PARISH COUNCIL REPORT WINTER 2015

It has been a good quarter for the Parish Council, as we have seen the fruition of the hard work put in by my fellow Parish Councillors to put together a plan for the refurbishment of the Recreation Ground. The construction company have been hard at it and now we have something to be proud of. The official opening will be on Sunday 29th November by the Chairman of Aylesbury Vale District Council, Mrs Jenny Bloom.

We are having a "walk round" next week with the highways department (Transport for Bucks) of Buckinghamshire County Council to inspect our village roads, verges and pavements.

The County Council has several Local Area Forums and we are part of the Buckingham LAF together several other Parish Councils in the Buckingham area. This Forum gives out some grants each year and we have applied for funds to help with kerb work in Stock Lane and parking in Vicarage Road.

I know that all will agree that the Lowndes Arms is a great asset to the village. We are therefore planning (with the permission of the landlord) to get the pub registered as a Community Asset. This gives the village the right to bid at market value for it if there was ever a proposal to close it.

At AVDC, we are very involved at the moment in progressing our new Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (upon which Graham Stewart comments elsewhere). It has now reached the "Issues and Options" Consultation to which we can all respond. I do encourage you to do so as several options in the list of possible sites for house building would impact severely on Whaddon.

Caring for our Footpaths

Following on from the reminder about clearing up after your dog (a recent walk around Whaddon revealed two lots of doggy doos, sadly) I'd like to ask for further help with our village pavements.

Firstly, please report any potholes, especially anything deeper than 2cm (about an inch in old money) to Transport for Bucks via their website or phone 01296 395000. TfB are unable to send people to check regularly, and rely on us to tell them about needed repairs.

Secondly, please spray out the weeds along your boundary with the pavement. Weed spraying is a luxury that can no longer be afforded within our cash-strapped highways budget, so five minutes of your time will enhance the look of the village no end, and help prevent damage to the base of your walls.



• VALE OF AYLESBURY LOCAL PLAN - 2013-2033

ISSUES AND OPTIONS PUBLIC CONSULTATION

By the time you read this article this important public consultation will be nearing its close.....but you still have until 4th December to make comment should you wish to. The process is quite complex, being difficult to understand in places, and even your Parish Council is finding it a little daunting, but councillors will be discussing the WPC response at their council meeting on 19 November - so please pop along if you want to learn more about what might happen in the Northern part of the district, which includes Whaddon!

The document contains a huge amount of information, and sets out everything you need to know about the 'Issues and Options' for the Local Plan, which needs, amongst other things, to plan for an extra 31,000 homes from now to 2033.

It can be found at www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/consultation.

You will see that the 13 specific consultation questions appear at the end of each section, (which is intended to direct you towards the relevant information for each question), but the scary bit is that you can't really answer many of the questions without having good knowledge of the 'Supporting Evidence', which is available as a link (on the above web site), which when opened gives access to a complex raft of additional documents - which I defy anyone to fully understand - which is why I believe many people will simply 'not bother' to respond at all – which is a shame with such important issues at stake!

The Parish Council advice on how to respond to this consultation, is similar to the MK Site Allocation consultation (also in this edition), in that there are really only 5 Questions that can be answered by 'lay people' and even a couple of those are difficult. Answers to the other 8 questions could simply be 'we have insufficient knowledge and the supporting evidence' is too complex!'

Below are the questions that are the easiest to answer and could interest you, but of course you may wish to tackle the others! Alternatively, pop along to the WPC meeting on 19 Nov to be held in the Village Chapel, join in the discussion and make your views known, which may influence your Parish Council's response!

Question 4: What should be the Council's approach for meeting the housing needs of the elderly?

Question 6: How should the Local Plan address the need for traveller pitches?

Question 8: Is the Settlement Hierarchy correct and if not why is it not correct?

Question 9: The Council details 9 separate options and asks you to choose your preferred 3, ranking them in the order of your preference. AVDC themselves have declared their 3 preferred options - but with no ranking preference.

Two of them include major extensions to Milton Keynes / Bletchley and the possibility of a new settlement or intensification at existing settlements.

Question 13: The Council ask you to choose one of four options in regard to how they should deal with landscape designation and protection.

As an indication, Your Parish Council's reply to this particular question is likely to be along the lines of:

Definitely bullet 2. In respect of the Whaddon Local Landscape Area (LLA), Whaddon Parish Council has long argued that this 'special area' – the southern part of which contains the as-yet unrecognised and historic Snelshall Priory site - should not only be confirmed, but it should be extended to the north to include the historic, valuable and much loved Whaddon Valley, below the Shenley Ridge (which roughly follows the line of the North Bucks Way). This area has enviable views, several public footpaths and a rare unspoilt charm that is as much of value to AVDC as it is to MK. Recent MK Local Plan inspectors have judged it so, as did the original planners and the previous 'Government of the day' Planning Inspectors. Milton Keynes Council – even in their latest November 2015 Plan:MK consultation document – Option plan 1 (SW of MK) show this general area as possible parkland or an extension to their public park system. Whaddon P.C. feels the case has been clearly made over a very long period of time, and this case continues.

The Whaddon LLA should be re-visited and reviewed as a matter of urgency before developer pressure destroys its potential not only for future generations, but for ever!but you may have other thoughts or comments to make?

Well, that's about it! AVDC are encouraging as many people as possible to get involved, but, as stated earlier, by the time you read this you will only have a couple of weeks or so to respond because the deadline date for responses is Friday 4 December.

SHENLEY DENS FARM

MILTON KEYNES PLAN, SITE OPTIONS - PUBLIC CONSULTATION

As part of their 'PLAN:MK' process, Milton Keynes Council are currently consulting with the public on its 'Emerging Preferred Site Options' which has been prepared to fill a short-term lack of housing land supply in its existing 2013 Core Strategy, which will be superseded by PLAN:MK very soon. The Council has assessed 61 sites in the urban area, one of which is 'Shenley Dens Farm', which is located north of Whaddon Hall, close to Oakhill Wood.

However, once opened it is more important to scroll down and view site U29 being the individual report for Shenley Dens Farm!

Comments must be received by 5pm on **Wednesday 20 January 2016**. You can respond via email (siteallocations@milton-keynes.gov.uk) or by post to Milton

Keynes Council, Development Plans, Civic Offices, 1 Saxon Gate East, Central Milton Keynes, MK9 3EJ.

Your Parish Council suggests that you might support its view that the 392 houses being promoted by developers on the 22.4ha Shenley Dens site, should be avoided at all cost as if it were selected – now or in the future - it will breach the natural landscape break along the Shenley Ridge and set a hugely damaging precedent by illogically encroaching into and damaging the character of the valuable and highly regarded adjoining open countryside, which includes the important and historic Whaddon Valley. (Be aware that the developers in their submission said "Shenley Dens would be a landscape led urban extension of 550 homes which could be enlarged")

Some residents will remember that this very site was part of a much larger application for 2055 houses, that would have 'swamped the valley' back in 2004, but at that time it was soundly rejected by a Local Government Planning Inspector, who shared the views above.

Fortunately, in this current consultation MK Council themselves conclude that: "There is no added value to allocating this site", but worryingly the report adds "that this conclusion could potentially be revised once the full extent of the MK western expansion area to the north is built out". Therefore, Whaddon residents may wish to write and strongly support MKC's initial conclusion, but at the same time express serious concern at the latter statement, as the developers will undoubtedly promote the site again in the 'soon to be published' PLAN:MK document that will look at a far longer time period and will require a much larger quantum of homes, than this current consultation! The more evidence and support the council gains now will hopefully strengthen their future resolve and strategic planning decisions.

The consultation asks 14 Questions, but your Parish Council suggests you need only answer Q1 which asks "Do you have any general comments to make about the additional sites in Appendix A irrespective of the assessment outcomes?"

You could then respond using the suggestions above. You can properly and sensibly avoid answering the other 13 questions by adding, "that whilst having detailed knowledge of the Shenley Dens Site, you live in the adjoining Aylesbury Vale District, and do not feel qualified to reply to the other questions", unless of course you want to go into greater detail.

IMMINENT PUBLIC CONSULTATION (Starting end Nov 2015)

WHAT IS PLAN: MK?

This new plan will replace the 2013 MK Core Strategy and will decide how much new development is needed – probably looking ahead to 2036 - 2050 – where it should go, and what policies will be used in determining planning applications.

WHEN WILL THIS HAPPEN?

It is already well under way, and your Parish Council has been involved in 'stakeholder workshops' and has responded to various 'topic papers' about how and where Milton Keynes might grow and what it might be like in the future. The outcome of this work has led to the development of a future 'MK Options and Visions' document which is due to be published around the same time as you are reading this article, upon which the public will be asked to comment. Whaddon residents should be interested as it is likely to affect them or future village generations – and much more so, than just Shenley Dens Farm – if you have read the earlier article in this edition!

WHAT CAN OR SHOULD I DO?

Firstly look at and keep in mind the following web site, which is up to date as this WQ goes to press, but will be updated over the coming months:

http://www.milton-keynes.gov.uk/planning-and-building/planning-policy/plan-mk

It is especially important to look over the next few weeks, because after MK Cabinet approve the document after 9th November (which they likely will!), a 'MK Strategic Development Document' will be published for a twelve week public consultation period, at the end of this month! By the time the next WQ comes out this consultation will have closed!

Your P.C. will try and keep you updated on the village notice boards or through the village email service (register to receive important village emails with our Parish Clerk if you have not already done so) at: ParishClerk@WhaddonBucksPC.org.uk

It is very likely – depending on what the document says - that residents, and your Parish Council will wish to respond early in the New Year.

WHAT WILL THE DOCUMENT SAY?

Your guess is as good as mine, but it will almost certainly show 4 development options in and around the city on which the general public will be able to have their say! (**one** to the SW around Whaddon and Newton Longville: **one** to the East of the M1 motorway: **one** showing enlarged villages throughout the MK district and **one** showing much increased densities by redeveloping parts of the existing MK 'city' area without breaking the current boundaries). It should be stressed that MK Council have not made any decisions about which, if any, of the options it favours, because the result of the public consultation will form a large part of the following decision making process — hence the importance of Whaddon and its residents getting involved!

Our thanks go to all of you who faithfully and generously support our events and especially to those who help to organise them and clear up afterwards.

The Annual **Christmas Fayre** is at 2.00pm on Saturday Nov 28th with our usual range of stalls, games and raffle. This year Father Christmas will again be paying a special visit with gifts for the children .Tea and cakes will be on offer and also mulled wine and mince pies. Thanks go to Beryl Evans for the organisation and to all who have offered raffle prizes or their time to help on a stall. We hope you will all come out for an enjoyable afternoon to the Village Hall and support us.

There will be no Village Worship on the following Sunday because the **Christingle** and School Nativity service will be held at 6pm. Everyone is welcome and we look forward to seeing you there.

Many of you may not have been aware that we had a **Glastonbury Thorn** tree in the churchyard which died. A member of the village has kindly agreed to provide a replacement which will be planted as soon as possible. The site will be marked by a stone plaque in the ground. Our thanks go to Mrs Clare Hadida for her generosity. Legend has it that Joseph of Arimathea came to Glastonbury with the Holy Grail and planted his staff in the ground. It grew into a thorn tree which was unusual for flowering twice a year. This was the original "Glastonbury Thorn".

Christmas is one of the major festivals in the church year and is a time of great joy and celebration. If you have not yet attended any of our special Christmas candle-lit services such as the Nine Lessons and Carols or the Christmas Eve service, I do urge you to come. The church is beautifully decorated and the candlelight creates a moving and intimate atmosphere. On Christmas morning at 10.00 am there is a birthday party for Jesus around the Christmas tree at the back of the church. This is especially for the children, but is enjoyed by all ages. There is a birthday cake and "Happy Birthday "is sung. The service lasts for only 40 minutes and is a wonderful way to start your Christmas Day celebrations.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH WHADDON

Fraudsters regularly hack into personal online accounts to obtain details which will allow them to defraud you.

To prevent fraudsters, it's very important to use strong passwords when setting up and accessing online accounts and online banking.

Passwords should be memorable enough not to have to write them down and long enough to be unique and hard to guess, which will ensure they are less vulnerable to being stolen.

If it is not possible to remember passwords a password manager could be used to store them securely.

Protect yourself:

- Make sure passwords are memorable so that you don't have to write them down. Make sure they are unique.
- Th!nk ab0ut how you could change the l3tters in your n0rmal passw0rds to make them more difficult to gue55!
- Use long, non-dictionary words and use different ones for each of your personal accounts and online banking. Make sure you change them regularly.
- Make sure passwords are not stored on devices that have shared access by other people, for example in internet cafes and when using other public Wi-Fi. If you believe you have become a victim of account hacking, change your passwords immediately and report to Action Fraud: www.actionfraud.police.uk/report fraud

Many thanks to all who attended the coffee morning which was held in Hazel and Barry's garden.


The amount of money raised plus donations was £610, and this amount was matched by Santander so the total raised for the church was £1,220.

Realistically we know we have a ringing span of about 2 years left and unless we have some younger people joining us we will have to join Thornborough, Beachampton and Great Horwood with a silent bell tower.

Don't be a victim of Wintertime Burglary

How to keep safe and advice on home security from your local council

On average just 1.5 houses in the Vale are burgled per day. Nevertheless many burglaries could have been prevented by considering these principles:

- Lock your doors and windows regardless of if you are in the property or not. The point of entry in more than 75% of the time is through a door or window.
- Lock your UPVC doors with the key.
 Flipping the handle is not enough to secure your door.
- Keep valuable items out of view.
 Leaving a laptop on view is an open invitation for a thief. Even less valuable items can be used to gain entry and is the most common way to force entry.
- Property mark your valuables with ultra-violet marking kits or Smartwater (contact us to receive a free UV pen). When goods are marked it enables recovered property to be returned and improves the chance of conviction.
- The security of the rear of the home is integral.

 Many burglaries are carried out via entry of a back door or window so make sure
 your back doors and windows are locked and invest in some prickly plants for your
 fence boundaries. If you have a side gate leading to your garden make sure it is
 locked.
- Make sure your shed/garage is locked and secure.
 Don't give thieves the tools to enter your home.
- User timer switches.

In the winter months when it's dark and nobody is at home a timer switch can be set to activate a lamp on the landing or hallway giving the impression that someone is at home. Timer switches are also ideal for when you're on holiday. You can buy these for under £3 from hardware stores.

Additional security advice for outbuildings and your garden

- Replace ordinary screws on outbuilding doors with non-return screws or coach bolts (the latter have smooth heads that cannot be undone with a screwdriver or spanner).
- Secure up-and-over garage doors with padlocks through the inside runners, or fit a padlock (with hasp and staple) on either side of the door.
- Add a mortise deadlock to existing latches on double wooden doors and fit strong bolts to the top and bottom of the adjoining door.
- Investing in a household alarm is a great deterant for burglars.
- Thorny shrubs growing under windows or against access routes such as drainpipes, walls and fences create an effective natural barrier. Berberis, blackthorn, rubus and pyracantha are all good for this. They are easy to grow and readily available from your garden centre.
- Fix a grill to steel plates inside garage and shed windows. Chicken wire is a good low cost alternative and may slow a thief down.
- Keep your home in good condition. Burglars looking for an easy way in will target split, rotten or warped doors and window frames.
- Put away tools and equipment and lock sheds and outbuildings when you're not using them.
- If you have been a victim of a burglary or are over 60, you can receive some security improvements for free.

Creative Coach: thoughts from my comfy chair

I don't generally encourage my clients to make New Year's Resolutions. Why? Because it's the wrong time of year, in my view. It's dark,

Christmas is done and dusted and we may feel a bit down. The weather's cold, we may feel guilty about overindulging over the festive season. Add all of that together, and it's not really a recipe for a good dose of motivation, is it? Remember your "new year" can start at any time; it doesn't have to be in January. There! You're off the hook, if you needed permission!

On the other hand, if you're definitely in the mood to motivate yourself in any way: starting something new, turning over a new leaf or taking up a new habit, here's a few ideas to get you thinking...

There's a great song by Thea Gilmore, called Start As We Mean To Go On. Music often inspires me, and some lyrics just grab you at a particularly apt moment. If you're about to start something new, what would be your top tips? I'm going to use a selection of the lyrics from Thea's song to help demonstrate some of my own suggestions.

We're going to start by aiming higher

A great sentiment. Sometimes when you've been doing something for a long time, you can lose sight of different ways of working. To aim higher is always a good idea: stretch and challenge yourself towards your goal.

We're going to start to fan the flames

A lovely analogy. A new venture often starts with a little spark of an idea, and that spark needs nurturing (fanning) to encourage it to grow into something powerful and successful. This could also mean making subtle changes to something you already do well. Fanning the flames can sometimes suggest a little subversion, and there's nothing wrong with that, if it achieves a positive purpose. Equally, you can fan the flames publicly, gain support from those around you and you find strength in numbers, or from others.

See what we're becoming and not what we have lost

This is a form of "future pacing" for all you NLP aficionados. Focus on what you intend to achieve, rather than what you're leaving behind. You're leaving behind what you don't need, and you can actively select the important things which will travel with you. Imagine how it will feel when you achieve what you set out to do, as this will motivate you along the way.

Take the trouble

When you start something new, it's exciting and challenging. Learn from previous experience about the priorities, the important items, and be pernickety about those. It will pay dividends. Others will recognise when time and trouble has been

taken over a job, and more importantly, so will you. You will get the satisfaction of knowing that you did your best.

Take up space

Be bold, be brave, be strong. To take up space might mean to make your presence felt. This could be via social media, networking, via your website, within your workplace or your own community. If you're starting something new, make an impression from the beginning. If it's new, you can completely reinvent yourself: what fun!

Take the bullet from the gun

Remove obstacles and negative temptation as you go. When you recognise the inclination to lapse back into your old way of doing things, or a threat to sabotage your venture, remember all the reasons why you chose to start afresh, and re-align yourself with your values and beliefs.

I've got two good reasons why I can't get it wrong

Use (meaningful) positive affirmations. Remind yourself of all the times you've been successful. Find a mantra or two to use to encourage yourself when the challenges crop up.

Now - start as **you** mean to go on. Decide what you want and go for it!






