



Middleton Dark Skies

November Highlights

<u>Planets on View</u> Venus is low in the evening twilight at the beginning of the month, but steadily rises higher as the month progresses, and by the end of the month this bright planet will be setting at around 7 pm. **Mars** rises at around 9 pm, so will be low in the eastern sky until around midnight. It will however increase in brightness during the month, and you should be able to make out its reddish colour with the naked eye. **Jupiter** rises at around 5.30 pm, so by mid evening it is high in the eastern sky, shining brightly in the constellation of Taurus. **Saturn** is beginning to slide away into the SW setting just after midnight


<u>Constellations</u> This month's constellation is Aries, The (golden) Ram, from Greek myth. The story goes that Aries, (who could fly!) flew down from the sky to rescue the hero Phrixos, who was so grateful to the ram that he promptly sacrificed it to the gods and hung up its golden fleece, which Jason and his Argonauts sought some years later. The constellation consists of 4 main stars and a number of much fainter stars that are difficult to see with the naked eye. Aries sits almost directly south during the evening, and is well worth the challenge of trying to spot.

<u>The Moon</u> The moon this month goes by the name of the Beaver Moon, which is derived from the fact that beavers are preparing their dams ahead of the onset of winter. It is also known as The Frost Moon, due to the first frosts of the winter forming during November. It will be worth looking out for the moon on the 17th as it will be sitting next to a very bright Jupiter

<u>Meteor Showers</u> Unfortunately this months Leonid's shower peaks just two days after the full moon, so will be all but washed out by the bright moonlight.

<u>Comets</u> Comet Tsuchinshan ATLAS did actually put in an appearance during October, but being low down in the twilight was all but impossible to spot without the aid of binoculars. To be fair, although faint, its tail was huge and the nucleus, although small was extremely bright. It was hoped that another comet discovered during October was going to make an appearance during late October/early November, but it disintegrated as it has passed the Sun and was pulled into it.

Causeway Farm - 'Hastoe' Field

As part of future options related to Causeway Farm the field next to our Recreation ground is expected to become available for purchase from Suffolk County Council (the owners of Causeway Farm).

The Parish Council is looking at the possibility of acquiring the field to be developed as community parkland with the aid of the community fund offered by the Sizewell C project.

I have put together a conceptual plan exploring ideas of how the field could be used for our village and the wider community. (see next page)

At our October meeting we welcomed Andy Malcolm from The Fishermen's Mission who gave us a talk on "The True Cost of Fish". Andy, originally from Whitechapel where he was a BT engineer for 23 years, moved to Suffolk when he answered an advert for the job of a fundraiser for a charity in the east of England and for 21 years he has been raising awareness and funds for The Fishermen's Mission. The charity was founded by Ebenezer Mather in 1881 after 189

fishermen died in a storm off the coast of Eyemouth in Scotland. Originally the charity provided boats filled with needed supplies and essentials that would go out to the fishing boats at sea, now the help is all done on land. After WW 2 there were 75,000 UK fishermen, the number is now 11,500. It is the most dangerous job in Britain with more deaths (the average age of a fisher lost is mid 30's) and accidents per number doing the job than even in farming. When an incident happens at sea the Mission are informed and are immediately ready to help the victim on arrival on shore and their family with the essentials of life. They will visit in hospital, raise money for the family, help with paperwork and bureaucracy and give moral and spiritual help. The aim is to get them ready for life after the accident. The Fishermen's Mission is at the heart of the fishing community and especially aim to help retired fishermen who maybe are in poverty, ill health and lonely. Fishermen's clubs have been set up to combat loneliness and for health care "Sea Fit" road shows bring health checks, health advice and dentistry to fishermen when they are on shore. Along with some stories of fishermen who have been helped, Andy with a strong deep voice sang a few sea shanties for us. Very enjoyable. He ended his talk with the fact that 380million portions of fish (in fish and chip shops) are eaten every year in the UK and fish is the only food that is still hunted!

Our November 20th meeting is the AGM. This year it was voted to be held in the afternoon at 2:30pm.

November Nature Notes

As we move through autumn, the wonder of bird migration is set before us. The arrival of migrating geese is one of the highlights. In Suffolk it is possible to see eight species of goose, although only White-fronted, Pink-footed, Brent and the two species of Bean Goose (Taiga and Tundra) are genuinely wild birds that follow set migration routes from the north to spend their winter here. In Suffolk the most common are Brent Geese, found on all the major estuaries, White-fronted and Bean Geese occur in smaller numbers on coastal grazing marshes. Pink-footed are the rarest in global terms, but winter in large numbers in North Norfolk with increasing numbers now being

seen in north Suffolk. The rest, Canada, Greylag and Barnacle Goose breed in the county and are considered feral.

Geese can be divided into two groups, black and grey. The black geese are the easiest to identify, Canadas are the familiar big black and white birds, Barnacles smaller with a distinct white face, and the small dark Brent Goose - not much larger than a Mallard. The grey geese are harder to identify, especially at the distance these wary birds are usually seen, from where, especially in poor light it is hard to distinguish the important bill and leg colours.



Of the grey geese, the easiest to identify is the White-fronted Goose with its conspicuous white forehead. Pink-footed Geese and Bean Geese are very similar, at a distance both can be picked out by the strong contrast between their head and neck and the rest of their body. The colour of legs and beaks is diagnostic. Those of the Pink-foot are not surprisingly pink, with the bill being partially black and much smaller in proportion to the birds head. Bean Geese are larger with orange-red legs and a bill with orange, yellow and black markings. Tundra and Taiga Bean Geese look very similar. Tundra Bean Geese are more common in Suffolk, while the Taiga Bean Geese are rarely seen beyond their main British wintering site in the Yare Valley, Norfolk. The Greylag is also large with a large orange bill and pink legs; it also has a grey forewing, which is prominent in flight. The Greylag is the ancestor of the farmyard goose, and can easily be recognised by the familiar honking call. The calls of the other geese are also characteristic, especially the Pink-foots calls, which has been likened to a pack of barking dogs.

To this list can be added a number of birds that escape to the wild from time to time, such as the Swan Goose, Barheaded Goose and also the Red-breasted Goose and Snow Goose, although which do occur occasionally as very rare vagrants. The introduced Egyptian Geese are not really geese at all, being a closer relative of Shelduck.

Young People Taking Action run youth drop-in centres on the High Street in Leiston, the Memorial Field in Saxmundham and Yoxford and Wickham Market Village Halls. Councillors' Declarations of Interest. None.

Public Forum. A member of the public referred to, and raised concern, over the removal of trees and hedges, as part of the archaeological works preceding the SZC link road, Yoxford roundabout, Darsham P&R, Wickham Market P&R and the two-village bypass. It is the PC's experience that protests to date have mitigated little satisfaction, furthermore, where works are being carried out on private land, the PC have no voice. It was agreed that much of the destruction appears unnecessary. The PC continue to ensure that works are carried out in line with the DCO but, unfortunately, the DCO is a vague document and therefore difficult to challenge. District Cllr Sarah Whitelock offered to investigate/make some enquiries.

A member of the public reported that Lionlink have been carrying out trial works on their land and that they have been visited by a senior tunnel engineer who advised that disappointment, destruction and disruption of the environment will be kept to a minimum. An offer of visits to Lionlink in Lincolnshire was also mentioned by the engineer, by way of reassurance.

The request for Lionlink and SZC to work together regarding the link road was highlighted again.

Cllr Whitelock reported the following:

- The proposed recycling scheme (discussed at last month's meeting) has been presented to full council and agreed.
- Wellbeing/mental health leaflets have been distributed throughout the ward. MIND completed a survey that indicated that mental health in this area is lower than the rest of East Anglia, and indeed the country. Training is to be made available to residents of Friston, initially, with regards to talking about mental health issues. Should this be successful it may be extended to other villages. Cllr Whitelock will keep the PC informed.
- A Youth Council has been established, in order that young people can have some influence over what happens at the Council. This will take place via schools, with two representatives from each school in the district.
- Residents are encouraged to complete the Community Safety Survey (details available on the village website and village hall noticeboard). The results of this survey will form a baseline for comparison with the completion of the same survey in several years' time. It is anticipated that this will eventually create a powerful document of evidence.
- A member of the public informed the meeting of a term used by the agricultural community 'Answer as a Percent'; whereby an indication of wellbeing is presented by a number and is used as a conversation starter. ESC is putting together a conference for farmers, recognising current challenges and ways to work in the current environment.
 More information to follow.

Minutes

The Council approved the minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 10 September 2024.

- * A new section on the village website for planning application meetings has been created.
- * Cllrs Cusack and Piercy are booked on the Emergency Planning Workshop, with a following meeting to discuss an emergency plan for the village, arranged for Monday 4 November.
- Necessary contacts have been advised regarding the change of day for the parish meetings (Wednesday, starting 13 November).
- * A positive response to Middleton Community Hub has been received from the WI and Holy Trinity Church. The Clerk still waiting to hear from the Village Hall Community and Middleton Community Council.
- * Poppy wreath has been ordered.

- * Cllr Taylor to write an article for the newsletter regarding interest in public transport for the village c/f. The PC are considering replicating a service that Aldeburgh provides, called Agnes (Aldeburgh Good Neighbours Scheme). Cllr Taylor has researched the workings of Agnes, with an investigation into implementation to follow. Currently, Cllr Taylor is waiting for a response from the individual that set Agnes up. Private residents' cars are use, along with a dedicated phone system. Insurance details are currently unknown, along with feasibility on a smaller scale, under WhatsApp. It was noted that CATS (Coastal Accessible Transport Service) provided an update in the village newsletter, seeking volunteer drivers.

A request has been made to use the recreation ground for D of E camping, this would include use of the toilets and kitchen facilities. The request was agreed. Action: Cllr Taylor to advise accordingly and erect a notice to advise users of the recreation ground. A thank you was given to the Summer Winers for filling the potholes in the car park and to Bill from Bentwaters for the supply of materials, free of charge.

Matters for discussion

<u>Playground Inspector</u>. The Clerk reported that contact has been made with Yoxford, Kelsale and Theberton Parish Councils. Yoxford - David Bracey, Kelsale – Play Inspections and Theberton – ROSPA Play Safety.

Play Inspections offer one annual inspection and three operational inspections, each costing £225, totalling £900 for four inspections per annum.

ROSPA Play Safety only offer an annual inspection costing £80 to inspect up to 5 items.

Further quotes were sought from Certified Playground Inspections and Playground Inspector but are yet to be received. Action: Clerk to refer to insurance documentation to establish inspection requirements, in particular quantity per annum.

<u>Survey</u>. Cllr Rowe provided the meeting with a summary of responses and specific comments/suggestions. Issues raised included play equipment, additional initiatives/further investments, education and wellbeing, a secure dog area and a wildlife/nature area. Improved pedestrian and vehicular access were also raised. The idea of allotments was suggested and favourably received by the PC. This facility could be offered to the school and potential care farm.

Action: Cllr Rowe to write a thank you to all who responded and an update for the newsletter.

It was agreed that proposals for the recreation ground need to be linked-in with the purchase of Hastoe Field, which will be accessed from the recreation ground, thus becoming one large area.

The PC were pleased with the response from the village. Next steps will include putting costs together for the various proposed changes/updates.

Action: Cllr Rowe to seek ballpark figures for the suggested initiatives.

A question was raised as to whether CIL may be used towards the improvements to the recreation ground. Action: Clerk to confirm whether CIL money may be used for this purpose.

The quantity of bins was raised again, including dog bins. Upon previous enquiries, it is understood that ESC is currently undertaking a bin survey. New bins (purchased out of the Precept) would need to be justified to ESC. Action: Clerk to contact ESC regarding purchase of new bins.

Cllr Thorpe provided the meeting with a concept for Hastoe Field, which may be used as an aid in the development of the area.

Sizewell C Grant – Adult Exercise Equipment c/f

It was noted that the Pavilion Manager role has finished for the year (April – September). However, a booking has since been received for the Pavilion, and it was agreed to pay the Pavilion Manager for this work.
