Parish Council



For me, the most dreaded word in the English language must be "consultation". Your Parish Council is bombarded with requests to respond to consultation on everything from planning to trains, from the proposed new civic complex in Tunbridge Wells to speed signage and traffic regulation orders. Consultation is now big business. It generates vast amounts of work at all levels of government. But there are several problems with this. The questions asked are frequently complex and lengthy such as in the recent local plan consultation. The first of a series. The consultation document was 55 pages long and the associated questionnaire was 25 pages. The second problem with all this bureaucracy is that responses often seem to descend into a black hole. There is seldom evidence that our views have changed policy or decisions. Too often the consultation process acts as a tick box allowing a local authority to impose unpopular decisions saying "well we went out to consultation".

The latest local plan consultation is on how to deliver the 13,000 additional homes that we are told are needed for the Borough. There is no box to tick to say that we don't want an additional 13,000 homes or 40,000 people at all. This would represent a tremendous increase in the size of villages such as ours. The Parish Council priority must be the provision of homes for our local people and their children.

TWBC has also issued a consultation document on its five-year plan for the Borough. Unfortunately this focusses on the town of Tunbridge Wells with only a passing reference to Cranbrook while Benenden is not mentioned at all.

It is on the needs of Benenden that the Parish Council has to concentrate. We will be helped in this by our Neighbourhood Development Plan. However this has to be consistent with the new TWBC local Plan, still in its early days, and national planning policy. So we don't have a free hand. The next stage in this is now taking place. Yes- you've got it - TWBC is now out for consultation as to whether we should have a NDP at all! This consultation runs from 26 June to 24 July, and hundreds of consultees have been identified. So why not join in and have your say also, see our website or contact me.

Rector's Letter



Life is to be lived

I do confess to feeling a little election fatigue of late! (Scottish Independence Referendum, September 2014; a general election in May 2015; Brexit in June 2016; another general election - with a surprising result! - in June 2017; and local elections in that period too.) You remember Brenda from Bristol: "You're joking - not another one! Honestly I can't stand this." Moreover, there is, of course, every prospect of another election in less than five years; people will start to moan about all this! However, just be grateful you live in a democracy and can enjoy having a choice.

In the same period, we have also had some surprising results in elections in other countries, one of which makes me concerned for the world's future and stability. We have also witnessed, on our televisions, huge numbers of refugees travelling across parts of Africa and the Middle East entering Europe and trying to cross the channel to the UK. We have witnessed atrocities of innocent people being killed by IS. In the last three months, we have seen three terrorist attacks taking place in our country: on Westminster Bridge and in the grounds of Parliament; at a concert enjoyed by many youngsters in Manchester; and on London Bridge and Borough Market. In these, so many innocent people have lost their lives and many others will have to deal with physical injuries and mental anguish and pain for probably the rest of their lives. In these attacks, we have witnessed the worst of human behaviour, but we have also witnessed humanity at its very best. We have seen a few individuals carrying out senseless, violent, brutal, murderous acts; but we have seen many, many more people showing love, compassion and care to complete strangers. And today, as I write this, we have seen again love and compassion in the community in West London as people have reacted to the devastating fire in a tower block. In all of these events, we have seen selfless acts by so many members of the emergency services and the public.

Humanity at is best is so beautiful; humanity at its worst can be utterly shocking. In one quote I have read today from London, a Paul Kipulu said, "There is nothing here but love; and I wanted to help." Oh that we could all take that attitude to living our lives, and it not take some tragedy to bring this out in us. All human life is valuable: whatever our culture, background, ethnicity, religion, sexuality, gender. I want to encourage you to live life; to enjoy life; to enjoy your family. None of us knows what is around the corner in our lives. So please, please - live in love. Life is too short, too fragile, too vulnerable, too precious to worry and argue about insignificant things. Life is to be lived and enjoyed - in harmony with everyone else.

The Roman Catholic Chapel

The white weather-boarded Roman Catholic Chapel in New Pond Road was built in 1931 by Mrs Ella Scrymsour-Nichol. It is a Colt building, designed by Messers Colt of Bethersden and is in the early English style, examples of which can also be seen in Gloustershire. The cost was approximately £450 and local labour was employed for its construction.

Before 1926 the nearest Catholic Mass centre to Benenden was Goudhurst and Mrs Scrymsour-Nichol was told that moving to Benenden would 'cut her off from the Church'. She took the risk and moved into the house then known as Our Lady's Dowry, now The Holt.

For the next few years she arranged with Father Mendham of Goudhurst to come over and say the occasional Mass in her garage. In 1931 with help from friends Mrs Scrymsour-Nichol purchased the land from the neighbouring farmers, the Henley's, and built the main body of the white weatherboarded building you see today. The Sacristy, at the far end, was added at a later stage. It was built 'for the Catholics of Benenden' and was dedicated to the memory of her husband. The Chapel stands in an acre of ground, which at the time she intended should include a school and a priest's house but these never materialised. The Chapel remained in the Parish of Goudhurst until 1963 when St Theodore's Catholic Church was built in Cranbrook and it became, and still is, part of St Theodore's Parish.

During the war Mr Blakemore, who was born in the house next door to the Chapel and still lives there, remembers British troops using the field for manoeuvres and in the 1970s his daughter remembers sitting on their garage roof to watch the filming of Anne of Green Gables. The Chapel was used twice for filming in the 1970s.

There have been five weddings in the Chapel. The first, in 1950, was that of Joanne Scrymsour-Nichol, Ella's daughter. Our daughter Charlotte was also married there in 2013 and our three children

To the memory of Mrs Scrymsour-Nichol who using her own resources and devoting much energy to the erection of this church in 1931 greatly benefited generations of the local Catholic community.

and their children have all been baptised in the Chapel, along with many others since 1931.

Mass is said at The Chapel every Sunday at 9am and every Holy Day at 7pm. Today the congregation is on average 20 to 25, with

Catholics not only from Benenden but many surrounding villages. There is coffee after Mass, at approximately 9.45am, on the first Sunday of every month, held outside in the summer months and around the pews in the winter to which everyone is most welcome to come and join us.





WALKHURST ROAD DECISION

The disappointing decision to allow a speculative developer to build 12 houses in Walkhurst Road, on a greenfield site; in the supposedly protected Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty; outside the limits to built development, is a worrying sign of the way things are going. Even more irksome was that this was not granted by a planning inspector on appeal but was passed by Tunbridge Wells Council's own Planning Committee. For technical reasons the usual protection for rural planning applications is being routinely overthrown. The borough does not have enough land identified in its plan to build the houses the government says it needs over five years. The local plan 2006-2026 anticipated building 6,000 houses - 300 a year. In 2015 a new government survey suddenly found the borough needed 13,000 houses. In the past a developer could be deterred from trying it on in sites like Walkhurst Road because it was not an officially identified site in the local plan and had all the protections. Now developers can override all these things because the Council does not have a five-year housing land supply. Thus appeals in Hawkhurst and Sissinghurst on similar sites have been decided in favour of the developer because housing provision overrides everything. It may be inevitable that planning inspectors grant these appeals but I strongly feel our own planning committee should not be colluding in the increasingly rapid potential ruination of rural areas. Applications like this which are against our policies should be turned down by our planners as a matter of principle. I fear that town-centred Tunbridge Wells Council is less attentive to the concerns of rural areas. We are presently debating where we will put 13,000 houses and I and most of the rural councillors will be arguing against scattering them among villages like Benenden.

ANYONE FOR STRAWBERRIES?

If the answer to that question is a resounding 'YES', then look no further than Benenden's Village Shop. The scrumptious strawberries sold at the shop are sourced by our local supplier PK Produce, from Hugh Lowe Farm in Maidstone. Hugh Lowe has supplied all the strawberries for Wimbledon, via their catering company, for over 20 years. At the farm the plants are protected by tunnels which also promote a favourable microclimate to prevent disease and encourage beneficial insects to control pests.

Strawberries are an excellent source of vitamins C and K as well as providing fibre, folic acid, manganese and potassium. They have long been used medicinally to help with digestive ailments, teeth whitening and skin irritations. They contain powerful antioxidants and are thought to protect against inflammation, cancer and heart disease.

Strawberries are not actually berries as their apparent 'seeds' are on the outside, reproducing instead by putting out runners. First cultivated in France, large strawberries were traditionally classed as a luxury item to be enjoyed only by the rich. However, because of its many seeds it was believed to be an aphrodisiac so a strawberry and sour cream, borage and sugar soup was given to French newly-weds. Be that as it may, there are few simple pleasures as agreeable as a dish of strawberries with cream (Cardinal Wolsey's idea) on a fine summer's day and both high quality products will be available in Benenden's.

PIEDMONT PEPPERS

Serves 4

Preparation 10min, cooking time 40min

- 2 large red peppers, cut in half lengthways, seeds removed
- 2 garlic cloves
- 4 cherry tomatoes, cut in half
- 8 basil leaves
- 2 anchovy fillets
- 25g butter
- 40ml olive oil
- 125g mozzarella cheese

METHOD

- Pre-heat oven to 180C/160Fan/Gas mark 4.
- Place the pepper halves onto a baking sheet.
- Place the following into each pepper half in this order: 2-3 slices of garlic, I cherry tomato cut in half, I basil leaf, ½ an anchovy fillet, small nut of butter, another basil leaf and finish with I dsp of olive oil.
- Place in oven for 30min.
- Remove peppers from oven, put a large slice of mozzarella cheese on top of each, put back in the oven until melted and peppers are soft.



Pork, storks and corks

Alsace is not a fashionable place. If it



were an item of clothing, it would be a pair of lederhosen worn by a morbidly obese man on a bicycle ride. It attracts curiosity and amusement far more than it invites admiration.

Wine from Alsace has never had the same foothold in the British market enjoyed by its German equivalent, yet its slender Germanic bottles have seen it afflicted by the prejudice engendered by the Blue Nun and Black Tower invasion of the 1970s and 80s. Mention Alsatian wine to a standard drinker and you'll be greeted by the rhetorical question: "Isn't it all really sweet?" In a bad way.

Some of the best wines from the region are really sweet, in a good way. A decent late-harvest Gewurztraminer will deliver as much residual sugar as an explosion at Tate & Lyle headquarters, and the sweetness spills over into many producers' versions of Alsace's other grapes as well, the Pinot Gris and the Pinot Blanc in particular, while even the Rieslings can veer from honey to petrol via uncompromising acidity: so you have to try before you buy.

This was my third trip to the area, and if you have a picture postcard view of Alsace consisting of medieval towns full of quaint half-timbered houses on mazy cobbled streets, perched among vertiginous vineyards in the foothills of picturesque mountains, Ribeauville in a nutshell.

Climb 500 metres above the commune and you'll find the obligatory castles - three of them no less; down the slopes, there's the right geology, from granite and schist, to marl, sandstone and limestone, to support all manner of worthy grapes. It boasts producers of the standing of Trimbach, whose £170 a bottle Clos Sainte Hune induces flutters in the hearts of

Riesling devotees worldwide, but its streets hold a breadth and depth of vinous pleasure.

As chance would have it, I was able to walk out of my front door on Rue de la Fraternite, turn left past the immovable toothless crone on the wooden chair - presumably placed there by Gallic Central Casting to stare distrustfully at tourists - and walk straight into the tasting room at Domaine Jean Sipp.

I went through the carte on three successive nights and narrowed it down to an excellent Muscat Reserve at 8.60 euros - lovely unsung aperitif, flowery and grapey and just a smidge off dry - a very passable cremant rose that delivers beyond the dreams of most supermarket champagnes for a mere II.30 euros, and the splendid Grand Cru Kirchberg de Ribeauville 2013, which may set you back 23 euros but has everything an Alsace riesling should have, in terms of the precarious balance of ripe, peachy fruit, full body and steely finish.

Emboldened, I headed down the Grand Rue, past more producers than you could shake a cured pork saucisson at, past the town hall with the symbolic black, white and red storks nesting rather messily on its roof, into the Cave de Ribeauville.

This is the local co-op - which will appeal to the army of socialist wine drinkers in Benenden - but it's not just any old co-op. It's the oldest co-op in France, established in 1885, and in 2015 it was named best co-op in the country by the Revue du Vin de France.

It's no spartan shed of the republic, either, offering stylish relief from the 35-degree heat, along with wine from eight Grands Crus vineyards, and encouraging the purchase of fine lieu-dit Haguenau Riesling at a criminally cheap 8.80 euros and lieu-dit Pinot Gris Silberberg at 9.10, along with more Muscat (vieilles vignes this time at 6.90, and even better), which may not see out the asparagus season.

All this plus mountain food to sustain the hungry hiker, surprisingly appetising Germanic cabbage, forthright Munster cheese, no lederhosen in sight and barely an annoying Brit to spoil the view.

Local Enterprise ... Enterprising Locals

NIGEL 'POODLE' ROBERTS

It wasn't a good night for Nigel Roberts. Just when he thought life couldn't get any more depressing than watching a farcical general election unfold in the early hours, he went to lock up at the Woodcock and found that torrential rain outside had barged its way in and was making unwelcome progress through the building.

The pub has undoubtedly survived far worse than this flash flooding since it opened its doors in 17th-century Iden Green, but the timing would have been bad enough even without the political kerfuffle that was putting the tin hat on a turbulent year.

The space does not exist to do justice to his forthright opinions, but suffice it to say that Nigel

is bothered by Brexit, mistrustful of Mrs May and downright traumatised by Corbyn, not least because of the damage the three are in the process of wreaking on the High Weald pub trade.

"I've learned never to discuss politics in a pub," he warns himself, before continuing, "but ... Brexit has affected us, no doubt. I've got a lot of European friends, German and Dutch, and the

feeling in Europe is that they don't want to come over and support a country that has left the EU.

"You only have to look on the roads and see the lack of European plates to see how badly it has impacted on businesses in the tourist industry in Kent and Sussex. We usually do 12 tables a week of European customers at this time of year and we're down to one, which hurts, and the election will only make it worse. It sends a message to Europe that this country is a bloody mess, which it is."

Just in case you don't recognise Nigel from the above, you may know him better as 'Poodle', as do the Woodcock regulars who welcomed him into

their spiritual home when he became landlord in 2015.

"It was what I was called when I was eight, when I had curly hair, and a lot more of it than I have now," explains the 57-year-old, "and it stuck all through education and through 27 years in the City."



Poodle hailed originally from Lancashire but his parents came to north Kent when he was a mere pup in 1968. He worked as a derivatives broker for ICAP, moved to Iden Green with his first wife and two young children in 1991, and soon became aware that this was where his future lay.

"I used to meet a friend at the Three Chimneys in Biddenden but he brought me here one day and the moment I walked through the door I loved the place," he explains. "Owning the Woodcock was a long-held dream but when the old landlady was getting out of the business and offered it to me, I was too busy with my family, so I had to turn it down, but I stuck a penny in the beam above the till, which is still there, and said to myself one day I'll have that pub'."

Divorced in 2003, Poodle left the City in 2009 to look after his sick parents, but finally the pub dream came to fruition and after 26 years in the village, he has lost none of his enthusiasm for the area or the establishment.

"I love it," he says. "It's hard graft and long hours but no different to the City and I think it's very important to have a pub like this. We used to have the Royal Oak in Iden Green and the King William in Benenden, and they've both gone. There were nine pubs in Cranbrook and only two left, and it's important for any community to have a watering hole, a place where nothing matters.

"I started going to the pub with my father on a Sunday before lunch, and this is that kind of place, a traditional inn that serves good food but hasn't gone down the gastropub route and ended up like a soulless restaurant with a bar.

"I like it because it's a community pub with regular clientele but also a lot of European trade because it's only a short hop from the Continent. You don't get places like this in Europe and people love it, in the winter with all the gundogs in here, everybody in their tweeds and the fire going, in the summer when the garden is a suntrap, as long as the sun is shining!"

A City trader with a sense of social responsibility may be a rare breed but Poodle is committed to the village cause and still working on his dream of buying the freehold of the Woodcock so he can

turn it into his dream pub. When he's not shooting, skiing or sweeping floodwater out of the loos, he can be found in the bar with his core of regular customers, definitely not discussing politics but probably thanking their lucky stars they live in Iden Green.

"The village has changed but I still love living round here," he says. "I go shooting to Devon for three days every year and it's beautiful but when I come back I realise it's just as beautiful here. I never tire of it, especially all the time we have places like this.

"People still like pubs. The local farmers and the trades boys need somewhere to go for a quick pint after work and the great thing about it is that you can

always find a good painter and decorator, a good plumber, electrician or builder by word of mouth.

"People come here to talk and that's what being a community pub is all about."

Bird Notes

In the middle of May I spent a week in the New Forest, an area with which I am unfamiliar. I look forward to visiting new places and seeing what bird species are there. The forest is one of the largest wild areas in Southern England with many different habitats. It is well known for its Dartford Warbler, Woodlarks and breeding Goshawks so my expectations were, as always, on the optimistic side. My first walk was amongst the many areas of gorse bushes, which is where the Dartford Warbler likes to breed. The first species to reveal itself was a Stonechat, easily recognised by its clicking call, not unlike two stones being knocked together. This was a lovely male with black head, white collar and orange breast. This species would be one I would see frequently every day. The next species was a handsome male Greenfinch, its green back and yellow primaries standing



out well in the sun. It was on top of a holly tree singing its unmusical wheezy song. I was to see a pleasing number of Greenfinches over the week, particularly but not exclusively, in the holly trees. This species has a worrying decline due to the avian trichomoniasis disease, so it was good to see a healthy population here. The next species to catch my attention was a flying Cuckoo that was calling on the wing. It conveniently perched on a nearby tree and I enjoyed good views of its streaky breast and dropped wing profile. Cuckoos were plentiful and I would have liked to have known what species they parasitized in the forest. In

these wild areas the Meadow Pipit tends to be a preferred species but the numbers of Meadow Pipit were pretty low. It seems to be a good year for Cuckoos and I have heard it most days in Iden Green and elsewhere locally. The walk now entered a wooded enclosure with a good diversity of trees hosting singing Willow Warblers, Blackcaps and Garden Warblers. In the coniferous parts Siskin were much in evidence with their easily recognisable whistle calls. This breeding season I have also seen and heard Siskin in both Hemsted and Bedgebury Forests. Most Siskins migrate to the northern forests in the U.K. and are only occasional breeders in the South but the New Forest is one of the exceptions where they breed regularly. On the edge of the wood there were a few loan trees and I heard the delightful song of the Tree Pipit. This was a species I was hoping to hear and see but I only had one other record during my stay. This is a species that disappeared from Hemsted Forest a few years back despite no obvious reason as the habitat still seems suitable and relatively unchanged. Unlike its cousin, the Meadow Pipit, the Tree Pipit is a summer visitor and may be its wintering areas are responsible for the decline.

My next visit was to Acres Down on the East side of the forest, known as a good place to see birds of prey, I was hoping to catch a glimpse of Goshawk or Honey-buzzard which breed in the forest. The Down is one of the high points in the forest giving very good views over a large area. There were plenty of Common Buzzards to scrutinise but I could not turn any of them into the target species although a lovely Hobby (small falcon) flew by to make up for my disappointment.

Further along the ridge there were plenty of gorse bushes with some silver birch amongst them. A bird with a cocked tail like a large Wren caught my eye and there on the tree was a Dartford Warbler. It gave only brief views before it dived back into the gorse. I was able to get some more brief views. The bird I saw was a male with grey head and a red/orange orbital eye ring. The dark red- wine coloured breast could also be seen, a magical handsome bird. This is typical bird watching where you search for one rare species in particular and end up seeing another completely different rare one!

The New Forest is also famous for its broadleaf woodland and we visited one large such area west of Fritham. It was a brilliant sunny day and the new leaves on the oak trees shone



with gorgeous new fresh green colour. Blackcaps were in full song and high up in the canopy I could hear a different song, I had a good idea what it was but as it was one that I have only occasionally heard before I wanted to make certain. I tracked around quite a large area and my neck was aching before the bird suddenly descended to a lower level and there before me was a brilliant male Redstart. Its grey back and black face and chin with a white forehead and rusty red breast and tail make it a very colourful bird. However in the dapple shade and forest floor it was quite difficult to pick out. Having connected the song with the bird I heard quite a few more before the day finished.

I have to say that the week was a bit of a disappointment, not so much that I did not see some of the rare birds but the lack of the more common species such as Skylark and Woodlark. I had



only two Tree Pipits and one Yellowhammer. I was surprised at the high level of grazing by both cattle and ponies; there was hardly a blade of grass to be seen and one could always see lots of animals. I gather that there is an EU subsidy for every head of cattle grazed on common land with no control on numbers and the habitat is suffering greatly and must account for the low numbers of the above mentioned species.

The Village Gnome

PONDLIFE


It was over the Sunday roast that Father made his fateful announcement. It's true it didn't seem


particularly fateful at the time - it just

seemed a bit daft. I mean, why would anyone want to turn a perfectly nice sheep meadow into a large ornamental pond? And, above all, where would the water come from to fill it?

A few weeks later a letter arrived. The council was rebuilding the adjacent bridge and needed a sliver of our land. Following negotiations only slightly less protracted than those to build, say, a new school, father gave away the land in exchange for a pipe under the road. This to bring water from the old millpond into what he now insisted on referring to as his 'lake'.

So the digger moved in and within hours, the ancient wildflower meadow was reduced to something resembling a Paul Nash landscape. Father, undaunted, held a small champagne ceremony as he removed the bung from the pipe and a trickle of water flowed forth. This marked the beginning of our problems. The four inch pipe constantly blocked with river-borne detritus. When sufficient water did enter and fill the pond, the bank between it and the river sprang leaks necessitating a concrete retaining wall. Ornamental waterfowl purchased for exorbitant sums flew off or just waddled down to the river and swam away. Glutinous mud on the bottom dissuaded even the hardiest bather and, while passing trout gave the pond a wide berth, black eels congregated joyfully.





There is, in the family album, a photograph of ducks swimming serenely in water so clear it reflects the house like a mirror. But shrubs and trees colonised the water's edge, pond-weed flourished and the dreaded green algae began its inexorable mission to blanket the surface. It got so bad that an elderly short-sighted dog mistook the surface for an extension of the lawn. After he'd scrambled back up the bank, his black fur turned completely green, he smelled as rank as the hound of Hades.



Father tried everything. Each year hundreds of pounds were expended on noxious chemicals - which were appalling for the environment and, anyway, only worked for a week or so before the green cover returned. The digger was brought back to dredge the pond and remove rotting leaves and high nutrient vegetation - to no apparent effect. A boom was set up to push the algae towards the exit sluice when the wind was in the right direction - which was seldom. Thus father spent much of his declining years pacing the banks with a long handled net, Sisyphus-like, scooping out the green slime by hand.



I determined on a different approach. Leave the algae to get on with it and celebrate a primeval-looking swamp next to the house. It's more Shrek than Gnome, but there's little point in waging such a futile war with nature. However if a Louisiana bayou is not what you have in mind for your Wealden cottage garden - then you are strongly advised against any attempt at a DIY pond!
