#### **COUNCILLOR VACANCY**

Following the recent resignation of Keith Daley, there is a vacancy on the Parish Council. If you are interested in finding out more, please get in touch. Our thanks go to Keith for his work as Councillor and Vice Chair and we wish him all the best for the future.

#### **VILLAGE GATES**

Parish councillors agreed to the purchase of white village gates to be situated in front of the existing 40mph and village name signs at the east and west end of the village. These are designed to act as a physical and visual reminder to drivers to reduce speed and give a distinct entry point to the community. The ones we have selected are made of sturdy recycled plastic and will therefore need little maintenance beyond an occasional wipe over.

#### **BOLLARDS**

It was agreed to purchase eight square black posts with reflective banding to be installed around the grassed area at the village end of the Old Bridge, to prevent vehicles parking here. Again, these are sturdily made of recycled plastic and should have a long life.

#### **MEMORIAL HALL**

The Hall management committee is facing the significant financial challenge of needing to install a new toilet block, to replace the old wornout facilities and meet the needs of all users. The parish council will do what they can to support this and also to help signpost the Hall committee to available sources of funding.

The Memorial Hall always welcomes ideas for events that will boost community spirit and help with raising funds for this precious amenity.

# A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY... THE RIVERBANK AT ATCHAM

The Severn riverbank, between the Mytton & Mermaid's garden and the tower of St Eata's, and the riverbed below, contain archaeological remains that explain much of the village's history over the last 800 years. Just to the right of the churchyard gates is a parking space for three cars, overlooking the river. Visitors might be surprised to find that, parking there, they are obstructing the main London to Shrewsbury road – or at least they would have been before 1769 when the Georgian bridge was built. For this is the surviving end, the abutment, of the old Atcham Bridge. This is confirmed by a look in the pub garden below that shows, below the loose stones of a rockery, the solid sandstonerubble core of the medieval bridge. Any remaining doubts are removed by an estate plan of 1746 in Shropshire Archives that confirms the old bridge on this very spot.

Neither is it a coincidence that it is directly opposite this point that the little rocky rapid appears whenever the river is low. A close look at the 'rocks' on the riverbed here (a facemask and snorkel help) shows that they are mostly squared building stones and some of them appear to be in place: Atcham rapid is, in fact, the foundations of the medieval bridge remaining in the riverbed, with gravel piling up behind to form the beach.

Old Atcham Bridge is known to have been built by the Lord of the Manor, the Abbot of Lilleshall, in 1220. But what has long baffled historians are the references about a century later to townspeople (burgesses) at Atcham: it seems that the abbots of Lilleshall tried to promote Atcham as a new town, but who, in their right mind, would try to develop a new town right on Shrewsbury's doorstep? The answer may lie below this same stretch of riverbank where, between the old bridge and the church, are the remains of a wharf or quay, of high-quality medieval stonework. The central stretch of this quay is visible just above water every summer, at the bottom of the riverbank just inside the churchyard where it still stands a metre and a half high above the riverbed (see photo).

But its foundations continue past the church and it was evidently around 27 metres long. Why is it here? In this writer's opinion it was built to compete with the quays in Shrewsbury: barges offloading onto carts here could have their cargo in the town almost within the hour, and were saved the bother of the seven-mile river-trip around the huge loops of the Uffington area and at least five obstructing fish-weirs. Atcham it seems, may have been developed as a medieval port town.

# **BERRINGTON PARISH COUNCIL**

#### FLETCHER HOMES DEVELOPMENT

Many residents attended both the October and November parish council meetings to express their opinions on the proposed development submitted by Fletcher Homes for 55 homes in Cross Houses. In October, the Parish Council listened to comments from the public and resolved to object to the application in its current form. Concerns around the proposals included the loss of privacy, parking provision, highway safety, traffic impact, provision of affordable housing, community benefits and developer engagement. In November, the developer's agent sent a Senior Planning Consultant to the meeting, who listened to residents concerns. At the meeting, it was communicated that a decision on the application may take up to six months, during which time the applicant will revisit the plans based upon community comments.

#### **VILLAGE GATEWAYS**

Representatives of Berrington Parish Council met with the supplier for the Village Gateways,

which are expected to be installed in 2026 at the 30mph signs at both ends of the village.

They appreciate this time as an opportunity to be together as a school family, a daily time for reconnection and personal development. It is a time that binds the school community and reinforces the vision to show and share love. Adults and pupils are welcomed into worship and invited to take part. Worship leaders value their role. They support the structure and lead on special occasions in school and church. They act as role models, encouraging participation and leading singing. Adults are enabled to lead worship through professional development, clear guidance and support. Pupils benefit from a repeated structure. 

# **COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH**

A big thanks from the Community to those of you who have turned out / put their names forward to help deliver the Community Speed Watch Programme, designed to make our village of Cross Houses a safer place.

To-date six people have put themselves forward - programme organiser Jim Healey has told The Village Pump that his team can always do with more help as the more hands the easier the task.

Currently the team are waiting for West Mercia Police to review and sign off DBS paperwork. Then the training on the speed gun equipment can take place.

Once trained up the team are hoping to get out at least once a month for the first six months to see just what sort of speeds traffic are doing through our village.

Once we get the results, we will publish them in The Village Pump so that everyone can see what is going on.

Whilst the team have been waiting for West Mercia Police to do their stuff they haven't just been sitting around. They have been out counting traffic to see what sort of volumes are going through the village at peak times.

The objective in undertaking this is to have a baseline which can be set against future increases in traffic which will inevitably happen as more housing gets built in the Severn Valley. The team collecting the data hopes that in future years if the traffic volumes increase even more, then the community might be able to use the evidence taken now to help put a brake on further development.






# **VENUS POOL NATURE RESERVE**

Located just to the south-east of the parish of Berrington, the Venus Pool nature reserve is the closest publicly-accessible nature reserve to the parishes of Atcham and Berrington.

For the first part of the previous Century, the area simply represented agricultural fields adjacent to the Severn Valley Railway.

The pool was originally a natural wet hollow which had been drained but became flooded in the 1950s when a culvert collapsed.

Land to the east was subsequently quarried for sand and gravel up until the 1990s, and the quarry has remained dormant ever since.

Shropshire Ornithological Society acquired the Venus Pool site in 1986 and work commenced to improve the habitat for birds, particularly waterfowl and waders.

Enhancement works took place in 1996 with the assistance of the Environment Agency. In 1999, with support from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF), the field to the south was purchased, with a car park installed and further improvements.

The small original brick-built hides have been replaced by large, wheelchair-accessible wooden hides to cater for the many thousand visitors who enjoy Venus Pools in any one year. To help manage this number of visitors, the North and Memorial Hides are restricted to members of the Society.

The reserve is managed under the terms of the Countryside Stewardship scheme.

#### **Policy on Dogs at Venus Pool**

Please note that dogs are not allowed at Venus Pool. Evidence is now available that shows that the presence of dogs can reduce the number of birds present by around 40% compared to the effect of walkers alone, which reduced numbers by less than 20% (that is without the use of hides). Birds see dogs as potential predators and leave the area – not a habit we want to encourage at Venus Pool.

#### **Current activity at Venus Pool**

The reserve is currently hosting an innovative project, in conjunction with governmental and

The purchase of the fields to the south allowed for the establishment of species-rich hay meadows and marshy grassland. The larger, southern field was purchased in 2003, again with the support of the HLF, with wild bird crops surrounded by flower-rich margins attractive to insects.

university collaborators, to monitor and identify bird song at Venus Pool (using sophisticated Albased technology).

# Introduction from the Station Commander RAF Shawbury, Wing Commander Paddy Durnin



Welcome to the second of this year's Helicopter Liaison Group Newsletters. I hope that you continue to find these useful for your Parish and Town Council Committees and also to help keep the communities you represent informed about RAF Shawbury's activity over the past 6 months. As previously, this edition provides an update on our flying operations, through which we provide trained aircrew for the Royal Navy, British Army and Royal Air Force as our core UK Defence task.

I hope you also find the broader news interesting as this shows how we try and contribute to communities and groups across the County. For example, you may have seen one of our helicopters supporting different events over this Summer? We managed to drop Science Technology

Engineering and Maths teams and helicopters into schools in Baldwin's Gate, Baschurch, and Market Drayton; as well supporting Sleapkosh, Three Counties Fest, Church Stretton and Weston-under-Redcastle shows. It is always a pleasure to be able to support the hard work of schools and event committees and it is a great way for our personnel to meet their communities and neighbours.

The 80th Anniversary of VE Day also provided us with a wonderful opportunity to recognise and connect with our local veterans. We visited 104-year old Syndey Knott DFC, a Lancaster Rear Gunner who flew 65 operational missions in World War II The Station also hosted Colin Cole who turned 106 in July and who served with the RAF Air and Sea Rescue Services, including on D-Day and VE Day.

Finally I'd like to reiterate that we rely on the support of civic organisations such as yourselves and the leadership you provide within your communities to fly with the freedoms we require to deliver our UK Defence task. #### Did you know?

As well as helicopter aircrew training, RAF Shawbury is also home to the Defence College of Air and Space Operations (DCASO) and, as such, provides Defence's next generation of military controllers, surveillance officers and air operations specialists. These personnel will provide Air Traffic Control wherever the military operate aircraft around the world, as well as provide the country's UK's Quick Reaction Alert in the event of any threat to UK Air Space. On 11 July 2025, one hundred and fifteen DCASO

personnel paraded at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire to mark the 75th Anniversary of continuous Air Operations training being delivered at RAF Shawbury.

## **Safety Campaigns**

RAF Shawbury's 'Be Seen Be Safer' horse rider campaign reached its 10th Anniversary in May 2025. The campaign is run in liaison with the British Horse Society and provides high visibility clothing to anyone who rides in our Low Flying Area. Alongside this, we run an education programme on the importance of our aircrew being able to see riders as early as possible, such that safe distances between helicopters and horses can be maintained. We were pleased to announce on the 10th Anniversary that all Defence helicopter units have now adopted RAF Shawbury's rider safety principles and are running their own 'Be Seen Be Safer' campaigns.



We have also started a Drone Awareness Campaign through our social media channels, which aims to inform individuals who are considering buying a drone about the regulations they must adhere to when flying in and around Shropshire. We have been really pleased to see Drone groups supporting this and helping us spread the message. Professional and recreational drone users are requested to give our Air Operations Team 24hrs notice of their intention to fly anywhere within Low Flying Area 9 (LFA9). Please see map opposite. # RAF Shawbury Flying Operations

#### **Flying Statistics**

Both Juno and Jupiter aircraft continue to deliver Aircrew training for tri-Service personnel. For the period 1 Mar – 1 Sep 25, the following overall hours were flown:

Day Flying Hours 7839 Night Flying Hours 527 Total Flying Hours 8366

#### Low Flying - Why?

The MOD has an enduring requirement to low fly within the UK. This is to ensure that military aircrew are current and competent to fly the operational missions they might be asked to undertake in their front line roles. All military low flying takes place within the UK Low Flying System. This aims to minimise disturbance to the public, whilst ensuring military requirements are met and air safety risks are managed. RAF Shawbury sits within LFA9, where the majority of flying training delivered by No.1 Flying Training School takes place. All activity is regulated by the Military Aviation Authority (MAA) and conducted in accordance with procedures and restrictions contained within their Low Flying Handbook.



Low flying is a highly perishable skill which can only be maintained through rigorous training and continuous practice in a realistic environment. Although the majority of our flying training is undertaken at a normal operating height, RAF Shawbury aircraft are authorised to fly at 100ft above ground level (agl) and in some cases 50ft (agl) within LFA 9.

#### Airfield Upgrade



RAF Shawbury is currently nearing completion of major airfield refurbishment under contract with Lagan. The project is on track to be completed by 5 December 2025. All runways and taxiways have been resurfaced as part of the project, as well as the completion of drainage works, lighting and hangar floors. Lagan is now close to the stage where lands caping and finishing touches are beginning to take place. RAF Shawbury has continued to run its training programme throughout the refurbishment programme. The limited space available on the airfield has meant some increased activity at the relief landing grounds, Tern Hill and Chetwynd, and other areas around Shropshire (i.e. Sleap airfield). From 2026 this will return to normal levels, depending on our training throughput.
