BLEASBY PARISH COUNCIL - BEING PART OF ALL OUR FUTURES

In much the same way as many of you have set about making New Year's resolutions, the Parish Council is currently taking stock of locally relevant issues, reflecting upon its achievements and disappointments and preparing the way for the continuing welfare, progress and viability of our parish community. Looking ahead, and planning for the future, is not only a positive approach to life, but also an essential component of Parish Council business. Consequently, the construction and implementation of the Parish Plan has been a major platform upon which to build and apply this wisdom.

As you will gather from the Parish Plan Steering Group's article further on in this edition, the results of the parish consultation exercise have confirmed that road safety, potential flooding and the maintenance of village assets continue to be the expressed priorities of the community. And so the Council will be directing its focus on these three issues during the coming year. Additional articles from the Flood Action Group and the emerging Traffic Safety and Management Group will confirm that the focus on, and progress in, these areas is already underway. We do hope that you will rally around these two groups' initiatives as the year progresses.

Effective communication within and across the parish and between the groups will be critical to the success of any of the PP projects envisaged. To enable every one of us to feel informed, become involved and easily contribute to the emerging debate and planning, the Council is also focussing on improving 'connectivity' and networking through upgraded website facilities.

Our Parish Clerk, Belina Boyer, after three and a half years of service, left the Council at the end of 2018. Subsequently the PC has employed a temporary minuting clerk, Lynn Holland, who will support all official meetings, whilst councillors will be covering other aspects of the clerk's role until a new appointment can be made. Please contact me if you would like to know more about this position which will be advertised shortly.

The PC continues to be one member short; we would very much welcome the opportunity to co-opt an enthusiastic individual to work with us until May at least when the present councillors' terms of office come to a close and each of us will have to consider whether or not to stand again for office. This is a chance for parishioners to stand for election and we would urge you to think about standing or, failing that, encouraging some likely person to put themselves forward with your nomination. This is a great opportunity to make a significant contribution to your village and to help shape the future of Bleasby Parish.

We would encourage you to come along to our regular 'second-Monday in the month' meeting to get some insight into the workings of the PC and to bring forward your views and ideas as a member of the public - just as a band of eight to a dozen

parishioners do so at present, bringing fresh perspectives and prompting fresh initiatives such as last month's appeal for more effective recycling of plastics by the responsible authorities and the suggested adoption of the railway station by villagers.

Succession planning within all our groups and organisations is really important: we all look to the next generation of active supporters coming forward to build on the firm foundations of existing organisations and groups, an established Parish Plan, a strong community spirit and, at least, a thousand year history. Let us work together with common objectives and mutual support to ensure a happy, safe and secure community - no matter what Brexit might bring!

He goes off the other way and ends up at the Roman military outpost for his region. OVERVIEW OF PARISH PLAN CONSULTATION RESULTS

Following the publication of the results summary of the initial Parish Plan Questionnaire in July 2018, parishioners were invited to attend one of two Parish Plan consultation meetings in November or to give feedback online over a period of two weeks. Thanks to all the people, representing 55 households, who contributed to this recent further consultation - either in person at the Village Hall events or online - the Parish Plan Steering Group has now been able to forward its observations to the Parish Council in order for it to discuss the final priorities and cost implications.

The three areas that you consider to be of the greatest importance are:

- Maintenance of Village Assets – including upkeep of Glebe Field, Jubilee Ponds, open spaces etc, (65.45%) – 36 households
- Road Safety – speeding, and parking, (52.73%) - 29 Households
- Flooding and Sewerage (47.27%) – 26 households.

(Support for the 6 other areas ranged from 21 to 4 households)

In order to resource these priorities, 34 households (61.82%) thought that the precept should be increased to allow enhancement, 13 considered an increase to allow additional funding, whilst 8 households opted for the standstill basic increase.

It is encouraging to note a further number of people willing to give up their time to help the community – either at events (22), helping with village maintenance (11), and the church grounds (4), joining groups to help establish a ‘Help a Neighbour scheme’ (12), or a ‘Community Lift’ scheme (8). Other important ways to contribute also attracted a good response – helping in a flood emergency (13), finding out more about being involved with a Neighbourhood Watch Group (7), and, most reassuringly, 10 people are interested in defibrillator training. 16 households wished to be contacted by the Countryside and Footpaths Group.

2 households omitted to leave their contact details on their response forms – if you think this could be you, PLEASE contact Charlotte Gent on charlotte.gent@btinternet.com so that you can be included at the next stage!

Once again, many thanks for all the helpful responses and comments without which there could have been no Parish Plan.

JUBILEE PONDS — FEATHERED FOREIGN FRIENDS AND FUR-COATED FIENDS

Winter is now beginning to bite with walkers around the Ponds becoming increasingly difficult to recognise, obscured as they are by weathershield apparel – transforming each individual into dumpy accumulations of layered clothing, hands mittened or hidden deep in pockets, facial characteristics lost behind steamed glasses, oppressive headgear and high coiled scarves.

Our birdlife has also become similarly rounded as plumage is fluffed up to trap insulating warm air and body profile compacted to reduce heat loss. They may look chubby and well-fed but not so - now is the critical cusp between survival and extinction, with shortened daylight hours for foraging, impenetrable frosted ground conditions, wind-chill factor at maximum and natural cover at a minimum.

Many more migrating birds have arrived to seek respite from deteriorating conditions on the continent and the higher latitudes. Our orchards are full of fieldfares and redwings, together with an influx of visiting blackbirds and songthrushes. Our waterfowl population has been significantly increased by incoming flocks of tufted duck, gadwall and goosander – even the odd pair of the once numerous pochard – whilst on our remaining meadows and boggy ground the wigeon and teal can be found, along with snipe with now, unfortunately, only a handful of piercing voiced lapwings.

By running water grey wagtails can be glimpsed seeking slimpicking sustenance. The spectacular great white egret may be spotted lumbering into flight, while the smaller, yellow-footed little egrets skulk and cower on the shallow margins. But from whence come these raucously gagging Egyptian geese – out of Egypt and out of favour?

Meanwhile, in brazen manner, a broad furred head breaks the surface of the fishing club's stockpond and swims in full sight to the bankside where it pauses defiantly in full view, its shining dark brown pelt glistening in the sun, eyes reflecting the sparkle of sunlight and its uniform coat only interrupted by a patched white chin. Here is the North American alien released into our countryside and conveyed through our network of water channels to every part of the land, almost wiping out our once common "Ratty", the water-vole, from swathes of the countryside and seriously damaging fish stocks, ravaging waterside nestlings and usurping the ecological niches of our native predators. The mink . . . escaped (or released) from fur-farms, now that fashionable, warm-fur, winter-wear has become decidedly non PC! Once a beauty – now a beast!


Lastly thank you to everyone who contributed to the success of all this year's events – without you they simply won't happen.

BLEASBY FLOOD ACTION GROUP WINTER UPDATE

Our small band of volunteers met in January to review the winter flooding risks and activities. Many parishioners walk around the paths and fields and keep us updated if there is a fallen tree or the ditches or dykes are backlogged. Thank you for doing that and, please, all of you continue to help us keep the water flowing by reporting any problems you see.

It is now two years since the burst water main on Main Street: we got very prompt action that day as multiple people reported it. The services respond to a **VOLUME** of calls. The more people call, the quicker it gets sorted! If you have an issue call Severn Trent Water straight away and please don't assume someone else has done it.

Notts County Council and Newark and Sherwood DC are continually reviewing policies and procedures for emergencies. We do the same. **It becomes more obvious that if there is a crisis, we have to help ourselves locally first.** There are very limited resources out there to help us. To this end we are updating our emergency plan and list of emergency volunteers. We haven't done this for a while. As with any community we rely on volunteers and all us flood wardens are ten years older than we were when we started. Two have retired so **we would welcome anyone who would like to be a volunteer flood warden or volunteer to get in**


touch. It just means being able to help if there is a crisis – it's not a regular commitment. **If you have moved into Bleasby since 2007 and want to help... we need to know.**

Equally we are redrawing up our list of vulnerable or at risk households. If you think you would struggle to help yourself in a flood then get in touch so we know that, should the need arise.

Lastly feedback from the Parish Plan showed that 20% of households had flooded at some point and 27% of them involved sewage. **That is 1 in 4...** We all affect our friends and neighbours by our actions in what we flush down the toilet. **Please do not flush wipes or sanitary wear or any other items not designed for that purpose. The consequences for us all are horrid if you do!**

To report a leak or issue with sewage or water supply call **Severn Trent 08007834444**. To report blocked ditches or dykes in Bleasby Parish or to find out more about volunteering or being an emergency contact call Elaine France on 830303, Alison Sutherland on 831026 or Peter Cast on 830284.





The new Countryside and Footpaths Group is using a Bleasby centred map which was specially commissioned from the company “The Yellow Walk Maps”.

Members of the group are finding it very useful – most other maps place Bleasby annoyingly on the edge of two sheets. The maps are small enough to go in any pocket and have their own little folder. They are also water resistant. A must for any walker!

These maps are locally available at the Bookcase at Lowdham and can be bought for the very reasonable price of £3.99.

Bleasby has a walking group (open to everyone) which meets on the third Sunday of each month. BLEASBY PARISH COUNCIL ONE – SPEEDING DRIVERS NIL

Speeding is a problem that is universal to modern village life. Bleasby Parish Council has been working extremely hard - writing letters, emails, making phone calls, meeting highways representatives, arranging data collection and so on - in response to so many villagers' requests to tackle speeding. We are very pleased to report that two Radar Speed/driver feedback signs will be installed in the village (one of them imminently) in order to caution speeding drivers between the level crossing and the Goverton entrance to the parish. This type of sign is being used across the country because they are effective at slowing speeding drivers down.

There is no single, simple solution to all speeding problems which satisfies residents, is effective and meets good engineering practices and standards. However, at least this is a step in the right direction. The results of the Parish Plan consultation have been extremely valuable in gathering residents' experiences, evidence, opinions, ideas and positive responses to volunteering in the future. Proposals include forming a 'Speed Watch Group' as community involvement is an important component of any traffic calming programme. If people are involved, the chance for problem resolution and a successful traffic calming programme is greatly improved. Often problems cited are ones of perception and not fact, and the solution proposed could be ineffective or even counter-productive. Please get in touch with the Parish Council or me if you would like to be involved with this particular initiative to take speed checks and to define the necessary statistics to support our case.

We strongly support a responsible and safety-conscious approach to driving. People should drive cautiously and at a moderate speed through villages, and especially on narrow rural roads, drivers should always keep at or below a safe stopping speed judged by the hazard free distance that can be seen ahead, and to take special care in areas where pedestrians, horse-riders and cyclists are present, or are likely to be present.

The results of the Parish Plan consultation meetings and the online questionnaire have confirmed that road safety remains a high priority and, to this end, our intention is to set up a proactive 'focus group' to engage with this task, explore the suggestions and ideas of the many PP respondents, the results of the Speed Watch Group and help formulate a Traffic Safety and Management strategy for the parish. 
Head, Mr Sam Mensah, said the MP had been met by school prefects, who had asked questions about Mr Jenrick and his job and were given very detailed responses.



EXCERPT FROM KATHARINE MORRIS' DIARY

February 12th 1935 – Evening: lights glowing rosy in lower windows; it is not yet dark. There is a great stillness over the farms, the feed-stacks that have grown less and less and the foreshortened piles of roots in the dim patches of light between the clouds and the water lying so still in ponds and dikes. There comes the thin, plaintive bleat of a tiny lamb across the yard; a heavy breathing from the bull and the thick, noiseless rustle of straw trodden under heavy hoofs. The home-field is fresh-harrowed, green and silver lanes under the long evening light where the big pair of cart-horses, released from labour, are pulling on the fodder that the waggoner has brought to them before he too goes home for his tea. Owls cry, brief intermittent sounds, almost as frail and plaintive as the new-born lambs, from distant tree tops.
