A "SUPPORT IT OR LOSE IT" MESSAGE FOLLOW UP From Boughton Malherbe Parish Council Chair.

Thank you so much to those of you who rang me to thank me for my "Support it or Lose it" article in the July Malherbe Monthly, it was much appreciated.

However, I have been advised that we do still have a regular milk home delivery service combined with other essential products from a company called Milk and More, who will deliver **On Line** orders in our area on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday before 7.00am and leave them on your doorstep, or an alternative safer place by arrangement.

Like myself, I am sure many of you were unaware of this very useful service.

Milk and More do not supply products in single use plastic packaging. Everything is able to be re-used and/or recycled to achieve zero waste. For example, your milk will be delivered in glass bottles and when you have used them they can be left out for collection when you next have a delivery, they will then be sterilised, refilled and re enter the delivery chain. When no longer usable they get recycled. The same principles apply to all packaging.

News from your local MP – Helen Whatley

Hoping for cooler and calmer times ahead

A week is a long time in politics, and these past few weeks in Westminster have felt particularly long.

Earlier this month I resigned from Government, after two and a half years as a Minister. Throughout that time my first responsibility has been to my constituents in Faversham and Mid Kent, but being a Minister gives you opportunities to do more - not only for your constituents but for people across the country. So resigning was hard to do.

Over the last few months my inbox has had a steady flow of emails criticising the Prime Minister, particularly for things that went on in 10 Downing Street during the pandemic. Anyone who has written to me will know that I have defended Boris Johnson, accepted his apologies and pointed to his vision and leadership of the country through difficult times.

But there are only so many times a leader can apologise and move on. I felt that moment had been passed. We now have a leadership contest giving us the chance to reunite between a new leader, and I'm proud to be backing Rishi Sunak to be our next Prime Minister.

I have known Rishi since 2015 when we were both elected to Parliament and have worked alongside him in the Treasury. Right now the biggest challenges facing us are about the economy, and crucially how we tackle the rising cost of living. The next Prime Minister will need to get inflation under control, get our economy growing and bring down the debts we built up through the pandemic. I know Rishi is up to the job. His grip of economic questions and his judgement is second to none.

While I may no longer be in Government, I'm continuing to work hard as your local MP. In the past few weeks, I've asked a number of parliamentary questions, including what is being done to improve access to primary care services and NHS dentists in Faversham and Mid Kent.

Parliament is now on summer recess, but there is plenty of work to do away from Westminster – from fighting our corner about Operation Brock, to getting investment in our wastewater network, and supporting people struggling with the cost of living.

Summer got off to a great start with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Weekend. I dropped into some of the fabulous events, and wow they were wonderful - from

beacon lightings and tree plantings, to fetes, fairs and street parties, proms in parks and uplifting church services. Huge thank you to everyone involved particularly to event organisers who I know spent months planning and preparing to make it all happen on the day.

It was great to be back at the Kent Show earlier this month after two years away because of Covid. It gave me the chance to catch up with some of our local farmers. Concerns about the shift to the new Environmental Land Management scheme and access to labour were top of the list, and I'll be taking these up with ministers when Parliament returns in the autumn.

Faversham at one time held the top spot for having the highest recorded temperature in the UK. But all records have been smashed following the recent heatwave. Our emergency services have been doing a truly outstanding job coping with increased calls in extreme heat.

Both in Westminster and across the country, I'm hoping for cooler and calmer times ahead. I wish you all a very enjoyable summer.

Google Digital Garage comes to Maidstone

It was great to co-host a Google Digital Garage at the Hazlitt Arts Centre in Maidstone. Digital Coaches from Google brought free digital skills training to over 70 local businesses, the largest Digital Garage event that Google have hosted so far this year.

The event was designed to help people grow their business online and find new customers, with topics ranging from social media strategy to tips on Google analytics.

It was such a pleasure chatting to some of our amazing local entrepreneurs. I'm determined for them to have the tools they need to succeed as we re-set our economy, increase productivity, and boost growth.

Unwelcome return for Operation Brock

It's hugely frustrating that owing to problems with French border police at Dover, Operation Brock has once again been needed.

On Friday 22 July I called a meeting with Kent County Council, the Kent Resilience Forum, and local Parish Councils for an update on the situation and to give local councillors the opportunity to express their concerns.

I've stressed to local authorities that we need better enforcement to stop lorries using local roads which are completely unsuitable for HGVs, as well as a long-term long solution to end the traffic problems on our roads once and for all.

My Business Newsletter takes off

I've launched a new quarterly newsletter for businesses in Faversham and Mid Kent. I'm starting these updates in addition to my surgeries, meetings and visits - to keep local businesses up to date on what's going on, both at a national level and here in the constituency.

I know when you're busy it can be hard to keep up to date with all the support available, so they're packed full of helpful information on Government grants and support, as well as local business events.

More support for electric vehicles

I've written to Parish Councils across Faversham and Mid Kent to encourage them to apply to the Government's On-Street Residential ChargePoint Scheme.

Under the scheme, 60 per cent of the installation costs are met by funds from the Department for Transport, with some charge points being installed completely free of charge to the local community thanks to arrangements with energy suppliers.

The Chairman opened meeting at 7.30 pm

M01/07/22 Apologies

Apologies from Cllr Prendergast (Kent County Council) and Cllr Round Maidstone Borough Council) were received and accepted.

M02/07/22 Declarations:

Any lobbying - none declared

Any interest in items on the Agenda - none declared

Any changes to the register of pecuniary interests - Cllr Turner had completed a new Notification of Disclosable Pecuniary Interests form

M03/07/22 Approval of Minutes

RESOLVED: the Minutes of the Annual Meeting held on 30th May 2022 were taken as read, confirmed and signed as being an accurate record of the proceedings.

M04/07/22 Public Session - one member of public present

Mr Jon Thompson, Chairman of Grafty Green Village Hall Committee gave the background to the request for funding for the Hall centenary celebration. He spoke about the importance of the Hall to the local community and the difficulties of maintaining a 100 year-old building. However, the Committee wished to hold a birthday celebration. Mr Thompson confirmed that the event would be free to attend but there would be a charge for refreshments. There was some discussion of Village Hall finances. Mr Thompson stated that the Village Hall was holding some reserves but wanted to be sustainable.

M05/07/22 Request for grant towards Village Hall Centenary Celebrations

Cllr Turner stated that he would not vote on the matter due to his position as treasurer of the Village Hall Committee.

RESOLVED: to award a grant of £500 towards the Village Hall centenary celebration.

M06/07/22 Planning Outcomes since 30th May 2022

Noted that 22/501707/PNMA Prior notification for the change of use from Commercial, Business and Service (Use Class E) to bedroom for existing residential dwelling (Use Class C3) for Post Office, Headcorn Road, Grafty Green, ME17 2AN had been granted.

M07/07/22 Local Policing/Community

Police/Crime Report: It was noted that 1 crime had been reported.

Speedwatch: Cllr Kennaird reported that one volunteer had come forward with another possible plus himself. He would be undertaking training once he had two other confirmed volunteers.

M08/07/22 Liverton Hill, Ditches, gullies, potholes

Councillors reported possible water leaks on Liverton Hill and at the entrance to Ash Tree Farm.

RESOLVED: Cllr Trzebinski to raise with South East Water

The large pothole at the junction of Headcorn Road and Eastwood Road was noted.

RESOLVED: Cllr Adams to inspect.

M09/07/22 59 Bus

Councillors had before them Mr John Collins' report. The Chairman expressed regret that the service terminus was at Morrison's and not in the centre of Maidstone. He reported that he had written a letter to Cllr Prendergast but other Councillors stated that they had not seen it. Cllr Eastwood stated that the report for KCC Cabinet had not mentioned the 59 service being a KCC instigated pilot scheme so the Cabinet Member making the decision on its future would be doing so without being aware of that important fact. RESOLVED: Cllr Trzebinski to write to KCC, including dual-hatted MBC and KCC Members, to make them aware of people's views.

M10/07/22 Litter

Councillors observed that the effects of the Lengthsman's litter picking were noticeable! RESOLVED: the Clerk to pass on Councillors' observations to the Lengthsman.

M11/07/22 Highways Improvement Plan

There were no changes to be made.

RESOLVED: the Clerk to chase up the signage at the junction of Crumps Lane and Headcorn Road and also the repainting of the central white lining that is needed from some distance back towards Headcorn up to and round the bend so that drivers can judge the road properly.

M12/07/22 Footpaths

Councillors noted the importance of maintaining the footpath between Headcorn Road and Woodcock Lane. The grass had recently been cut by a group of volunteers from the Ramblers.

RESOLVED: the Clerk to ask the Lengthsman if he would be able to maintain the footpath by, for example, strimming every other month.

RESOLVED: the Clerk to ask KCC who is responsible for footpath maintenance.

M13/07/22 Councillor Reports on any External Meetings attended and MBC Councillor's Report

The Chairman reported that he had attended a councillors' conference in Lenham, at which the main topic under discussion was the cuts in rural bus services.

Cllr Trzebinski reported that, since the recent elections, the Conservative group held a majority of seats on Maidstone Borough Council. Work started last year was continuing and a Cabinet structure was in place. 1,000 houses for Maidstone were being progressed. Cllr Trzebinski had been appointed to 4 committees; Cllr Round was working hard looking at parks and open spaces, including staging concerts, events etc and had organised Headcorn Air Show.

Grafty Gourmet

This is a great summer dessert recipe. If preferred, it can be made in one single large dish and baked for approximately 15 minutes more.

Raspberry, Lime & Coconut Dessert

Ingredients

60g of butter, softened, plus extra to grease 200g of caster sugar 3 medium free-range eggs, separated Grated zest and juice of 3 limes 125g of self-raising flour 4 tablespoons of desiccated coconut, plus extra toasted to serve 300ml of whole milk 200g of fresh raspberries

Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°C fan. Beat together the butter and sugar in a large mixing bowl until light and fluffy. Add the egg yolks, one at a time, beating well between additions. Beat in most of the lime zest and all the juice, then gently mix in the flour, coconut and milk.
- 2. In another clean bowl, whisk the egg whites to soft peaks, then gently fold into the batter in 2 batches until just combined.
- 3. Place 4 ramekins/bowls into a roasting tin. Divide the raspberries into each bowl, then top with the pudding mixture. Pour boiling water into the roasting tin so it comes halfway up the sides of the ramekins/bowls. Bake for 18-22 minutes until golden. Sprinkle with extra toasted coconut and the remaining lime zest to serve.

Windows 11 – How to Install and main changes Go to: Upgrade to the New Windows 11 OS | Microsoft

Before you upgrade you will be prompted to "Check for Upgrade.

Step 1: The "Check for Upgrade Now" button, will prompt you to Open Settings, say Yes

You can take a look at the "<u>new look, features and enhanced security</u>" article, linked on this page to see exactly what will be changing with some more advanced features, especially for people who use multiple applications at the same time, described in last month's article.

Step 2: Click on Download and Install and accept the Licence Terms. This will start the download, the percentage download is shown at the top of the settings page.

Step 3: You will need to restart to complete the installation which you can do straighaway to have it schedule for later. The restart will take some also because it is like a large update.

How long does it take: I downloaded it from the internet (and we all know that we still don't have the best internet connection in this village) and it took me a very long time. The internet information I found said it could take up to an hour and half in total, my experience was longer.

If you are installing from a USB installation drive, on a powerful computer, I read that this should not take any longer than 20mins, but I have not tested this.

The main user experience changes are:

Taskbar - This is now in the centre, it can be moved back to the left if you don't like.

Start Menu - has been reworked, it is much cleaner and fresher, and better than the tiled version in Windows 8, but it does not show windows labels any more.

Systems Tray - which is found in the bottom right, has been reworked, the systems notification area is clearer, the calendar is included and the systems shortcuts are a lot cleaner too eg: when you select the volume or WiFi button, this lets you make quick changes.

Widgets - This is a return from Windows 7, widgets are small apps that pop up showing things like news and weather when you select it from the taskbar.

Additional improvements include, the Apps Store, Xbox included, Direct Storage which speeds up load time for gamers and **finally** there are new

animations throughout that make using windows feel more fluid and dynamic. Many system icons have been redesigned to look more modern.

Word on the street is that it is worth doing for the speed and animations if your a gamer or you rely on audio visuals in your applications, but possibly not worth it if your happy with the speed at which things are working and being downloaded with Windows 10. This month's anniversary is August 22nd, the date on which Claude Debussy was born 1862 in Saint-Germain-en-Laye, France. He was among the most influential composers of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Born to a family of modest means and little cultural involvement, Debussy showed enough musical talent to be admitted at the age of ten to France's leading music

college, the Conservatoire de Paris. He originally studied the piano, but found his vocation in innovative composition, despite the disapproval of the Conservatoire's conservative professors. He took many years to develop his mature style and was nearly 40 when he achieved international fame in 1902 with the only opera he completed, Pelléas et Mélisande.

Debussy's orchestral works include Prélude à l'après-midi d'un faune (1894), Nocturnes (1897–1899) and Images (1905–1912). His piano works include sets of 24 Préludes and 12 Études. Throughout his career he wrote mélodies based on a wide variety of poetry, including his own. A small number of works, including the early La Damoiselle élue and the late Le Martyre de saint Sébastien have important parts for chorus. In his final years, he focused on chamber music, completing three of six planned sonatas for different combinations of instruments.

Christian Message August 2022

Double rest

There's a passage of scripture in the Old Testament (it's in 1 Kings 19) that tells the story of the great prophet Elijah after he has had it out with the opposing prophets of Baal. The queen at the time is furious and threatens to kill him and he flees. He flees his companions, his enemies and perhaps also himself. He arrives in the mountains exhausted, physically and emotionally, and falls asleep. When he wakes, we are told that he is fed by birds, and he sleeps again. When he wakes the second time, he is able to pray and hear God in the situation. He goes on his way and all ends up an awful lot better than he had feared.

It seems to me that this little-read passage has much to say to us in our current times about what a friend of mine calls "double rest". In case you have been living in an extraordinary bubble, we have been facing opposition-everywhere it seems: in viruses, in war in Ukraine, in climate crises, in energy hikes, in spiralling costs of living, in strikes everywhere, and so on. Many of us feel as though we have been tackling many problems on our own territory too.

Many people feel tired. We need rest; we need <u>double-rest</u>. Well, we are in holiday season, but you may not be able to afford to go away twice (or even once). But we can still take time to rest deeply and doubly.

What might this mean to you? How might you take double-rest to recover? May it even be that you would encounter God as you do so?
