ON 3<sup>rd</sup> SEPTEMBER, I attended a meeting of roughly 100 or so residents, the majority of whom were fed up of the charges and increases levied by OM Peverel.

I offered to take the email addresses of all attendees, not only to provide a forum to construct correspondence with OM, but also to make an application to the Leasehold Valuation Tribunal (LVT) to get the increases halted.

Of the 100 or so residents, six put their information down. To say that I was disappointed and disheartened would be an understatement.

Six people out of the 2000 or so adults who live in Fernwood will be considered by the LVT as less than 1% moaning about the increase – this will not get the response we need.

The application to the tribunal will cost £50. We are going to ask the Parish Council to fund this initiative on behalf of all residents.

in order that we can at least get the ball rolling.

Apathy will not work and no longer is this the time to leave it to others or hope it goes away – it won't. OM have proved they can do what they like and unless we make a stand, the likelihood is that charges with rise and rise.

# Parish Council Report - Cllr J Weale

The Parish Council and Residents' Association, who are meeting will know, your Parish at all times working for a better Council is taking steps to deal for us all, sometimes feel frustrated that they do not seem to be making progress and that there is little or no back up from residents. However, at the last FRA Meeting, which was well attended, the tide of feeling about current issues both with the developers and OM Peverel was considerable.

Both the PC and FRA find it helpful to hear what difficulties point in attending as nothing individual residents are struggling with so that we can be better informed and able to represent you.

As those who attended the address the fees and services of OM Peverel and are in the process of employing an impartial agency to look into it in order to assess whether or not we are getting a fair deal.

It is extremely important that all residents who feel they have not been fairly treated attend our meetings in order to present a united village on this. You may feel that there is no can be done but the more residents get behind this the better.

The Parish Council is

considering a door-to-door campaign in order to reach all residents and get an opinion.

We all know the problems with OM Peverel but there are other problems with the developers:-

- · The indifference to our parking and speeding problems.
- Our non-bus service. Inadequate space for
- parking.
- Lack of lighting in existing parking areas.
- · Drainage etc.

If we do not put our objections forward now, any other new developments will carry the same problems.

# Lively Open Meeting on 3 September

A LIVELY MEETING TOOK PLACE in the Village Hall, attended by almost 100 residents and invited guests.

The discussion points covered were far ranging and excited a considerable amount of interest.

### Education

Bob Hattersley, Head of Chuter Ede, advised that it is likely, based on the applications for places at Fernwood, that the proposed full seven-classroom school would eventually be developed. Further, that the school had achieved an 'Outstanding' rating from OFSTED, which announcement was acknowledged by well-deserved applause from residents.

### Apply early for school places

Some concerns were expressed that Fernwood schoolchildren had not always been prioritised for placement at the school. Assurance was given that every effort would be made to accommodate our children within Fernwood, and parents were advised to make very early applications for school places. The entry programme for 4-5 year olds, effective September 2014, is being considered this November.

### Future village development

Robert Galij of David Wilson Homes advised that 110 dwellings still need to be completed and sold prior to the developers leaving the village. Best estimates suggest that this would happen within the next two years.

In the interim, the road systems would not be adopted by Highways Department until at least September next year because of ongoing negotiations with the existing land owners.

This note was greeted with dismay, since early adoption of the road systems would have allowed long overdue controls to counter irresponsible parking and speeding.

### **Greater Fernwood Development**

It is envisaged that greater Fernwood development – a total build of some 3200 homes under the Core Strategy initiative - will commence no later than July 2015 (and perhaps as early as January of that year).

David Wilson Homes had made an initial application to build around 1000 homes to the north of the village as part of this expansion. No firm ideas were volunteered as to what other building group would be employed to construct the remainder. Naturally, and bearing in mind the problems experienced to date, residents raised some serious concerns regarding the planning processes. Among the concerns raised was the provision of an extra school; access to the new-build, possibly via the existing road systems within Fernwood; the idea of providing another access road directly into the new-build area; the controls to be exercised over construction traffic to minimise inconvenience.

Unfortunately, the developers have been unable to provide any assurances at this point regarding these and other planning issues and it was recommended by County Councillor Sue Saddington that the Residents' Association and the Parish Council should organise a special meeting at which all of these problems could be discussed as and when the formal outline development plans are made available.

### Lottery funding

John Proctor advised that there had been a successful bid from the Lottery Fund to build a youth shelter and for additional trim trail equipment. Questions were raised regarding the necessity for a shelter and it was determined that this is what the youngsters had requested in preference to any other facility.

### Village upkeep

John Proctor advised that regular 'walkabouts' take place to monitor the effectiveness of the maintenance work undertaken. A joint report is produced by the Residents' Association and the Parish Council for implementation by OM and the developers (as necessary).

### **Maintenance charges**

Criticism was received from residents concerning the latest Legal Notices regarding the adjustments required to allow for the increased communal 'green' areas to be maintained by OM. (The adjustments appear to be as a result of the build programme being less than expected). The possibility of deferring payment of charges will be considered by OM pending further investigations.

Discussions escalated to an extent which clearly underlined a high degree of dissatisfaction. Some of the concerns expressed were in respect of the level of manpower employed; whether the contractual processes between OM and the developers were subject to regular standard competitive tendering; whether a discount should be afforded by the District Council since Fernwood was naturally accessible by other communities.

Jim Gould, on behalf of the Parish Council, confirmed that an independent firm of chartered surveyors has been briefed to prepare a report to evaluate the effectiveness of the service received and to express an opinion on the value for money aspects of the charges made by OM.

### Media


Residents were encouraged to continue to submit editorial for the Fanfare – indeed this also applies for any modifications to the Residents' Association website www.fernwoodra.com.


Over the next few months, we will be introducing a new texting service to invite you to attend your various reviews and to let you know about new services that you may be interested in.

### Visit a beech wood - in

America Autumn is called 'Fall' – the time when trees turn amazing colours and then shed their leaves. Any woodland in late autumn will have trees showing autumn colours but beech woodland can be especially spectacular with leaves turning yellow, gold and orange before they fall. Magic! (You can find Beech Trees in Clumber Park and Sherwood Country Park, Ollerton)

Visit a deer rut – Visit a deer park. This is the time of year when stags and bucks develop antlers and fight rival males to attract a harem of females. Red deer are our largest land mammal and the stags have the most spectacular antlers of any British species. Deer, of several species, are surprisingly widespread and at this time of year you may hear the barking of muntjac and roe deer or the roaring of red deer at night. You do, however, need to take great care as during the rutting season stags can get very aggressive.

Spiders' webs – on cold autumn mornings you suddenly realise how many spiders there are. Take an early morning walk and spot spiders' webs outlined in dew on hedgerows, in meadows even on house windows and car wing mirrors. Spider silk is truly amazing – see if you can find a spider actually making a web and watch carefully how it's constructed.
