Emergency Plan Update

Your copy of the October 2019 edition of Malherbe Monthly is accompanied by your free copy of the latest revised version of the Boughton Malherbe Parish / Grafty Green Emergency Plan. Please take a few minutes to read the plan, and keep it in a safe place should it ever be needed.

Please destroy all previous copies of the plan which you have kept.

The plan is mainly intended to be used in the event of a major disaster such as a plane crash into the village where many people might be affected, and we have to respond until the emergency services arrive. The plan might also be used if, for example, we have an extended power failure, homes are cut off by snow, or a major storm strikes.

The plan also contains useful information for self help if your home is at risk or you are in personal danger.

In particular, the plan aims to help the elderly and vulnerable. If you know anyone who might benefit, including yourself, please tell Ron Galton (01622 850369) and a confidential note will be kept on file in case of need.

If you live outside the Boughton Malherbe Parish, and have received a copy of the plan with your magazine, you are not excluded from assistance in emergency. We will always try to help if possible, but if your Parish has its own plan you should use it in preference to ours.

It is hoped that the plan will never be needed, but if it is, it provides the framework for co-ordinated help.

October 2019 Malherbe Monthly Article on traffic calming

Following the feasibility work undertaken by MLM Consultants, in collaboration with Kent County Council Highways, a proposed scheme was developed. Consultation on the proposals took place during June culminating in a public meeting in the village hall on the 1st July. 37 members of the public attended the public meeting, along with representatives from KCC. A summary of the comments made at the meeting, and received by correspondence, can be found on the Parish Council website at: http://www.boughtonmalherbe.co.uk/community/boughton-malherbe-parish-council-12879/background-documents/.

In order to explore the main themes emerging from the consultation so far, a further meeting was held with KCC Highways on the 12th September. The key answers received from KCC at this meeting are summarised below:

	Question	KCC Response
1.	Can the granite "chicanes" be placed anywhere else in the village without impacting on the effectiveness of the scheme?	KCC advise that the scheme will be less effective if the chicanes are moved north of the Kings Head or the chicane opposite the shop is removed from the scheme altogether. The locations were surveyed by both KCC and MLM and the locations chosen are the best available. KCC do not believe that the chicane by the post office will discourage parking and there is sufficient room for vehicles to pass both parked cars on the Post Office side and avoid the chicane. Vehicles can park on the chicane, and if they do, they will slow traffic in any event
2.	Will the effectiveness of the proposed scheme be affected by moving the southern village gate to near Wren's Nest where the current village sign is located?	The village gate and painted road surface can only be located within a 30mph zone and not on the edge where it joins a national speed limit zone, such as the current village sign near Wren's Nest. KCC also advise that having two village signs will be confusing. KCC suggested leaving the current village sign where it is currently located, and, instead of a village sign on the new white gateway at Barnside, have a sign on the gateway saying "Please drive carefully through our village"
3.	Can we opt for a speed hump on each side of the village centre or does this require street lighting? What are the full range of options available that don't require street lighting?	No, speed bumps can only be created where there is street lighting. Only changes to the road surface and white lining can be used where there are no street lights
4.	is a "virtual speed bump" as used in East Farleigh an option for us see photograph?	Yes. This can be added to the design for the proposed village gate red tarmac area. This feature can only be used within a 30mph area and not where a 30mph area joins a national speed limit area as at the village sign near Wren's Nest
5.	Would there be any value in conducting another	Yes. However, KCC advise that we wait until the village centre scheme is completed then conduct traffic surveys on the extremities of the village as

speed survey in a different location as we were told by some residents, we conducted our survey in the wrong place? part of the next phase of work and to assess the impact of the scheme.

KCC advised the Parish Council on the location of the previous traffic survey as
the best location to develop traffic calming through the centre of the village.

The Parish Council would welcome comments on the following possible amendments to the proposed scheme:

- 1. Retain the existing village sign at the Headcorn end of the village opposite "Wren's Nest"
- Instead of a village sign on the proposed new village gateway to be located opposite Barnside, place a sign on the gate saying "Please drive carefully through our village
- Once the initial scheme is in place, conduct further traffic surveys at either end of the village, then discuss further measures with KCC for the outer areas of the village

Grafty Gourmet - Quick & Easy Lamb Biryani

As always, I try and keep these recipes basic and easy to cook. This classic dish couldn't be simpler. A one pot recipe that takes just 25 minutes and results in a flavoursome, warming lamb curry. Serve with Poppadoms and Chutney.

1 tablespoon of sunflower oil 1 teaspoon of cumin seeds 300g of cubed lamb (from the leg or shoulder) 1 red onion, peeled and thickly sliced 200g of basmati rice 400ml of hot vegetable stock 2 tablespoons of hot curry paste Juice of 1 lime A Handful fresh coriander leaves

- 1. Heat the oil in a large pan. Roll the lamb cubes in the cumin seeds so they stick firmly to the meat. Cook the lamb and onion for 5 minutes until nicely browned.
- 2. Stir in the rice then pour over the stock. Mix in the curry paste, using a wooden spoon to scrape up all the tasty bits from the bottom of the pan.
- 3. Bring to the boil, reduce the heat then cover and simmer gently for 15 minutes until the rice is tender and liquid has been absorbed.
- 4. Stir in the lime juice and scatter in a few fresh coriander leaves. Stir and serve.

A message from your MP - Helen Whately

What's going on in Westminster?

People often ask me what is going on in Westminster. It has been a strange – and sometimes difficult – few months.

I appreciate that Brexit continues to divide opinion. I've heard a full range of views from constituents – from those who want to see us leave without a deal to those who want to cancel Brexit.

I still believe the best outcome is to leave the EU with a deal – and the Prime Minister wants to see this as well. But we must hold our nerve in these negotiations and be prepared for any outcome.

As a Kent MP, I do not take the risks of no deal lightly. That's why I continue to meet regularly with Ministers from the Treasury and Department for Transport to make sure plans are in place to keep Kent moving under any Brexit outcome. And I was pleased to see the Government provide extra funding for Brexit preparations in Kent.

The Prime Minister has also announced extra funding for schools and hospitals – and I will continue to work hard to make sure Kent gets its share of this money.

Earlier this month I was made Minister for Arts, Tourism and Heritage. This is my first job in Government and while I'm excited to be taking on new responsibilities, my top priority will continue to be working hard for Faversham and Mid Kent.

More money for Kent's schools

Every school in Faversham and Mid Kent will get an increase in funding as a result of the extra £14 billion the Prime Minister has committed to education funding between now and 2022/23.

As part of this, Minimum Funding Levels will increase to £5,000 per pupil next year, with every primary school getting a minimum of £4,000 from 2021/22. This will benefit Kent schools which have traditionally been lower funded.

Kent schools could also be in line for an additional £20 million to help children with special educational needs, so every pupil can access the education that is right for them.

Some good news for rail users

Passengers on Southeastern trains can now get money back for journeys that are 15 minutes late, following my campaign to get compensation for shorter delays. And a new railcard has been introduced which gives 16-17 year olds half price train

fares, including at peak times. This will be a huge help to families whose children commute to school or college by train.

I know there is still a lot of work to be done to get the reliable and affordable trains people need. Earlier this month, I met the Rail Minister, Chris Heaton-Harris, to put your views about how to make trains better directly to him.

Brexit preparations get funding boost

Operation Brock is getting a £20 million funding boost as part of the Government's preparations to leave the EU on 31 October.

This will ensure Operation Brock – designed to keep the M20 open in the event of disruption to services across the English Channel – can be implemented effectively, if needed.

Much of this funding is for contingency planning. Ideally, we won't get delays at the ports and we won't need Operation Brock, but if it is going to be deployed, it needs to work properly. This includes making sure border checks are ready and the police and local authorities have all the powers they need.

Securing more money for hospitals in Kent

I'm determined to get Kent its share of the extra £1.8 billion NHS capital funding which has been announced for hospital upgrades in England. I've met other local MPs and the Chief Executive of East Kent Hospitals University NHS Foundation Trust about a request to the Health Secretary, Matt Hancock, for £350 million for hospitals in our area.

People in East Kent have waited too long for better healthcare. With the medical school on the way, now is the time to sort out our hospitals.

Results are in from my Park Wood GP survey

The survey has given me a good sense of what's going well and where people are having problems. For instance, some people can get an appointment the same day, but others told me they have to wait over two weeks.

I've shared my results with local GPs, asking them to work together to make sure everyone has a good experience at their surgery. I've also written to the local NHS body which funds GP surgeries asking them what they can do to help. Finally, I've written to the Health Secretary so that the Government knows that Park Wood needs improvements in GP services.

An online survey about GP services - for everyone in Faversham and Mid Kent - is still open, so please visit my website and take a few minutes to tell me what you think.

The summer holidays provide opportunity to explore our creative and social nature; to play sports, to travel, to read, to engage in hobbies, to relax, to have fun! I hope you have had plenty.

I often jovially say, 'if it's not fun I'm going home...' I get bored easily with the mundane and I am yet learning 'to be content in all circumstances...'

The word 'holidays' stems from 'holy days'. Holy meaning 'set apart' or 'other.' At one time the only release from your labour were the holy days or feast days of the local church – no wonder they were valued and seen as such a gift. You would be odd not to value a day off from work occasionally that came because of the local religion. Farming in the 21st Century is far from straightforward, however Roundoak Farm at Sutton Valence and its sister farm at Kings Oak at Ulcombe, situated on the tranquil and beautiful southern slopes of the Greensand ridge overlooking the Weald of Kent, have developed their own multifaceted unique farming enterprise, hinged around their specialist care of rare breed cattle and sheep.

It was the idea of Norman and Ruth Coles, with no notable experience in farming, to embark on this venture, and started with the acquisition of only a few Hebridean sheep at Roundoak. They were initially referred to as 'Colesy and his old goats' in the local pub, and the idea was originally met with skepticism and in the early days we recall being the laughing stock of some of the local farmers! Admittedly, the journey has been very interesting and at times challenging, but I don't think that anyone is laughing now!

Stock levels across both farms now stand at some 120 cows and calves, 3 bulls, and some 700 sheep. Following on from the Hebridean sheep, we acquired Highland cattle, and then more rare breed sheep including North Ronaldsays and the endangered Borerays. More recently the farm also added the stunning, rare and ancient White Parks to the farm, which are native to the UK. Finally our most recent acquisition, at the request of the Rare Breed Survival Trust has been Vaynol cattle, similarly beautiful and rare beasts. The farm also has a breeding herd of Sussex cattle.

It is of note that that the farm also has royal connections with both our bulls, the Duke and Prince of Balmoral being former members of the Queen's stock at Balmoral Castle in Scotland, as are many of our breeding heffiers. We have a great relationship with Dochy Ormaston the Queen's highland stockman and regularly have the pleasure of staying on The Estate.

A key facet of our enterprise is the use of the farms' stock in conservation grazing throughout the County, especially for many conservation groups such as Kent wildlife trust, Medway Countryside Partnership, KCC at some of its country parks and a number of large houses privately owned with land. This use of livestock grazing is essential for the management of many of Kent's wildlife habitats.

Rare breed animals are slower growing than their crossbred counterparts, and as a result their meat is tastier, more lean and lower in cholesterol and therefore

has significant health benefits for the consumer. Another unfortunate side effect of cross-bred animals who are obese, is that it has resulted in so many calving and lambing problems, unlike the rare breeds who commonly birth unaided and with ease. Despite this, however, it didn't take long for us to discover that at the local market the rare-breeds would get trashed on weight and price, and therefore have little or no short-term commercial value. Unfortunately it is our 'observation that food production in this country has taken over from the general welfare of the animals.

Through this realization, we began to identify the need to expand and diversify into other areas including tourism and events. This has included caravanning and camping, glamping and events such as weddings, corporate and formal functions, and we also now run several annual events including a gin festival and a beer festival. We use and sell our own homegrown meat where possible and we also recently opened up a pop up butchery selling our homegrown produce either fresh or frozen.

Our increased emphasis on events has also seen the creation of our incredibly unique Yard bar. Although not yet licensed, it is the quirklest area ever, with discarded farm clutter the focus is on the up side down cattle tombstone feeder which forms the bar top. We have had many private functions in this area and our 5 acres of woodland, which includes a stage for open-air bands, large fire pit and entertainment area.

Although we are not actually 'open to the public', we do encourage people to make an appointment to come and look round the farm, as getting the public to the farm is hugely important to us and allows us to educate people to understand a lot more about the rare breeds and their value. Through personal farm safari style tours of the farm on our farm buggies, visitors are able to get up close to the animals and can see for them selves our animals are happy and well cared for.

Lastly, we have our own unique way of dealing with our older stock. We hated taking our old cows to market where we were trashed on price – sometimes not making more than a few hundred pound, but what alternative was there? We tentatively put an advert on Preloved – wondering if anyone else would feel they same way about our magnificent and much loved Highland cows. In fact, we could not believe the response, we have since sold in excess of 30 beasts to kind people all over the UK, who have had some land and wanted to care for these lovely animals.

Roundoak and Kings Oak are continuing to expand. We have a regular newsletter and our Facebook page continues to grow. People like to feel that they are a part of this 'new age farming enterprise'! Despite all this we do still regard ourselves as a commercial farming enterprise, however we sell a unique concept and product, and are passionate about our role in helping to preserve our endangered and rare breeds.


