3) Minutes of the Previous Meeting

The minutes of the meeting on 7th June 2022

The minutes were approved and signed as a true record of proceedings.

4) Matters Arising from 7th June 2022

a) Sale of the Shop

No developments to report. It was noted that the shop is now back on the market and being offered at £450,00. A meeting of the Egerton Community Stores directors is being arranged.

b) Post Office

Service and hours promoted on Facebook and Next Door.

c) Heathlands Garden Settlement

Cllrs Lawton and Tilden attended meeting called by Lenham PC on 14 June. Lenham has contracted 2 barristers to represent it at the September hearing. The Planning Inspector has given Maidstone Borough Council 7 pages of feedback and a deadline of mid-July to provide the required missing detail.

Given the implications of the size of the development for the borough of Ashford without the necessary improvements to infrastructure, and the complete lack of public comment from ABC about the proposed development so close to the boundary line, it was agreed that EPC would write to ABC seeking answers to a number of pressing questions.

It was also agreed that a joint letter with Charing PC should be sent to ABC about the impact on traffic along the A20 and other transport links.

6) Footpaths report No 147 (see Appendix i)

Cllr Pat Parr reported five outstanding issues and one closed at Bedewell. New issue reported re the stile at Stonehill to Green Lane is too high.

7) Highways report No 36 (see Appendix ii)

Cllr John Lawton said KCC has sprayed the vegetation to clear the ragstone wall opposite Stisted Way to allow for the planned repairs to the pointing.

The KCC portal will not allow EPC to register a request for a 7.5 tonne weight limit for Green Hill Lane, so Cllr Lawton has asked the KCC steward and County Councillor Charlie Simkins to action the request.

EPC view: This proposal will complement the refurbished house and is a significant improvement on the existing semi-derelict outbuilding. The materials and design meet the principles in the Egerton Parish Design Statement. The installation of discreet solar panels on the lower section of the garage roof fulfils the need to generate on-site electricity, thus meeting the climate change and renewable energy policy D8 in the 2022 Egerton Neighbourhood Plan and other relevant policies in the ABC Local Plan.

Proposed: Support in view of the obvious improvement on the existing garage, the importance of energy self-sufficiency and in the interests of climate change mitigation.

EPC view: These latest plans make smaller external changes and extensions to the house than the full planning application that was approved at this property last year. Materials will match existing. **Proposed:** no objection

Proposed: Vice Chairman Peter Rawlinson. **Seconded:** Cllr Claire Foinette. **All in agreement.** Cllr Lois Tilden did not take part in the discussion or vote as she is a neighbour to this property.

EPC view: In 2010 (10/01706/AS) a large hay barn was granted planning permission, comprising some 464 sq. metres in floor area at this address. That later became the subject of a planning application in 2019 for conversion into a pair of semi-detached dwellings but this was withdrawn in favour of demolition and the creation of two detached dwellings, now under construction. (20/00913/AS). There have also been smaller domestic buildings (16/00146/AS) and temporary mobile homes for staff mess rooms, and sow pens with the same farm address (21/00998/AS). The permission sought here is to create a large sheep rearing/lambing/shearing building further along the lane, 7.5m (24') high, 30m (98') long and 15m (50') wide – which has the same floor area as the 2011 hay barn that is now being replaced. EPC will comment to suggest ABC look at the site history and make a site visit to Wanden Lane.

Proposed: Object based on drainage, flooding, over-development in a remote area of the village and conflicting with previous planning applications at the same location since the 2010 barn was demolished for housing and could have been used for the current proposal instead.

Proposed: Vice chairman Peter Rawlinson. Seconded Cllr Claire Foinette. All in agreement.

9) Playground improvements

Cllr Claire Foinette highlighted issues raised by Wicksteed's annual playground inspection: the wet pour lifting; painting the swing frame; signage required for the basketball area.

Action: Clerk. The wet pour will be addressed by contractors during agreed works to improvement the play area.

Comment had been made by a villager about a potential increase in noise from the play area if facilities were extended and the potential increase in anti-social behaviour. It was agreed to add the installation of CCTV around the hall car park as an agenda item at the next meeting.

10) The Parish Assembly

The Parish Assembly had gathered residents' views and votes on several important issues that will feed into the next Parish Plan and prioritise future spending and areas for grant funding. (See Appendix (iii).) The issues raised will be considered at the next meeting.

Other: English Rural Housing was at The Assembly to talk to residents about the proposed development of affordable housing on the Gale Field site and Lansdown Asset Management was also at The Assembly to talk to villagers about the development of older people's accommodation on the Orchard Nurseries site.

It was agreed to upload the presentation created for the Parish Assembly to the EPC website.

11) Older People's Accommodation

The proposed development and developer, as well as the access route to the proposed development site, became a matter of public record on 22 June at the Parish Assembly.

The Heads of Terms is being drawn up by Lansdown Asset Management. It will pass to EPC's lawyers for review and the Working Group for Older People's Accommodation (WGOPA). The terms will define the options for the purchase of the land known as Orchard Nurseries from EPC, the amounts of monies to be paid – and at what point they will be paid. Following legal advice and review, the WGOPA will make a recommendation to full Council at the next meeting in September.

The WGPOPA recommended that EPC approve that an outline planning application should be made by Lansdown Asset Management to Ashford Borough Council to develop the land known as Orchard Nurseries into housing suitable for older people.

Proposed: Chairman Richard King. Seconded: Vice Chairman Peter Rawlinson. All in agreement.

12) Affordable Housing

Cllr Lois Tilden said that English Rural Housing (ERH) deputy development director Alison Thompson had been pleased by the level of interest shown in the proposed development of affordable housing on the Gale Field Site at The Parish Assembly on 22 June. During the evening, the results of the consultation process were fully shared with residents, and concerns about drainage and protection of hedging and trees were discussed; 14 people had registered an interest in one of the homes. On the basis of the consultation with the village and additional feedback from EPC to ERH about the preference for a crescent shape layout and a wish to see more 3-bedroom properties within the development, it was proposed that EPC approve that ERH proceed with an application to Ashford Borough Council for outline planning permission on the site known as Gale Field. **Proposed:** Chairman Richard King. **Seconded:** Cllr Pat Parr. **All in agreement.**

EPC has 35 days to issue a new response to Mr Eustace. All in agreement that a fresh response should be issued.

• Music Festival feedback on its future viability without full access to the village hall. EPC agreed that it should move forward as quickly as possible to provide a dedicated site for the preschool that would allow it to vacate the village hall and give greater access to village groups and activities such as the Music Festival in 2025. It was agreed that a dedicated committee would need to be formed to maintain the progress as soon as funds become available.

A letter will be written to the Music Festival Secretary Jane Carr to update The Music Festival organising team about the timeline for development of a standalone pre-school building using funds released by the sale of the Orchard Nurseries site for the development of Older People's Accommodation.


The outstanding issues below are listed with the KCC Reference, the date reported, the footpath number, the location, the difficulty experienced and the status of action.

- 1. **PROW 210554009.** 24/05/21. AW76 opposite Kingsland Lane, Mundy Bois Road. Broken stile. Status: Assigned to an officer, remedial action will be taken.
- 2. **PROW 210561834.** 24/05/21. AW79 Mundy Bois Road to Rockhill Road (opposite The Laurels). Broken stile (bottom plank flicks up when you step on it as both ends have come loose from the supporting posts). Status: Assigned to an officer, remedial action will be taken.
- 3. **PROW 210959063.** 10/09/21. AW75 at Heronsdale, Wanden Lane. Egerton resident complaint of overgrowth (brambles) and fence panel leaning towards the footpath. Status: Still Awaiting Allocation.
- 4. **PROW211126930.** 09/11/21. Part of AW87 to the west of the church behind the Glebeland houses where the path is quite narrow. Badgers have again been active and collapsed the side of the path about halfway along. Status: Still Work Scheduled but it is accessible with matting in place until a more permanent solution is found.
- 5. **PROW211117086.** 21/11/21. AW64 Footpath opposite Egerton House on Greensand Way in a small, wooded area towards the byway up to Coach Road. Two planks missing/broken on the bridge over a small stream. Status: Still Work Added to Forward Maintenance Plan.

NEW ISSUES:

- 1. **PROW220662514.** 09/06/22. AW79 at Rock Cottage end, Rockhill Road. Overgrown vegetation on this first part which is designated by KCC to be cleared by them. Status: Verges cleared by KCC; hedges cleared by Peter Rawlinson.
- 2. **Enquiry.** A lady from Maidstone Ramblers wanted to know if it was possible to get a small part of driveway at Newland Green Farm designated as a footpath as it had been used for over 20 years as part of footpath AW73 from Pluckley/Smarden end onto Newland Green Lane instead of stopping short of the driveway, turning left and then left again down towards the Wanden Lane area and joining onto AW70 (see footpaths map overleaf). Contact details given for KCC East Kent Public Rights of Way Department. It was noted that this farm track had only ever

been allowed as a privilege to walkers when the building was used for farm animals, but now it was converted into a private home it was not reasonable for people to walk immediately outside the residents' windows as it did not respect their privacy. Cllr Tilden will contact the residents to see if there is scope for an alternative walking route to join the existing PROWs on the Definitive map.



3. **PROW220641396.** 22/06/22. AW81. Stone Hill to Green Hill. At the Parish Assembly two separate reports were made regarding the boundary stile between the Stone Hill properties to the large field out to Green Hill. The stile there is too high for ladies to manage.

You will recall I wrote to you on 24th February on behalf of EPC making a detailed complaint in relation to the closure of Forge Hill in Pluckley for the water main replacement works in December.

A second detailed complaint was made in the same letter in relation to alleged 'emergency' works on Mundy Bois Road.

As a consequence of the problems, EPC requested various actions that would help prevent such problems being caused again and apologies be made to the affected residents including the parents whose children were abandoned a mile from their homes, the residents of Green Hill Lane who had suffered the most but also the wider community of Egerton.

Barbara Westmacott, Senior Streetworks Co-ordinator (East), eventually responded to our complaint on 13th April – some seven weeks later. An apology was at least made for the delay in replying. A copy of Ms Westmacott's response is attached for ease of reference.

The response fails to address the substantive issues we have raised and fails to recognise that much of what happened could and should have been avoided. Statements such as "KCC Streetworks continue to work closely with all utilities to reduce the disruption caused by works...." is complacent when it is clear communications have not been adequate. Ms Westmacott acknowledges that SEW did not notify KCC of the works on Mundy Bois Road before closing the road and signposting a dangerous diversion. It is not acceptable to brush this off with "KCC did what they could when they knew", and it was "regrettable". It seems that the utility companies are almost a law to themselves when it comes to closing roads and signposting diversions for an emergency. It begs the question of whether this is indeed appropriate, of how an "emergency" defined and who decides what is and isn't an emergency.



The lack of acknowledgment and apology in Ms Westmacott's response to the very real problems caused by the actions and failures of KCC, SEW and contractors is frankly insulting. People and property have been put in peril and this cannot be dismissed so lightly.

You may or may not be aware of a further incident which further evidences the mismanagement of utility repairs and the impact on road users. Despite Forge Hill being closed for over 6 months, no sooner had the works been completed and the road reopened when once again Forge Hill was closed by SEW for a repair at Pluckley Thorn. This was work that should have been done at the same time as the water main replacement work but yet again we hear excuses from SEW that it was a different team. To make matters worse SEW closed, presumably with Streetworks knowledge, Forge Hill in its entirety despite a much better diversion being possible using the Pinnock and Rose Farm Lane.

Egerton Parish Council wish to make clear their considerable concerns with the how road closures are being managed and the apparently inadequate communications between KCC Streetworks and the Utility companies. Changes to the current processes are clearly needed.

EPC also asks me to repeat its request, made in the letter of 24th February, for formal apologies to be given to the parents whose children were abandoned at Pluckley Farm Shop, the residents of Green Hill Lane and the wider community of Egerton.
