Work Parties

The October work morning was wet and horrible and unsurprisingly there were just five of us turned up. However we managed an hour clearing weeds from the border above the pond before the rain finally drove us indoors for a hot drink and a shower.

We have bought five hundred native daffodils to plant at the side of the paths in the area near the grotto. Native daffodils, also known as the Lent Lily, are slightly smaller than garden cultivars, but are extremely hardy, tolerating exposed conditions and naturalising easily amongst grass.

We will be planting these on Sunday 10th November meeting at the archway near Woodend at 10am. Of course we are not restricted to planting native species. If anyone was to arrive on the Sunday with a bag of daffodil, crocus or even tulip bulbs, I could find a position for them somewhere in the gardens.

See you on the 10^{th} and let's hope the weather is a little better than last time.

Litter Picking Guidelines

- Litter-pickers, bags and protective gloves can be provided if you require.
- If you find any large, heavy objects do not lift or place in litter bags. Contact the Parks Team and they will deal with such items.
- Beware of sharp objects like glass and metal. Be careful when picking it up but also when it is in your litter bag.
- Contact the Parks Team if you come across any hypodermic needles. The team are trained to deal with this kind of problem and have the right equipment.
- Be careful when litter-picking away from the footpath. Safety first – avoid banks that are too steep and watch out for low branches. Wear sturdy shoes.
- If you litter-pick alone make sure that someone knows where you are.
- Leave filled bags near a bin and let the Parks Team know.
