Welcome from the Chair

very much hope that you are enjoying the summer so far. The sunshine seems to bring out everybody and everything and the parish is absolutely full of life and activity this summer. Fetes, concerts, the BeaconLit, the WW1 Commemorative exhibition at The Hub to name but a few have kept our residents happy and entertained. The Allotments are as bright and blooming as ever and The Village Swan in Ivinghoe Aston has new landlords who celebrated the World Cup 2014 in real style!

The Parish Council has been extremely active itself since the last edition of the magazine. Our Community Speedwatch volunteers have been out again, monitoring speeding traffic in the parish. Brian Dale our newest Councillor is proving to bean inviable asset to our hard working team and is heavily involved with matters traffic in our parish. He is currently reviewing the appropriateness of a Sentinel speed camera system for use in the parish which could really improve our ability to record accurate traffic data. Parishes in our Local Area Forum group are being asked to submit proposals for new traffic calming schemes in their parish, although previous experience in this area does not encourage us to be hopeful in this matter.

It is however, planning matters that continue to keep your parish council busy and as you are aware I am sure by now, a proposal has been submitted by Gladman Developers for 70 new dwellings in the heart of the village off Station Road adjacent to Ford End Farm. Much activity has ensued in the parish and a group of local residents

called Ivinghoe Together have formed a small steering committee to look in depth at the planning application. They have held a public meeting with more proposed and also produced a leaflet for all parish residents with details of the planning application and information as to how you can have your say.

This is not the only major planning application to be on our horizon. Plans have been submitted for a 60 acre photo voltaic farm at Seabrook Farm in Horton. The parish council takes very seriously its' responsibilities as best it can to represent the parish views on planning matters. It is unfortunate for us in the Aylesbury Vale that our planning authority's Planning Policy Framework was rejected by the Secretary of State and our planners are left until 2017 with old saved policies which leaves the planning authority vulnerable and policies susceptible to misinterpretation.

Your views on planning applications have a real impact on the decisions that planners make and given the scale and impact of these two planning applications that have recently been submitted, the parish council encourages you to make your views known to the planners.

I very much hope that no matter how active you are this summer that you all have the opportunity to take some time out and really enjoy all that this summer has to offer.

FORD END WATERMILL

IVINGHOE, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE

The only working watermill to survive intact in the county. The mill, recorded in 1616 but probably much older, was in use until 1963. Now restored by members of the Pitstone & Ivinghoe Museum Society, it retains all the atmosphere of a small farm mill of the late 1800s. Visitors can work the sack hoist and mill wheat on a rotary hand quern. Stoneground wholemeal flour for sale on milling days.

his is the first of what I hope will be many articles I write for the Ivinghoe Beacon Magazine, a publication which exudes community spirit. events - you might like to visit one of the many attractions which will show our younger generations why the war is still relevant today. Just up the road at Waddesdon Manor, the Waddesdon at War exhibition looks at the Estate during the war from the perspective of the Rothschild family. At the County Museum in Aylesbury, a special exhibition Duty and Service: Bucks Lives in the Great War looks at the experiences of war from a county-wide perspective and, if you fancy venturing further afield, the recently re-opened Imperial War Museum in London always offers a rich insight into the enormity of the First World War and is a valuable experience for visitors of all ages.

However you are spending the summer months, I wish you well and I look forward to writing for the *lvinghoe* Beacon Magazine in 2015.

Ivinghoe Together

he Ivinghoe Together working group is made up of a number of lyinghoe residents who are working together to ensure that the community remains at the heart of the village, now and for the future

Many of you will have received a leaflet from Gladman regarding the potential development of land off Station Road in lyinghoe. This leaflet stated that they would be seeking outline planning permission for 81 residential homes. We feel that this development will irrevocably change our village alongside destroying the view out of lyinghoe towards Mentmore and Cheddington Hill.

We recently held a village meeting to discuss how to respond to this speculative approach. Over 110 individuals attended the meeting that took place in the Ivinghoe Old School Community Hub to work out how best to protect our village and its surrounds. An application has now been lodged with Aylesbury Vale District Council and the working group have been pulling

together the valid arguments that can be used within objections. We are also investigating long term proactive methods of combating intrusive changes, through the development of a neighbourhood plan.

ike several other generous community spirited people before him, you might have seen **John** Cutler has donated his skilled work for free – taking apart and reassembling our Ivinghoe Old School Community Hub front wall, so desperately in need of restoration. Thanks John, you did this in heat wave conditions, vet we are volunteer trustees are so busy in the Hub these days that it seems only weeks since our very popular Easter egg hunt here in the cold and windy Hub's kitchen garden.

However, spring has sprung into high summer now and our kitchen garden is fulsome with fresh salad growth, herby garnishes and soft fruit, and our Community spaces are in daily active use. Our flexible spaces can either be divided by their screen to work as two small rooms or with the screen rolled back to work as one larger space which has supported many a celebration, Baptismal party, Birthday or Wake. Other weekly group use includes classes for babies, toddlers, children and adults in all things physical and health promoting, recreational and entertaining. Some younger classes have run their course and made way for other ideas you might wish to bring, and also older children's needs are now coming to the fore. Pilates for adults and later for Mums and babies on a Thursday, and Yoga on Wednesday evenings are very popular, and we have the pleasure as we do our admin in the IT room where hot-desking and PC teaching is our plan, to hear the variety of choirs practice and groups of musicians do the same. Why not start a class here yourself?

In early May we suggested a shared Art Maker's Fair could work better by splitting a large group of artists with their wares to display for sale between our Ivinghoe Community Hub venue and the Old Town Hall. This happened with great success as the artists generously shared their aims, skill hints and methodology with us the browsers, and forged (literally) what could be an ongoing successful partnership with our village. We have another group Artist's Network Bedfordshire exhibiting on 20th/21st September, preceded by a Saturday workshop on 6th September.

Then suddenly we had arrived at 19th June - our Hub's tenant Café owner Hayley Wesley's CuriosiTEA Rooms first Birthday! This café has been the focus for so many of our Community coming together informally to enjoy lovely home-made refreshments seven days a week, so we all celebrated with gusto! The same week we had co-joined with the WI to refresh the village on the day of the lovely church fete and exhibit a range of Old Ivinghoe photographic prints that continue to prompt the community to help us



answer some searching questions on details of our anecdotal history, all leading to an eventual book!

Continuing the theme of the fete day's WW1 – the British Legion's display kick started our invitation to this community to bring in their WW1 memorabilia and copies of their personal photographs and ephemera of the time, to join in an exhibition to last until its climax with poetry and song led by Judith Sheridan, here in our Hub over the Remembrance Sunday weekend in November 2014. Please come in to look at and add to our growing exhibition. Our AGM date is **now fixed as 27th August** at which we will also share a myriad of Hub activities and plans for the future.

Typical of a village that knows how to pull together - our Public Meeting last week here in the Hub was packed with 120 people interested in finding a solution between us. For those interested in progress on the Gladman proposal of a development of 81 houses in the field in front of Ford End Farm in the centre of our

Dates to look forward to include: our two coming ActiviTEA days with lunch included for primary school age children on first Tuesday 5th August and September2nd (TBC).

We also have another popular **Psychic Evening on 12th September**. Please come in and make your bookings with our onsite Trustees or Hayley in her café. Beyond all this we are also exploring sharing our creative skills; drama; after school / homework clubs; line dancing, summer fun on the lawn, small film clubs with refreshments, good neighbouring initiatives what else would interest you?



Ivinghoe Speedwatch Report



le held four Speedwatch sessions in June, all at Great Gap. Sadly the patterns of behaviour followed those of previous sessions and there seems to be no evidence of reduced speeds. We've recorded some trucks and far too many vehicles overtaking at excessive speed. In fact I have been in correspondence with the Chief Executive of AVDC regarding this issue and made some proposals, including marking up double white lines, but these are regarded as inappropriate in the circumstances. I will be contacting the Chief Executive again.

We are continuing Speedwatch sessions in July, and whilst nothing is yet booked in August I'm anticipating further similar exercises. Anyone available to help in the future please let me know. As ever I'm happy to arrange sessions in lyinghoe and lyinghoe Aston subject to the availability of volunteers.

The MVAS has been set up again in Great Gap. It is recording traffic speeds

of vehicles travelling towards Leighton Buzzard. Due to battery failure it was not working for a period but is now operating again. We'll download the data in due course which will provide further evidence of the ongoing situation. Sadly any corrective action is unlikely to take place in the short term. In the meantime our action is limited to carrying out exercises which are designed to educate.

I'm pleased to be able to confirm that the police have also carried out an enforcement exercise in June. They prosecuted seven motorists in a period of about one hour and are planning further similar exercises in the near future.

Finally I'm pleased to be able to confirm that a "Sentinel" speed "camera" has been purchased by the Local Area Forum for use by local villages. This is in addition to the equipment which we currently borrow from Cheddington. The equipment we normally use relies on the observers to record details of the vehicle, and it can sometimes be difficult to recognise vehicle types and sometimes even colours. The new "Sentinel" equipment records an image so that the details can be downloaded after the event and this gives a guarantee that the data recorded is correct. In the event of a subsequent dispute it also allows for confirmation of the data. The new equipment will otherwise be used in a manner similar to the current equipment in that it will not be operated remotely, but only when attended by properly trained members of the Speedwatch team.

The **Miller's** Tale...

e are now roughly halfway through our open season and visitor numbers have been about average, as a voluntary organisation we rely very much on getting people through the door to cover our overheads. But the number of visitors we get can depend on several things, firstly, whether we are actually milling or not, secondly, dry weather always helps, and thirdly if there are any major events taking place at the same time, things like large local events/ shows, or Wimbledon, or the Grand Prix formula one racing, or the Olympics, or as we have this year, the World Cup.

But we never really know how many visitors will turn up until we are actually open, its fine if we are busy because the day just seems to fly past and before we know it the day has gone and we are closing, its great to be really busy with lots of visitors but also very tiring. On the other hand if we have a quiet day with a low number of visitors then the time seems to drag by and this too seems to take it out of us, and we leave the mill feeling nearly as tired as if we had been rushed off our feet, although we do have chance to have a good chinwag and catch up with what other people have been up to lately and to find out about any local news and gossip.

We also had a slight problem the last time we were open and milling, we had two of our newer millers on duty and they are still quite new to milling wheat so I said I would pop in to see how they were getting on. They said they were not happy with the way things were going and explained to me that the flour was

really hot and everything was running slowly, all attempts by me to try and rectify the problem failed, so as it was towards the end of the afternoon when most of the visitors had left and there were only a handful of people left in and around the mill we decided to stop and call it a day.

A few days later we tried milling again and we had virtually no flour coming out although there was plenty of wheat going in, so we stopped and dismanltled all the millstone cover and fittings and lifted the top millstone away from the lower millstone.

Then we could see what was causing the problem, the stones were completely caked in hardened flour, so hard that it needed a screwdriver and scrapers to remove it and was hard work! Then we decided to brush it with water and leave it to soak in which along with a steam gun made it much easier to remove. But we were puzzled as to why it had happened in the first place, it was suggested maybe the wheat had become damp, but moisture testing ruled this out as it was well within spec.

So we scratched out heads a litle and then talked to some 'professional millers' who said the hot flour and slow running suggested that the stones may have been too close together, therefore generating friction heat which had baked the flour onto the millstones, another suggestion was that because of the slow running there may not have been enough centrifugal force to propel the flour to the edges of the stones so it built up and added to the friction heat and baking effect. Hopefully we have



found the problem and have learned what happens if you run the stones too close together.

Five Top Tips for Composters

1 The golden rule – you can compost anything that once lived. Only a few things are best left out - cooked food scraps, and perennial weeds for instance are better dealt with separately.

2. Be kind to the worms in your heap. They are accommodating creatures, and whilst they do not have to be talked to nicely, they do appreciate a good mixed diet. So put in all those items you might be wondering about, such as egg shells, citrus peel, tea bags and so on. They can all go in.

3. Observe the 50:50 ratio. That means. half your heap should be made up of green material (soft and sappy kitchen peelings and so on) and the other half of paper and card (I tear up and use cereal packets, toilet roll middles, printer paper and so on - it all composts down a treat).



4 Make sure your heap is not too wet and not too dry - just slightly moist is about right. Water it with your watering can if too dry, and make a lid of some sort - maybe a square of old carpet.

5 Make it easy on yourself. Put your bin in a handy spot, near the kitchen door if possible, so that emptying your kitchen caddy does not involve a trek over a muddy lawn.

6 Give it time. You have to have patience, but your heap will get there in the end. Oops, that seems to be 6 tips!

irst of all, a big thank you to the Ivinghoe Parish Council for providing a stand pipe at the top of the allotment site. It is certainly appreciated by the plot holders at the top, and I quote: "Makes watering my plot much easier."

I would also like to welcome Councillor Karen Groom and Councillor Sheena Bexson our new Parish Council Allotment Officers and at the same time, thank Gloria Snowden for her efforts in the past.

A meeting was held on Sunday 13th July; sitting on deckchairs on Alex and Owen's plot with tea, coffee and cakes provided, 10 allotmenteers (with five apologies) discussed the formation of the Ivinghoe Allotment Club with the intention of joining the National Allotments Society which will be of great benefit to all of us as plot holders.

It was agreed that this would be classed as a club rather than an association, with the purpose of creating more social activity among allotmenteers and becoming more involved within the community. All allotment holders are welcome to join, and if you have not expressed an interest to date, then please contact Michelle on 668992 for more details. The sooner we know how many members we have the application to join the NAS can be sent off. I think it's fair to say that the Parish Council support our application.

The village show was also discussed and it was agreed that in view of the time that it would not be possible to hold a show this year as it would be too much of a rush and not possibly up to the standard that we would be proud to be associated with.

The allotment site looks great with all sorts of various lush looking green plants on all the worked plots. On a personal note, my shallots and onions have not been as good

as I would have expected. Wilted rather early, I lifted them all, got rid of the affected leaves and left them to dry out. The result is that it has not been a wasted crop, slightly smaller than usual, but good colour and most importantly, they are edible!

I complain about the onions and yet we have nothing to complain about really. On a recent visit to Cambodia. Sue and I visited an island renowned for its silk weaving. With every house built on stilts and a loom underneath. The ladies earn approximately two US dollars a day for an eight hour stint and yet they freely gave us a plate of completely fresh sliced mangoes and a gift of 10 mangoes as we left (we gifted them some dollars in return). These people are poor - it was a real eye-opener for us. If our planted veggies do not come up to our expectations please think before moaning and count ourselves as being extremely fortunate.

The first early potatoes were extremely tasty although yields not very high. They are like gold nuggets! Salad crops are doing very well with lettuces good and firm. It has also been an excellent year for peas, the pods bulging as a result of the good weather. Did you know that the UK is Europe's largest producer of peas? Growing about 86,000 acres each year, Bird's Eye reps may be about next year... in Ivinahoe!

Finally, just to let you know, there are two vacant plots on the site at the moment. So if you are interested please contact Maxine Havnes. The allotment gate opened and a family came in and asked if they could look round, they had spotted the allotments in passing a magnet for any allotmenteer. I explained this was based on and American Indian method called the "three sisters". Mrs Denvsov said likewise she also grew French marigolds in between her carrots. Mr Denysov was very knowledgeable and offered excellent advice especially regarding the care of my fig tree and hopefully following his instructions I will at last be able to grow tomatoes on my plot.

Mr and Mrs Denysov said they thoroughly enjoyed walking round the allotments but where was everyone on such a fine weekend? I said I sincerely hoped they found their plot intact on their return to the Ukraine. A truly international horticultural exchange!

Choose the Chilterns

xplore the beech woods of the National Trust (NT) Ashridge Estate this summer holiday and enjoy the chalk downs with great Chilterns' views along the Drover Walk way.

Inhabited since the iron age, the extensive estate has been home to Iron Age farmers, the Romans, Tudors, Bodgers and soldiers preparing for the D-Day invasion. The remains of a hill fort, which once guarded the area against attack, can still be seen at Ivinghoe Beacon – the trailhead for the long-distance Icknield Way that traverses the estate, along which many ancient tumuli can be seen.

Ashridge House was popular with Royalty from 1290 when Edward I held a particularly long parliament in the monastery, his stay caused great inconvenience to the locals who were legally obliged to keep the king and his court for over five weeks! King Henry VIII held court here and loved to hunt and made sure the forest was well stocked with game.

The NT has managed this landscape since 1926 as a working estate, continuing 3,000 years of tradition; by using livestock to help look after the diverse habitats on the downlands and foresters fell timber to ensure the health of the woodland.

This lovely walk follows the network of ancient sunken green lanes so typical of the area that were once used over hundreds of years for droving livestock from the villages of Aldbury, lvinghoe and Pitstone to graze on common land. Once open but nowadays a mixture of grassland, ancient trees and relatively

young woodland, Aldbury, Pitstone and Ivinghoe Commons are all within the Ashridge Estate and are just three of the 200 commons across the Chilterns.

The area supports an amazing diversity of rare butterflies, orchids and birdlife including the goldcrest and the lesser-spotted woodpecker. Wild fallow deer are a common sight and muntjac deer, badgers and the rarely found dormouse are also local residents. The main focal point of the Ashridge Estate is the granite Monument erected in 1832 to the 3rd Duke of Bridgewater, also known as the Canal Duke. There is limited opening during the summer and it's worth the climb to to top where you can enjoy the views across five counties.

How do you mark the passing of a giant?

As most of you will know by now the most notable tree in Frithsden Beeches

died, as it had lived, in a most spectacular way. We had been told there was a problem and when we investigated, half of the tree had split away and fallen to the ground. Whilst we pondered what to do, the other larger half decided it couldn't stand without its counter-weight and crashed to the ground.

Many of you may be thinking well that's that then another old tree bitten the dust – but as the great storms of the 1980s and 90s showed us, there is life after death. The amount of 'timber' that has now been made available to those myriad of deadwood munching insects and fungi is guite staggering and the vast space left in the canopy will allow light to flood down to the forest floor, which has been starved of light by such a dominant beech tree, and allow all sorts of dormant plant life to flourish. There will be a rush to be first to fill the space and for a while provide it will be a natural area that will stimulate peoples imagination for years to come.

If we could transport ourselves forward, say 50 years, there will be a thicket of trees in a roughly circular shape and a few lumps of moss covered rotting logs. Hopefully it will be alive with lots of buzzing insects and chirping birds, this new vibrant woodland will be a good way to mark the passing of a fallen giant.

DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.


In some circumstances, we may be able to undertake hospital trips to the John Radcliffe or Nuffield hospitals. Please contact the number below if you are having difficulty accessing transport to these hospitals.

In this case, each journey will be classed as return – as the volunteer will need to return to Pitstone using their own vehicle and petrol.

Ivinghoe Beacon August 2014 Land at Rushendon Furlong - Pitstone

he AVDC planning committee on 18th June agreed by 5 votes to 4 that they were minded to approve an outline application for 40 houses behind Rushendon Furlong subject to conditions to be agreed by officers, despite Pitstone Parish Council and local residents making a strong case with high quality presentations to the committee, to uphold the policies still relevant from the old local plan, followed by a long debate on the value of those policies, the footpath, drainage, and landscape.

The committee resolved 'that the application be delegated to the Development Management Manager to determine, subject to the satisfactory completion of a Planning Obligation Agreement to secure on site provision of affordable housing, financial contributions towards off site leisure. education and public transport provision, the provision and maintenance of an on site open space and a suitable SuDS scheme (drainage) and to secure a travel plan. Any approval to be subject to such conditions as the Development Control Manager considers appropriate or, if this cannot be achieved. refused for such reasons as considered appropriate'.

At the same meeting a controversial application in Aston Clinton was also approved by 5 votes to 4 and I have since also learned that since then applicants have won an appeal for 40 houses at Stoke Hammond.

Several other similar planning applications have been received - 40 houses on the edge of Edlesborough and 40 on the edge of Great Horwood, and a further application for 90 houses has been

submitted in Aston Clinton.

No application has actually been registered yet for proposed houses in lvinghoe, at the time of writing

Ringshall Road closed by badgers

The road has been closed since mid. June and is due to re-open mid July as the carriageway outside Trust Cottages collapsed into a badger sett! Not sink holes as some might think.

A license to repair the subsidence is needed from Natural England and an expert will be on site for the repairs.

Is this another first for **Ivinghoe Division?!**

Have your **voice heard...**

am pleased to report that, partially at least, I have been successful in my campaign to rationalise the AVDC planning committee. I did mention that I would hopefully have more to say on this and now I can.

When an application for planning is opposed by the Parish Council or your AVDC local member and this is against the recommendation of the officers of the council it will go to a committee which is held in the presence of elected members. In order to speak one must register to do so and give the name of the person attending. This has been found to be unfair and obstructive. I have attended these meetings with your Parish Council representatives whom have been denied the chance to speak due to meetings overrunning. I am delighted to say that this pointless rule has been changed to allow the name of that person no longer being so restrictive. The unwieldy size of the committee has also been reduced which should hopefully speed up proceedings without restricting supporters or objectors being given the chance to have their sav.

The other matter I have been working on, in partnership with other parishes locally, is inappropriate speeding in the villages. You will probably have noticed the flashing sign on Station Road or further down toward Great Gap which collects data. This information is useful for the police when they decide where to position their limited resources. A new piece of equipment will soon be used in the area which will work along similar lines to the Speedwatch which is operated by volunteers. This equipment will record infringements and is then passed to the Police. Letters warning drivers will follow. It is expected that this will be extremely useful in our attempts to combat the incidents of heavy goods vehicles speeding along Station Road. It will be shared by parishes in the area so will not be working all the time but it is another tool to combat what you have identified as a major concern.

Due to the failure of our local plan there have been a flood of applications for development across the Vale and indeed across the whole country. Some will be inappropriate, some not. It is of course true that we need to build more houses in order for our communities. to remain sustainable and to provide somewhere for our young people to live where they grew up. Rest assured though that I continue to represent my area to oppose any development that is unsustainable.
