

#### **Middleton Dark Skies**

## **August Highlights**

Perseid Meteor Shower If there is one spectacle worth sitting out for, then the Perseids are it. Dark skies and 'warm' evenings, is not a bad combination for observing. The peak of the shower is on the night of the 12<sup>th</sup>/13<sup>th</sup> August and once the moon has set at around 11 pm there will be dark and, hopefully, clear skies. The sun will have set around 8.30, so even from 10 pm, it will be worth looking out for the meteors. The Perseids are visible from July 17<sup>th</sup> through to 24<sup>th</sup> August, but in lesser numbers the further away from the peak. The radiant of the shower, which is the point in the sky that the meteors appear to originate from, is located out to the NE just below the constellation of Cassiopeia, which is easily recognisable, as it resembles a big, if slightly wonky, W. The peak rate should be in the order of 100 per hour, but this would be much later in the night as the radiant rises higher in the sky. At between 11pm and midnight, the rate is more likely to be in the region of 50 per hour as you are only seeing meteors that are above the radiant, the other 50 are heading back down towards the horizon. Realistically you will probably see 15-20 an hour, annoyingly most of these will no doubt be out of the corner of your eye. They are fast and tend to leave a long trail that will last long enough to be seen to fade. Basically, grab a chair, lean back, and look towards the NE.

The Milky Way. If you are looking out for the Perseids, you will not fail to see the Milky Way arching overhead from the NE to the SW horizons and passing through the length of Cassiopeia. If you look again towards the end of the month, any time after 10pm, it will be quite a spectacle, as the moon will be rising during the early hours, so not interfering with the view. If you look at it through binoculars it is just an incredible sight.

Planets on View. Venus makes its appearance in the evening sky, albeit low down towards the western horizon. It sets at around 9 pm so will still be in the twilight glow, and therefore quite tricky to spot. Saturn rises in the east at around 9 pm, so once dark look out for it fairly low out towards the SE. Saturn's rings are edge on at present, so are not at their best for viewing. Jupiter and Mars are rising about 20 mins apart, from

the winter constellations!!)

The Moon This month the full moon is on the 19<sup>th</sup> and is given the name of Grain Moon or Red Moon, as it takes on a slightly red colour due to the summer haze filtering out the bluer wavelengths of the moonlight. This month's moon is also a supermoon. This occurs when the moons closest approach to the Earth during its orbit, coincides with a full moon. In theory, its brighter and bigger, but very difficult to judge and compare with the naked eye.

<u>Constellations</u>. One to look out for high out towards the SE is Pegasus, (the winged horse from Greek myth) although it is the square of Pegasus that will be easier to find. Actually, the constellation is made up of two figures from myth, the other being Andromeda which can be found arching away from the northern most star of the square, in a rather bent **V** formation of six stars. Keep a good lookout for The Andromeda Galaxy, its visible to the naked eye, albeit as a slight smudge. If you do see it, you will have seen the furthest object that can be seen with the naked eye. Tip- Once you have found the galaxy, look off to one side very slightly as this will make it stand out better. Strange, but it works for any faint night sky object. (By the way, the Galaxy is headed this way, but will take 5 billion years to get here!).

# **August Nature Notes**

If you find that the leaves of your gooseberries, roses and particuarly Solomon's seal become skeletonised or transparent with just their veins remaining then this is the work of sawfly larvae, which eat through the tissue of the leaf until it has almost completely disappeared. However, few sawflies are major pests.

Sawflies have nothing to do with the 'true' two-winged flies but are part of the insect order, Hymenoptera, together with bees, wasps and ants. They are considered to be the most primitive group and are all harmless and cannot sting. Adult sawflies lack the narrow waist of other four-winged Hymenoptera and grow up as caterpillar-like larvae, generally feeding on, or inside, the leaves, stems or fruit of plants. A few groups cause galls, which larvae feed inside, to grow on willow leaves or twigs. Unlike similar moth and butterfly caterpillars, sawfly larvae have more than five pairs of fleshy legs behind the three pairs of segmented legs at the front. Most have quite smooth skins - rarely with long bristles, spines, or a waxy covering, but never 'woolly'. The larvae can often be seen around the edges of the leaves and most curl up into an S-shape when disturbed.


Sawflies are found all over the world but have a very different distribution to most insect groups - few occur in tropical places and diversity increases away from the equator, especially in the north. In Britain there are around 107 different genera and about 550 species. They are found in all sorts of habitats, from high mountains to woodlands, they are particularly abundant in grasslands - especially where plants are diverse and conditions not too dry.

Most species are specific to a few related plants, a smaller number use only a single species and some others are generalists. Their common name doesn't quite do justice to the amazingly adapted saw-like egg-laying equipment of the females - used in various ways to insert eggs entirely or partially inside their host plants.


At 40mm in length, the Horntail (or Giant Wood Wasp) is Britain's largest sawfly and is quite a scary looking beast, although is entirely harmless. Its natural habitat is pine forests where its larvae feed on the living wood of the pine trees, however, it is obviously attracted to cut softwoods as it often occurs when building work is undertaken. The Horntail's long ovipositor lacks the "saw" that is characteristic of most female sawflies and is instead shaped like a smooth needle so that it can more easily penetrate the wood of pine trees.

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# Middleton-cum-Fordley WI



# Councillors' Declarations of Interest. None.

#### 3 Public Forum

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A member of the public advised the PC that the entrance to the playing field, through the gate, near the pavilion, has become hazardous due to exposed matting and needs immediate attention.

It was confirmed, upon enquiry, that the Declaration of Trust 1986 relating to the village hall is still current and legally binding (the document includes that three MPC representatives should attend village hall meetings). It was reported that the village hall committee is dwindling and in need of assistance. Cllrs Thorpe, Rowe and Kendall offered to attend the village hall meetings, held four times a year. The next meeting is in September.

#### 4 Minutes

- a) The Council approved the minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 11 June 2024.
- b) <u>Matters arising and Action Points</u>
  - Removal of Stop Sizewell C signs. Middleton Moor Group advised that these have been removed because they had become unsightly.
  - \* Flowerpots behind water pump. Ongoing.
  - \* Information regarding the Well Minds East Suffolk publication have been put on the village website.
  - \* SZC wide load communications are now accessible on the village website.
  - \* Nonsuch Farm provided a quote for a 5-year fixed contract (retracted at this meeting).
  - \* Advertisement placed in village newsletter for volunteers to cut the village green.
  - \* Internal Audit Report, AGAR and Exercise of public rights dates put on village website
  - Certificate of Exemption sent to the External Auditor.
  - \* Information Protection Policy updated.
  - \* Clerk has been provided with an image showing The Bell Inn boundaries and this has been forwarded to ESC.
  - \* Clerk has been supplied with possible contractors to carry out works to village path approach to church.
  - \* Clerk has written to SCC Highways, following a request from a village resident, regarding poor/ambiguous/out of date and obscured road signs.
  - \* Clerk has written to SCC Highways, requesting that warning be given for road closures in the village.
  - \* c/f Cllr Cusack to make enquiries with the Summer Winers regarding annual donation and possible volunteer(s) for village green grass cutting.

#### 5 Sizewell C

Cllr Macdowell reminded the meeting of the upcoming Main Site Forum (16/7/24) and the Northern Transport Forum (7/8/24). Each Parish is entitled to ask two questions at the Main Site Forum, and these were agreed, as follows: 1) What enforcement measures, in detail, are currently being undertaken to enforce the 30-mph speed limit on the B1122, and with what results? 2) How can the promised average speed camera system for the B1122 be accelerated so that it is in force significantly earlier than a full year after the start of the 'Early Years' phase?

The issue of wide load notifications was raised again; are these helpful, given that they are supplied with such short notice and often not necessarily a wide load? A member of the public advised the PC that notifications are provided on the SCC Highways Facebook page a week in advance and that this link is a better option than the SZC website.

The average speed cameras will not be in until the end of the year. It was agreed that driving along the B1122 can be intimidating for drivers, especially those with small vehicles because of tailgating by HGVs. Impatient drivers are overtaking vehicles travelling at 30mph (mostly in areas of the B1122 that have always been 30mph). Blue SZC badges on vehicles are slow to appear and it was agreed that, ideally, they are placed on the front and back of vehicles.

A double white line was suggested, to make overtaking a legal offence. A member of the public advised that unmarked police vehicles have been patrolling and booking offenders. Cllr Macdowell confirmed that drivers found to be driving badly are dealt with appropriately, highlighting an incident where a driver was asked to be removed, by SZC.

Construction of the link road starts this summer, commencing with archaeological works. The road is scheduled for completion January 2027 and the Yoxford roundabout is scheduled for completion six months prior to this date. The official start date for SZC was January 2024 (the early years).

<u>Sealink</u>. Cllrs Cusack and Macdowell will be attending virtual PC briefings. Other Councillors are welcome to attend. Sealink is not planned to come through Middleton village, however, Lionlink is.

It was agreed that a member of the PC attend the SZC Community Fund Meet the Funder Event.

#### 6 Councillors Reports

- a) <u>Village Hall</u>. Cllr Lacey apologised for sparse attendance at the village hall meetings (and advised that he has been the representative for one year only).
- b) Middleton Primary School. No report.
- c) <u>Highways, footpaths and trees</u>. No report.
- d) Middleton Moor.

<u>Substation</u>. UK Power Networks have rejected the location of the substation proposed by the PC, advising that unless they are able to place it on the Moor in line with their original request, they will not place it at all.

<u>Pond and Moor Maintenance</u>. Cllr Cusack advised the meeting that Nonsuch Farm have withdrawn their expression of interest in the Moor, consequently allowing him to take the matter 'back' as Chair of the PC. Cllr Taylor was thanked for the work she had done, to date, as Vice-Chair.

A brief back story was provided detailing PC efforts (see previous minutes) to ensure that the pond is returned to its original condition and that the Moor is managed in a sympathetic and appropriate manner, following the end of Causeway Farm's involvement. An opportunity was then given to the public to voice their thoughts and concerns regarding the moor and pond, following which it was agreed that the Moor Management Group will continue to manage the Moor.

Pond work will be carried out, as scheduled, by Peter Frizzle, an experienced conservation contractor. The work will fit in with the GCN lifecycle. Notice will be given to Cllr Taylor when works commence. This will be the first of annual maintenance works.

The PC's bid for National Lottery Funds was unsuccessful.

Members of the Middleton Moor Group voiced their disappointment at the lack of representation of the MPC at their meetings. The same was said of the Middleton Moor Group attending MPC meetings.

Members of the public were reminded that the PC meetings are always open to the public, and that minutes of the meetings are available both online and in the parish newsletter, thus keeping residents informed and up to date.

e) <u>Causeway Farm.</u> Our understanding (to be confirmed by Suffolk Couty Council) is that the farm is to be lotted up with the likely sale of farm buildings and different plots of land. The process will, we hope, involve Suffolk Wildlife Trust. Recommendations will soon be made by Suffolk County Council (SCC) officers to elected members. They will then update the PC with their proposed plans. The expectation is that this will happen within the next 2/3 weeks.

The PC would like to take ownership of Hastoe Field for rewilding and picnic spots, although there are no clear plans to date. Cllr Cusack advised that there is a possibility of the housing development on Hastoe Road being extended, acknowledging mixed feelings amongst village residents.

#### 7 Finance

- a) The latest financial position was received and accepted by all.
- b) Cllr Taylor advised that the existing speed camera has been re-erected on the B1122. It still works, in that it indicates speed, however, it does not collect data. It was agreed that this is acceptable because of the average speed cameras scheduled to be erected along the B1122. The possibility of a speed camera along the B1125 was mentioned again, although questions were raised as to whether a location along this road would meet specification and if not, the purchase would be a waste of funds. It was agreed not to upgrade the existing speed camera or to purchase a new one. Cllr Taylor to provide Cllr Thorpe with the handheld speed gun with a view to collecting data along the B1125.

#### 8 Village Path approach to Church

It was agreed to contact the companies supplied by Cllr Piercy to seek quotes. Action: Cllr Lacey to provide Clerk with the specification. Action: Clerk to supply specification and request a quote from the contractors.

## **Review of Asset Register**

All councillors were asked to consider the Asset Register and let the Clerk know of any changes/updates before September, when the insurance comes up for renewal. Upon request, Cllr Cusack confirmed that the PC does not pay for the village hall insurance. PC insurance covers fixtures and fittings, such as play equipment and bins. The pavilion is insured separately, under a different policy. Action: All to review the Asset Register and contact Clerk with any amendments/updates.

#### 10 Flooding/Maintenance/Emergency Plan

It was agreed that despite previous unsuccessful attempts to seek advice/assistance regarding flooding the PC need to consider an emergency strategy plan (a statutory duty of the PC). Efforts regarding this have been made in previous years but are yet to be completed. Action: Cllr Cusack to locate existing paperwork, with a view to the PC reviving the work.

### Correspondence

It was agreed to donate £500 to the Yoxmere Fisherman. Action: Clerk to make donation.

The PC were made aware of bin collection problems experienced by a village resident, this was noted, and it was agreed that Fletchers Lane vegetation needs to be kept clear.

Cllr Rowe advised the PC of correspondence received from the existing village green volunteers, stating that they are no longer able to undertake this work. There has been no response from the advertisement in the village newsletter for volunteers to cut the grass.

The no parking signs on the green are too numerous and some are broken. Cllr Thorpe agreed to investigate replacement or repair and consolidate as appropriate to the sympathetic layout of the green. Action: Cllr Thorpe.

A member of the public referred to the large plant pots on the Moor (see Matters Arising above), advising that unless growth is kept under control, they are not worth doing.

It was reported that the German Shepherd and owners (see April's minutes) have returned to the Recreation Ground.
