A message from Petra

Dear friends,

Thank you all so much for the love and support you have expressed to us over the last ten days. We have been overwhelmed with love and kindness, not to mention meals, flowers, chocolate and wine and baskets of vegetables grown in gardens and allotments. It feels as though we are floating on a sea of love and prayer. It's hard to believe that the place where a few days earlier, eighty or more of us spent a lovely afternoon eating cake, drinking tea and chatting with neighbours and friends, could be a place of such extreme violation. We have always kept a policy of open house; I like to think we are hospitable people and part of living in the Rectory is about people coming and going and about the welcome they receive. The police have now alarmed the house all over; we have devices on windows and doors and GPS alarms and panic buttons all linked straight to the police station. There is something I dislike about this on the one hand, but see how necessary it is on the other. We need to feel safe in our home.

Our daughter has not yet been able to face coming home and is staying with friends, so we are living between two places. They are wonderful people and I am so grateful to them for their kindness and gift of security for her, but it is heart breaking to come home without her each evening. That we know the perpetrators are safely locked away is of some comfort, but still it has taken something precious away – something far more precious than the few bits of metal they managed to get into their pockets.

The police have been wonderful, but the very nature of crime detection is that everything has to be done so quickly and once the criminals are arrested that time frame becomes even tighter. I lost count of the hours of waiting in rooms in the police station and how many times I told the story over and over again.

There have been many moments over these days when I have felt immensely proud of my daughter. What she went through was unthinkable, but she was able to do all that was asked of her afterwards and make a significant contribution to tracing the two men. However, a couple of nights ago she said, "You know, in a way I feel quite sorry for them." She had recognised that not only must they have such awful lives, in and out of prison, always looking over their shoulder, living on the proceeds of the bits and pieces they manage to steal and having no concept whatsoever of the emotional damage they do. What kind of childhood must they have had? Utterly dysfunctional with none of the support and privilege that she and her friends have had.

In that moment I felt so proud of her, because she was right. It doesn't excuse or negate what they have done to her, but it's the beginning of a transformation. It's where goodness and compassion and generosity break in like a chink of light in the darkness.

Our lives have been turned upside down and the future feels very uncertain at the moment. But we are blessed to be so surrounded by love and prayer and the knowledge that there is no darkness the love of God cannot make light. There is nothing that God's creative power cannot heal.

In the words of Julian of Norwich:

He did not say 'you shall not be tempest-tossed, you shall not be weary, you shall not be discomforted,' but he said, 'You shall not be overcome.'

And all shall be well, and all shall be well. All manner of thing shall be well.

I am on compassionate leave for the time being, so that I can focus on supporting my daughter and recovering from this ordeal.

FREE FIREWORK DISPLAY AT THE WELLCOME GENOME CAMPUS!

The Genome Campus Sports and Social Club are holding their annual Fireworks display at the Wellcome Genome Campus on Friday 1st November at 7pm. The tradition of village signs is believed to have started around 100 years ago on the Sandringham Estate in Norfolk. The idea has spread and is particularly popular in the Hundred Parishes. Around two-thirds of the parishes have a welcoming sign that usually tells us something about the place and its history. The installation of a village sign has often been prompted by a significant event or anniversary. The Queen's Silver Jubilee inspired the erection of Stansted Mountfitchet's knight signs at either end of the village in 1977. The arrival of the new millennium (was it really 20 years ago?) saw a rush of somewhat off the beaten track, for example in Broxted and signs, followed by the Queen's Golden Jubilee in 2002. The 800th anniversary of Magna Carta inspired the installation in

Little Dunmow in 2015.

Signs are generally made from wood or steel and their designs often show great imagination and artistic skill to depict aspects of life or history that are important to that parish. Several include a plane, recognising the part played by their local airfield in the Second World War.

Some parishes have more than one sign: for example, Much Hadham has its own plus others in the hamlets of Perry Green and Green Tye. Some signs, such as Finchingfield, have different images on front and back. Most are at the entrance to the village or in a prominent place, whilst a few are Thaxted.

I would be interested to hear of any signs older than those in

Stansted Mountfitchet or newer than the one erected in Albury in May 2019. I would also like to hear if any have been listed. If you are a photographer or artist, there is much scope for trying to 'capture' these charming works of art. Ken McDonald, Secretary



Do you have apples or pears going to waste each year and ending up in your green bin or on the compost heap?

This year it can be a different story...come along to the Village Hall on October 13th and as well as being able to enjoy a tasty bacon brunch you can bring your 'unwanted' fruit to press.

We will have a mill and press free to use, so that you can turn your apples and pears into delicious juice. Help and guidance will be 'on hand'!

All you need to do is bring your apples and pears, along with bottles in which to take your freshly pressed juice home again.

You will need to make sure any bottle is thoroughly

As a rough guide - 2kg of apples will make about 1 litre of juice.

Fresh juice will keep for about 5 days in the fridge or you can freeze it if you use plastic bottles with screw tops.


