Letter from the Chairman of Boughton Malherbe Council

2022/23 Parish Council Budget

The Parish Council has managed to maintain an extremely low budget for many years and has not raised its share of your council tax – known as "The Parish Precept". In recent years this has become increasingly difficult. The expectations placed on parish councils have increased year on year. As financial constraints restrict the capacity in higher level councils (Maidstone Borough and Kent CC) more expectations are placed on parish councils to ensure their areas are not neglected. Parish Councils now assume greater responsibility for:

- keeping an eye on our highways and suggesting, or funding, improvements and maintenance
- monitoring compliance with planning rules and ensuring enforcement action takes place
- keeping an eye on public rights of way and funding improvements
- monitoring and reporting fly tipping and litter
- taking action when vital community resources are under threat and taking steps to protect them
- maintaining the parish council website and ensuring that the work of the council is more transparent to the public

The volume of correspondence and consultation from higher levels of local government requiring responses also grow year on year.

Councillors are volunteers, and they are dependent on the support provided by the Parish Clerk to deal with this workload. The Clerk is the council's main resource and expenditure. The working hours of our Clerk have not changed over the years. Our Clerk is employed for 4 hours a week to do all this work which has increased way beyond this allocation. Other Parish Councils, of a similar size to us, have increased

their budget and Clerk hours over recent years to deal with this increased workload. We are now behind other comparable parishes in terms of our resourcing.

We are therefore proposing to increase the parish council budget from £6324 in 2021/22 to £8,614 in 2022/23 in order to increase the hours of the Clerk to 7 hours a week. This is still below other similar sized councils, but we are aware that we want to keep the increase in the precept as low as possible.

This budget increase will mean that the parish precept, for an average Band D council tax payer, will increase by £8.25 annually, or 16p a week.

The budget will be discussed and approved by the council on the **24th January** at 7pm in the Village hall and you are invited to attend the meeting where you can comment on this proposed increase in the public session, prior to the councillors considering a draft budget.

Minutes of the Parish Council on Monday 6th December 2021, 7.30pm in the village hall

Cllr Galton opened meeting at 7.30pm

- 1. Anybody filming or recording this meeting to declare it.
- 2. Apologies received apologies from Cllr Adams
- 3. Declarations:

Any lobbying - none

Any interest in items on the Agenda – Cllr Eastwood regarding item 6 Any changes to the register of pecuniary interests - none

- 4. Response to the Maidstone Borough Local Plan Review. Regulation 19 Draft submission the draft response was agreed subject to one amendment. Paragraph 3 should be removed and sent separately as a complaint regarding the lack of consultation about the expansion of the garden village. Clerk to submit the response to Maidstone Borough Council.
- 5. "Lengthsman" Contractor Chris Wheal provided an update on the current condition of hydrants and the importance of keeping them clear ffom overgrown vegetation. It was agreed that the specification would be amended and an advertisement produced for submission in Malherbe Monthly, the Downs Mail, village Facebook group and the website. A one-year contract will be offered, renewable annually. The Clerk will enquire whether the council's insurance will cover any liability if the Lengthsman clears vegetation from fire hydrants. The specification will be amended to reflect advise from the insurers.
- 6. Grant Request from the Shop Committee following receipt of a grant bid from the village shop committee, it was agreed in principle that the council will make a grant to the village shop initiative for the following items:
 - to investigate the practicalities of erecting a timber container of the village green £500 initial
 - to set up website and email to enhance communications £200 per year
 - to advise on all aspects of setting up a small village shop Plunkett Foundation membership £240
 - to set up legal registration using model rules £310
 - to hire village hall to gain more community involvement and consultation £90
 - to fund further posters, questionnaires, and leaflets printing costs £400
 - to fund other incidentals £250

It was agreed that an initial grant will be made immediately to the shop committee for the following items:

1.	Plunkett Foundation – membership	£240
2.	Set up legal registration using model rules	£310
	TOTAL GRANT	£550

- Clerk to prepare a letter to the committee setting out the terms of the grant. Once the committee has formally established itself as a legal entity, the remaining grant items will be paid. Subject to a formal agreement incorporating deliverables and reporting back to the council.
- 7. 2022/23 Budgets it was agreed that a draft budget will be prepared based on an increase in the Clerk's contracted hours from 4 to 7 per week. It was agreed that the Lengthsman will be funded from reserves in the first year as a trial period. The Clerk will draft a letter from the Chairman for Malherbe Monthly explaining the reasons for the budget increase and the impact on the precept. The Finance and Staffing Committee will meet separately on the 17th January to consider the draft budget and revised staffing arrangements in detail. The Clerk will circulate a draft budget and amended job description in advance.
- 8. Further information the Clerk advised that we have not received a response from Arriva regarding the bus damage to the fence. It was agreed that the Clerk will chase this up and, if a response had not been received in two weeks, Gavin Rees will be commissioned to repair the fence and the bill sent to Arriva.

We are delighted to let you know that we will be restoring Post Office services to Grafty Green on **Tuesday 18 January 2022 at 12:45- 2.15pm**, and weekly thereafter. The current branch is due to close on Wednesday 29 December 2021 at 11:00 following the withdrawal of the premises for Post Office use.

We are pleased to be able to reinstate the service as a Hosted Outreach service whilst we continue to seek a permanent solution. The new service will be operated from Grafty Green Village Hall, Church Road, Grafty Green, ME17 2BA by the postmaster from Headcorn Post Office and will offer a range of Post Office products and services.

Village Hall News

It seems a long time ago now but in early December our resident quizmaster Richard hosted his annual Christmas Quiz to a sell out crowd. Richard and his elves ensured that a good time was had by all.

We are seeking to strike a balance between the safety of hall users whilst keeping the hall open as much as possible so that we can all as a community enjoy the physical and mental benefits of meeting others and taking part in those many and varied activities that we all enjoy.

We are asking hall users to keep the hall well ventilated when in use, use the hand sanitiser provided when entering the hall, clean down regularly used surfaces such as light switches or door handles at the end of a session or activity and to wear a mask when moving around the hall with the exception that these can be removed if you are undertaking a physical activity. Pop Up Post Office - Tuesday 18th January 12.45pm to 2.15pm

As you know sadly our village Post Office will by the time you read this have closed and firstly I would like to thank Rob and his family for all their hard work and service to the village over the years and to wish them well for the future.

Whilst arrangements are being made to organise a community village shop we have been in discussion with the Royal Mail about the possibility of a temporary Pop-Up Post Office to be held once a week in the Village Hall to provide us all with at least a limited replacement service pending the establishment of the shop.

I am pleased to advise that progress is being made in that Royal Mail are happy with the location, have agreed in principle to a once-a-week service on a Tuesday between 12.45 pm and 2.15pm and subject to a satisfactory test of their equipment and their final sign off this service should be available shortly.

A Royal Mail notice has appeared detailing the start of the service on Tuesday 18th January, matters have become a little complicated and delayed with the staff who are organising it's implementation having contracted COVID and are at the time of writing self isolating. Please bear with us if there is some slippage on the timescales for it's introduction I will endeavour to keep you updated on progress.

Grafty Gourmet

This cakes is both gluten and diary free. It has a great moist sticky texture that is very moreish.

Gluten Free Clementine Cake

5 clementines
Vegetable oil for greasing
275g of caster sugar
300g of ground almonds
Seeds from 8-10 green cardamom pods, ground to a powder
1 teaspoon of gluten free baking powder
2 teaspoons of vanilla extract
6 large free-range eggs, lightly beaten
Juice of 1 lemon
1 cinnamon stick

- 1. Put 3 of the clementines in a pan of water, bring to the boil and simmer for about 2 hours until really tender, adding more water if necessary. Drain and leave to cool a little. Cut in half and pick out any pips, then blend the fruit (yes, skin and flesh) to a pulp in a food processor.
- **2**. Preheat the oven to 180°C (fan oven 160°C). Grease a 23cm springform cake tin, then line the base with baking paper.
- **3**. Put 225g of the caster sugar, the almonds, ground cardamom and baking powder in a large bowl. Stir, then make a well in the centre. Mix the pulped clementine's, vanilla extract and eggs in the well, then mix into the dry ingredients. Pour the mixture into the tin. Transfer to the oven and bake for 50-60 minutes.
- **4**. Meanwhile, squeeze the juice from the remaining 2 clementines into a pan. Add the lemon juice and the remaining 50g of caster sugar. Heat gently until the sugar is dissolved, then add the cinnamon stick and simmer for 3 minutes.
- **5**. Remove the cake from the oven and pierce the top in a few places with a skewer. Drizzle over the citrus syrup, then leave for 1 hour to soak in. Transfer the cake to a wire rack to cool completely.

News from your local MP - Helen Whatley

Countdown to Christmas

Earlier this month I called into Faversham to mark Small Business Saturday. The Christmas tree and lights were up in the Market Place and the whole town was wonderfully festive. It's that time of year when the clock starts to speed up and we begin to wonder how we can get everything done in time.

While this Christmas can only be better than last year, the spread of the new Omicron variant is a reminder that we are not yet out of the pandemic. The measures announced by the Prime Minister recently are a reflection of that reality.

And while I know that a return to face coverings and working from home will be frustrating for many, these are crucial steps to slow the spread of this new variant and get booster jabs into arms.

December saw the launch of our 10-year plan for social care - giving carers and the people they look after a clear plan for the future. It was a huge privilege to lead this work when I was Care Minister and I'm delighted to see the plan published.

We're also giving greater protection to nature through our Environment Act, which will see new duties on water companies to clean up their act. And we're delivering on our commitment to level up communities across the country, including more money for communities in Kent.

These next few weeks will be challenging. Everyone can help to keep our recovery on track by taking up the offer of getting a booster jab and following the latest guidance.

I wish everyone in Faversham and Mid Kent a very happy Christmas and New Year.

Get your booster jab

As our battle with the virus enters a new phase, it's vital everyone takes up the offer of getting a booster jab.

I got my booster in early December – joining over 600,000 people across Kent in getting a third jab. If you have not yet had your booster, you can book an appointment or find details for walk-in clinics on the Kent and Medway CCG website.

Since our vaccination programme started in December last year, over 3 million jabs have been given out across Kent. Huge thank you to everyone involved in this colossal task

.

Supporting our High Streets

While the pandemic has been tough for many businesses, the shop owners and traders I've spoken to recently are optimistic about the future

Across the country, we're helping high streets back on their feet after the pandemic with business rates halved for 90 per cent of retail, hospitality, and leisure businesses; training and professional advice through our Help to Grow scheme; and support for employers with our Plan for Jobs.

In Kent alone nearly 3,000 young people have been given work placements through the Kickstart Scheme and the number of people on job seekers support across the county continues to fall.

Cleaning up local water quality

Like many people, I've been shocked by stories of sewage ending up in our local rivers and coastline, and flooding caused by our creaking wastewater network. I put these concerns directly to the CEO of Southern Water, Ian McAulay, in a meeting I arranged at Faversham's Wastewater Treatment Works in November.

Having secured a £2 million investment in the treatment works, I was keen to see how this money will be used to clean up our water locally - including plans to increase capacity at the site. I've called for similar investment at the Harrietsham Wastewater Treatment Works.

Southern Water also committed to working with Kent County Council and local councillors to tackle the repeat local flooding incidents. I'll be keeping a close eye to make sure these commitments turn into action.

Crunch time for Maidstone Local Plan

While I support the main objectives of Maidstone Borough Council's Local Plan, I remain concerned about the proposed developments at Lidsing and Heathlands - which are strongly opposed by local residents.

I've had several recent conversations with Housing Secretary, Michael Gove, about the need to look again at overall housing numbers. We do need new homes, but Kent mustn't be expected to take more than our fair share.

Meanwhile... Covid cases meant that the Meadows Inquiry in Headcorn, which I was due to speak at earlier this month, was postponed until March next year. I share residents' concerns about the delay, and I've written to Housing Minister Chris Pincher to ask how we can make sure the Inquiry goes ahead.

Making our streets safer

There are now record numbers of police in Kent, and the new Maidstone Task Force is making fantastic progress in tackling drugs and violence in Shepway – with 50 vehicles seized and 175 arrests made in the last 12 months.

We're also giving police new powers to tackle drug gangs, and our new 10-year drugs plan will prevent more people from falling into addiction in the first place.

In the New Year, I'll be chairing another meeting in Headcorn for an update on work to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour in the village.

Christian Message January 2022

Happy New Year!

It seems strange to be writing those words, as it is still November at the time of writing and Christmas is still a few weeks away. Covid -19 will probably come to define the third decade of this century as it casts its shadow into another year. The opening passage of John's Gospel which is read at every Midnight Mass includes the words: 'The light shines on in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it'. In order to have shadow there must also be light. Christians believe that Christ is this light. Despite the darkness of last year, the light of Christ still shines on in hope. Light is a synonym for good in the bible and darkness is a synonym for evil; however, although they are opposites they are not equal. A small candle will always light up a darkened room.

This time last year we had no vaccines, no widespread and community-based testing. Planes were grounded. Here we are another year later and we have so much to be thankful for including a rediscovered sense of community spirit. I imagine that everyone reading this will have their own personal experiences and perspectives to relate to, and there can have been few such unifying phenomena experienced collectively by so many millions of people in the course of history.

Amanda Gorman, a young American poet spoke great words of hope in her powerful poem at the inauguration of Joe Biden as president last January. I share the first line and last lines here:

When day comes, we ask ourselves
Where can we find light in this never-ending shade?

For there is always light, If only we're brave enough to see it. If only we're brave enough to be it'. (From: The Hill We Climb).

I end with three questions:

- Are we brave enough to see and acknowledge that this light is the light of Christ?
- Are we brave enough to be that light to others and share in the hope that Christmas has brought us again?
- Are we brave enough to step out with courage into a new way of being; a beacon of light and love to our communities? I hope so.


