#### **Grafty Garden Cuttings - April**

Everyone can compost, no matter the size of garden, a compost container can be built or purchased to suit. A wormery can deal with kitchen waste and small amounts of well chopped garden waste, while anything goes from there on up. It is best not to encourage rats and other vermin by adding kitchen waste to an open heap, so a lidded bin on a good base is ideal here. A barrow load of grass clippings mixed in occasionally plus junk mail and any other paper that can be shredded all helps the rotting process. (No glossy, highly coloured or plastic coated paper and no see-through envelope windows). Wet newspaper and tissues can also be added and the whole lot will rot down very quickly.

It does take a surprisingly long time to actually fill the container though. Our garden waste goes into huge heaps surrounded by tin sheets and wire and I have three. One is for leaves only, one in use and the other left for a year to rot down and being spread on the ground. Everything goes in, apart from seed heads and pernicious weeds like couch grass, ground elder and bindweed. This method is known as the cold heap method, as I have neither the time nor the energy to turn the tons involved every few weeks, which would be the ideal, plus I build up the heap over the course of the year, so not enough heat is generated for the hot heap method. Again, it helps to chop or shred any sizeable pieces, especially if it is woody. Anything dubious that needs dealing with can be sealed into a black plastic bag with a few holes punched into it, placed somewhere out of sight for a year or two and left to fester: even the worst weeds will eventually succumb. The outcome of all this work can be sieved and used as potting compost, spread on the ground as a mulch as it comes, or dug in and is an excellent soil conditioner with some nutrients for the plants as well.

Everything is gearing up to seed sowing and planting: early potatoes should be in, with main the crop planted towards the end of the month and many other vegetables can be sown. Keep in mind that frosts can strike at any time from now until early June, so timing is of the essence for such as cucurbits and beans, both runner and French, which are all susceptible. I am planning on sowing a good selection of root vegetables including beetroot, which until now have been rather neglected especially as a winter food - no longer, for we have discovered the delights of beetroot chutney. \*

**Visits enjoyed:** Wisley at the beginning of March with wonderful displays of crocus, cyclamen corm, snowdrops, Hammamalis and hellebores and one that involved birds: the Wildlife and Wetland Trust's reserve at Arundel. Only a 2 hour drive and we enjoyed seeing many and varied ducks, geese, swans et al in large numbers, on paths that are mostly level and paved and suitable for all, including both push and wheel chairs.

\* Recipe can be found in the Good Housekeeping Complete Book of preserving, but be warned, visitors arriving during the making of this chutney may think a foul crime has been committed! White or golden beetroot have a little less flavour but none of the staining properties.

#### The Grafty Gourmet

Yet another very simple recipe for you to try. This is a great alternative to seafood risotto. Long-grain rice can be used instead of risotto rice, but it won't give you the traditional, creamy texture that is typical of Italian risottos. I usually use unsalted cashew nuts, instead of peanuts, but either will do.

#### **Italian Chicken Risotto**

#### Serves 4

2 tbsp sunflower oil
15 g (1/2 oz)1 tbsp butter or margarine
1 medium leek, thinly sliced
1 large yellow pepper, diced
3 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, diced
350 g (12 oz) risotto rice
a few strands of saffron
1.5 litres (2 3/4 pints) chicken stock
200 g (7 oz) can sweetcorn (drained)
60 g (2 oz) 1/2 cup toasted unsalted peanuts or cashew nuts
60 g (2 oz) 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
salt and pepper

- 1. Heat the sunflower oil and butter or margarine in a large saucepan. Fry the leek and pepper for 1 minute, then stir in the chicken and cook, stirring until golden brown.
- 2. Stir in the risotto rice and cook for 2 3 minutes.
- 3. Stir in the saffron strands and salt and pepper to taste. Add the chicken stock, a little at a time, cover and cook over a low heat, stirring occasionally, for about 20 minutes, or until the rice is tender and most of the liquid has been absorbed. Do not let the risotto dry out add more stock if necessary.
- 4. Stir in the sweetcorn, peanuts or cashew nuts and Parmesan cheese. Then season with salt and pepper to taste and stir for a further 2 minutes.

#### The April Night Sky

The sun is in the constellation of Pisces at the start of April, and moves into Aries on the 18<sup>th</sup> April.

Full Moon occurs on Thursday  $9^{th}$  April, when the Moon is in Virgo, and New Moon on Saturday  $25^{th}$  April.

For a while now it has not been possible to see Mercury. However, this month there is an opportunity to see this small planet in the western sky after sunset. After Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> April shortly after 9:00 pm BST, it will appear as a tiny dot just above the horizon slightly north of due west.

At the end of last month Venus was at inferior conjunction (almost directly in front of the Sun). During April it rises in the east about an hour before sunrise. Although still very bright it will not be easy to see just above the horizon at dawn.

As I reported last month we will not be getting any good views of Mars or Jupiter until late summer. However towards the end of the month you should be able to spot Jupiter low in the south-eastern sky early in the morning before sunrise.

Again this month you should be able to get some good views of Saturn through a telescope. Saturn rises in the east in the middle of the afternoon, and reaches its highest point in the sky to the south in the late evening. You should clearly see the disc of Saturn together with many of its moons. The famous rings will appear as a narrow oval.

Towards the end of April the Lyrid meteor-shower should be active. The meteors will seem to radiate outwards from a point in the constellation of Lyra, close to the bright star Vega, which is high in the southeast after midnight.

A number of you may have read early last month that NASA has launched a rocket in search of answers to the age-old question: "Are there other worlds like ours out there?"

The Kepler mission with a sophisticated telescope, named after the 17<sup>th</sup> century German astrophysicist, will not be looking for signs of life, but will be focused on the so-called 'habitable zone' within our own galaxy. Up to now Astronomers have found over 300 planets orbiting other stars, but they are mainly inhospitable gas-based giants similar to Jupiter. The latest update on the mission is that Kepler is about 1 million miles away, which is about 4.5 times the distance to the moon.

#### The Samaritans

The UK now has one of the highest attempted suicide rates in Europe. Last year alone, at least 142,000 people tried to take their own lives. Of those, around 6,000 sadly succeeded – leaving countless grieving family members to face life without them.

Samaritans take some small comfort from the fact that without their phone lines, thousands more people could have lost their loved ones. However, they rely on the

financial support of givers, and it is clear that they need assistance to continue to reach out to people in distress.

They do not just man telephones, valuable though that is. They target groups they have identified as being particularly vulnerable to suicide, so that they can help people to deal with their feelings before they become suicidal. For example, their current project is to increase their work with young people, and to channel help to their volunteers who take the message of prevention into colleges, and who teach students how to look out for each other.

During the foot and mouth crisis they increased their work in rural areas, and distributed 60,000 copies of their booklet "coping with stress".

They believe that only by reaching out in ways like these can they hope to reduce the shocking suicide rates in the UK. And they need your help.

#### Christian Message – April 2009

I suppose we must all remember some particular journeys we have taken. Some of them have been long and tiring, some have been beautiful, some we have enjoyed the company and often they might have been journeys which have not gone according to our plans. For instance, we might remember problems of reading maps, or taking short cuts which have led to us becoming very lost.

I recall the surprise of outstandingly beautiful views as we drove through Western Ireland on a holiday. I remember having to keep young children amused as we travelled on long journeys. And then there was a car journey to an interview north of Manchester. It was an important interview which would span 3 days. Of course, I wanted to make sure I would be there in time, but, as I approached Manchester I discovered that the motorway was closed. I found I was exploring unfamiliar territory, with the knowledge that I would now be late arriving. Of course, when I arrived I discovered that everyone else had experienced the same problem and that was how we broke the ice, sharing the experiences we had all had on that journey.

In the Christian calendar our journey to the Easter season began on Ash Wednesday which was on 25<sup>th</sup> February this year. Sine then we have been travelling through the season of Lent and looking forward to the glory of Easter day. This journey for the Christian is a journey of purpose and focus. Jesus began his journey to Jerusalem resolutely. There was no indecisiveness in his course of action. Like our life journeys his would take some unusual twists in surprising directions, that are often not the easy way.

I wonder if you can remember part of your life journey when the travelling had taken longer than expected but you may have concluded that 'it was meant to be'? When we say that, do we mean that God had wanted us to take that particular route to accomplish some particular purpose?

At other times we might actually have chosen to take the longer route through our short-sightedness, or maybe we have tried the short cut which has taken us somewhere quite different to where we had intended to go.

We read in Luke 9; 51 that Jesus set his face to go to Jerusalem. As we travel towards Easter let us decide where we will set our face to look for our guidance and our focus on our continuing life journey.
