TVBC secures funding to further commitment to making councilowned buildings carbon neutral.

Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) has successfully secured funding from the government's Department for Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNZ) for Phase 3b of the Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme (PSDS). This grant is delivered by Salix Finance on behalf of DESNZ.

The authority has been awarded up £221,871, which will help to further its commitment to ensuring council owned and occupied buildings will be carbon neutral. The funding is available for heat decarbonisation projects within public sector, non-domestic buildings.

Decarbonisation is the term used for the process of removing or reducing the carbon dioxide (CO2) output from a process - so in this case it is looking to remove carbon from how we heat buildings.

The secured funds will be used to install energy efficiency measures, by changing to LED lighting and improving insulation measures, and upgrade the heating system to one powered by cleaner energy at the council's Bourne House depot in Romsey.

Council going green to keep the streets clean!

Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) is taking a step forward in reducing its carbon footprint, following the delivery of three new electric powered pedestrian sweepers.

The quieter, better-performing new machines will be replacing the Council's existing fleet of diesel pedestrian ones.

The new sweepers are more powerful, and are quieter too, which is beneficial as they will be predominantly used in both Andover and Romsey town centres.

In 2020, the council approved its Climate Emergency Action Plan, which identifies what actions the local authority will take towards becoming carbon neutral.

Members of the public should start to see the pedestrian sweepers in action over the coming weeks.

Council Tax Bills March 2023

Council Tax bills will be arriving in the post over the next few weeks. Your bill will detail exactly how much you will pay each year, and the breakdown to each organisation.

The amount of Council Tax you pay depends on what band the property is, and where it is located.

You can find out what Council Tax band you are on the GOV.UK website: <u>www.gov.uk/council-tax-bands</u>

For an average Band D property, the total bill for 2023/24 will be £1,951.05, excluding parish or town council charges. This is collected by us (Test Valley Borough Council) and then distributed between the following organisations:

- Hampshire County Council, £1,460.25, an increase of £69.39 from 2022/23 (4.99%)
- Police and Crime Commissioner for Hampshire £251.46 an increase of £15 from 2022/23 (6.34%)
- Test Valley Borough Council £158.91, an increase of £5 from 2022/23 (3.25%)
- Hampshire and Isle of Wight Fire and Rescue Service £80.43, an increase of £5 from 2022/23 (6.63%)

Council Tax is an annual charge households pay to their local council.

We send out the total Council Tax bill each year in March. You pay your bill to us (Test Valley Borough Council) each month and we pass on the relevant amounts to three other organisations.

Each organisation has different responsibilities for providing public services. Council Tax helps to fund hundreds of local services.

The money you pay to Test Valley Borough Council funds the services we provide.

Our services are also funded by business rates and government support.

We provide several local services, including:

- supporting people at risk of becoming homeless
- planning permissions for new and existing properties
- waste and recycling collections
- housing advice and support
- support for local businesses and town centres
- food hygiene inspections
- street cleaning
- countryside management including nature reserves.
- managing council car parks
- pest control
- election and democracy services

Failure to help with fly-tipping investigation lands man in court

A Southampton man ended up in court earlier this month and was ordered to pay £240 after failing to assist Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) with a fly-tipping investigation.

In January 2020, TVBC received reports of a large fly-tip on Foxes Lane, Wellow.

The waste consisted of carpets, a divan bed, a fridge, construction waste, a table, a white door, wooden shelving, metal gates, plaster board and a vast quantity of general household items and furniture.

A council officer found evidence that the waste had

originated from an address in Southampton. They contacted the landlord who advised that he had instructed his handyman to employ a contractor to clear the waste.

The handyman had seen a vehicle collecting scrap locally and arranged for the driver to meet him at the property.

The driver visited the property on 11 January and arranged a price with the landlord over the phone. He removed the contents of the house on the same day.

The landlord later received a telephone call confirming the job was complete and he was asked to transfer £400 into an account in the name of Mr Connor Dashwood. The waste was dumped either that night or early the next morning.

TVBC invited Mr Dashwood, 27, of Carlisle Road, Southampton, to an interview under caution on 7 July 2022, which he failed to attend.

On 11 October 2022, the council issued a legal notice requiring him to assist with the flytipping investigation, but Mr Dashwood did not respond.

On Monday 13 February at Southampton Magistrates' Court, Dashwood pleaded guilty to failing to respond to the legal notice. He was ordered to pay a £100 fine, £40 victim surcharge and £100 costs.
