We have the good news that the outing to Sandown Castle Community Garden near Deal can go ahead using our own transport. The garden is in Sandown Road, Deal CT14 6NY.

You might remember the excellent talk given by Linda Ford last year on the development of the community garden. Linda is delighted that we are coming to see the garden and will be coming down to meet us during our visit.

Meanwhile - our gardens in July are moving on into Summer. Roses are looking lovely still and the tomatoes are growing strongly even out of doors. We are asked to use water wisely but new and young plants will need regular watering and plants in pots also need regular feeding too. It is already time to plant autumn-flowering bulbs and transplant seedlings of biennials sown earlier. Shallots, Early potatoes and Onions can be harvested now and we can finish planting out Winter brassicas and sowing spring cabbages. Herbs can be picked for drying.

Grafty Gourmet

This recipe does not really need an introduction. Just indulge !

Gin & Tonic Cheesecake

250g of digestive biscuits 100g of melted butter 600g of cream cheese 100g of icing sugar zest and juice of 1 lime, (plus extra zest to serve) 50ml of gin 280ml of double cream 250ml can of gin and tonic 2 tablespoons of caster sugar 1 lemon, (half juiced, half finely sliced) 2 medium meringues, crushed

1. Butter and line a 23cm loose-bottomed tin with grease proof paper. Put the digestive biscuits in a plastic food bag and crush to crumbs using a rolling pin, or blitz in a food processor. Transfer to a bowl, then pour over the melted butter. Mix thoroughly until the crumbs are completely coated. Tip them into the prepared tin and press firmly down into the base to create an even layer. Chill in the fridge for 1 hr to set firmly.

2. To make the filling, place the cream cheese, icing sugar and lime zest in a bowl, then beat with an electric whisk until smooth. Tip in the gin and double cream, and continue beating until the mixture is thick and completely combined. Now spoon it onto the biscuit base, and spread to the edges. Smooth the top of the cheesecake down with the back of a dessert spoon or spatula. Leave to set in the fridge overnight.

3. Pour the can of gin and tonic into a pan, add the caster sugar and lemon juice and boil hard. Once it has reduced to a syrup (about 3-4 minutes over high heat), cool a little, then add the lime juice and the slices of lemon and toss in the syrup. Allow to cool completely.

4. To serve, remove the cheesecake from the tin and place onto a serving plate. Top with a handful of the crushed meringues, then drizzle with the syrup, scattering the lemon slices on top as you go. Add a final dusting of lime zest, slice and serve.

Music Notes for July 2020

As I write this in early June the signs of an easing of the virus lockdown are becoming clearer, but there is still little chance of live concerts in our area in July. Because concerts require rehearsals most local music societies are not expecting to perform until the Autumn, if then. However more professional orchestras at home and abroad are finding ways to produce music which is published through the internet. If you have internet access and go to https://www.classicfm.com/music-news/live-streamed-classical-musicconcerts-coronavirus/ you will find contacts for a long list of Classical music organisations from around the world which are live-streaming, or that have

made their concert archives available online.

The radio of course is a constant supply of good music on Radio 3 and Classic Fm. As last month, Radio 3 will supplement its programme of archived performances with live chamber concerts filling many of its "lunchtime concert" slots – sometimes with interesting versions of pieces better known as works for full orchestra. Beyond that, one Radio 3 concert to specially note is a performance of Purcell's *The Faery Queen* from the Notre-Dame Basilica on 11th July at 6.30pm. Also, a composition culled from Beethoven's nine symphonies by Ian Farrington and featuring a 350 strong Grand Virtual Orchestra will be broadcast on Radio 3 on Friday July 17th to open the 2020 proms series. It is forecast to be on BBC4 TV two days later.

Turning to other TV items, the three-part instalment of the series exploring the life and times of Beethoven promised for June is now expected in July on BBC4, but still at "a date and time to be advised". Also promised on BBC4 but with no time scheduled is The Royal Opera House's performance of Beethoven's *Fidelio* which was filmed just days before UK Lockdown. As I said last month, as the virus emergency changes no advanced programming for either radio or TV can be guaranteed. All we can do is keep an eye on the daily schedules.

The musicians dictionary continues in lockdown: flute – A sophisticated pea-shooter with range of up to 500m and deadly accurate at close quarters.



Christian Message July 2020 by Rev Dr John Huggins

Navigating Change

A year ago, I wrote a Christian message with the same title as this, completely unaware of course what MASSIVE change we would all be expected to navigate this year.

What strikes me about the lockdown is that it has been so different for different people. Some people have been isolated and have more time than they know how to fill. Others have struggled to home-school as well as work from home, with grandparents unable to help. In this area, because of God's grace and the good sense of most people, we have been spared from the worst of the epidemic; but that is no consolation to those who have family members or friends who have died. And in general, the poor have suffered the most without nice gardens for self-isolation, and with minimal space for home-schooling children.

I hear much talk of how we want the world to change – to return to a different 'normal' from what we have accepted in the past. Here is what I would like to see in the new normal: A world that we stop warming to extinction. A country that continues appreciating its key workers (bin-handlers, teachers and farmers as well as paramedics and doctors). A flourishing sense of appreciation to each other in our communities, especially recognising the kindness of those who are volunteering at this time. A world where we take time to appreciate with wonder the beauty of nature around us. And lastly, a revived memory of the Christian faith underpinning all that is good in society – not just meaning "going to church" (although we look forward to churches being open again) but a real, active, living faith that the good God, who revealed himself to us in Jesus Christ, longs for – so that each of our lives bursts out with love, joy and goodness.

There's a wonderful song doing the social media rounds at this time made by churches across the UK called the UK blessing. Google it and listen, and as you do so, absorb the truth that each of us is loved to bits by God, warts and all. What would you like the 'new normal' to be like?

Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things. (Philippians 4:8)

Grafty Green Stores Coronavirus Precautions


