



A Square Piano in St Peter's



Concert goers who filled St Peter's Church on Friday evening, 7th March, were in for a treat. The renowned Patron of Stockbridge Music, David Owen Norris (pianist, composer, academic and broadcaster), came along with his 1781 square piano and entertained us with stories and anecdotes whilst educating us on the invention in the early 18th century of the keyboard instrument that gave the pianist some control over the volume with the use of levers - hence: piano = quiet, and forte = loud. And so the pianoforte was born. David's opening piece on this enchanting instrument was the Sonata in C minor by Johann Christian Bach (son of Johann Sebastian). The music that followed was by a young Mozart, who had arrived with his family in London in 1764, and who, during that summer, aged 8, composed the lovely three "Pieces from the London Sketchbook", which sound perfect on the square piano. David continued with Mozart's Sonata in G minor.

Into the mix, our accomplished and entertaining pianist also skilfully wove the musical talent and enthusiasm of Jane Austen, whose birthday 250 years ago we celebrate this year. David's title of the programme was "Yes, yes, we WILL have a Pianoforte", a quote from Jane to her sister Cassandra in 1808, telling her that she would buy one as good as she could get for 30 guineas. Jane practised the pianoforte every day before breakfast and she took lessons from the assistant organist at Winchester Cathedral. In her novel "Emma", Jane Fairfax receives a square piano from an anonymous donor, who is later revealed to be her secret fiancé,



Frank Churchill. Later in the programme, David played for us a Sonata in E flat. It is unknown who wrote it, but the musical manuscript is in Jane Austen's very own hand, the finale is preceded by a portrait of a young lady, and the question is still unanswered: could Jane have written the charming piece of music?

After the interval, during which the audience enjoyed their drinks in the Town Hall and our esteemed guest assiduously tuned his square piano (it seems to need a lot of tuning), he played a Rondo by Gustav Holst's great-grandfather, Matthew Holst. He followed that by "Robin Adair", A Favourite Irish Melody with Variations for the Pianoforte by George Kiallmark (1781-1835). This is the only piece of music actually named in Jane Austen's novels.

The concert finished with another of Mozart's sonatas, this one, unusually for Mozart, being in A minor. It was composed in 1778 after the sudden death of his mother whilst she had been accompanying Wolfgang Amadeus on a tour. The music seems to match his anguish, and apparently even the manuscript for this sonata appeared to be a bit more scrawled than his usual work.

The audience in St Peter's gave David Owen Norris a massive round of applause, well deserved, at the end of this entertaining, illuminating and enchanting concert. Stockbridge Music are lucky to have him as Patron, and we in turn are incredibly blessed that Stockbridge Music, under Paul Wing's superb direction, regularly attracts people from far and wide to come and enjoy such a broad range of concerts in St Peter's Church, Stockbridge.

Stockbridge Amateur Dramatic Society Terror on the Test - Saturday 12th April


SADS are holding a **unique event** (see Poster p5)
It's part play reading; part murder mystery;
and part party.

We had originally planned to do a full production of the play *Terror on the Test* which is a Stockbridge version of *Death on the Dudwell* written by William Moore (son of Charles Moore - former editor of The Daily Telegraph and The Spectator) for a local drama group in East Sussex. Our director had to withdraw for work reasons and so we decided to use the script as the basis for this event instead.




Topic Homework Spring 1

Stockbridge Parish Council News

High Street Parking and HCC Survey

In June 2023, HCC undertook a parking survey on Stockbridge High Street. It took until January 2025 for HCC to provide the PC with the final version of the report of this survey. A draft report had been produced in the Autumn of 2023 and it took considerable perseverance by Cllr Lawrence and then the Information Commissioner's Office with Freedom of Information requests and then sanctions for the draft report to be released in Spring 2024.

The PC is now being asked by HCC to provide a response to the report and the Council is seeking to get as much feedback as possible. The question the PC is seeking to answer is simple – does the community support paid parking or not? The ramifications of installing a paid parking regime are explained in the article on the opposite page and it is important that residents and traders consider carefully what is best for Stockbridge.

The survey is available on the Parish Council's website at

2025 Parking Survey - Stockbridge Parish Council -Stockbridge Parish Council, Stockbridge. There are also other articles published there concerning matters that respondents may like to consider. The survey is an online survey but, if you prefer a paper copy, please contact the Clerk (contact details below) who can arrange for a paper version to be sent to you. Paper versions can be returned to Hoxton's Bakehouse or Prego. Only one response per resident, please, and only residents of Stockbridge. High Street traders are also invited to respond. The responses will be verified to ensure they are from Stockbridge residents or traders so the survey will be asking for your address. This will enable the PC to prove that the response to HCC is from the community as well as the Parish Council.

The survey closes on 30th April 2025.

Local Government Reorganisation

HCC's proposals for bringing together the 11 borough and district councils and neighbouring unitary authorities into a reduced number of new unitary authorities - that will provide the same services as both county and district councils - were to be presented to the HCC Cabinet on 21st March and the GVT by 31st March.

HCC's proposals will look at how the services it currently delivers can continue under the proposed new unitary authorities. HCC, which will be broken up, is responsible for the vast proportion of local government services and budgets across the area. This includes vital services from social care for children and adults, public health, education, libraries, roads and registration, to transport, waste disposal, strategic planning, trading standards and countryside services - and all of these services benefit from HCC's significant scale of operation.

HCC is aware that a higher number of unitary councils with the number of residents close to the minimum 500,000 does not stack up financially. This will cost the taxpayer more and weaken the financial strength of each individual council.

Victory in Europe (VE) Day Anniversary

Communities across Test Valley are being encouraged by TVBC to mark a special Victory in Europe (VE) Day anniversary in May. Thursday 8 May 2025 will mark 80 years since Germany's unconditional surrender of its armed forces, bringing the end of World War Two in Europe. To honour this, Test Valley Borough Council have set up a VE Day 80th Anniversary Grant Scheme, which will enable communities to apply for up to £500 towards local celebrations to mark the historic event. Not-for-profit organisations, clubs and societies, parish and town councils and schools can all apply for a share of the pot. The closing date for applications is 12 noon on Friday 25th April and all activities must take place within two weeks of 8th May 2025. If a temporary road closure is needed for your VE Day event, the application fee will be waived. For more information about how to apply visit www.testvalley.gov.uk/VEDayGrant.

Black tie, Suit or Glitzy Glam

The 2025 Parking Questionnaire from The Parish Council

Stockbridge Parish Council has been asked by Hampshire County Council to yet again try to find out the views of residents and businesses with a fresh survey of attitudes to paid parking. I have seen an early version of the survey form and have the following points that I think everyone should consider before responding. The PC has debated and written about this issue extensively over the last few years. If you look on the PC's website you will see a very good article that shows that the PC now seems to have its own view about paid parking; it is much against the idea.

There are a number of qualifications to these bald questions on the survey that need to be drawn to your attention because paid parking is a complex issue, not subject to simple questions and yes/no answers. As the PC's own work in previous years has shown, paid parking implies considerable costs to both businesses and residents some of which are outlined below;

- 1) Who will have to pay? All residents of Stockbridge parish? Who would be exempt, if any? Would residents have to buy a residents' permit giving them an exemption? How much would that cost? Would residents on Old London Road and Trafalgar Way have to buy permits? Or would they have to pay if they went to the High Street in their car?
- 2) Who would qualify for a permit? Drivers who have off-street parking as well as those who do not?
- 3) If those who have off-street parking would have to pay for their cars to be on the High Street and elsewhere, would this alter their perception of what they are being asked?
- 4) Will there be fines for transgressors? The only way to enforce parking payments is for there to be a system of noting which cars are where, recording the time they arrived and departed, but with a time limit. This is usually done nowadays by cameras watching over the area concerned. If the time limit is exceeded will there be penalties?
- 5) The payments for parking are only a small part, usually, of the revenue that the Highway Authority will be seeking. In the surrounding towns, the system used is an electronic eye and there are many instances where drivers are caught out overstaying their time by a matter of a few minutes and then being rewarded by a hefty fine; the system is ruthless in its efficiency. So how much will the fines be? Current levels are often in the range £80 to £120. Setting up these monitoring cameras and analysing the results and sending out penalty notices are expensive.
- 6) What would this mean to a resident with off street parking who inadvertently left his/her car in the High St overnight by mistake?
- 7) How long will the permitted time be? Two hours/three? This matters, because a recent report

of a survey which the PC organised shows that 70% of people in Stockbridge on summer and presumably spring and autumn days came from more than 10 miles away. This indicated that Stockbridge is a DESTINATION for a day out for people from far and wide who also eat, drink, go shopping as well as walking their dogs. A good lunch in a restaurant or pub may well take more than two hours followed by a walk around the shops, buying as well as looking. The length of stay recorded in the survey was in some cases for the whole day. How many will be fined if they overstay the permitted time? No-one would be likely to stay longer than the time available but the economy of Stockbridge as it is now, depends to a large extent on these people and their activities here, NOT on locals' expenditure alone.

- 8) Will paid parking and fines drive visitors away, never to return?
- 9) If there is paid parking will residents be happy if there are growing numbers of shops, restaurants and other services which close because of a lack of trade? What will Stockbridge look like if this happens?
- 10) Who will benefit from paid parking? Businesses? NO. Visitors? No. Residents? Possibly Yes if you don't mind the slow decline of the economy and appearance of Stockbridge as well as the decline in the value of your house, which you may well have just bought with a mortgage?
- 11) Are there examples from other similar towns such as Alresford and Lymington where paid parking and fines have been experienced and which might help in making informed judgements about the issues?

These are just some of the questions lying hidden behind the current and indeed any such survey, the answers to which are essential to anyone trying to make a balanced and informed judgement about the simple questions asked in the survey. I believe, however, that the answers to the questions I have posed are simply not available. The County should have come clean about these but seems reluctant to do so. However, there have been a number of local surveys and reports commissioned by the PC and the results sent to the Highways Agency in recent years. These have been the reactions to the prospect of paid parking and fines, and the question to the County remains: why another? The answer was clear three years ago; NO!

However, you are asked to comply and fill in this new survey. Without the answers to the questions I have set out above, I will have to vote 'No' for no other reason than that I don't have any idea about what the reality will be if I answer 'Yes'. May I politely suggest you do the same? It's your future, your business, and your Stockbridge that's at stake here, not a simple matter by any means.

St Peter's Church Communion Plate

By reader request, we are re-running the following article which featured in the magazine some years ago. It was written by the late John Stephenson, erstwhile Churchwarden of St Peter's, who will be remembered by many.

David Williams, current Churchwarden, writes:

'As a retired major general, John Stephenson was a driving force in Stockbridge for many years, notably as Churchwarden and as President of our local branch of the Royal British Legion.

As Churchwarden, he oversaw both the restoration of Old St Peter's church and significant improvements to St Peter's.

John was an ardent traditionalist and his article about our historic communion set reflects that inclination. It is appropriate to remind parishioners of this precious possession as we approach the start of Holy Week and the celebration of Easter.'

Most parishioners will know that the Parish is fortunate to possess two most valuable pieces of Communion Plate.

The silver gilt Chalice of 1697, weighing 26 ounces of Britannia silver, bears the Stockbridge crest and the crests of the two donors, Thomas Jervois and George Pitt.

These two gentlemen also donated the silver Paten of c.1700, weighing 5 ounces of Britannia silver.

Few readers, however, may be aware of the more recent history of our valuable inheritance.

When extensive repairs to the Church were under way in 1992, the Treasurer, Steve Weighall, reminded me that the Chalice had been kept in the vaults of Lloyds TSB Bank in Andover for many years. Not only did this cost the Church £50 annually, but it was never seen publicly. After lengthy negotiations with the Curator of Winchester Cathedral (John Hardacre), it was agreed that the Chalice would be kept in the Cathedral Treasury where it could be viewed at all times.

Furthermore, the Cathedral Insurance Policy included the loan of the Chalice to our Church four times annually. So, on the appropriate day, Steve Weighall and I visited the Bank Manager to collect the Chalice (no, we were not offered a glass of sherry!). When a large locked box was produced from the vaults, the Manager asked "Who has the

key?" Since the key had been lost many years ago, we signed for one 'locked box containing a Chalice'. Returning to Stockbridge, Steve and I carefully dismantled the box to reveal a tarnished but very beautiful, ornate Chalice. After polishing, it was taken for display at Winchester Cathedral Treasury where it can be viewed today.

The Paten also has an interesting recent history. When I took over as Warden in 1989, the Paten could not be found and was therefore noted as 'missing' in the Terrier and Inventory. In the early 1990's, the safe in the Vestry was broken open and the previous collection taken by the thieves. On

careful inspection of the safe later in the day, the Police said that the lock was so simple it could be picked by a child. Before arranging for the fitting of a new lock, I took everything out of the safe. At the bottom, wrapped in old brown newspaper, I found a very tarnished piece of silver bearing a hallmark. It had been so badly damaged that it

resembled the shape of a Cornish pasty. The Cathedral silversmith confirmed that it was the Paten and subsequently repaired it at a cost of £50. It then joined the Chalice in the Cathedral Treasury.

While I was Warden, I collected the Chalice and Paten from the Cathedral for use during our Communion Services at Easter, Christmas and Harvest Festival every year. This custom was continued by my successor (the late George McMeekin) but has lapsed in recent years.

Reflections on

Music has played a key role in my life since I was a very small child. During the Second World War, I would listen to my mother playing classical music on our upright piano in the evenings. On top of the piano was a photograph of my father in uniform before his regiment went off to war. He was away almost continuously for six years. Before bedtime, my brothers, sister and I would say goodnight to his photo. Then I would lie awake listening to the haunting strains of Bach or Chopin drifting up the stairs. The music was my comfort blanket.

Reflecting on my life from a distance, I recognise that regular church attendance and then singing in the choir (Matins and Evensong) for all of my school years was the seedbed for my enduring love of church music. As an adult, I have been fortunate enough to sing in some fine choral groups both in Greece and the UK. Now, as my vocal cords suffer

And I can echo George Eliot who famously said, "Life seems to go on without effort when I am filled with music". Listening to (and singing) sacred music can be therapeutic, evoking feelings of connection to something larger than oneself, and the power of singing in a communal setting promotes feelings of connectedness to each other. Church attendance may sadly be diminishing but the search for meaning still goes on.

The birth of Christian music is lost in time but believers have been singing praises to God since time immemorial. Gregorian chant, still sung regularly in holy orders, dates back to the 9th century. It is monophonic, unaccompanied and liturgical. Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179) was a German Benedictine abbess, a multi-talented writer, composer and theologian. One of the earliest and best-known composers of sacred chant, she wrote, "Music stirs our hearts and engages our souls in ways we can't describe". It is often thought that polyphony (the combination of two or more voices singing in harmony) started in the Renaissance but evidence has been uncovered of such singing being written down in the 10th century.

Reflections on... ...the healing power of sacred music

Many of our great composers have given us magnificent, large scale, sacred musical compositions. Think of the power of Verdi's Requiem Mass or Mozart's *Requiem* which grapples with the mystery of death, as he himself approached his end. Gabriel Fauré said that his Requiem "did not express the fear of death but as a happy deliverance, and aspiration towards happiness above". Listening to the exquisite melody of the Pie Jesu, (try Andrea Haines of Voces8 *) and the Sanctus later in the piece, I understand what Beethoven meant when he said: "Music is the mediator between the spiritual and the sensual life".

Many of the great sacred music composers of earlier times were European, although Handel, who had been born in Germany, was a naturalised English citizen and composed his Oratorio, The Messiah, using the English Language from the St James Bible. It is often played at Easter and celebrates the risen Christ. Another English composer was John Stainer. As you will see on p.5, the Stockbridge (augmented) Church Choir with soloists will be singing "The Crucifixion" on Good Friday. I would defy anyone not to be soulfully moved by his choral setting of "God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son...". Stainer wrote his Cantata with church choirs in mind and it includes participation by the congregation in hymns, which have become well known over the years.

Of course, sacred music is frequently played in concert halls and not churches, but as I grow older, I am most happy listening alone or in a sacred setting. And how lucky we are to have digital access to whatever music we choose through the internet. Research proves that music has got healing powers. Stroke patients can learn to talk again after music therapy. Listening to classical music by composers such as Bach, Mozart or Brahms can lower blood pressure, steady the pulse and alleviate anxiety. Recently, I became nostalgic for the weekly singing of the psalms from the Parish Psalter. The repetitive rhythm is meditative and very spiritual. I recommend the old recordings of Guildford Cathedral Choir to be found on YouTube.

Classical music, like many other sorts of music, can inspire and unite people. But there is something spiritual about sacred music which speaks to the heart where the soul resides. Perhaps it is where we find the 'still, small voice' that summons us to be our best.

Views from the Potting Shed



I have become increasingly dissatisfied with my own garden over the past few years and plans

are afoot to work out why this is so and, a conclusion once made, how to rectify it.

Looking back on old photographs of a once wellconceived plan, of which I could be proud and which was filled with harmony and the (to me) much-needed odd spot of anarchy, I finally managed to pin down my more recent mistakes. Alongside small, piecemeal changes over time which did not help the overall picture; the need to simplify things to make gardening easier; invasion by one ill-chosen plant or the indulgence of buying a plant I liked, but which did not fit successfully into the entire picture, and finally admitting that increasing years were making me slower, my light bulb moment came when I realised I had forgotten something rather important. Gardens are full of things which are growing, and a beautiful shrub, tree or plant which has grown out of proportion to the whole puts the entire picture out of kilter.

Artists and garden designers alike will talk of Fibonacci and the 'golden ratio' or 'golden rectangle' by which certain proportions produce the most pleasing effect aesthetically; Mother Nature herself offers us many examples in the natural world. Whether we are familiar with the principles or not, we tend to use it unconsciously, planning spaces and planting with due regard to height and width to produce a harmonious whole.

Colour choice also plays an integral role in promoting this 'whole'. In our own, normal-sized spaces, by restricting our palette to 3 main colours used in various shades and with differing textures, this, when combined with green leaves and stems, help to create the effect. Fortunate gardeners with large areas to work in can create separate 'rooms' exploring different atmospheres and moods – think of Monty Don and his 'Jewel Garden' filled with rich colours, compared with the simplicity of his Cottage Garden. His garden at Longmeadow has not stood still since 1991 but has grown and evolved over the years; he has never shrunk from admitting mistakes. And how boring Sissinghurst would be if Vita and Harold had only designed the White Garden and left out the Nuttery or the Tapestry Garden. Christopher Lloyd understood the need for different moods in the garden and, controversially, loved to use a little anarchy within one border, as those who have visited Great Dixter will know, but most of us have neither the space nor the courage to go 'off piste' in any serious way. This will not be a quick fix, but a proper Plan with a proper Strategy. All in all, I'm rather excited about it.

Lindy Lou's Kitchen Recipes & Crafty Corner



So since my last instalment, I have become a dehydrator! As well as a mad air-fried potato eater!

Anyway, I discovered that if you add sliced bananas to the air fryer in a single layer, set to dehydrate over night, 7 hours later you have the most amazing banana bites. My rabbit loves them too! I promise to try something more useful with the Air Fryer in my next column.

We are already well into Spring so, rather than the usual Lamb recipe, I thought we should have a most amazing and easy Pork instead ... it's something to master and will always work - try your own spice rubs, it is obsessive!

(See tips at end for picking the best meat for this.)

Slow Roasted Fennel and Coriander Pork Belly

Serves 6-8

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp sea salt
- 2 tsp coriander seeds
- 2 tsp fennel seeds

3kg outdoor-reared or free range pork belly with ribs removed (but retain) and skin scored.

Method

Preheat oven to its highest temperature. In a pestle and mortar (or anything that will grind the spices), add the salt, coriander and fennel and crush them together. Rub these all over the pork.

Put the ribs in the middle of a large roasting tin and then sit the pork belly joint on the top

Roast on high oven temperature (c. 200°C) for 30 minutes, then reduce the oven temperature to 140°C/ fan 120°C /gas1. Cook for 6 – 7 hours until tender.

If by any chance the crackling is not as crisp as you would like, then increase the temperature at the end and continue to cook for a further 20 minutes or so; it will not harm the meat.

Serve with lovely crispy potatoes and beautiful roasted vegetables.

It's so simple but amazing ...

Tips for buying a pork belly joint

Always look for a good layer of fat between the meat and the skin - not something we are that keen on nowadays but it's this that will ensure you get the best crackling and tender meat.

Covid Vaccinations

Our Spring Booster Covid vaccination clinics will take place at Broughton Surgery on 4 and 5 April for those who have booked.

Patients aged 75 or over (including those who turn 75 by 17 June 2025) and patients who are immunosuppressed are eligible for the Covid booster.

Blood tests

This is just a reminder that we need a request from a healthcare professional to take blood. If you were seen at Winchester or Andover hospital, the request can be made electronically. If you were seen at Southampton or Salisbury, we will need the paper request.

Test results go back to the person who requested it, so the results of tests requested by hospital staff are not sent to the GP surgery and will not be available to you on the NHS App.



Courts Baron and Leet March 2025

The Courts Baron and Leet met on 5th March in Stockbridge Town Hall. It followed the traditional format of a summons by the Town Crier, the swearing in of the Officers and Jury, and then an address by the Lord of the Manor, Guy Boney KC. Again, traditionally this involved obituaries of those who had passed away during the year, (one always learns things one didn't know with obituaries), and an overview of 'the state of the village', highlighting items of interest and thanking those involved. Catherine Hadler of the National Trust then spoke about issues on the Common and Marsh, and took questions from the audience. A tried and tested, informative and enjoyable session, but then there was a small break with tradition. The Foreman of the Jury gave his report without the Jury retiring, explaining as follows:

"The role of the Jury at the Courts Baron and Leet has gradually changed over the years. The historic position is that the Jury represents the Burghers of Stockbridge, and maintaining their rights on the Marsh and Common remains central to that role; but the way that is enacted has changed. The Jury historically was chosen by the Bailiff at the door of the Courts, and served while the Courts were in session, ie for a few hours. Nowadays the Jury meet about twice a year, and Jurors are expected to serve for three years or so; this enables them to get to know the various issues and contribute sensibly. It also provides continuity. The meetings are chaired by the Lord of the Manor, and attended by the Officers of the Courts and the National Trust. As a result, the Courts has developed into a very positive interface between the community of Stockbridge and the National Trust.

Discussions this year have been wide-ranging; on the Common we have covered such topics as Ragwort, Security, Drones, Birdlife, Ferreting, Digging on the earthworks, Poaching, Hare coursing, Shooting, Commercial dog walking and much else.

On the Marsh, discussion has covered: Water quality, Restoration of the riverbank, Fencing along the river, Drainage gullies across the marsh, Bridge moving, Intensity of use, Dogs, Birdlife etc."

The Lord of the Manor wished to place on record the sense of gratitude widely felt by the Burghers of Stockbridge at having the Down and Common Marsh on their doorstep, and the National Trust on hand to manage and maintain them so well. They fund and do all the hard work, and make the final decisions. The Courts comment, contribute as appropriate, and are usually listened to. There is always a need for Jurors, so anyone who would like to join the Jury, please let the Bailiff, Andy Soper know, see contact details at front of magazine.

Eco News from Lisa Trailor

How to help children deal with Eco anxiety

If you've read my recent articles you know I've been feeling challenged about how to deal with climate change. 'Eco anxiety' is something many people are experiencing but what about the effect on the youngest generation? Apparently 78% of 6-12 year olds are already worried about climate change. What should you say to them about it? How can you help them feel more positive about the situation?

Greenpeace have published a handy guide for talking to primary-age children about the climate crisis – and I'm happy to forward this to anyone who wants to e-mail me (lisalamberti@hotmail.co.uk) – or check out the Greenpeace website. Here are a few tips in the meantime which, to be honest, could apply to those of us who are a bit older too:

- 1) **do talk to them** they might already be concerned and hearing worrying stories
- 2) **you don't have to know all the answers** but you can explore the topics together
- 3) **balance bad news with good news** (see below for this month's good news offering)
- 4) **take action together** I'll be interested to hear what you do or maybe you've got a suggestion for an activity that we can run at church aimed at children and their parents let me know. We'll be doing our citizen science nature count at St Mary's on the afternoon of June 15 a great family activity! And mending broken things could be something you do together (see below).

Who heals the broken?

At the time of writing, I've not long started the Lent course and today's reading was from Psalm 147, with words of hopefulness about God healing the brokenhearted.

Each day we've been given a little challenge and today's was to bring to mind something broken and ask God to make it into something beautiful – I went off on an environmental tangent ... and, as a result, here are a few suggestions about mending broken things!

- there's a **repair café** in Andover on the 3rd
 Saturday of every month, 10am to 1pm at St Ann's
 Hall on Suffolk Road. Take along your broken items for repair.
- I've taken things along to the Men's Shed in the Andover Chantry Centre (check website for opening hours) and they've given them a new lease of life
- or if you want to try mending things yourself, how about trying a creative 'visible mending' course. Beaker Buttons at Weyhill is a good local venue for crafts and Jen, the owner, runs many courses including visible mending
- or perhaps you've already got the skills to do the mending yourself – when I was at school we were

still taught sewing/woodwork etc. and valuable skills were passed from grandparent to grandchild. How about **passing on your skills** to the next generation – a great way to spend quality time with the grandchildren?

And on the way, you'll be helping to mend this broken world; repairing something to give it new life helps stop things going to landfill and mitigates the need to use more of the world's limited resources.

Good news

The government has recently given the go-ahead for specially-licensed releases of beavers into the English countryside. In the Government's own words "Beavers can bring many benefits including boosting biodiversity, creating and restoring wetland habitats and reducing downstream flooding" and we all know that flooding is becoming a bigger issue in our area.

In the last few years, beavers have been living in enclosures throughout the country, including at Knepp and, more locally to us, as Ewhurst Park. This new ruling will allow for their release – albeit

with human oversight to ensure their activities aren't detrimental to us - and lots of consultation with local people in potential release areas.



There are no plans, as far as I'm aware, for releases around the River Test, but Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust have a project well underway for the River Yar on the Isle of Wight. We're off to Isle of Wight for our holidays later this year – it's lovely to think that maybe next time we go, we'll be able to see beavers in the wild.

The Ultimate April Fool?

Joseph Boskin, a History professor at Boston University, was interviewed by an Associated Press writer about the history and meaning of April Fool's Day.

During the interview, Boskin stated that April Fool's Day originated during the Roman Empire when a group of fools and jesters boasted to Emperor Constantine that any one of them could rule the kingdom as well as or better than the Emperor himself. Amused, Constantine gave them a chance to prove this boast by appointing Kugel, the King of the Fools, emperor for a day. Kugel immediately decreed that only the absurd would be allowed in the kingdom on that day. The custom stuck, and the tradition of April Fools was born. The interview with Boskin appeared in newspapers and was widely attributed.

Several weeks later, Boskin confessed that he had made up the whole story. Kugel was, in reality, a kind of Jewish casserole, not the King of the Fools. What's more, Boskin admitted that he didn't actually know how April Fool's Day began!

St Mary's Longstock

Ash Wednesday on Wednesday 5 March was the beginning of Lent and



there was a service at St Mary's Church, Longstock at 7.30pm. This was preceded by the first session of the Lent Course in St Mary, Longstock. St Peter's and Old St Peter's Stockbridge





From the Rural Dean

This year, Easter falls in the middle of April (Easter Day – 20th April). The month will have the contrast of the 'getting ready' of Lent and the 'party' that is Easter. Easter falls at the end of School Holidays which will make church and schools mark Easter in a different way to usual. How will you celebrate Easter?

On Palm Sunday (13th April) – the Sunday before Easter – we hear the story of how Jesus came into Jerusalem a few days before his death, riding a donkey. The crowds waved palms and cheered him as a king. Some churches get a real live donkey for this service, and everyone gets palm branches or a cross made out of palms to hold and take home.

In the New Testament of the Bible, the Resurrection (Jesus becoming alive again) is said to have occurred three days after Jesus was crucified by the Romans and died in roughly 30 AD. The holiday concludes the "Passion of Christ," a series of events and holidays that begins with Lent - a 40-day period of fasting, prayer and sacrifice - and ends with Holy Week, which includes Holy Thursday (the celebration of Jesus' Last Supper with his 12 Apostles, also known as "Maundy Thursday"), Good Friday (on which Jesus' crucifixion is observed) and Easter Sunday.

Although a holiday of high religious significance in the Christian faith, many traditions associated with Easter date back to pre-Christian, pagan times.

In Romsey Deanery, there is a wide range of ways in which Easter is celebrated – services at all times of the day; some in traditional language, some in modern; some indoors, some outdoors; some with chocolate, some without! Wherever and however you choose to celebrate Easter – do have a great time.


