

SODC: WASTE MANAGEMENT CONTRACT

The minimum charge is £49.50 for up to 3 items and £9.50 for each additional item. There is a maximum of six items per collection day: if you have more than six, you'll need to book another collection day. Please note that a bed and mattress counts as 2 items and a three piece suite (consisting of 1 settee and 2 chairs) counts as 3 items.

Before you contact us to book your bulky waste collection, have a good think about whether you have any other big items to dispose of. Once we have processed your booking, we are unable to make any alterations or add any other items – even if you have only booked one or two items.

DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

Trial of longer lasting road surface

A West Oxfordshire road was resurfaced with a high performance material to test the product's suitability to increase the life of the highway.

New proposed rural bus services

OCC's 2023-24 budget included £800,000 for the provision of improved rural transport. For many communities this will herald the return of public transport coverage for the first time since 2016. Buses are likely to take the form of a minibus (16 seats, depending on demand and responses to tenders. OCC has reached out to Parish Councils for views on possible new services from Watlington to Thame and Reading.

HIFI Update

The government has intervened after Oxfordshire County Council's Planning and Regulation Committee resolved to refuse the County Council's planning application for four road and travel projects in and around Didcot, known as HIF1. The application will now be considered at a public enquiry by a government appointed Planning Inspector.

RECTOR'S PINT

At the beginning of September, I attended a small reunion of students from the sixth form College in Henley which I attended from 1976 - 1978. There were only ten of us, together with spouses and partners. I was very nervous about going, as I was rather on the fringe of things as a student, and I was rather thrown when a man I vividly remembered said to me "Simon Cronk, I have to confess I only half remember you". I was a bit flustered and attempted to remind him that we had in fact shared a group holiday together in Dawlish, where one of our number was then living. He had absolutely no memory of ever being in Dawlish! I really wish I had the presence of mind and been quick witted enough to ask "which half do you remember?" That was one of those golden opportunities which I think will probably never come again.

I did wince a bit at being told I was 'half remembered' but I went on to have a very happy afternoon, as we all did, with the hope that we will do it again. However, this did make me reflect on the value we put on being known and remembered. For some, this is crucial to their lives as they strive to leave a legacy, for good or ill, that will never be forgotten. For most of us, the reality is that in a relatively short period after we die, within a generation or two, we will have been forgotten. But there is another dimension to this which we do not see. As a Christian I believe that one of the fundamental realities of our faith is that we are known by God. In Isaiah 49:16 we read "Behold, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands". And in John 10:28 we read "I gave them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand". What is the true nature of our identity and security? Is it that we are remembered after 45 years by someone we never really knew in the first place, or that we are known by God? I know which one gets my vote.

Remembering will be at the centre of a special service we are having at 4.00pm St Mary's Great Milton on Sunday 5th November a service of Commemoration and Thanksgiving for the Departed, so a bit of advance notice for people to put in their diaries. This will be for anyone who wants to remember family and friends 'whom we love but see no longer'. We will hear names read and there will be an opportunity to light a candle of remembrance. Also, as we reflect on our own mortality, we will remember that in God's eyes we are fully and completely remembered.

FRIENDS OF WELLS FARM

October is a time of change for the reserve. The trees are beginning to prepare for winter and the leaves will start to change colour. They do this because they produce less green chlorophyll and draw down nutrients from their leaves back down into the trunk and roots ready for next spring. Two other main colours remain and these are produced by carotenes (yellow) and anthocyanins (reds and pinks). With shortening days a reduction in another chemical makes the joint between the leaf stem and the stalk change, producing fractures and eventually leading to the fall of the autumn leaves. Fallen leaves are then dragged underground by worms (surprisingly fast) or get consumed by various fungi, thus all of the remaining goodness gets recycled.

The remaining grey poplars towering over the pond at the bottom of Barn Field should have been removed by now. I was told by someone in the forestry industry many were planted in the late 70s to provide wood for matches that Bryant and May would use to make their matches. But smoking decreased and more people used lighters so demand plummeted. I think ours were planted between 1977 and 1981. SSEN also plan to do some more tree pruning to clear the lines around Blenheim and the allotments so be careful and don't get too close.

BBOWT plan to remove the asbestos sheeting form the side of the second barn as it is beginning to break off. At some point the barn will be improved. You will also notice that BBOWT cut some of the paths back last month to make it easier to walk around. As far as I am aware the livestock will not be returning yet but look out for the signs and keep you dogs on a lead to avoid worrying the livestock.

VIEW FROM VIEWS

Now with harvest done and dusted, except for our 2nd year of our current experiment into lupins that, will come to harvest about the time you read this, like all other crops this year they look promising, however the proof of the pudding is in the eating. As I have just mentioned crops looked better than they produced this year. The Winter Barley that looked so well all through the year I think was so good it could not hold it's selfup by the time of cutting and about 10-20% had fallen over and were on the ground before the combine could cut it the result being that we cut off their heads. The Winter wheat was just disappointing it also looked so well through the whole growing season but just did not yield, I think in fact had I walked the whole field, on a regular basis, I would have realised that it was not all that good. However judging by the national crop we were about average most of our colleagues suffered in the same way with the fickle weather this season. However I have to crow about the Oil Seed Rape not an outstanding average crop but again very respectable yield. What I must crow about is that as I will have mentioned many times before, due to pigeon damage in the spring I estimated that a 1/3 of the area would yield ½ a crop, when I worked this out with the tonnage, we harvested I was within 2% on 100 tonnes. Looking on the bright side except for about ½ the Rape crop all our harvest came in without the need to dry a grain, we were so lucky in this what has proved to be a very tricky time, and with the contractor that we employ. At the time of writing next year's Rape has been planted and eaten by Flee Beetle, we now have the tricky decision to take, do we re plant as it is now a little late, or hack it up and plant something else, if so what. I must add that we are by no means alone, it is reported as a nationwide problem, some crops have escaped, and luckily for George Farrant he has at least 2 good crops.

After such a long explanation of our Harvest, which is the most important time of year on our farm I must make mention of wildlife which I guess most readers are interested in. Well not a lot to mention as most birds now this year are either sheltering from the rain or the blistering heat. Once the crops were off we a number of Hares, and Partridges until, they found their way out of sight, the numbers of both which have been very low of late, also perhaps not quite so welcome, but great to see the number of deer we are accommodating. What is good though is to see the amount that wildlife has increased of late.

On the subject of conservation the great news is that we have recently formed what is known agriculturally as a "Farm Cluster". For the last few years there we 2 clusters on the River Thame, which only achieved a talking shop status, which some of us did not feel good enough, as the Government was encouraging us to do something. As a result it was decided that these should amalgamate and, employ a facilitator. With the help and mutual agreement with "River Thame Conservation Trust" (RTCT), the "Thame Catchment Farm Cluster" (TCFC) was formed with the "RTCT" allowing us the time of one of their senior project officers to be our facilitator. Already we have started

project called Landscape recovery which aims over the next few years enhancing the catchment of the Thame or extending the good works the "RTCT" is already doing, it is thought that there is substantial Government funding for this sort of initiative. This I think is all very exciting as it will give us farmers the finance to carry out works that we could not otherwise do. As an aside if it can be reproduced the picture is of a fish refuge, we dug only 4 years ago now it looks as if it has been there for ever, just shows how quickly nature takes over.

The big issue concerning us in this locality, is the threat of the development of Waterstock Golf Course. Firstly this was going to be a transport Hub, but now as did not seem to perhaps fit with the rural environment it is now to be a science Park, with residential, perhaps the developers thought this might be more acceptable. There are several questions we have to ask ourselves on the whole issue, is this area far too close to the "River Thame", will we be able to enforce the necessary measures to stop any pollution reaching the river with the existing infrastructure? When it is already under pressure from sewage pollution. Surely a Science Park would be better nearer other like facilities (Culham, Harwell, & Sandford). When we consider the transport hub this would be warehousing for the likes online shopping, the head of John Lewis has already suggested that we need a royal commission to investigate the demise of the high street. Then it could be argued do we need so many houses built when there are many left vacant for no apparent reason, either second homes or just an investment, this is really criminal when we are destroying the environment just to build houses for human beings. Is it not time we stopped and took stock, made sure all precautions were taken to avoid pollution, (sewage, proper drainage and control of surface water) before anymore development is allowed, developers have been allowed to get away without taking proper control of these issues.

Just as school were due to return, and the sunshine that many had been longing for came, we hit the problem of the safety of school buildings due to concerns over reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC). The potential disruption to education and the timing of the problem caused inevitable and understandable frustration. The Department for Education had been working to identify buildings which may have RAAC over the last year but the problem escalated with cases that came to light over the summer and at the end of all establishments with buildings with RAAC confirmed by a surveyor were advised to take the affected space out of use until suitable mitigations have been put in place. I think that this was a sensible precautionary step to protect the safety of everyone whilst adequate mitigations are being put in place. Whilst the concern was widespread thankfully once the list of affected places was published I was relieved to see that no schools in this constituency were affected.

Following the media coverage of the introduction of Ultra Low Emission Zones (ULEZ) I received a number of emails from constituents raising concerns on what is being seen by some as a war on motorists. I appreciate that a number of residents in this area do travel to London on a regular basis. The ULEZ in London means that for those who do not have a compatible vehicle there is now a charge of £12.50 a day to drive in these zones. As we have seen in the High Court challenge the size of the zone and the unavoidable negative economic impact on some residents makes the scheme contentious. The decision to introduce the scheme was entirely that of the Mayor of London and media reports of him seeking to hide research from Imperial College that questioned the beneficial environmental impact of the scheme simply led to the claims that it is nothing more than an anti-motorist cash cow.

From early days as an MP I have been very clear that in a rural area such as the Henley Constituency a car is not a luxury; it is an essential means of transport both locally and indeed for longer journeys where practical alternatives do not exist. Whilst we can argue for more public transport the geography and nature of people movement will always make it a challenge to provide an efficient and economic system that meets the diverse travel needs. We need, as always, to find a balance and do our best to bring people with us on change. Sadly when measures are introduced that seem to be excessive it leads to other more genuine measures being challenged too. Tackling air pollution is nothing new. The most recent Government Clean Air Strategy 2019 complements the Industrial Strategy, the Clean Growth strategy and the 25 Year Environment Plan. However the whole strategy is not just aimed at motorists, it is much wider.
