

It seems hard to believe that another year seems to have flown by and everyone is now preparing for the Christmas party season and the start of another year. My mother always told me time gets quicker as you get older and she certainly was right!

The Parish Council have had another busy year and the Parish Council elections in May now are a distant memory. The three new Councillors continue to learn about the role and are contributing alongside of the three councillors that continue to serve. There remains one vacancy for anyone who may be interested in getting more involved in the community? Why not come along to the next Parish Council meeting and see what may be involved?

Annual Walk About

You may have seen the Parish Councillors and the Clerk walking around the village on a wet Sunday morning in November. We find this a very useful opportunity to look at the condition of the assets (bins/noticeboards etc) that the Parish Council are responsible for, but also to look at the condition of the Roads/Footways, grassed areas and highway drainage that others are responsible for. Last year this resulted in the footway surfacing in the village, which has made a big difference. All work identified this year has been reported to the relevant authority. With the current financial constraints, it is unclear when the works identified may be carried out, but we will continue to monitor the situation and raise with our County/District Councillor as may be necessary. We are now at the end of the grass cutting season and as far the Parish Council are aware, there have been only a few teething troubles with the new contract this year. If you have spotted a problem that you think needs addressing and you think we have missed, please get in touch.

As this year comes to an end and thoughts of new year resolutions are in the air – how about going organic or growing your own, just a short walk from your front door? If you are interested, please contact the Parish Clerk for current availability. There are some half plots as well as full plots, if you would like to have a go, but don't wish to commit to a full plot.

World Challenge 2019 - Madagascar Ellie Michael

On the 17th of July this year I set off on my World Challenge expedition to Madagascar along with a small group of students and teachers from my school. It was an amazing experience and one I will never forget.

Madagascar is a third world country, experiencing some of the most extreme poverty in the world yet one of the most inspirational things to see was how happy the people there were despite the poverty they face every day.

The first destination of our trip was Ranomafana National Park, a tropical rainforest home to incredible wildlife including ring-tailed lemurs, mongoose and the critically endangered golden bamboo lemur which we did have the privilege of seeing. This trek was tough but we worked as a team to get through it and had an amazing local guide showing us the way and teaching us about everything we were seeing. It was also amazing to see such unique and interesting animals completely in their natural habitat.

Moving on to the second stage of our expedition, we were working at a school in Ifanadiana, a small remote community, helping to renovate the classrooms. When we arrived at the school the students performed a traditional Malagasy dance to welcome us and show their gratitude for our help which was really emotional for us but also so lovely. Over the next few days we got to know some of the staff and students better and they were all so willing to get stuck in, helping us scrape old paint of the walls and paint the classrooms in the colours of the Malagasy flag. We also played games with the students and had the pleasure of being taught how to make some traditional Malagasy foods by the staff. This project was definitely one of my favourite parts of the trip because we got to spend so much time within the community and learn so much about the culture.

Next was our second trek, to the top of the mountain 'Peak Boby' which was equally as challenging as our previous trek, if not more so and this wasn't just a physical challenge. Due to unexpected circumstances we unfortunately could not complete this second trek and we had to pull together and become a really strong team to work through what was happening and what we were going to do next. Even though we did not reach the peak of the mountain as we had planned, the views we saw on our trek were absolutely breathtaking and something we are unlikely to ever see again.

After our expedition on the mountain we headed to the D'Anja community park which is a small forest home to many ring tailed lemurs, chameleons and zebu. We again had a local guide who taught us about the forest and the things we were seeing, including a lot of information about the ancient tribes who lived in Madagascar in forests such as this one.

We then moved on to the city of Toliara, one of the more tourist areas within the country, where we visited the local markets to buy fresh produce which was a nice luxury as we had been eating a lot of rice, pasta and tinned vegetables for a large proportion of the trip. We stayed here for one night in a hotel resort where we had the luxury of a swimming pool and an amazing restaurant before moving onto the final challenge of our expedition. We visited the Honko Mangrove Project where we repaired the boardwalks and with the help of another World Challenge group also helped make a dock for canoes which was tough work, especially as this area of Madagascar was so warm. In the evening we had a big feast with all the food we had got left from our trip and the fresh food we had bought in the city which was really nice and we then spent the rest of the evening sat on the sand dunes next to the mangroves where there was an amazing view of the beautiful clear night sky.

For the final few days of our trip we had time for some rest and relaxation on the beach of Mangily. We stayed in apartments right on the beach, took part in snorkelling and whale watching and spent time by the pool in the Bamboo Club resort.

Before we left Madagascar we took an internal flight back to the capital city of Antananarivo ready for our flight home. We had a bit of time here to have a final look around and we explored a huge craft market where we bought many souvenirs, gifts and keepsakes to treasure and remember our trip by before we finally headed back to the UK.

This trip truly was a once in a lifetime experience and I am so grateful I had the opportunity to visit such an amazing country. I just want to thank everyone who helped me fundraise, I am so grateful for all your help which allowed me to go on such a fantastic expedition. As well as all the beautiful things I got to see and all the wonderful people I got to meet, I also got to be part of a great team who worked so well together throughout the whole trip as we booked transport, managed expenses and cooked meals as well as completing all the sections of our trip to the best of our abilities.

In September, guest speaker, Charles Parker returned to give a presentation on “The History of Fiskerton Airfield”. It opened in January 1943 and the first operations were on 16 and 17 January. Up to 36 Lancaster bombers were used here. There were 3 squadrons based at the RAF site. Charles showed us a “day in the life” type scenario from old photos he displayed. The photos from the 1940s were aerial views and pictures of the aircraft and crew. Fiskerton was one of only 15 RAF airfields that had FIDO (Fog Investigation and Dispersal Operation). This was a system where two pipelines, one on each side of the runway through which fuel would run would have the vapours lit & the walls of flames would burn off fog allowing returning aircraft to land safely. The squadrons based here were 49 and 576 who ran Operations Preenemunde and Manna respectively. The camp was closed in 1951 and given to the Ministry of Agriculture. The land and some buildings were used for several years as a school, knitting factory and the HQ of the Royal Observer Corps. There are plaques on the airfield land, donated by the farmer, and in the church commemorating RAF Fiskerton.

In October, Guest speaker, Sam Millard, returned with a presentation called “History Mystery”. He told us stories from history, and we had to work out the link. It turns out that all the stories subsequently became recorded in history through nursery rhymes. The stories were as follows.

“Georgie Porgie”. Based on the tale of George Villiers. 1st Duke of Buckingham. A favourite of King James I & VI and a bit of a lady’s man.

“Humpty Dumpty”. The nickname of a large cannon that fell when a tower in Colchester collapsed after being repeatedly shot at during the English Civil War.

“The Grand Old Duke of York”. He was Richard Plantagenet who thought he was going to be king on the death of Henry VI.

“Mary had a Little Lamb”. In New England, little Mary Sawyer was late for school on the day the school inspector and his nephew came to visit. The reason was that her pet lamb had followed her. The nephew wrote a three-verse poem about it, the first verse being the nursery rhyme we are familiar with.

“Little Jack Horner”. This story is set during the dissolution of the monasteries. The Bishop of Glastonbury sent a gift to Henry VIII of 12 deeds to local properties hidden in a pie to try to appease him. The messenger, Thomas “Jack” Horner stole one of these deeds from the pie for himself.

“Ring O’ Roses”. Of course, everyone knew that this was a story about the plague. Sam put us straight on this and told us that it simply wasn’t true! This was a surprise and a trick question!

“Three Blind Mice”. Queen Mary I had three cardinals betray her when she was a princess and her mother Catherine of Aragon’s marriage to Henry VIII was declared to not be legal. Once she became queen, she had them hunted down and killed.

We’ve also had 3 donations to our archives recently. Syd Doughty has donated his 1957 winner trophy for the church institute billiard league (marked as “unknown” on the list in the Harby History book). David Potter of Collingham donated a copy of the book he has written about RAF Wigsley and the men who served there. George Dickinson has donated copies of the plans from the church restoration. Thank you to all three.


