



# Queens Head Shop


We met John Jones last month in relation to the demolition of the Toll House. Now we have his son Thomas living with his family at 2 The Hollies, The Cross, West Felton, having inherited the mill, the shop and the bakery. In due course they were taken over by his daughter Kate (Norman's Auntie of whom we hear later) who had married John Gittens from Sandford. It remained in the Gittens family. John and Kate were still in the shop in 1921 with sons David and Frank, daughter Kate Margaret, and a servant Bertha Jones. John seems to have retained the bakery when he later sold the shop to William Cotgreave. Kitty tells us that in 1932 "Gittens was the Baker and brought



#### the bread around".

Wm. Cotgreave continued the thriving business, providing much more than groceries: coal and sand; the post office was in his shop at one stage; and a busy telephone exchange. William's daughter Marjorie was born in 1923. During the war she joined the ATS and delivered telegrams etc. to the airfield at Rednal. There she met dashing RAF pilot, Flight Leader John Stockbridge, 122 squadron. They married in 1946 and in due course took over the shop from her father. Whilst everything at Queens Head changed around them, they ran a successful business until they

# Do the Garden Path with Topiarius

#### High summer

If your garden features a lot of herbaceous borders and bedding then July will still be peak time, but gardens more orientated to earlier shrubs could be starting to look past their peak. Our garden tends towards being of the early type, which is one reason why I choose this month to make my annual assessment to note changes to be made for next year. It is easy now to see what has become tired and also what has outgrown its allotted space. A year never passes without a few things being listed for severe cutting back or even removal. Whenever you review your garden, it is virtually guaranteed that you will note things that failed or exceeded expectations without the reason being obvious. You have to put it down to plants having a will of heir own. I then feel better by considering that, if gardening was reduced to an exact science, it would lose much of its attraction.

There is very little seed sowing in July, lettuce for succession and cucumbers to replace the first crop, which in all probability will pack in earlier than you would like. There is also some planting out of brassicas sown earlier in modules plus chard sown in June will need to be thinned. I tend to look upon July as when I tire of the routine jobs of weeding, feeding, mowing and watering, which are most unlikely to have become less. Hence, some resolve is

needed. Also, a reminder that things to look out for this month are caterpillars on brassica and blight warnings (www.blightwatch.co.uk). Last year some parts of the country had some exceedingly high temperatures, although we escaped reasonably lightly. Let us hope, there are no such problems this year.

A couple of garden columnists have commented recently on plants going in and out of fashion, which is sometimes very difficult to understand. I can remember a time when a local nursery couldn't get enough water lilies but a year or two later nobody wanted them. That was put down to some safety police telling the world that ponds were unsafe. It reminded me of the joke that, if water were invented now, it would be banned as you could drown in just a few centimetres and, worse, the same water could go on drowning people. Apparently, rock gardens have also been out of fashion for some years. Once they often featured in show gardens but you would now have to look back in the photo archives to find them being used. I have no idea why but I do know that gardens with a steep slope to contend with are highly likely to be keeping the genre alive. Leylandii gave conifers a bad name and, to be fair, some "dwarf" conifers end up anything but, so a downturn in popularity is understandable. Happily, there are dwarfs that can be kept in check and they are enjoying a comeback. ♦

retired in 1981. The business changed hands again. It eventually closed in the 1990s and is now a private house. John Stockbridge was a local and County councillor until the early 2000s.

Whilst still at school Eileen Hanmer used to help "Aunty Marjorie" in the shop, and upon finishing, joined them full time in 1962, only leaving to look after her new daughter, Jane, at the end of 1978. By 1983 her experience as postmistress saw her working in West Felton shop at The Cross, where she remained for 17 years.

**Norman Jones**, wrote down his memories for Ann Evans some years ago. They are abridged here:

#### MEMORIES OF LIFE IN WEST FELTON

by Norman Jones, great grandson of the first owner of Queens Head Mill.

"The house at West Felton where I was born was known as No 2 The Hollies next to Public Hall. I have vivid memories of watching traffic when I was about 4 or 5 years of age. As I was not allowed beyond the garden gate, I watched from a vantage point through the railings of the front garden. There was an amazing variety of passers-by, men, women and children, animals of all kinds - especially on market day. Many animals were driven by drovers to and from Oswestry, some five miles away. The farmers and their wives rode on the horse and cart. There would be the occasional wagonette: a four-wheel vehicle, horse drawn of course, the driver up front and passengers seated on

benches down the sides and facing inwards. In the autumn particularly they would be engulfed in produce to sell. I remember those huge wicker baskets.

"As there was a big army camp at Park Hall, we had a lot of military personnel, vehicles and equipment passing to and fro. There were men marching or sometimes cycling, wagons drawn by mules, occasionally gun carriages. The Royal Flying Corps (later the RAF) drove by in their super motor vehicles; best of all were the ambulances with a big red cross.

"Vehicles of all kinds were a continual fascination. Naturally, there was a variety of agricultural equipment, invariably drawn by a steam traction engine.

"The two greatest attractions were the threshing machine and very occasionally - maybe twice a year - a fair or circus drawn by the ubiquitous traction engine. They were so noisy and slow moving that they gave ample warning of their approach and I was able to scamper to my vantage point through the railings.

"There are so many vivid, colourful, happy memories of my childhood in West Felton. Some of the most endearing and enduring are the outings. Allday excursions to nearby beauty spots: Nesscliffe Hill, Llanymynech on the Welsh border, and Ellesmere the local "lake district". We of course went to Oswestry to the circus, the theatre, or whatever. Although mother must have been very busy with the house, garden,



(Continued from page 19) and lodgers, she obviously loved a day out.

"We could get to Oswestry by train involving a walk to Rednal Station, but the other places meant borrowing a horse and trap from the local shop-keeper. This would only be possible on Bank Holidays (Sundays were out). The shopkeeper, Mr Lloyd, was a staunch Primitive Methodist - in any case, I don't think mother would have wanted to have a day out on a Sunday.

"Then there were Sunday school outings; two well remembered were by horse-drawn canal barge. One "voyage" was to Ellesmere and the other to Llanymynech. The barge was a coal boat, swept clean and wooden forms placed along the sides.

"This gives me the opportunity to write about Queens Head. This was an ideal spot for the business founded by my great-grandfather. A mill for grinding corn into flour dominated the business. The flour was transported to Liverpool along the canal via Ellesmere Port on the Mersey. What is more likely by a flourmill than a bakery and grocery shop? But by good fortune, there was also a sandpit and a coal business; truly a flourishing concern. Later came the post office and still later the telephone exchange. I recall many happy hours at Queen's head, occasions before mother died in 1919, but later, after her death, when on Sundays I had dinner and tea there with Auntie Kate - my father's sister. The day included Chapel morning and evening and Sunday school in the afternoon." ♦



village school. Because we lived three miles from the school, a bus picked us up from Haughton, I clearly remember my cousin Hazel, and school friends Jean and Margaret Hamlett and myself, running the gauntlet past Evans's geese on Haughton pool in the mornings, they always seem to be hiding just around the corner, ready to chase us. For some reason I can't remember them being there when we came home in the afternoon. While waiting for the bus, we spent many a happy ten minutes in the old Smithy playing pussy in the corner or hide and seek. (don't laugh!).

Mr Cecil Evans was the headmaster for many years, a keen sportsman. West Felton School had the best football and netball teams in the area. He and Mrs Evans, a lovely lady, retired and lived at the Avenue House for many years. Mr Johnson was the next headmaster, I think it was about 1947, he taught me for about twelve months, and then at the age of eleven we were sent to school in Oswestry, we were the first eleven yearolds not to finish our education at the village schools.

After school and tea, we would all congregate at Evans's farm at Haughton to play football, rounders, or whatever was popular at the time. Harvest time was a time for running rabbits when the corn was cut. Home we would go with our trophies for mother to make a rabbit stew, 'wonderful.' Winter time, going around the houses singing carols, Miss Rowson (teacher at the village school) always had an apple for us and sixpence. On Sundays we went to St Chad's Church for Holy Communion, home for breakfast and back again for Sunday school at 11

o'clock, Miss Seabury was the Sunday school teacher, she also taught at the village school for over 50 years. In the evening a bus came to pick us up for Evensong at St. Michael's, the church would be full. We also went to Sunday school at the Methodist chapel in Haughton, and took part in the anniversary, I still remember the enthusiastic singing, and all in our best dresses especially bought or made for the occasion. In our teens, my sister and I were Sunday school teachers at St. Chad's, to about fifteen children. In later years, I had the privilege to be Chapel Warden there for twenty vears.

In the 50s, we started our teenage years. leaving school and going to work. From Hen Barnes it was a 3 mile bike ride to catch the bus at West Felton, (I met my husband Sid waiting for that bus to Nesscliffe Army Camp where my sister Mary and I worked. We married in 1960). But on a Friday night it was off to a village dance, sometimes Felton, Knockin or Ruyton. A crowd of us would set off with perhaps 2 bikes between 6 or 8 of us, we took turns with the bike, riding so far then leaving it for the next girls. (No easy feat with all our frilly petticoats, which was the fashion). No one to run us around in cars in those days, you walked, biked if you had one, or stayed at home. But on a Saturday night there was a bus from Hen Barnes, off we would go to the Plaza or Victoria Rooms, sometimes 'the pictures', returning on the last bus at 11pm. You must remember all places of entertainment had to close before midnight on a Saturday because of the Sunday laws.

My brother bought a car in the 1950s, I

#### **LETTERS TO THE NEW KING**

Over the past year the church has sponsored three competitions for children from West Felton School. These have been in connection with the Platinum Jubilee, Christmas and most recently the coronation. The entries have been divided into junior and senior groups and the church has provided cash prizes for the top three entries in each group. Prizes have been awarded at special services held in the church and the exhibits from all the children, not just the prize winners have been on display. Much credit must go to Helen Hughes, head teacher, and her staff for arranging the topics, to the children for entering into the competition with such enthusiasm and to Patricia and Rob Hicks for their sterling efforts in preparing the 'washing line' (complete with clothes pegs) from which to hang the pictures. Thanks must also be due to the judges. Judging was always the worst moment whenever I was asked to speak at meetings. There was always a competition that I was asked to judge at the end – flowers, walking sticks etc. Inevitably one competitor was delighted whilst five ended up thinking I was the most unenlightened man on earth.

The most recent competition invited the junior children to design a £5 note for the new reign. Novel designs there were a plenty. Some would have tested the ability of any forger and all were colourful. One entrant produced a picture that caused all who beheld it ex-

claim 'that's Prince Charles'!

The more senior children were invited to write a letter to the King telling him what their hopes were for his reign. Some correspondents attributed more power to him than a King has these days. What did strike many observers was the neatness of the handwriting, together with the excellent spelling. Interesting too were the subjects that the children chose to draw to the King's attention. Inevitably the children may have been exposed to certain topics as part of their school curriculum. Many letters asked the King to intervene in more than one problem. Others, when addressing an issue, suggested that the King might visit someone, usually Mr Putin, and give them a good telling off as a Head teacher might deal with an unruly pupil.

Looking through all the letters, there were themes that came through. It was not possible to work out proper statistics since not all children may have produced a letter. In addition attributing a sex to a child can be difficult since some names can be either male or female and some children wrote about more than one subject. Of the individual topics, stopping war was pre-eminent, followed by concern over trees, and this applied to both girls and boys. Various aspects of the environment including trees, oceans, climate and litter came second for both sexes, with only a few mentioning oil. Concerns over deprivation were less frequently mentioned,

dog was fastened in when they came. But one day a black airman came for eggs when the dog was out, but strangely, the dog and airman took a fancy to one another. After several visits the airman asked if he could have the dog, as he was very fond of it, so away up the road went the airman on his bicycle with Spider tucked under his arm.

Every evening before dark, a bucket of water was drawn from the well (no tap water then) and placed by the back door, with a cover over it. One night we heard a noise outside but because Dad was not at home Mum did not go to investigate. Next morning there was high excitement: a prisoner of war had been found in a aircraft at Rednal airfield with a box of pepper in his pocket "to throw in someone's eyes if he was caught" so the tale went. But we did wonder whether the prisoner had had a drink from our bucket of water before heading across the field to the aircraft. There were a lot of prisoners of war working on the farms, just ordinary lads a long way from home and glad to be out of the fighting. During the harvest times they were fed with the rest of the workmen around the big kitchen table, one of them called Henry continued to write after the war and my aunt was Godmother to his first son.

Because my Mum and Dad were such lovely people they were frequently asked by the airmen who came to the house, if their families could come for a holiday to have a break from the cities and all the bombing, no one was ever refused. Looking back I wonder, "where did we put them all?"

One night the siren went and the drone of the aeroplanes was heard, but this

time they dropped a bomb at Hen Parks leaving a massive crater, they were apparently trying to hit the main railway line, to stop supplies, that one was a little close for comfort. As mentioned, Rednal was a training airfield, and unfortunately crashes were pretty frequent, but there are two that remain in my memory: Sergeant Stanley Paul Lister crashed into the farm building at Haughton Farm. The rescuers were unable to reach him for the flames. There is now a plaque to his memory on the farm building. The other was the day a bomber crashed into Tedsmore woods killing all on board. A few of us children went next day to see the plane, I shall always remember the tail of the craft hanging from the trees and debris strewn around; it was a very subdued bunch of children who returned home. I remember going to a circus on the airdrome in one of the big hangers, I think it must have been after the war, just as the airfield was winding down. I had never seen an elephant before, it was marvellous. I can also remember Mum coming home from Oswestry with a bunch of bananas, we had never seen any of these before either, what a treat.

We were very lucky during the war, we never went short of anything foodwise, because we had our own produce from our smallholding, and fruit in abundance, which was picked, bottled, jammed and stored for the winter. Nearly everyone was self-sufficient, having chickens and sometimes a pig to fatten and kill, then along came Mr Huxley to slaughter the poor thing, we were always sent out of the way on that day, but to country children it was all part of our way of life. At the age of five, we all went off to the

although these concerns were more commonly mentioned by girls. It was girls who specifically mentioned cost of living. The youngest group was more concerned about war than the oldest. The environment caused more grief to the oldest group whereas unease about animals featured in some of the younger children's letters. Although this is a farming area, anxiety about farmers and farming did not feature strongly.

When the late Queen came to the throne in 1952. I don't remember being asked to write a letter to her with my hopes for her reign. Having just come through the war and the even tighter rationing after the war, peace would have been uppermost in my mind. This as much as to allow for more of certain foodstuffs. Sweets only came off the ration in 1954. Around that time I remember being taken to an ice cream parlour by my parents. My eyes lit upon neither would I have done so in 1952. ◆

a 'Knickerbocker glory'. When my father learnt that this cost half a crown (£3.90 in today's money), he exploded and I had to make do with a 3d (0.39p today) wafer. I cannot recollect environmental concerns or deprivation being high on the list, though coming from a farming family I am sure that ensuring farmers did well would have featured.

Five hundred years ago, Pope Leo X had just awarded Henry VIII the title of Defender of the Faith for his treatise against Martin Luther's ideas. The initials F.D. still appear on our coinage. Yet England was on the threshold of the mightiest change in religion for a thousand years. Perversely F.D. no longer refers specifically to the Catholic creed. In 1546, following Henry's break with Rome, parliament conferred the title on Henry. Certainly no child called upon the sovereign to uphold the Faith and

# MEMORIES

by Mrs Ann Evans

I was born at the Old Farm, West Felton, but my family, the Lindops, moved to Hen Barnes in 1939, and although our childhood was spent during the war years, what a wonderful time we had, so much freedom to wander over the fields and woods, summer months bathing in the river Perry.

We were well used to the wail of the siren to warn of enemy aircraft on their way to bombing raids on Liverpool, the search lights lighting up the sky, the distinctive sound of spitfires taking off and landing, the shock of young inexperienced pilots crashing. Because we were young it was accepted as part of life. On one occasion an aircraft crashed in the long meadow belonging to my Uncle Fred, the young pilot crawled from the plane and my Aunty Min took him in the car to the hospital; sadly the young pilot died. Just as they were taking the aircraft away, another crashed in the same field; fortunately, the pilot was unhurt. I remember as a child running to see the plane and the airman lifting me up to look inside. On the nights of air raids the neighbours would all get together for a cup of tea and a chat or to play cards. It was not all doom and gloom for us children, we had a marvellous time. We spent our days playing hopscotch or hares and hounds. No need of computer games or television to occupy us, we were never bored. The Antrobus family lived next door and in the holidays Barbara, Gladys and Margaret Davies who lived at the Pump House would put on a concert for the neighbours in the barn. The summer days always seemed to be hot

and long and in winter, snow to make snowmen or frozen pools to skate on, only wandering home when we were hungry.

We had our chores to do, collecting sticks to light the fire in the morning, no electricity in those days, every thing was cooked on the open fire; the washing was done in the boiler house where a fire was lit under the old boiler to boil the clothes. And in the evening, going down the field to fasten the chickens in for the night. Looking back how did our mothers find time to do everything? My mother, as well as looking after the family and household, also ran a smallholding doing the milking and feeding pigs and poultry, harvesting with horses when everyone joined in. Mum used to make beer for the harvest and weeks before corks would be popping from bottles at all hours of the day and night.

Dad worked hard, he left home about 5 o'clock in the morning to cycle to Marchweil near Wrexham to work as a fitter, not getting home until 7 or 8 o'clock at night; some weeks we would only see him at weekends. We were in bed when he went in the morning and when he came home at night.

Mum used to sell eggs, and the airmen from the airfield at Rednal came to buy them. We had quite a ferocious dog called Spider; mum had to make sure the
