Job Advert - Parish Clerk - Boughton Malherbe

A vacancy has arisen for the post of Clerk to Boughton Malherbe Parish Council resulting from the upcoming retirement of the current Clerk.

Boughton Malherbe is a small parish incorporating the village of Grafty Green, the hamlet of Boughton Malherbe and the surrounding countryside, sitting on the greensand ridge between Lenham and Headcorn in the district of Maidstone.

This is a part time role requiring 7 hours per week. The role is home-based with flexibility as to when the hours are worked and attracts a salary between £10.44 and £11.55 per hour (national SCP 7-12) - pay award pending - depending on experience/qualifications.

Council meetings take place bi-monthly in the evening, and occasionally there is a requirement for committees to meet between council meetings.

Duties for this interesting role include:

- attending evening Parish Council Meetings, usually held on Monday.
 Additionally, there is a requirement to hold the Annual Parish Meeting each year as well the occasional day-time meeting/site meetings
- preparing the agendas and taking minutes
- giving procedural advice to councillors
- carrying out the Council's administrative tasks
- managing all aspects of the Council's finances including budgeting, monitoring expenditure, VAT and the production of all relevant accounting statements as well as the audit process.
- dealing with general enquiries and correspondence
- updating and co-ordinating the Parish Council website

The successful applicant will have good communication, administrative and literacy skills as well as a basic IT skill set covering the various packages required to carry out the functions of the Clerk. The Clerk needs to be organised, have the ability to be flexible and able to show initiative. Where required training will be provided.

The ideal candidate will have previous experience in a local government/clerk role and some experience of managing budgets.

Editorial

Included in this month's magazine are the minutes of two recent Parish Council Meetings. The first on Monday 17th January was a meeting of the Finance and Staffing committee and the second on Monday 22nd January was a full Parish Council meeting. It should be noted that all 5 Parish Council members attended both meetings.

The meeting of the Finance and Staffing committee primarily involved a discussion about the forthcoming budget for 2022/2023 and how it was to be financed. The main change to the budget was the proposed increase in the Council Clerk's salary, which is to be increased from 4 to 7 hours a week. This was deemed necessary as the current clerk was working far in excess of 4 hours a week due to increased involvement in responding to Maidstone Borough and Kent County Council's demands.

As a result of this increase in Staffing costs, the Parish Council decided in the meeting to increase the **Parish Precept (the bit that is raised through your Council Tax)** from £5731 to £7523.

It should be noted here that currently (as of 24th January 2022) the Parish Council has £91,324 in its bank accounts. Bearing in mind that the total expenditure for 2022/2023 is expected to be £7982 it would seem reasonable to fund this increase in the budget from reserves rather than increasing our Council Tax Bills through the Precept. The recommendation by the committee to increase the Precept was recorded in the minutes and was to be confirmed to the Full Parish Council at the meeting on the 24th January.

During the Full Parish Council meeting on 24th January the budget was again discussed. Taking note of comments made by email and from the public session in the meeting from residents of the Parish a number of changes were made to the budget. Most of these were of a minor nature and the result was the budget and the resulting Precept was voted on and passed. However, the Precept was now set at £7005 but the increase was still to be taken from the Precept instead of from the substantial reserves the Parish hold.

Again, it should be noted that the Council has underspent its income in 9 of the past 10 years and as a result built up reserves over time.

The reasons given by the Parish Council for not taking this increase from the reserves were that Policy decisions taken in previous meetings had meant that the reserves were earmarked for future projects. However, these commitments do not hold water, they are just pure 'aspirations'. They were quoted during the meeting and include:

- 1. Buy the Village Green
- 2. Buy land for the proposed Village Shop
- 3. Buy land and construct a car park for the Village Hall

All of these commitments are fine in themselves but are any of them **realistic**? For example, how can we justify holding reserves when the Parish Council has no idea what any of the

proposed acquisitions would cost, if any land would be available to purchase or if the Village Green is for sale or will ever be. Additionally, in the case of the Village Green why would the Parish need to buy it as it has been a Village Green for many years and the Parish rents the land for a pepper corn rent from El Group.

It should be noted that a substantial amount of the reserves are made up from 2 donations made to the Parish and held by the Parish Council. They were £15,000 from a legacy and £100,000 from Quinn Estates. Additionally, recently the Parish Council received £4357 from Maidstone Council, being a Community Infrastructure Levy raised from planning applications. This just further increased the reserves because the Parish Council does not realistically have any projects on which to use this income.

Another justification for not using the reserves was made by the Parish Council. It said that advice received by the council from KALC (Kent association of Local Councils) and from the Parish's Internal Auditor has recommended not to use the reserves but to fund the increase from the Precept. This is simply not true.

Below is a copy of this advice that is taken from the Agenda of the Finance and Staff Committee Meeting held on 17th January 2022:

Item 6.2 – advice regarding funding a budget increase from reserves

(i) Advice from KALC

it's usually NOT prudent to run down reserves (particularly now= time of uncertainty). So, on 1) **just best practice not a legal requirement**. I think on 2) again, I would be concerned as its about sustainability and I think as above risk. you refer to spending from Reserves. This can only be from the General Reserve and really for the first year only NOT a long-term solution **UNLESS you have very large reserves**, if so why??

(ii) Advice from Internal Auditor In the end it's up to the councillors.

I note Clive and David's comments and agree with the general sentiment but in the context of a £2.4k increase with reserves **35 times** that amount the general sentiment hardly applies.

As long as there is a reasonable business case for the increase in hours (e.g. reflecting what already happens or real additional work) I have no issues with plans to increase the precept or to use the balances to fund the additional expenditure

I have **highlighted** parts of the advice that mean there is no issue with funding this budget increase from reserves. We have large reserves and the internal auditor says he has no issue with this.

Which leads me to ask why are we being asked to pay more for our Council Tax through the Precept for it only to be added to reserves which are already at an inflated level

Cllr Turner opened the Meeting at 7.30pm.

- 5, Matters Arising none
- 6. Parish Council Staffing -
 - 6.1 noted the comparison of the Clerk's hours with other similar sized parishes and agreed that the Clerk's hours are increased to 7 hours per week. It was further agreed that this committee will keep this under review and ask the new Clerk to monitor their hours and report back to the Committee
 - 6.2 reviewed the advice from KALC and our Internal Auditor below regarding funding the cost of the increased Clerk hours from reserves and agreed in principle to fund the increased cost through the precept, subject to approval by the full council
 - 6.3 reviewed and agreed a revised job description for the Clerk. The Clerk was asked to reduce the number of tasks by consolidating points 17 -24 into two tasks supporting councillors with these functions
 - 6.4 agreed to move from a single point salary for the Clerk at SCP 9 (£10.86) to a range dependent on experience and qualifications covering SCP 7 to SCP 12 (£10.44 to £11.53). However, it was agreed that the Council will retain discretion to appoint at a higher level in order to attract the right candidate, if necessary
 - 6.5 received the resignation from the current Clerk Mr Chris Hume and agreed a timetable, process and advert for the recruitment of a new Clerk
- Review of Draft 2022/23 Budget agreed the draft budget below for 2022/23 for recommendation to the full council. It was noted that the budget is subject to further amendment once the PSS is known. Cllr Eastwood proposed that the budget increase from

2021/22 be funded from reserves rather than an increase in the precept by removing items that are not commitments. It was agreed to delete the Christmas function and fund this in 2022/23 from an anticipated underspend in 2021/22 carried forward into reserves. It was also agreed to delete the TCPA membership and litter collection in view of the lengthsman plans. These three deductions, plus any increased PSS, will be used to reduce the increase in precept. It was agreed that any staffing costs above budget in 2022/23 arising from the appointment of the new Clerk will be met from reserves.

- 2022/23 Precept agreed to recommend a precept of £7550 to the full council, subject to amendment by the Clerk once the PSS is known.

Minutes of the Parish Council on Monday 24th January 2022, 7.30pm in the village hall

The Clerk made a statement reminding councillors and members of the public present of the council's standing orders regarding public contributions to meetings. The Clerk advised councillors that if they made significant changes to the draft budget and precept at this meeting, they should hold a further meeting before the end of the month to enable the public to consider a new draft budget. The Clerk also reminded councillors that they must not have a closed mind with regard to the decision on the budget and precept, and if they had fixed view they should declare it under this item as an interest and not take part in a vote on these items.

- 4. Approval of Minutes approved the Minutes of 8th November and 6th December 2021
- Matters Arising Cllr Kennaird reported that KCC are looking at the white lining issues on Headcorn Road
- 6. Public Session comments were received from 3 members of the public with regard to items 13 and 14, saying that, as the council has large reserves, and no plans for their use, the increase in the budget should be funded from reserves rather than an increase in the precept. Additional comments had been received and distributed to councillors prior to the meeting.
 - Martin Le Voi spoke on behalf of residents of Boughton Park about a series of traffic accidents at the junction of Crumps Lane and Headcorn Road and asked the council to lobby for improved road signage
- Kent County Council and Maidstone Borough Council Reports Cllr Ziggy Trzebinski (MBC)
 updated the council with regard to (i) four yearly elections (ii) cabinet system of decision making
 being introduced
- Planning Outcomes since 6th September 2021 noted Wallet Court application had been rejected and had been referred to the Planning Inspectorate on appeal
- 9. Local Policing/Community
 - 9.1 Police/Crime Report one crime reported
 - 9.2 Speedwatch noted that there was one volunteer, David Jenkins. Agreed to seek further volunteers through the village Facebook Group, Cllr Kennaird to arrange. Cllr

- 10.2 Traffic Incidents at Crumps Lane/Headcorn Road junction following a meeting with the MP, MBC, Police and KCC on anti-social behaviour and speeding on the 14th January, KCC have agreed to survey the entire length of Headcorn/Lenham Road and consider whether action is required on speed limits and signage. The Parish Council has been invited to a meeting to discuss the findings.

Pork, cider and apples are a great combination in cooking, for a reason. This great recipe blends both the sweet and the salty flavours together for a real winner!

Sausage & Cider Casserole

1 tablespoon of sunflower oil 8 good quality pork sausages 200g of smoked bacon lardons 50g of butter 2 medium onions, chopped 2 garlic cloves, crushed 2 small parsnips, chopped 3 large celery sticks, chopped 1 tablespoon of tomato purée
2 tablespoons of plain flour
300ml of dry cider
300ml of fresh chicken stock
8-10 fresh sage leaves, chopped
1 tablespoon of wholegrain mustard
2 small eating apples

A squeeze of lemon to serve (optional)

- 1. On the hob, heat the oil in a large flameproof casserole dish (with a lid). Add the sausages and brown them all over, then transfer to a plate.
- 2. Add the bacon lardons to the casserole dish and fry for 5 minutes until the fat is crisp and brown. Transfer to the plate with the sausages.
- 3. Drain off all but 1 tablespoon of the oil from the casserole dish and add half of the butter and, when melted, add the onions and garlic. Cover and cook for 10 minutes, stirring now and then, until soft and lightly browned.
- 4. Take off the lid, stir in the parsnips and celery and cook for 2 minutes more. Stir in the tomato purée and flour, then gradually stir in the cider and stock and bring to the boil.
- 5. Return the sausages and bacon to the casserole dish, then stir in the sage and mustard. Cover and put in the oven and cook for 40 minutes.
- 6. When the casserole is ready, melt the remaining butter in a non-stick frying pan. Quarter, core and slice the apples into wedges. Add them to the pan and fry gently for 2-3 minutes until golden all over and just tender. Season with a little salt and pepper.
- Remove the casserole from the oven, stir in the apples and season to taste (add a squeeze of lemon if you think it needs it). Serve with baked potatoes or mash and greens.

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
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Christian Message February 2022


