# DORSET GREENWOOD TREE PROJECT

Discovering, conserving and celebrating Dorset's Veteran Trees

Working alongside The Woodland Trust - Ancient Tree Hunt a nationwide initiative to secure the future for old, fat trees in the UK.

# Why we must look after our Veteran Trees.

Unlike the elderly human population which numbers are expanding year on year, veteran trees are in serious decline.

Why does it matter? Just like Elderly people, trees in their latter years need help to continue to have a good quality of life. We need to know where these trees are and if they are in threat of competition from other trees or scrub that could shorten their lives.

They are one of the most important habitats for hundreds of insects, birds and mammals. The older the tree the more life that depends on it.

Historically through history man has often plundered woodland and not replanted. In the 1970's the tree population hit an all time low in the uk. Once these Veteran trees die, it will take I to 2 hundred years for them to be replaced.

This is why we want to record and care for the older trees on the hill.

Life cycle of a tree

The best way to understand the life cycle of a tree is as follows.

The childhood years: The new kid on the block has a lot of growing up to do. It will receive a few knocks on the way, nibbled, chewed and shaded by others, but by it's teenage years it can hold it own. It will start shading out it's competitors and making it's own personal space.

Middle age: For some trees this stage will last for hundreds of years. Like humans the growth slows and the tree in it's prime and flourishes. It produces seed, (children) provides shelter (a home) and becomes a habitat (extended family) in it's own right.

Old age: Us humans slowly decline in our later years. A few wrinkles start to appear and our limbs do not work as well as they use to. Often elderly trees will sacrifice a bough to help it survive. Cracks and holes appear and the tree slowly starts to decline. The tree takes on a new character becoming one of the most important trees in the wood. Just like Grandma, the matriarch, wise and much loved by the whole family.

#### Why we must encourage children.

The children our the future volunteers that will look after the hill. We all have childhood memories of special places and we are drawn back to them in future years.

Many of the volunteers we have today, played on the hill in their youth. But we have a generation gap, there are no younger volunteers coming forward. We have hardly any volunteers between the ages of 20-50.

Many within that age group were not encouraged as children to play outside, educated about wildlife, or feel a connection with their local environment.

We try and encourage families to take part and educate adults as well. Not all white butterflies are cabbage whites, nor all little brown birds the same species. How many people can name wild flowers and insects they see?

The Hill and Cooper's Field are unique in the fact they are within a stones throw of the town, housing estates and has open access to all.

We have inspired Aiden and his family, so please support him to encourage more families to enjoy the wonders of the hill.





Two volunteers Pat and Chris empty the two poo bins every week. The bags are so heavy they often use a sack truck, or as I did when they were both away, a trolley. It was the most I could do to pull it along.

With the lighter mornings and evenings the amount of dog waste that is being picked up has increased. These bins are well used as is the one by the main gate.

We would like to thank everyone that does pick up and the two ladies that empty the bins.

#### TALKING RUBBISH

People come to enjoy the woodland, views and wildlife. What we can't understand is why they then want to turn it into a rubbish dump. The things that the volunteers have removed over the years include, continental quilt, tents, shopping trolley, tarpaulins, deposable B.B.Q's, nappies, cling film, seats, nets, as well as the usual, water bottles, beer cans, wine bottles, crisp and sweet wrappers and discarded poo bags.

Last year volunteers took it in turns every month to litter pick. This project worked very well, until there seemed to be very litter left to pick.

After six months without any organised litter pick the amount has started to increase. We want to ensure that this doesn't yet again become a problem.

Rubbish and wildlife do not mix. Much has been reported about rubbish and marine wildlife, but it affects land based wildlife too. Young animals and birds will often try to eat plastic bags as they work out if it is food or not. Discarded bottles and cans can become traps as they get stuck inside. Food such as cake, chicken bones and chocolate can be fatal for some animals.
