A message from your MP – Helen Whately

The country is divided over Brexit, and this puts MPs in a difficult position too. My view is that we should honour the referendum result and leave the European Union, and it is better if we leave with a negotiated deal. That's why I've consistently voted for the deal.

I've also voted to keep no deal on the table because you can't carry out a negotiation if you aren't prepared to walk away. However I don't take the risks of no-deal lightly, not least the risk of delays at the border causing queues on the M20. That's why for the last three years I've been urging the Government to set up an alternative to Operation Stack – which we now have in the form of Operation Brock.

I don't want a second referendum. Voters were told in 2016 that it was a once-in-ageneration chance to decide on our relationship with Europe. So I voted against Labour's proposal for a second 'confirmatory' referendum.

The last few weeks have shown that there is no majority in Parliament for a specific way forwards. The Prime Minister has negotiated an extension to Article 50 until 31st October. This means we will have to take part in the European election unless we can agree the withdrawal agreement before that. Theresa May has invited Jeremy Corbyn to meet her to work out if there is a version of the deal that Labour would support. If so, that could break the impasse.

I sincerely hope that they can agree on an approach that honours the referendum result and gains a majority in Parliament so we can avoid a long extension and participating in the EU elections. It is time for us to move forwards. You can read more about my voting record here.

While Brexit has been keeping me busy, I'm still getting on with my campaigns on schools, better healthcare, help for farmers and easier transport for people with disabilities.

Is there an alternative to the Pope's Field site for Maidstone's new schools?

I know how worried people are that new schools at Pope's Field will lead to even more gridlock on Bearsted Rd and that the nature reserve will have to be moved. I've asked Kent County Council and the Education and Skills Funding Agency multiple times whether there's another possible location, but they've told me Pope's Field is the only suitable site.

As an MP I have no direct say in planning decisions like this and I was not involved in choosing the location. I am pleased that the developers listened to my concerns and changed the proposed entrance, so it's no longer directly off Bearsted Rd - but I know this won't solve all the traffic problems.

With all the new houses on the way we do need a new primary school, otherwise children in Bearsted could have to travel for miles every day to get to school. At the moment there doesn't seem to be an alternative, but if anyone knows a better site please let Maidstone Borough Council know, as they will be the ones making the final decision.

Have we finally seen the back of Operation Stack?

With all the uncertainty over Brexit, Highways England activated Operation Brock "to demonstrate Kent's preparedness for disruption". This caused considerable inconvenience for people living in Bearsted, Lenham, Hollingbourne, Harrietsham and Headcorn. Junction 8 coast-bound was closed so drivers had to go the back to Junction 7 to get onto the motorway. There was also a noticeable increase in traffic on the A20 and some people were kept up at night by noisy trucks on the Ashford Rd.

I'm pleased Brock has now been called off. While it's an improvement on closing the motorway completely for Operation Stack, it's far from perfect. I'll be meeting ministers and Highways England soon to urge them to review it and make improvements.

At the same time I'll keep pushing for a deal with the EU that keeps freight moving freely across the border.

People are struggling to get an appointment with a GP

In parts of my Kent it's very difficult for people to see their GP. At one surgery in Park Wood there's just one GP for 4,000 patients.

There's extra money going into primary care and we're training more GPs, including at the new Kent medical school. But we need more nurses, physios and other health professionals in primary care. I asked the Health Secretary what he is doing to ensure that people can see the right health professional when they need to.

Seasonal agriculture workers' pilot scheme launched

2,500 non-EU workers will come to Britain to work on fruit farms, as the Seasonal Agriculture Workers' pilot scheme launched on 6th March.

I've been arguing that fruit farmers in Kent need to know they will be able to hire the thousands of workers they need to pick and pack fruit, and this pilot scheme is a reassuring step in the right direction.

The outcome of the pilot will help determine our future immigration policy - and as Chair of the All Party Parliamentary Group for Fruit and Vegetable Farmers, I'll be working to make sure it's a success.

Headcorn station needs step-free access

Headcorn station is a busy station, with passengers making 600,000 journeys a year, but it has no disabled access. This makes life more difficult for people who can't use stairs - some are even going in the wrong direction as far as Ashford to get to a station with a lift. I called on the Government to give Headcorn a fair share of the Government's £300million fund to improve disabled access on our railways - but regrettably the bid wasn't successful. I'm disappointed Headcorn was overlooked this time, but I won't give up.

A great tasting Italian pork recipe. As usual, and like most Italian recipes, this is a very simple recipe bursting with flavour.

Lemon Pork Tagliatelle

2 cloves of garlic 2 tablespoons of extra-virgin olive oil 1 small onion, finely chopped 1 celery stick, finely chopped 100g diced pancetta 500g minced pork 200ml dry white wine 50g of grated parmesan, plus extra for serving 1 grated zest from one large lemon 400g dried egg tagliatelle 3 tablespoons of chopped flat leaf parsley

1. Peel the garlic cloves, cut in half lengthways. Gently warm the garlic and oil in a large frying pan (big enough to toss the pasta in later). As it starts to colour, take off the heat and let the garlic infuse for 5 minutes, then discard it.

2. Tip the onion and celery into the garlic oil, sprinkle with a little salt and return to a gentle heat. Let them soften, without colouring, for 8-10 minutes. They should sweat rather than fry, so if you hear sizzling add water, a tablespoon at a time.

3. Add the pancetta and cook for another 6 minutes. Stir in the pork and turn the heat up. Don't colour the meat too much and avoid

breaking it up. Add the wine and let it evaporate, then season. Pour in 200ml water, cover and simmer for 20-25 minutes. Mix in a little water if the mixture gets too dry.

4. While cooking, put a pan with plenty of water on to boil. When the water is boiling add 2 tsp salt, then the pasta. Bring back to the boil, give it a good stir and reduce the heat so the water boils gently. Taste the pasta 2 minutes before the timing on the packet.

5. Drain the pasta, reserving some pasta water. Immediately transfer the pasta to the frying pan and toss well over a low heat. Tip in the parmesan and toss well. Add pasta water to dilute, or extra cheese to absorb excess liquid, and mix again. Toss in the lemon zest and parsley and serve.

There are options to turn off or on <u>Private messages</u>, <u>Replies or thanks to me on my posts</u> and <u>Replies to posts I follow</u>. Note: There is an option to unsubscribe at the bottom of any emails.

To turn on **Notifications** for "**nearby neighbourhoods**", select that option, which is also in Settings, this will show a list of all the nearby communities. You can then decide to leave them on or turn them off.

Finally you can opt in or out of getting infrequent emails from Nextdoor about your account.



Len Valley Health Walks

During the 43 weeks we walked in 2018, on Wednesday afternoons, Thursday mornings, Saturday mornings and the second Monday monthly, our walk leaders led a total of 182 walks, enjoyed by 1,864 walkers, walking in 23 different locations and covering approximately 548 miles. Included in these figures is the successful Sunday full day walk, along the cliffs at Dover to St Margaret's Bay, which we did in the summer. So a very big thank you to all our walk leaders, who do this on a purely voluntary basis.

We started 2019 with a New Year's Day circular walk, from the Hook and Hatchet pub at Hucking, through the lovely Hucking Estate. Our Saturday walks started on 5th January and the second Monday monthly walks also started in January. The Thursday walks commenced on 21 February and the Wednesday walks the following week.



It is not an option for nearly of a quarter of a billion Christians across the world who are persecuted because of their faith in Jesus Christ.

Here are a few true stories of the way Christian believers are treated. In **Malaysia** those who contravene Shari (Islamic) law are arrested and sent to rehabilitation camps.

Last year saw a sharp increase in opposition to religion, including Christians in some parts of **China.** Church buildings have been forcibly closed in some places and there is a ban on under 18's attending worship.

Pastor David's church in **India** was vandalised by Hindu extremists and members of his congregation were badly beaten. Another pastor was left unconscious with a fractured skull after youths threw him off a moving train.

Christian families in **Upper Egypt** have had to leave their homes because of threats against them and their children and demands that they convert to Islam.

An **Eritrean** Christian is living in a refugee camp in northern Ethiopia. Her husband was killed in jail and this lady was detained several times when she refused to deny Christ. She is living with HIV after being raped in jail.

Whether you attend church or not please think of the Christians I have mentioned and remember them in your prayers.

A prayer: Lord God we thank you for our freedom to worship in the way we choose . Please help all persecuted believers to continue to live by faith. Amen.
