Welcome from the Chair

elcome to our final edition of the year. As you will see it is rather seasonally themed and rightly so, as there is so much happening in our neighbourhood over the next few weeks.

I would like to start by thanking the pupils of Brookmead School for their wonderful colourful Christmas designs. We asked the pupils to design the cover for this edition and although difficult to choose we have settled on the drawing by six year old Maggie Goddard for our front cover. We also thought that the drawing by seven year old Ollie Harkness was worthy of printing too, so do take a look at the back cover of the magazine. Well done to you both and thank you to Brookmead School for your fantastic contributions to the Beacon Magazine!

Apart from the upcoming Christmas events taking place over the next few weeks, there is much more happening in our neighbourhood to occupy you. Our last couple of parish council meetings have been very well attended by you and understandably so. You should be aware that we are in the process of having the Conservation Area in Ivinghoe reviewed and a large amount of the work by our Conservation Area Officer has been completed. She has spent a great deal of time walking around the village, taking photos and talking to residents and is now at the report writing stage. Once a draft has been prepared the officer will come to one of our parish council meetings to present her findings which will trigger a public consultation period. Please check

the parish notice boards and our website (www.ivinghoepc.org.uk) for our meeting agendas, so that you can find out when the officer will be coming to present her findings to us.

lvinghoe Together, our local residents group, who formed to deal with the issues raised by the Gladman Development application in Station Road, have been working very hard over the last few weeks and months. At the time of going to press we are only able to tell you that the planning officer for this case has deferred the decision on this application to 5 November. This extension has allowed for Bucks County Highways to submit its' comments on the proposal which are now in. Bucks County Highways have recommended refusal of this application and I would urge you to go to the AVDC planning portal (http:// www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/planning**building/**) to view their comments in full. By the time you receive your copy of this magazine the decision may be in, so you may still have time to submit your comments, but whatever the outcome of the officers recommendations. Ivinghoe Together are committed to following the case through. For their continued hard work and support, the parish council would like to extend its' gratitude to them.

Some months ago parish councils in Buckinghamshire were invited to attend some meetings with regard to the development of services. The plan is to give parish councils the responsibility for grass verge cutting and other associated street

maintenance. Bucks County Council (BCC) continues its' efforts to cut costs and to pass public service expense down the line. This particular issue is giving lyinghoe Parish Council quite a headache. To date we are still attempting to obtain the correct mapping information of our parish from BCC that will adequately allow us to make an accurate financial decision as to whether or not this is the right course of action for the council to take. Many parish councils across the county have already taken up the offer to manage their own local maintenance services, which includes a number of services, such as gutter clearing and signage cleaning. Until we have been given accurate and up to date information from BCC we will not be able to make a firm decision on the matter. However, it is likely that ultimately the parish council will be responsible for undertaking this maintenance work across the parish and this will have an impact on our parish precept by loading substantial costs to our annual outgoings.

Finally, I am pleased to inform you that the parish council is to embark on a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP). Neighbourhood planning was introduced under the Localism Act 2011 to give people a 'hands on' role in planning development in their neighbourhoods. Neighbourhood planning enables local communities to choose where and when they want homes, shops and businesses to be built and to have some influence on the way that they look.

We have undertaken the first stage in the process which is for the parish council to apply to Forward Plans at Aylesbury Vale District Council for the designation of a Neighbourhood Area. We have applied for our Neighbourhood Area to be the parish boundary (as the majority of parishes undertaking this process have done) which takes in the village of lyinghoe,

the hamlet of Ivinghoe Aston and a small number of homes and associated land in Ringshall. Once the application is received a six week public consultation is triggered giving you an opportunity to comment on the Neighbourhood Area proposed by the parish council.

A NDP is a shared enterprise that is managed through a qualifying body, namely the parish council, and the work of the plan is organised by a steering group. This steering group is made up of parish councillors and members of our community with the aim of developing a shared vision to deliver development for the future growth and enhancement of our community.

We are right at the beginning of this process. We will be hosting public events, leafleting, twittering and generally doing everything we can through the work of the steering group to seek your opinions, advice, suggestions and ideas. It is only through collaboration and community engagement that we will be able to create a document that accurately expresses your views and issues. If successful our plan will be translated into planning policy (see the recently adopted Winslow Neighbourhood Plan http://www.winslowtowncouncil.gov.uk/towncouncil/winslow-neighbourhood-plan/).

There is a lot of information on NDPs on the internet but you can contact us if you would like to find out more. Additionally, if you would like to contribute to the process or have skills or experience that could be valuable to the development of the plan, please email the clerk at

Hayley Wesley who runs her community café CuriosiTea Rooms as our Community Hub tenant, employing four local part time helpers, won the 'Best Loved Community Café in the Chilterns' award - well deserved! - this followed by the Leighton Buzzard Observer's 'Café of the Year' award, which shows how lucky we are to have such a facility in our village - rewarding Hayley's hard work for us all! Another Pop-up restaurant will have been enioved by over seventy diners - Hayley will be planning her next one for the 5th December, do come in and book a table for you and your friends. Also retrospectively, a Half Term ActiviTEA Day On 28th October making arts and crafts related to Autumn and Christmas presents; Poppy Sales up until November 9th, and MP John Bercow's visit on 24th October: 31st October - Face paint and fun; and our 1st November Indoor Car Boot Sale. Gladman Development

he lyinghoe Together working group is made up of a number of residents who are working together to ensure that the community remains at the heart of the village, now and for the future.

We joined together in response to the Gladman application for 70 houses at land off Station Road in Ivinghoe. We have worked together to develop an overarching objection document to this application that takes into account the wider planning issues that this unsustainable application raises. This has been submitted and is available on the AVDC planning portal, alongside a large number of other objections. We are extremely grateful to all those who have objected, leafleted and supported us along the way — **Thank You!**

At the time of writing (October 2014) the Planning Officer has delayed his decision until 5th November 2014, pending a report from the Highways Agency. The two options that could occur following this are either that he too objects and the application is refused, or

he is mindful to support the application at which point it will be passed to AVDC for decision at their Strategic Development Committee. Once we know this initial outcome we will need to regroup to work on the next steps. Even with a refusal Gladman are likely to appeal and our journey will continue. Gladman may also put in another, second, application. If this does happen the process will start again and we will need to ask for more personal objections to be made.

Ivinghoe Parish Council are leading the development of our own individual Neighbourhood Plan. This will enable us, as residents of the village, to determine our own development future. We will liaise and work with the Neighbourhood Plan Committee, helping wherever possible.

Our next event will be the Annual Fireworks on Saturday 8th November.


For safety reasons we will be using the Jubilee Beacon.

Ivinghoe Development

he proposed housing estate on the edge of lyinghoe village clearly represents a conflict of interests on one hand of a straight forward business plan and on the other a personal spoiling, and general degradation of the village as it stands, at present a tranquil and delightful place to live.

Of course there is a need to house the massive influx of people but hopefully without irreparably damaging fertile agricultural land and the character of a small village.

Good news, Ivinghoe Parish Council voted to object to the Gladman development. So far so good, however the determination deadline has been put back some four weeks from the original date of 8th October. The position at the time of going to print is as follows:

Mark Denman Planning Officer at AVDC although possessing Ivinghoe Parish Council objection will wait for a response from the Highway Authorities. Then making a decision himself or referring it to the planning committee at AVDC.

A very welcome addition to the Parish

Council vote of objection is the formation of a strong organisation called 'lvinghoe Together' to counter this development the scale of which could be considered as an invasion.

To continue this analogy the Chief of Defence staff, one Dr Andrew Dicker and his very able adjutant Kate Mackie plus Richard Wade, Jasper Boersma and Bob Corn have formed a steering committee; Their aim being to repulse this green field housing estate. This group have held open meetings at the Village Hub, the Old School. The meetings are chaired by Andrew and each time the hub is filled to capacity. As a result of these meetings a flood, 150 or more reasoned and cogent letters of objection together with a beautiful and poignant film made by Roger Hillier were sent to the Parish Council, AVDC, the House of Commons and Gladman by letter, Email and possibly even carrier pigeons.



Letter to the Editor The Warren, Ivinghoe

Dear Editor

In Issue 89 of the Ivinghoe Beacon Magazine, Nigel Thompson reported that yet again, Church Road, Ivinghoe has been dug up by Anglian Water to repair a burst water main, necessitating the closure of the road. May I suggest a possible reason for the repeated fracturing of the water main?

The speed bumps in Ivinghoe and Pitstone, but especially between the entrance to Ivinghoe from the Tring/Dunstable direction and the Kings Head, are not only considerably steeper but also much higher than is the norm. The speed bumps through Marsworth are gentler while those between Aston Clinton and Western Turville are positively genteel but still effective.

The effect of the steep, high bumps, even if taken at a low speed, is to fully compress a vehicle's suspension – and more – causing it to momentarily 'take off' before thumping down on the other side of the bump. In the case of cars this causes not only a severe jolt, often painful to passengers spines but also damage to the suspension and especially tracking/steering on the front axle. Modern articulated lorries, which Church Road seems to attract normally, have five or six axles each carrying up to eight tons. Imagine the damage that repeated impact of up to eight tons could cause to a buried pipe.

However, it could be argued that the water mains which were laid at a time when traffic was much lighter both in terms of weight and volume were built at too shallow a depth for today's monsters.


PS – if Anglia Water were to draw a similar conclusion they might try to seek redress from Ivinghoe Parish Council and Aylesbury Vale DC/Bucks CC.

Reply from Ivinghoe Parish Council

Dear Mr Lord

Thank you for your letter highlighting this frustrating problem. The Bucks County Council Guide to Traffic Calming for Parish Councils guidance document provides parish councils in the county with a guide to traffic calming measures that can be implemented to reduce traffic speeds. The particular speed bumps in Church Road, were installed many years ago and will have been subject to certain regulations to which Bucks County Highways are duty bound to implement. The guide states that 'Speed Cushions' have their height and frequency controlled by regulation and so it is extremely unlikely that Anglian Water could seek redress from Ivinghoe Parish Council for damage to the water main as we do not own the road and do not set the regulations for implementation of traffic calming measures. Also the humps would not have been created unless Bucks County Highways felt that the relevant justifications for implementing such a scheme could be qualified.

We have had complaints over the years regarding the noise in particular generated by HGV's going over these bumps but have lacked the support from Bucks County Highways in finding an alternative solution. The parish council are currently having our conservation area appraised and in line with this project, councillors are seeking funds from our Local Area Forum to fund a review by an independent traffic consultant with the prospect of having a low impact traffic calming scheme designed (not necessarily implemented – at least not all in one go) that can better and more suitably suit the problems associated with heavy traffic in the village.

Community **Speed Watch**

hings have been quiet on the Speedwatch front since our last report. This has not been due to any lack of interest or declining concern. but simply because the equipment has been away on holiday. In fact the Palm Pilot had to go to Holland for attention as it would not hold a charge but I'm pleased to say that it's now back with us (on 12th October). Thanks to Chris Poll for organising this. We will now be booking some Speedwatch sessions. It's a shame that we've missed the best of the weather but we've carried out Speedwatch in the cold before, so no doubt we can do it again.

We have commented previously that, despite several approaches by the PC and residents to AVDC with suggestions for traffic calming taken from the Council's own publication regarding the subject all those proposed have been rejected as "inappropriate". Furthermore the additional road markings which have been put in place ostensibly to have an effect on traffic speed have not done so. It is the new 30mph limit through Great Gap which is the priority but the village provably suffers too. We have, therefore, identified an independant traffic consutant who will be able to give us a professional view of our situation and one which we can argue in the knowledge that our proposals are reasonable. We will be asking for proposals which are appropriate to our situation both financially and with due regard to the protocols for the Conservation Area as outlined by AVDC in their document Aylesbury Vale District Council, Conservation Areas – Highway Protocol.

The consultant to whom we have spoken is presently producing an initial scoping report for Prestwood, near Great Missenden. We have been invited to attend the presentation and one of our Councillors will be present.

Clearly such an exercise will have a cost and we have now made a formal application to the Local Area Forum for funds which will enable this survey to take place.

As background we have a wealth of evidence to support this application in the form of the downloads from the MVAS and data from our Speedwatch exercises. Our fully analysed MVAS data for Northbound traffic covers three separate spans of time in 2013 of 16, 18 and 24 days. As an example for the period ending 21st September 2013 over 77% of the traffic exceeded 35mph, and 45% was at 40mph or faster.

As a direct comparison we have data from the MVAS for a period approximately ten months after the set of data above, and with the installation of the additional ineffectual efforts to control traffic. The period assessed was 7th June to 7th July 2014, North bound. There were a total of 70,353 traffic movements, or 2,270 per day. Of these 53.020 movements were at above 35mph, 1,710 per day or 75.3% of the total. There were 33,467 traffic movements at above 40mph, 1,080 per day or 47%. There were 11 at between 70 and 75mph and 1 at 80 to 85 mph with one at over 100mph. Once again, thanks to Chris Poll for downloading the data, charging the MVAS batteries and locating the equipment where needed.

Throughout Ivinghoe the traffic volume and speed issue is becoming one which is putting the community at risk. Many driveways have exceedingly limited sight lines and it is only a matter of time before one of these speeding motorists collides with a car leaving a driveway. If the speeding vehicle is a lorry the results will be disastrous. Ivinghoe is also a mixed community with many young people but also some of more senior years and lack of any effective traffic controls put these people at particular at risk every single day.

The issue at Great Gap is the volume of traffic paying no heed to the speed limit in a potentially very hazardous environment. In fact on 19th May a speeding van collided with a parked 4 x 4 belonging to a local tradesman which was actually off the carriageway and wrote the 4 x 4 off. The white van took 83 yards to stop, indicating a speed of between

60 and 70mph. The police would not attend as the road was not blocked and there were no injuries although a passing PCSO stopped to investigate the reason for the people at the roadside. Also, as previously commented we have an ongoing problem with the traffic in lvinghoe village and our proposal is for a detailed survey by independent traffic specialists to review the total traffic issue.

Once this is complete we will have an independant report of what is possible. There can then be no refusal on the grounds of any proposal being "inappropriate". Whilst this will not guarantee any corrective action by Bucks CC it will, at least, give us a range of options. At this stage it is difficult to suggest how these will be funded, but once we see a survey we can start considering appropriate action.



The **Miller's** Tale...

s I sit here writing this article we have just one more open day left this season, which is our annual collaboration with Tring's Own Apple Fayre, which by the time you read this will have been and gone, bringing our 2014 season to an end.

It has been a reasonably good year with visitor numbers just about holding their own with previous years, not our best year ever but bringing in enough income to keep the bills paid and the mill open for another year. If you have visited the mill this year, thank you for your custom and we hope you will consider visiting again and please tell your friends and family about us, and if you are local and haven't visited the mill before then firstly, Why not? and secondly, we hope you will consider a visit during our open season next year.

So with the opening season behind us we can start to get on with off season maintenance which includes lifting off the top millstone and cleaning and inspecting the millstones for wear and tear and making sure that the grinding surfaces are still sharp enough to last through next seasons milling sessions, and if the grinding surfaces are not good enough to last another season then we will have to call in our local millwright to cut them back into the right pattern so they grind the wheat properly into fine flour. This cutting of a new grinding surface into the millstones is termed 'Dressing' the stones and it hasn't been undertaken for several years now so it may well be time for them to receive some attention, but we wont really know until we get the stones lifted apart.

Also I should mention that as part of our attempts to publicise the mill and entice new visitors we approached some local film makers with a view to producing a publicity video about the mill.

After several meetings to discuss the type of video and image we wanted to portray and a basic working storyboard agreed, a date was arranged for us all to meet up at the mill and work our way through the filming of different scenes required for the video.

It is guite strange seeing and hearing yourself on film and having to 'act' your part naturally for the camera whilst doing jobs that you normally perform without several pairs of eyes and a camera following your every move. After initial nerves/camera shyness and discussion over who would do what were overcome we got stuck in and worked our way steadily through the different scenes to be filmed, with shouts of "All Quiet please", and "Camera, Action" being the words to listen out for. After several hours the main scenes had been recorded, and after the initial first few shots that needed several attempts we got into the swing of things and many scenes were done in 'one take'. Although at one point filming had to stop halfway through a shot as a shout of 'help' alerted us to the fact that one of our volunteers had crawled behind a machine he was working on and had turned around and then got himself stuck and couldn't get back out again! When we realised it wasn't really serious and was actually quite funny the cameraman turned and asked us if we wanted him to film the chap stuck




behind the machine, but we decided for his embarassment sake that perhaps it was best not to.

Tales from the **Compost Heap**

Or how to make compost according to the Knights Templar

t was 40 years ago, there was great excitement in the gardening world in France. An ancient manuscript had been discovered, describing a unique method of making compost, as devised by "Les Templiers". These were, in English, the Knights Templar - and I can only assume that their order included some stay-at-home monks who did the gardening, as well as the actual knights who went off on crusades.

The text described a way of fermenting freshly-cut small branches, then spreading them out in a layer with the assistance of various signs and symbols of cultural significance. The method was as follows: submerge vour freshly-cut branches in water for 24 hours: fish the "mash" out of the



water, pile up the branches and tread on them to squash them; leave the pile for 3 weeks, in which time fermentation begins and the heap starts to heat up; then crumble the contents of your pile. and form the result into a new triangular heap; leave this for 3 months, protected by more branches; finally, spread your compost out on the soil, and plant into it.

If you do not fancy doing all this, alternatively - and far more easily you could make your own compost bin, or buy one, and fill it up with your household peelings, shredded paper etcetera! And leave out the bits about soaking, crushing, piling and shaping, History does not record how successful the Knights Templar were with their method, but the fact that it died out seems to speak for itself.

To make local gardeners' lives even simpler, David Green, churchwarden from St. Mary's lvinghoe, has invited local folk to come and help themselves from the compost heap that is in the churchyard, on the right as you approach the church from the bus stop. All you need to do is turn up with your wheelbarrow or sack, and take what vou need.

Brookmead School

Learning outdoors is an important aspect of our children's experience at Brookmead, as is music, drama and sport.

Visitors to the Children's Centre and Windmill Nursery will I hope have enjoyed our sunflower meadow that simply went on growing through an amazingly warm September. The flowers were grown from seed which the children planted themselves in the spring. When we returned to school after the summer holidays there were one or two flowers that were taller than the children in Key Stage 1; by the time pupils in Year 6 were carrying out a detailed mathematical study later in the month, there were sunflowers that were taller than us all.

Our Sunflower Project has prompted a lot of interest across the school. They have provided a stimulus for art work, measuring, counting, looking for patterns, scientific observations and investigations, as well as a great place for games of hide-and-seek and chase. From dissecting a sunflower head pupils in Year 3 found that unripe sunflower seeds resemble small teeth – I'm not sure how many tooth fairies have been caught out by this discovery! Now the sunflowers have been harvested and the Yurt is being used as a sunflower laboratory before it is taken down to be dried out and go into hibernation ready to be reassembled in the spring.

Learning outdoors is an important aspect of our children's experience at Brookmead, as is music, drama and sport. We are delighted that the number

of sports teams continues to grow and more opportunities are created for children to represent the school at sporting events. Pupils are also keen to start the day by raising their heart-beat in Energy Club, a before-school club that gets children running around and enjoying being energetic. We are very grateful to the parents volunteers who work with our staff to support these activities.

The number of pupils learning musical instruments in school continues to grow; we are very impressed with the enthusiasm and persistence which is being rewarded by their excellent achievements in music examinations. Brookmead children will be singing at a number of events around the villages this Christmas. We look forward to seeing you there!

shridge is a perfect location for a walk on a beautiful winter's day. Wrap up warm and take in the stunning surroundings of the National Trust's Ashridge Estate at this magical time of year. The leafless trees give you a great chance to spot deer and flocks of birds roaming the woods looking for food. If you would like some inspiration on a new walk route pop into the Visitor Centre and we can point you in the right direction.

News from the Estate: Juniper Propagation

Juniper is a native conifer species that is now very rare in the South of England. We have only two mature bushes and two young bushes on the estate. The plant itself provides vital habitat for different species and a food source for migrating birds.

We are undertaking a project to restore the current population and make it sustainable and healthy. This is vital for the biodiversity of the estate and the survival of the species in the South East. We are doing this by using the existing plants as a source of seeds and cuttings.

In October the rangers collected 50% of the viable berries from the one fertile female on the estate to be propagated and grown in the tree nursery currently under construction. This is a long term project as juniper berries take two years to mature. Then the seedlings will be grown for two years in a greenhouse and for a final year in the tree nursery before being planted out.

Early next year we will also take cuttings from both the male and female bushes which will be grown on for 2 years in the greenhouse, and a further year in the tree nursery before being planted out. This method is quicker than collecting seeds: however the new plants will be genetic clones of the parent plant, leaving the population susceptible to infection and disease.

Hopefully through the two methods we can create a sustainable population within 15 years.



DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.

Ivinghoe BeaconPlanning decisions

he AVDC aimed to reach a decision on the proposed 70 houses at Station Road Ivinghoe by October 8, but as I understand it no decision is likely before the end of the month. When the decision has been made I and my fellow councillor for Cheddington ward Corry Cashman, will let people know through a short newsletter on planning.

The District Council elections May 2015 will be held on new boundaries, decided by the Boundary Commission, despite representation and alternative suggestions from the Council and local people. The current separate Pitstone and Cheddington wards will be combined into a single 'Pitstone and Cheddington' ward with two District Councillors. The new ward will include Pitstone, Cheddington, lvinghoe, and Marsworth, but not lvinghoe Aston or Slapton.

The General Election May 2015. If our MP John Bercow, Speaker of the House of Commons, stands again for election, as anticipated, it is highly likely that he will once again not be opposed by the three main political parties. (As speaker, he is not a member of any political party). Last time many voters were disappointed when they only discovered this on polling day. It is a longstanding convention that in respect for the office, the main parties do not oppose the speaker. Local Lib Dems have been lobbying the national party ever since our MP became the speaker, to ignore the convention and give voters a choice, so far without success.

County Council Children's Services were judged inadequate by OFSTED

this summer, particularly around social work practices. However processes for children who go missing or who are at risk from sexual exploitation were identified as strong, thankfully. In recent weeks a robust improvement plan has been drawn up and the council committed to additional funding, so far £4M overspend this year, £1M from contingency, plus another £4M still needed. The OFSTED report opened with the statement that Children's Social care is not in the two top priorities for the Council, limiting the effectiveness of those with lead responsibility for the service. I hope this hard hitting report is an opportunity to change that.

At last – £263M capital investment in Bucks roads for a four year 'preventative asset maintenance' programme. This is a stunning U turn from a council leader who has consistently rubbished my annual budget speech for the last three years which has emphasised the absolute necessity for investment. The new cabinet member for Transportation, Ruth Vigor-Hedderley has successfully

reorganised the delivery of highway repairs and gained additional revenue funding, the results of which can be seen in the spate of local roadworks.

National Heritage – risky business

The AVDC Heritage Team will soon be embarking upon a comprehensive Grade II Listed Building Survey across the District, as part of the National Heritage at Risk Grade II Project.

The aim of the project is to train local volunteers up to survey important historic buildings in their area, and to monitor those buildings to make sure that they are not falling into disrepair.
