Memories

It started with a question about the dental history of my family. I had to say I did not know much. We lived in a Victorian terraced house with no bathroom. Therefore I did not have a toothbrush until I was about twelve when my Plumber Dad turned one bedroom into a bathroom and toilet. The first visit to a dentist was after an accident on my bicycle when I broke my two front teeth aged about thirteen.

The lavatory was in the back yard attached to the house, but out the kitchen door round the side of the kitchen, scary after dark. The bath was in the kitchen with a big wooden hinged cover over it which served as a table top when the bath was not in use. Both were plumbed into the mains though.

We heated the water in a big gas boiler which had to be filled by bucket loads of water from the sink, until my Dad put in a gas geezer over the bath and sink. In the winter the gas oven was lighted to warm the kitchen before having a bath. So until the bathroom was installed we cooked, washed and bathed in the kitchen and knew no different, this meant dental hygiene was not thought of much.

Remember this was back in the nineteen fifties after the war years had destroyed quite a lot of homes including the one my family had lived in. The washing took my Mum all day and the boiler was how she heated the water to do it with a thing to push the washing through between two rollers turned by a handle on the side to squeeze the water out of it, called a mangle. She used to dip all my dresses in starch making them so stiff after ironing they stood up on the floor by themselves. She never knew how I hated it as the armholes were so hard and rough they rubbed the top of my arms raw. My brothers' necks got the same treatment from their shirt collars.

We did not have TV but listen to the radio almost all day, my sister's favourite programme was "Music while you work" usually bands played popular melodies. On Sundays there was "Two way Family Favourites" which played requests for the men serving overseas in all three services, they listen in their camps while the families at home listen over Sunday lunch.

I could go on but it would become very boring for those too young to remember, but maybe I have stirred some nostalgic memories for some.

Jenny Whittle - News from County Hall



Following on from my last piece in the *Malherbe Monthly*, I am pleased to report that Kent Highways has agreed to introduce a 30mph speed limit from the top of Liverton Hill (just before the Liverton Hill sign) to cover a considerable number of homes and will stop about 200 yards from the top. This will be subject to the outcome of a three month statutory consultation period (a Traffic Regulation Order will be advertised in the local press). The existing national speed limit will be retained to cover the bends of the Hill. Many of you reading this may think that it is a ludicrous decision if the "straight" part of the Hill is going to have a lower speed limit but the bends will remain unaltered. Be assured, however, that I have taken on board KCC officer's advice that a 15-20 mph speed is appropriate for those bends and drivers need to use their common sense when navigating bends. I would also hope that on descending the Hill, it is unlikely that drivers will go at 30mph only to put their foot on the gas when they reach the bends! My view at this time is that we should see how effective the reduced speed limit is in action and review whether a lower speed limit will need to be put in place for the bends (e.g. a 20mph sign?). Better signage will also be installed to alert drivers that the Hill narrows and the need to approach with care.

The Find and Fix pothole blitz is continuing. If there are any outstanding potholes that you believe need repairing, please do let me know and I will alert our highways team.

The KCC Cabinet Member for Highways, Nick Chard, recently met with Transport Minister Theresa Villiers **calling on better rail services for Maidstone** and for restoration of the **Maidstone East-London Bridge service**. The rail franchise for Kent is due for renewal in 2012, but Southeastern could be granted an extension to 2014. A rail summit arranged by KCC in March will be followed up by another meeting in the Autumn to lobby government to improve rail connections across the county.

In order to reduce the enormous public spending deficit, KCC will need to take around £340m of savings from a controllable budget of £1.4bn (excluding schools) over the next four years. Whilst just over half of this will be found from restructuring, better procurement and general efficiencies, that still leaves a significant sum to find. The recently published HM Treasury's *Spending Review Framework* document poses a number of questions that are similar to those that helped the Canadian government radically reduce public expenditure. The questions among others include: does the activity provide substantial economic value, can it be targeted to those most in need and can it be provided at lower cost or more effectively? Kent County Council's 84 elected Members including myself are considering these questions in every area of activity we are involved in and are identifying ideas for savings and spending priorities. If you have any ideas or suggestions, please do let me know.

The battle to **protect maternity services at Maidstone Hospital** continues with a public meeting arranged by the Kent County Councillors representing the borough of Maidstone. A public meeting will be held at Maidstone Leisure Centre on 9 September at 7.15pm. It will be chaired by BBC Kent Radio presenter John Warnett, with speakers including Hugh Robertson MP and Helen Grant MP, Paul Carter (Leader, Kent County Council), Chris Garland (Maidstone Borough Council), local NHS representatives, local GPs and campaign group MASH. Having a packed meeting will send a strong message to the Strategic Health Authority that Maidstone's maternity unit needs to retain consultants on standby to assist women who experience complications during labour. Please do come! If we lose consultants, expectant mothers in Maidstone could be transported to Pembury, Medway or Ashford - yet the borough's population is growing and needs a fully staffed maternity unit to cope with local demand.

The Grafty Gourmet

This is a very simple, yet surprisingly tasty meal. It's something that I made up using what limited ingredients I had at the time, because I hadn't been shopping. Like most good recipes, the simple ones are the best. Any pasta could be used in place of spaghetti if you prefer.

Spicy Sausage Spaghetti

Serves 2

6 Good Pork Sausages, cooked and sliced into ½ cm slices

A hand full of Spaghetti

1 Onion, chopped finely

½ Large Red Chilli, chopped finely

1 Clove of Garlic, crushed

½ Cup of Vegetable Stock

2 Tablespoons of Tomato Puree

1 Teaspoon of dried Basil

¼ Cup of grated Strong Cheddar Cheese or Parmesan

1. Place the spaghetti in boiling water and simmer for 10 to 12 minutes. Make sure the water is bubbling all the time, as this will prevent the pasta from sticking together.
2. Sauté the chopped onion, chilli and garlic in a little butter and olive oil, in a frying pan, until the onions soften. Make sure the oil is not too hot, as this will burn the chilli and garlic. The idea is to get the flavour of the chilli and garlic into the oil.
3. Add the sliced cooked sausages, vegetable stock, dried basil and the tomato puree and stir to combine the ingredients evenly.
4. Drain and add the cooked spaghetti to the sauce over a low heat and stir, until the pasta is evenly coated in the sauce.
5. Serve on warm plates with a good sprinkling of strong cheddar or parmesan cheese.

Neighbourhood Watch

Over the past year or so there has been a great deal of discussion at a regional and national level about changing the NhW (Neighbourhood Watch) logo that we have all used since NhW was first launched in this country in 1984.

Kent County NhW Association held a unanimous position that it was the best known logo in the country even amongst criminals and that it would not be in the interest of NhW to change it. There would also of course been financial implications to changing things such as signs and stickers. The South East Region, (Kent, Sussex, Surrey, Hampshire and Thames Valley) were united in opposition to these changes as indeed were a number of other regional groups.

I am pleased to say that the Design Council who were engaged by the Home Office, to, amongst other issues look at changing the logo have now recommended to National NhW that the logo should **NOT BE CHANGED.**

I felt that it was important to bring you up to date with this important bit of news.

May I also say a special thank you to the board of Kent County NhW Association who I know championed objection to the change at both regional and national level.

NEWS from Maidstone Borough Council

Beware of bogus callers

Maidstone Borough Council wants residents to be on their guard if they receive a telephone call from someone saying they are from the council, and asking for credit or debit card details so that they can reimburse a council tax overpayment.

Maidstone Borough Council does not operate in this way and advises anyone who receives such a call NOT to give any debit or credit card details. Revenues manager, Stephen McGinnes says: "If possible, make a note of as much information as you can, end the call and then telephone Consumer Direct on 08457 585497 and the Police on 01622 690690 to report the incident."

The advice follows an incident today (Friday August 27) when a resident refused to give the details requested and called the council to check if they had received a bogus call.

Kent Trading Standards

Kent Trading Standards has received a report from a consumer who received an unsolicited call from a trader claiming he had detected a fault on their computer. The consumer allowed the trader access to his system to download software. The consumer then found out that the service would cost an exorbitant amount.

The caller did not give the name of the business and they called from a 0207 (inner London) number.

Kent Trading Standards are warning consumers to be wary of these types of calls. If in doubt, end the call. Please report such callers to Consumer Direct on 08454 04 05 06 who will be able to recommend traders from our good trader scheme "Buy With Confidence" or visit www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk

These traders have been thoroughly vetted and audited by Trading Standards officers and are only approved if they meet our strict criteria for membership.

Kent Trading Standards has received a report from a consumer who received an unsolicited call from a man with an American accent stating that the consumer had won a holiday and to press an option in order to claim the prize.

Please be wary of these types of calls. There is reason to believe that the business is based in Florida, USA. If you are in any doubt hang up. Be especially aware if they are asking for personal details, bank accounts or a fee before they will process your "prize".

Remember, if it sounds too good to be true it usually is.

The September Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Leo at the start of September, and moves into Virgo on the 17th.

The Autumn Equinox occurs on Thursday 23rd September, when the Sun crosses the celestial equator. At this point, night and day are of equal length. After this the Sun moves into the southern half of the sky, and I'm afraid that for the next six months the nights are longer than the days.

New Moon occurs on Wednesday 1st September, when it appears in the constellation of Taurus. Full Moon is on Thursday 23rd September. The September Full Moon is often called the "Harvest Moon", because it continues to rise around sunset for several evenings, allowing farmers to work long after sunset. At the end of the article I will be returning to the Moon. (not literally)

Mercury is at inferior conjunction (almost directly in front of the Sun) on 3rd September, and by the end of the month it will start to become visible, with difficulty, in the eastern sky at dawn.

It is unlikely that we will be able to see Venus this month as it is very low in the south-western sky at sunset, and sets only minutes after the Sun.

Like Venus, Mars is low in the south-western sky at sunset, and therefore it is very unlikely we will be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Jupiter is the only planet well placed for viewing this month. It can be seen due south at midnight about 30 degrees above the horizon. Relative to the stars it is moving south-westwards in the constellation of Pisces. Through a telescope the disc of Jupiter can clearly be seen, together with the dark and light cloud bands and some of the four major moons.

Saturn is at superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) on 1st October, and will therefore not be visible this month.

You may have read recently that the Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter has discovered cracks in the surface of the Moon. Scientists believe that this is caused by the cooling of the Moon's interior, and calculate that its radius has reduced by around 100metres (320ft) in the relatively recent lunar past. (within the last billion years) They are saying that stargazers are unlikely to notice any change in the size of the Moon in the near future.



Bulky Refuse Collections (Weekend Freighter Service)

Maidstone Borough Council have made a number of changes to the Weekend Freighter Service. From the 21st August this year, the freighter service will operate on a Saturday only to improve efficiency and reduce cost, however the number of sites visited remains unchanged. Streamlining the service and re-planning the route also reduces the amount of miles we have to drive, so also reduces the CO2 emissions.

Waste collected by the freighter is taken to landfill so therefore we can no longer accept garden waste, large bulky items or household waste (from wheeled bins or black sacks) as there are better ways of treating this waste in Maidstone. Many items can be recycled at the household waste recycling centre in Tovil.

If you have a large amount of garden waste you can book a bulky collection (as long as it is suitable contained in builders bags etc) or take it to your local household waste recycling site where it will be sent for composting. Alternatively, you may wish to hire a garden bin.

The service is provided for the collection of certain items of rubbish that cannot be put out with your weekly refuse collection or recycled, such as an old bicycle, broken rotary washing line, old fitness equipment such as bikes and rowing machines, old carpet and underlay, home furnishings and bric-a-brac, DIY waste such as broken tiles, plumbing, radiators etc. We will also accept broken or small items of furniture and plastic items such as broken garden chairs and toys.

We will accept wood and metal but it would be preferable to take these materials to the household waste recycling centre in Tovil where they will be sent off for recycling.

Important Information

Only freighter staff are authorised to load items into the vehicle. For your own safety you must remain outside the cordoned area, children must be kept away from the freighter at all times.

In busy periods, it may be necessary to queue to hand over your bulky items, abusive behaviour towards staff will not be tolerated. Please approach the vehicle from the side and always be aware of moving traffic. Please do not leave items on the pavement or road before or after the Freighter visits.

Freighter operatives have the right to refuse to accept waste particularly if it is hazardous, can cause damage to the vehicle or cause danger to the public, such as: Flammables, Large quantities liquids/powders, Paints/Oils, Lighting tubes, Vehicle parts/batteries/tyres etc, Commercial waste, Garden waste, Large bulky items including sofas, Clinical waste and Asbestos

Plasterboard can no longer be collected by the weekend freighter or household bulky collections, this is due to the acid produced when land filled. Waste plasterboard should be taken to the household waste recycling centre in Tovil.

Electrical Items

We can no longer collect electrical items such as fridges, televisions, monitors etc. Under European legislation we'd have to provide a separate vehicle to continue to collect these items. We will accept other old electrical appliances such as vacuum cleaners, microwaves etc, however we would prefer it if you could take them to the household waste recycling centre in Tovil where they will be recycled. You can also dispose of electrical appliances through our paid for bulky collection service.

Christian Message September 2010

Being a member of Maidstone Street Pastors, I have seen my fair share of drunken revellers enjoying the nightlife our town has to offer. We all know that you get the happy drunk, the sad drunk & the aggressive drunk. We also know that there is a culture in our society today whose motto is " yeah it's the weekend, time to get completely hammered ". Now none of this shocks me, as I am sure there are a few of us out there who, if we are honest, can say, " yep been there, done that, got the t-shirt "!

After spending just over a year in this Ministry, the biggest thing that has struck me is that so many of our young people feel that they are unworthy of God's love. I think the most frequent question all of our teams get asked is " why would you give up your own time to help us? " Well the answer is simple; we do it because we care and because we want to take God's love onto the streets of our town. It is not our remit to quote chapter & verse from the Bible, but to be there when needed and hold out a helping hand. We take a slow walk around the town looking out for the confused & vulnerable, help those separated from friends, look after those who are a little worse for wear and generally make sure people are safe from harm. It can be very rewarding at times and at others it can be frustrating, but it has taught me a very valuable lesson. That lesson is about time and the way we rush through life.

It bugs me why so many feel so unworthy, and humbles me how grateful they are for the time we spend with them, no matter how short. It has made me look at myself and how I go about my daily life. To spend 6 hours a month with the Street Pastors is all fine & dandy, but as anyone who has ever been shopping with me can tell you that I hit that town like a whirlwind! Focused solely on what I need & where I need to go. It had never really occurred to me before, that in fact there are confused & vulnerable people on our streets at daylight hours as well as nighttimes! So now when in town I do try to take a slower walk around the shops and take more notice of the people around me.
