Hastingleigh with Elmsted Women's Institute

Hastingleigh with Elmsted W.I. met on Thursday the 5th of September 2019 at the Evington Hall. 25 members attended and 1 guest. This month we had a fascinating demonstration on Origami, the Japanese art of paperfolding. Our speaker Ms Tsuyoko Page started by telling us that the art of Origami is at least 200 years old. It is not taught in Japanese schools, but every child is taught by someone in their families, often their Grandmothers. Ms Page folded many different items; animals and birds (lobster, frog, flapping bird, penguin and the infamous crane), many different boxes, a cup which was drinkable, and a nun. Whilst she was folding, she told the story of Sadako Sasaki, a little girl who developed acute leukemia 10 years after being exposed to radiation during the atomic bombing of Hiroshima. Inspired by the age-old Japanese belief that anyone who makes 1,000 origami cranes will see their

wish come true, Sadako spent her last days folding paper cranes on her hospital bed in the hope she would recover. There is now a monument to her in the Peace Park, where every year 1000s of paper cranes are displayed in the park as a symbol of peace. For more information on this story visit https://

In The Garden

ith autumn closing in on our gardens seed sowing out doors is over for the year although some late lettuce, herbs, winter purslane could be sown in the greenhouse or under glass with a little heat as needed. Not too much heat for lettuce seeds – their germination is inhibited at temperatures over 25 degrees C. Some will remain small through the winter but will give a good start for early cropping at the end of the winter.

Nonetheless we can glory in the autumn colours of shrubs and trees. The sugar in the leaves of acers, for example, are what brings forth the reds and brilliant gold. On these hills the more delicate acer palmatums may need a sheltered spot to flourish. The brilliant berries of the hardy pyracantha and cotoneaster are ever reliable and provide a feast for blackbirds and other small song birds. I have a couple of them.

Our crab apple 'Rosy Glow' has been declining for the last few years and this year seems to have completely given up the ghost with no fruit whatsoever. This is a disappointment as I enjoy making crab apple and rosehip jelly a delightful accompaniment to roast lamb and an alternative to the straightforward red currant jelly. I think I will see if I can obtain a Malus 'Everest' to succeed the Rosy Glow (but not in the same spot). This is a dwarf crab apple with pinky white flowers in the spring followed by scarlet apples in the autumn.

I have a couple of cotoneaster franchetii in pots that I grew from tiny two leaved plants found, self-seeded, under the parent tree. They might be somewhat pot bound but I shall have a go at planting them out this autumn. At flowering time honey and other bees can't get enough of their delicious nectar.

As ever, our courgettes continually tried to prove they are marrows. The onion crop has been exceptionally good and is now safely strung in the shed, hopefully out of reach of the mice. Leeks are promising but the carrot bed looks so-so. Parsnips, sown twice, decided definitely not to germinate this year; I would try starting them off in modules but I fear they do not like being moved.

Brussels sprouts and some cabbages definitely suffered in the very hot weather and, worse than that we had to obtain emergency supplies of purple sprouting broccoli and spring hearting cauliflower as the earlier plants completely succumbed in the heat.

A problem that has cropped up in recent years is the use of the hormonal weed killer used in grassland called 'Aminopyralid'. This is used on grassland to kill broad-leaved weeds such as docks, nettles and thistles and persists in the grass that is then eaten by livestock who do not appear to be harmed. It passes through the animal into the dung which can then be used as manure or made into compost that you might buy at a garden centre. Potatoes, tomatoes, beans, peas, delphiniums, phlox and roses can be affected with distorted curled leaves and fern-like growth. Some poor growth effects might be from other causes so a 'bean test' where broad bean seeds are grown in a mixture of the suspect material to see how they develop. The advice is to return contaminated material or compost to the place where bought which might be easier said than done. The effect can last in the soil for up to a year so I hope you do not come up against this. The RHS has advice on-line.

Wye PPG

rom June this year, all English GP surgeries are now linked to nearby surgeries by Primary Care Networks (PCNs). Wye surgery is part of the new Ashford Stour Primary Care Network along with Ashford Medical Partnership, New Hayesbank Surgery, Sydenham House Medical Centre, Kingsnorth Medical Practice, Hollington Surgery and Sellindge Medical Practice. This makes Ashford Stour one of the largest PCNs with around 99,000 patients. But why has this been done?

The establishment of PCNs is a building block towards a long-term plan for the NHS that will connect primary care social and community care services. Patients need to feel that their care is co-ordinated, that the services they meet join up around them and that their records are available so they do not have to explain themselves every time. Progress will be evolutionary rather than revolutionary, but the larger PCN groupings will be able to commission, maintain and deliver a wider range of health support for their patients, from pharmacists, district nurses, community geriatricians, dementia workers, physiotherapists, podiatrists/chiropodists, social workers and the voluntary sector. This will be of particular assistance to patients with complex problems. Once data-sharing protocols are agreed, patients will be able to access GP and other services by telephone or online. There will be a strong focus on preventative and personalised care that will enable flexible access to treatments according to patients' differing needs.

It is important that patients are informed and enabled to have an input as the PCN's develop and this is the aim of the Wye Surgery PPG Health Information Day to be held in the large Village Hall Wye between 10am-3pm on Friday October 25. All are welcome

ow the patchwork colours of fields in view from our hills has totally changed, brown, straw with some green and the shrill cry of the buzzard is more poignant with the onset of autumn. It has been a good year for Hawthorn berries but a very bad year for sloes. Along with apple windfalls, also not so plentiful this year, these berries and fruits are so important for winter birds. With the corn all cut hares will be more visible and sadly to the criminals who course them up her with greyhounds and lurchers. The Rural Police have only about 8 staff covering East, West and North Kent but they still do an incredible job. Soon we can harvest Chestnuts in competition with the squirrels and pheasants. These moments bring some melancholy but by then fresh blue skies will not be so far away. BRKM

Hastingleigh Parish Council Superfast Broadband Update

The subject of Superfast Fibre Broadband provision in our area was brought up at the Annual Parish Meeting in May. We contacted Kent County Council (KCC) to discuss the Government's Rural Gigabit Connectivity programme (ie Superfast Broadband).

Businesses and residents in some of the hardest-to-reach places (which we are) in the UK are eligible for additional funding towards the cost of installing gigabit-capable broadband to their premises when part of a group project. Rural premises with broadband speeds of less than 30Mbps can use vouchers worth up to £3,500 for each small and medium-sized businesses (SMEs), and up to £1,500 per residential premise to support the cost of installing new gigabit-capable connections. KCC are likely to launch an additional Voucher scheme in September.

Group projects are when two or more residents and/or SMEs get together to combine their vouchers towards the shared cost of installation. Single connections are not eligible for additional funding.

Our initial discussion with KCC was optimistic that fibre broadband to premises in most of our immediate area is feasible if we all work together.

Farming Notebook

s the autumn equinox approaches the long days of summer begin to shorten, and nature prepares her harvest to store for the colder part of the year. Likewise on the farm we have been combining the crops of cereals, beans, herbage seed and oilseed rape, putting them into the silos and barns. Potato lifting is also well under way, and thanks to good weather going well.

Round the northern hemisphere celebrations begin to show thanks for the safe gathering in of the crops. There are the traditional Harvest Festivals, beer and wine tasting events and even Harvest Moon parties, by the light of the full moon that rises nearest the autumn equinox.

Although many regard the beginning of September as the first day of autumn, it is traditionally marked by the equinox, the day on which the length of day is the same as the length of night. This is on the 21st September. After this date the nights will noticeably start to draw in. A sure sign that winter is on its way. It is hard to believe as we enjoy day after day of bright warm sunshine with hardly a cloud in the sky. Why did we rush to cut wheat at over 20% moisture in August....?

The combine has been cleaned, serviced and put away for another season. Yields have been good. All the crops benefitted from sufficient moisture and good lengthy spells of sunshine, particularly during the grain filling period of June and July. High volumetric weights, measured as Kg/Hectolitre, are a sure sign of good quality. This year the wheats have been coming in at values of 80 or thereabouts, the average most years being in the mid seventies. Lorries are leaving the farm looking only partially filled, but still having a full payload. It is going to be a year where we are going to be pleasantly surprised by the tonnage moved once the stores are empty. Sadly, the markets know this and are offering prices some 25% below that of last year! Still, it is always satisfying to produce a good crop...

The potato season last year was the most challenging that we have ever had. The problems of lack of rainfall, harvesting difficulties and maintaining storage quality made us sit down and thoroughly review the whole enterprise. We looked at our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. I will not go into detail, but it was a really useful exercise. We have made changes from variety choice, planting and growing crop management, right through to harvest and storage. Most of this just by making better use of the resources that we already had. The best decision that we made was to

increase the output of the grader at harvest time. To do this we have borrowed an extra box filling machine and decided to employ a gang of Romanians to man the grader. They have been fantastic. The four of them work from 8am to 7pm, six days a week - they have a 45 minute journey to and from work on top. Any pause in the grading and they are off with brooms and shovels keeping the shed spotlessly tidy. On Saturday tea time, Elizabeth supplies a freshly baked cake for all of the grading crew which has gone down very well – literally! It even resulted in an English word being spoken-"thankyou". An achievement in itself.

It is the first time ever that we have been able to grade as fast as the harvester can lift the crop. Our potato harvest will be complete after two weeks and two days. Beating our previous best by 11 days!!!

The Hereford bull has been taken away from his cows to ensure a tight calving pattern next spring. We hope to have most of the cows calving down by the end of April. The herd will have a PD (pregnancy diagnosis) by the vet in a few months time to give an indication of calving dates. We know we will have one very busy day when all the cows that were synchronised and fertilised by AI (Artificial Insemination) will all calve together.

Soon we will be introducing the Hereford to our home bred Sussex bull. They will run in adjacent fields and then there will be a certain amount of food involved to ensure the development of a smooth friendship. Herefords and Sussex are quiet breeds, so we are not expecting too much strutting, pushing and shoving...

The cows are looking well, but have become restless. The grass has lost its steam and so we have started to feed some silage and a little corn to keep them content and in good condition for the cooler days and nights. The calves have grown on well and all look solid. No surprise really, as they have had access all summer to a creep feeder filled with a cereal mix. The calves feed ad lib by squeezing through a small gap to access the trough. The cows are too big to get in and have to go without!

Our focus now turns to next year's cropping. The small seeds-grass and oilseed rape-have been planted, but could really do with some rain to bring them on. This year we have planted the rape with a companion crop of white mustard. The mustard grows very vigorously, and it is hoped that any cabbage stem flea beetle will feed on it rather than the slower growing rape plants. The beetle can literally wipe out a rape crop in a few days. We are

no longer allowed to control the pest with a seed dressing so anything is worth a try.

Soil sampling, both to check for pH and nutrient levels, along with hole digging to ascertain soil structure issues have been carried out. Screened chalk and additional Phosphates have had to be applied to some fields to rectify deficiencies. Subsoil cultivations have also been carried out where necessary during these ideal weather conditions.

We will also be spreading our farmyard manure on fields due for a second successive wheat crop. The well rotted dung from our own cattle yards along with that from a local dairy farm where we "swap" straw for manure, is a great source of nutrients but particularly organic matter which is vital for the health of our soils.

As we seem to be generally on top of things I am looking forward to the East Kent Ploughing Match. It is a really good "farming" day out, and a milestone in the year. A real sign that autumn is upon us...
