Stockbury Bridge

This is not the article that I had been hoping to write ...

Given that National Highways refused to include any form of traffic management for the junction between Church Hill and the A249 in their plans for the Stockbury Roundabout, Kent County Council have been working hard in the background to secure funding for a bridge. It was initially anticipated that a bridge would cost around £8 million but the latest rules from the Department for Transport (DfT) mean that the projected cost has risen to £16 million.

So far KCC have spent in excess of £100,000 putting together a business case with a view to securing funding from the DfT. Access to the funding pot is a competitive process and unfortunately the Stockbury Bridge is close to being in last place. While KCC will continue working in the background, they are understandably reluctant to commit any more significant amounts of money to the scheme.

No-one seems to doubt that the Church Hill junction is dangerous and will be even more so once the roundabout scheme has finished but potential deaths do not figure in the DfT's calculations when assessing priorities for funding.

If the risk of death does not count, what does? The answer is the number of vehicles that would use the bridge. As a small rural community we do not have thousands of commuters wanting to access the A249 or the M2, so the perceived "benefit" is very low. If we want a bridge, the best way to secure funding would seem to be to allow the building of several thousand houses around Stockbury!

This seems to be an interesting paradox given that the Government has previously stated its commitment to protect rural communities. The bridge is needed to protect both citizens and businesses in Stockbury but the only way we can get funding for it through the DfT's usual process is if we allow our rural community to become an urban community!

The safety of the junction will be the subject of audits by National Highways and KCC; if the number of serious accidents is significant, this may provide a case for a bridge. Unfortunately, it looks like we will have to wait for at least 2 people to die in separate accidents at the Church Hill junction before the Government will take our bid seriously.

Stockbury Goes Green

As we move ever closer to "net zero", grants are now available for communities to develop infrastructure that will support the IPCC's agenda on climate change. Given the number of highly polluting diesel and petrol vehicles in the Parish, it was felt that Stockbury's contribution to greening the planet should be an initiative that would encourage people to purchase electric vehicles. Cars would obviously be the first "target" but in time this will extend to tractors, combine harvesters and other farm equipment.

A plan has been developed to provide multiple electric vehicle charging points in the centre of Stockbury village. In Phase 1 on the scheme, these would be powered by a wind turbine dedicated to the task. Initially 6 charging points would be provided outside the Village Hall, powered by a turbine located on the village green. At approximately 25 metres (82 feet), it will stand well above any buildings in the village and should receive the full benefit of the wind that frequently blows across the top of the hill.

Clearly a wind turbine on its own would be of very little benefit as it will only provide electricity for the charging points when the wind is blowing. To provide a source of continuous power there will be a battery bank next to it. This will be relatively unobtrusive being only 20ft x 6ft and 8 ft tall; it will fit between the turbine and the village sign.

Phase 2 of the plan will involve filling in the spaces between the trees in the orchard with solar panels and providing charging points, designed primarily for farm vehicles, along Church Lane. Again, there will be an unobtrusive battery bank located by the gate at the junction with The Street.

If all goes well, Phase 1 should be complete by 31st September 2022 and Phase 2 by 30th April 2023. A formal commissioning ceremony followed by fireworks and a free bar, with a special guest who will have cycled all the way from Sweden, is planned for 31st June 2023. 

M2 junction 5 Stockbury interchange improvement scheme

Starting on 28 March 2022, we'll be changing the layout of the A249 northbound where the road meets the Stockbury roundabout.

To do this safely, we'll have weeknight lane closures – 8pm to 6am, Monday to Friday – on the A249 in both directions between the roundabout and Chalky Hill for four weeks. There will always be one lane open to traffic in both directions

We'll then permanently close the dedicated entry slip to the M2 eastbound from the A249 northbound. This closure will allow us to prepare the foundations for the construction of the new flyover. You will still be able to join the M2 from the first exit of the roundabout.

Stockbury Book Club

Agent in Berlin by Alex Gerlis

Agent in Berlin is the first in The Wolf Pack series, featuring an unlikely pair of British agents operating out of Berlin, an American sports journalist and an SS officer's wife.

With war coming to Europe, British spymaster Barnaby Allen is recruiting a network of agents in Germany. Despite constant danger and the ever-present threats of discovery and betrayal, Allen's network unearths top-secret plans for a new German fighter plane and a truly devastating intelligence prize, an audacious Japanese plan to attack the United States. But can they prove it? The race is on.

There was an unusual amount of agreement within book club this month about the enjoyability of this book. There was certainly consensus that all of the names did get a bit confusing, so the reference list of characters at the beginning was well used and that a lot of the German place names were glossed over by readers due to difficulties with pronunciation.

A number of the group said that they found it a quick read. Some didn't feel it went anywhere very fast while others felt the lack of pace initially supported the slow build up to the war and intensified the suspenseful nature of the activities. It was felt that the stress the operatives were under was well characterised and the dilemma experienced by some between being a patriot and acting as a spy for whatever reason, was nicely handled. There was disagreement within the group about whether or not there was any love interest.

Comments were made about the nature of the propaganda surrounding the Olympics, how the different identities of the cities really came through and the link between the beginning and end of the book.

One member finished the book just as events in Ukraine began unfolding and found this very poignant, which generated a great deal of discussion and speculation about how possible future events might play out.

All members of the group scored it either a 7 or a 9 resulting in an overall score of 8/10.

Stockbury Gardeners

It really makes my blood boil when I hear that finally our hopes of obtaining allotments on farmland to the east of the village are thwarted. As our Member Gardeners were made aware, the request has finally been answered with a big NO. The reason being KCC have been forced under government policy to allow the positioning of a 144 hectare solar farm to be positioned in Stockbury Valley.

Electro-Bulgare, were grant funded by the EU whilst the UK were still members and were recently given the green light to commence construction; this despite fierce objection by KCC. Under EU directive, article 100-22 /2017 states that any grade 4 (low grade) farmland can be forced (by compulsory purchase) to install solar panels. Stockbury was cited as low grade due to the number of flints in the area and the south facing slopes of Stockbury Valley present the best

angle for the sun to work and produce power. This alone will not occur immediately adjacent to the east side of the village; however, the huge battery storage, power converters and containers will occupy most of the area, making the Stockbury Valley the largest solar farm in the UK. It is understood that Electro-Bulgare will be looking for accommodation locally for the construction workers, Bulgarian speaking hosts will be preferred.

During our next meeting on Thursday 7th April, we will be discussing our options when it comes to our future allotment search. Please do not miss this important meeting.

Our guest speaker this month is (due to illness last month) Steve Harmer presenting a talk on "The History of Sissinghurst" this is at the normal time of 8pm.

An update on the playing field, "perimeter wilding" will be given by the Chairman following a walk round by the members last month. Anybody in the village that would consider volunteering to help please contact The Gardeners.

Kent Fraud Alert

Fraudulent Appeals for Ukraine

There have already been nearly 200 reports received about fake emails purporting to raise money for those affected by the current Ukraine crisis; some of the emails are even claiming to have been sent by Wladimir Klitschko and are using various scams from purchasing t-shirts to donating bitcoin.

Before you donate to a charity, check the charity and their registration number at www.gov.uk/checkcharity. If they have an annual income of over £5,000, they must be registered.

If you believe the charity is fraudulent, report it to the police or Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or online.

If you receive a suspicious email, do not click on any link and forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Fake Santander Texts

Another month, another scam text message in circulation. This time, one that claims to be from Santander suggesting new direct debits have been set up and attempts to trick people into clicking on potential harmful links.

If you receive a suspicious text, forward it to 7726, this reports it to your telephone operator.

Investment Scam Emails Not From 'Which?'

Criminals are impersonating 'Which?' to sell sham investments online. This is attempted through a bogus email which directs potential victims to go to a fraudulent website that misuses the 'Which?' logo and copyright to appear legitimate. DO NOT click on any of its links or follow its instructions as neither the emails or website have anything to do with 'Which?' Instead please forward suspicious emails to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Cooking with Zeina

Zeina's Easter Rafaello Cake

I rarely bake these days. It involves an incredible patience – more patience than I can muster; I'm more of a fiery alchemist when it comes to food! But it's Easter soon and it's time for something sweet This is one of the few desserts I don't stress over (Well, unless I eat it ...).

Ingredients

1.5 cups sliced almonds 2 tbsp butter 600ml whipping cream ½ cup milk powder 300 grams white chocolate 1.5 cups coconut flakes 500 grams wafers (no filling) 8 tbsp icing sugar

For the Decor

Little pastel Easter eggs Sugared flowers Meringue (crushed)

Method to the Madness

- In a large bowl, mix the cream and the icing sugar with a whisk until you get stiff peaks.
- Stir in the milk powder, half the coconut flakes and half the sliced almonds.
- Melt 200 grams of the white chocolate with the butter on a double boiler (or you can do this in the microwave in 30 sec increments, be sure to stir throughly between each 30 secs and continue till its fully melted,. This shouldn't take too long and helps with less washing up! Allow it to cool slightly (but still remaining a liquid) and then pour this into the cream mix. Gently mix well till combined but be sure not to over-mix and then cover and put it in the fridge.
- In another large bowl, roughly crush the wafers by hand is best and strangely satisfying. Set aside.
- Bring on the cake tin (ideally a spring-form one with a removable base if you'd like to take out the cake. Use butter paper to line it and add a bit of butter, just in case (Because as you know, butter makes everything better!). Also, since there is no baking involved you could also layer the cake into a beautiful glass serving dish and serve it directly.
- To assemble put a layer of crushed wafer at the bottom, then a layer of the cream mixture. Sprinkle lightly with the sliced almonds and coconut flakes and repeat until you've used everything up, making sure the final layer is crushed wafer.
- Melt the remaining chocolate and drizzle on top. Put it into the fridge to set.
- Remove the cake from the tin gently. To decorate add the pastel eggs, crushed meringue and sugared flowers and serve.

Invite friends and family over because you shouldn't have this alone and then enjoy it in the spring sunshine!
