#### **Report from the Chair**

Most of the councillors and both members of staff went on the recent training and were all successful in gaining their certificates for 'off to a flying start'.

The library has finally opened and is beginning to have an impact, so hope everyone heard the BBC Radio Northampton broadcast promoting its work. The volunteers have a list of events planned for villagers to enjoy so please support them. The councils' thanks go to all those supporters who have worked hard for this long, awaited opening to take place.

Some of the older equipment is to be repaired on the Recreation Ground in Wollaston Road. Those older members of the village will be relieved to know that the rocking horse is to get a new lease of life and not be scrapped as some people feared. It would be interesting to find out just how old it is. I know it's at least 63 years old but can anyone remember when it first appeared? The recreation working party are looking at equipment for the over 10's to make the recreation ground more interesting but this has had to be put back for a short while because of the repair costs. Any good ideas will be much appreciated.

We have had good feedback on the new seat that we put on Pear Tree Corner in memory of all those people who died in the covid pandemic. It certainly brightens up that area. It does make the other seat look a bit dull but plans are afoot to replace that one with something more colourful. The seats that are removed will be used to replace old, damaged ones elsewhere.

The bus shelter at the entrance to the Recreation Ground has been painted as have the railings around the War Memorial at Little Irchester. There is still some work to be done on other items around the village.

The car park next to the bowls club is to be marked out with parking bays. Thursday is the best day to do this but every time they come to mark it out it pours with rain. Oh, how we longed for rain in the summer but now I wish it wouldn't rain on a Thursday!! It will be done before it snows, I hope.

In November we will be setting the budget for the next financial year and considering plans for the future.

#### **IRCHESTER COMMUNITY ORCHARD.**

All the trees got through the heatwave, although not bearing a great deal of fruit, it was their first season. I am hoping for a better crop next year of course weather permitting.

We have measured out for four raised flower beds, these are not solely for flowers but vegetables as well. The beds will be made from old sleepers, treated to take the extremes of the weather that we keep experiencing. They will be low lying so that the disabled and children can use them and wide enough for anyone to perch on them and be able to reach across.

We will also be planting daffodil and tulips amongst the trees, these will hopefully attract bees, butterflies and, other insects to help with cross pollination.

We have listed the Orchard on various sites showing that the Parish is helping with our carbon footprint none less than H.M The Queen's Green Canopy. It is vital that we try and restore the imbalance of house building, the loss of land and trees needs to be redressed and if our Orchard helps in its small way then that can only be a good thing.

Again, please can I remind you all that this is your Orchard, we are trying to do our best, if there are any keen gardeners that have just a hour or two a week to lend a hand please contact either Councillors Armstrong or Watts (our telephone contact numbers are published in the village voice) we will be happy to have you on board also if you have any extra bulbs over and would like to give to the Orchard again please contact either Councillor.

Finally, please can the lady who contacted me at the beginning of the Orchard re-donating a tree get in touch as it is coming around the time for the planting of fruit trees. The two ladies who have donated a walnut and a sweet almond thank you these were given to the Northampton Orchards as they have larger areas to take those type of trees.

I would on behalf of All concerned with the Orchard like to wish you a Joyful Christmas and a Happy New Year.

# Book Corner

If you are reading this article then no doubt you will have heard of Alexander McCall Smith's book called 'The No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency' which is set in Botswana and features Mma Precious Ramotswe. How many of you knew, though, that McCall Smith has written 23 books in that series alone (one of my favourite chapter headings being 'How to Deal with an Angry Ostrich') with 15 in the Scotland Street series and 17 in the (my favourite) Isabel Dalhousie set, as well as the Corduroy Mansions series, plus children's books and various academic books? My goodness, I think the word 'prolific' could have been coined just for Mr McCall Smith. I daren't add up the total number of books as no doubt it would be out of date before I finished the sentence – but it must be over 100.

Alexander McCall Smith, CBE, FRSE, is a British writer who was raised in Southern Rhodesia and was formerly a Professor of Medical Law at the University of Edinburgh, as well as a respected expert on medical law and bioethics and who served on British and international committees.


I first read *The Right Attitude to Rain* (2006) which I picked up in a charity shop as I had enjoyed *The No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency*. Readers of novels will know the pleasurable feeling of "oh, that was good. I wonder if there are any more in the series" – and finding that, yes, there are, several! *The Right Attitude to Rain* is actually the third in the series of Isabel Dalhousie novels and, although they can be read independently of each other, they are probably best read in order (which I am now doing).

*The Sunday Philosophy Club* (2004) is the first of this group and is where we are introduced to Isabel Dalhousie, a Philosopher who somehow always gets involved in other people's difficulties, despite the fact that she edits the *Review of Applied Ethics*, a respected magazine. A moral philosopher who edits a magazine on ethics, will this be a difficult read? No, not at all, and that is down to Isabel herself who is quirky and funny and intelligent and thoughtful. The books are not complicated mystery or detective stories but are in fact, charming and, IMHO, very enjoyable.

Apart from that, Isabel Dalhousie novels are set in Edinburgh, which is now firmly on my list of places I want to visit. I hope you find them as satisfying as I do (and I am only half way through the series).




We have talked about autumn and the changes that we might see in the environment during this season, and sung lots of autumn and Harvest songs.

We are delighted to announce that our French friends in the Coulon Link are busy planning their visit to Irchester in April and our own plans are now being made to welcome them back following the disruption caused by the pandemic.

So as we head up to celebrating Christmas here are a few traditions held in France during the festive season.

As in many countries in Europe, the French celebrate Christmas with a Christmas tree or sapin de noël which they decorate with lights, ornaments and tinsel. The tradition originated in Alsace in the 14th century when decorations included apples, paper flowers, and ribbons. It was introduced into France in 1837.

Traditionally, children place their shoes in front of the fireplace hoping to have them filled with gifts. Nuts, sweets, fruit and small toys are hung on the tree over night ready to be discovered in the morning. However, along with *Père or Papa Noël (Father Christmas), comes a rather less welcome character, Père Fouettard.* 

(known as The Whipping Father) who might hand out lumps of coal and has a stick with which to 'chastise' the naughty children!

In churches and many homes the 'crèche' can be found. These are filled with santons or little Saints. When driving round France at Christmas time these scenes can often be found displayed in front gardens.

'Living crèches' such as plays and puppet shows and based on the Nativity, are often performed to teach the important ideas of Christianity and the Christmas season.

And of course you couldn't describe Christmas traditions in France without mentioning food. Le Réveillon de Noël is eaten on Christmas Eve evening and also on the evening prior to New Year's Day. It is a meal that can last for a number of hours and it's name comes from the word réveil, which literally means 'waking'. Attending a réveillon means staying up [and probably eating] until after midnight. The food is often rich and is accompanied by plenty of wine or champagne. Seafood is very popular as well as a variety of fowl.

The pièce de résistance of the meal is often *la bûche de noël, a log-shaped cake similar to a swiss roll. It has a fluffy frosting and is a light, airy cake.* 

Following the meal a candle is often left burning just in case the virgin Mary should pass by.

We would like to wish everyone a happy and peaceful Christmas and look forward to seeing many of you at our events during 2023.

### Ingredients

100 g (3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>oz) butter, softened, plus extra to grease
100g (3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>oz) ready-made cranberry sauce
2 tbsp. golden syrup
100 g (3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>oz) dark brown soft sugar
2 medium eggs, beaten
100 g (3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>oz) plain flour
1 tbsp. mixed spice, heaped
300 g (11oz) mixed dried fruit
1 medium apple, peeled and grated

## Directions

Grease a 1.2 litre (2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> pint) pudding basin. In a small bowl, stir together cranberry sauce and golden syrup. Spoon two-thirds of the mixture into the base of the prepared basin, reserving the remaining mixture.

In a separate bowl, beat together the butter, sugar, eggs, flour, mixed spice, dried fruit and grated apple until well combined. Spoon the mixture into the prepared basin and press a large piece of parchment paper on to the pudding to cover the surface.

Microwave on medium power for 9min until firm to the touch. Leave to stand for 10min before turning out on to a plate. Spoon over reserved cranberry mixture and serve immediately with the Amaretto Sauce.

Dear friends, as I write this, we are approaching the end of October and I am drawing together plans for the Advent and Christmas season at St Katharine's. There is a rhythm to Church life which I find really powerful at this time of year – the weeks of Advent, our carol services, Christingle and Midnight Mass, are all waymarkers through the preparation for our Christmas celebrations as we meet the baby Jesus afresh each year.

As a child growing up here in Irchester, I cannot recall the excitement for Christmas really beginning before December, although my family were subjected to me practising The First Nowell and the like on the recorder, violin and later the clarinet, from early November in anticipation of the many Christmas concerts and carol services I would play in. Christmas carols conjure up for me many happy memories of my childhood, with words printed on two huge hanging

I love the fact that young children meet Christmas afresh each year – never losing sight of the mystery, awe and wonder of the season. However, that awe and wonder needs to be savoured and enjoyed. Imagine setting out to make the most amazing decorated chocolate cake (other flavours are available!): creaming, beating, sifting and folding until your arms ache. Then you pop it into the oven and, as soon as it is ready, lift it out onto the cooking rack.....and eat it there and then, standing at the kitchen counter. I suggest that you would be disappointed. Imagine how much better it would taste with butter icing and chocolate decorations sitting on the sofa with a cup of tea. Worth the wait.

For Christians, Advent is that period of waiting, that time of anticipation of the joy which is to come. A time to slow down as the Christmas story slowly begins to unfold. In our busy world we could all do with some slowing down and some stillness in our lives, so I would invite you to take some time out this Advent. When I'm worried, I take comfort in the Bible and the book of Ruth, in the Old Testament, is a favourite of mine. It's only a little book just four chapters long, but it gives a big message on how God provided for some women who experienced tragic circumstances.

When a famine hit Israel, a family from Bethlehem moved to Moab. Whilst there, the husband died, leaving his wife Naomi a widow. They had two sons who married Moabite women, and both sons died too, leaving two daughters-in-law, one of whom was called Ruth. There were no social security benefits to help them, and their custom dictated that a near relative should look after them, but they had migrated to a foreign land. One of the daughters-in-law went back to her own Moabite family, but Ruth determined to stay with Naomi, and when they heard that the famine had ended in Israel, they returned to Bethlehem. They arrived as poor widows with no prospects, but Ruth went to work in the field of a good and kind man called Boaz, who just happened to be a near relative! Ruth married Boaz, had children and eventually Ruth became the great-grandmother of King David, and a descendant of Jesus Christ! How well God provided for these women, and what an honour to be listed in the genealogy of the Messiah! (Ruth and Boaz are listed in Matthew 1.8)

No matter how devasting our present situation may be, God can turn it around if we believe and hope in Him. His resources are endless, and He will provide what we need. And, if we are willing, He will use us to help others in need too.

One of Jesus' brothers, James, wrote a letter to the early believers who were being persecuted for their faith and suffering terribly. At the beginning of the letter James wrote, "Consider it pure joy my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." It is very hard to consider it pure joy when we go through hard times, it's a big ask, but I can tell you from personal experience that if we can trust the LORD, we will experience His care and provision, just like Naomi and Ruth.

None of us knows what is around the corner and what we will face tomorrow. And trouble will come to us all, whether we are believers or not. The verse in James says, "**whenever** you face trials", not "**if**". Speaking personally, we recently learned that my husband's cancer has advanced, and at the time of writing, Jim is waiting for a referral to Northampton Oncology. We know that there is a difficult road ahead, but we trust God to give us strength for each day. We know that He will, because He has done it before, many times.

So whatever difficulties you are facing today, don't face it alone. Talk to the LORD about it, say sorry for all the times you have ignored him or rebelled against Him. He cares about you and will make a way where there seems to be no way. And you will always be welcome at Reachout. Our service starts at 11am each Sunday.

# MAKE A BEE HOTEL

#### What you need

- Three clean tin cans
- Bamboo canes
- Non-toxic PVA glue
- Wood glue
- Paint
- Two thin pieces of wood for the roof
- A thin square piece of wood for the back of the hotel



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#### Instructions

- Place the piece of wood you have chosen for the back of your bee hotel on the floor. Put wood glue on the bottom of the cans and stick them to the wood in a pyramid shape (two below, one on top). Leave them to dry for an hour.
- 2. Take the pieces of wood for your roof and place them in a triangle shape covering the cans. Glue the wood into place and leave them to dry for an hour.
- 3. Ask an adult to help you cut the bamboo canes into short sections the depth of the tin cans. Place a little PVA glue on the end of each cane and push it into the can. Fill up the can with the canes.
- 4. Now your bee hotel is nearly ready. Paint it in bright colours and patterns (with non-toxic paint) and leave it in a quiet, sunny, place outside for the bees to start using.

# Gardening Tips

# Flowers

Plant bare-root roses, shrubs, hedging and ornamental trees, as long as the ground isn't frozen.

Take root cuttings of fleshy-rooted perennials such as oriental poppies, acanthus and verbascums.

Establish new colonies of snowdrops and hellebores by buying plants in flower, so you can choose the prettiest blooms.

Clear away soggy, collapsed stems of perennials and compost them.

Take hardwood cuttings from deciduous shrubs, such as forsythia, willow and viburnum.

Remove and bin hellebore foliage marked with black blotches, to limit the spread of leaf spot disease.

Press mistletoe berries into the bark of apple trees to establish your own mistletoe plants.

Check that small alpines don't become smothered by fallen leaves and other wind-blown debris.

Deadhead winter pansies and other bedding regularly, and remove any foliage affected by downy mildew.

Move dormant plants that are in the wrong place to more suitable sites.


