The Results

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Residents Questionnaire

1) Introduction

The Neighbourhood Development Plan process will provide residents, businesses, service providers and local organisations with a unique opportunity to help guide development within the designated area, plan the future delivery of local services and facilities, and ensure that Fleckney remains a vibrant and sustainable place to live, work, and do business.

To support the successful development of the Neighbourhood Plan, the RCC supported Fleckney Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee to undertake a consultation with all residents living in the designated area.

2) Survey Methodology

A questionnaire was developed by the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee in conjunction with the RCC (Leicestershire & Rutland) and with advice from Harborough District Council. The final version of the questionnaire (see Appendix 1) and the basis of this report, was the Residents' Questionnaire available for every resident aged 18 and over. This was 15 sides of A4 in length including the instructions, guidance notes providing further background and context and a Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA) map of the designated area.

The questionnaires were delivered to all households in the designated area during March 2017 and included an envelope into which the completed questionnaires could be returned and posted at one of twelve drop off points in the area by the closing date of 24th April 2017.

Households could also go to the Fleckney Neighbourhood Plan website to download a printable copy or complete the questionnaire on-line.

A small group of volunteers uploaded all the completed questionnaires onto a survey software system for analysis by the RCC (Leicestershire & Rutland)

3) Results

Response to the survey

The total number of completed Questionnaires returned and submitted onto the online survey software system was 537. This equates to a 27% response rate of the questionnaires distributed.

Presentation of the results

This report includes tables and charts which detail the results of the survey.

The tables show the number of respondents who selected each option. The percentages are calculated as a proportion of the number of respondents to the survey as a whole.

This report does not detail all the responses to the open text questions. A sample of the written comments received are included to give an example of some of the points being made along with a Word Cloud illustration where helpful.

A full list of all the written comments is available as a separate document and all the data received from this questionnaire is available in a separate excel spreadsheet for further analysis.

Footpath that runs through the centre on the same side as the pharmacy to narrow can only just fit a pushchair and it needs to be wider



Volume of traffic

Dog fowling along Wolsey lane, Street lights not on in morning during winter making early starts hazardous. removal of hedges in field between Cobwells Close and industrial estate was completely unnecessary. Should have been kept as a natural screen between houses and proposed industrial units.

Parking near end of roads e.g. just inside Main Street, High street, Kilby Road, Road dangerous!

Parking on bend just after the duck pond Having to wait at duckpond only to be cut up my idiots coming through near Library when it's not their turn.

Vans parked on the junction of Gladstone Street. Gladstone and Victoria Street should be One-Way. Can't walk on the pavement because of all the cars half parked across the pavement street. Articulated lorries still coming through the village.

Small brooks (e.g. On the corner of Main Street) cleaned out at inappropriate time without consideration for wildlife, term used to be a thriving frog and toad population, killed off by cleaning.

Loss of green space by large building sites being approved

Dog fowlers should experience having poo on their shoes/pushchairs etc.

Litter is a particular problem everywhere in the village. It would be good for communities and organisations to arrange litter picks in problem areas.

Enforcement of bylaws for littering especially in the centre of the village-imposing fines might improve behaviour.

Condition of the verges is hard to comment on seeing as most of them around the area I live in have cars parked on them

Dog mess on fields of Saddinton Road and Lodge Farm Road, smashed fences and litter.

Roads are many potholes/dangerous road surface

So much noise from light aircraft and helicopters - especially on fine weekend days. Fleckney is often used for noisy stunt flying aeroplanes. Anti-social noise. Too many businesses now based at home - we have three vehicles and two vans owned by the tenant next door who loads and unloads them noisily early in the morning and then runs all his machinery on the front pavement without any regard to residents who include many retirees.


Pot holes all through the village an general state of the roads

Examples:

Checks needed at least yearly on factories emptying liquids into the Brooks and streams. Traffic pollution.

The pond seems to have been "improved" by good intentioned people. This includes the use of slabs positioned end on to form a bank with no tethering to the existing bank. The slabs are moving which is a worry. Also, the water seemed to get higher this year before flooding, possibly making the flooding occur quicker and deeper on the road. Has suitable advice been taken before DIY pond mending commenced?

The impression for villagers and visitors alike is that the village is last on the list for Highway improvement. Fed patch jobs for past 25 years. Love the block paving in Kibworth (£££?). There is no village prettiness - more town planning is needed with sensitivity to the changing nature of the village from its industrial past to a primarily residential Community.

I find it a problem that kids hand out in the Lodge Road rec late at night. There is no need for motor bikes to cause that much noise in a quiet residential area.

Fleckney is a fabulous, peaceful rural village with minimal noise or litter pollution and minimal crime & antisocial behaviour concerns. I continue to live here exactly because of this and because the village population is largely comprised of mature older households whom respect the environment, enjoy the rural location / local community 'feel' & 'atmosphere'. This small village 'feel' and 'atmosphere' is already starting to change with the new Bellway site and will change / ruin the village if more housing development n and/or surrounding Fleckney is agreed & proceeds.

Without the litter collector, this village would be a mess, he works so hard, I would like to see the kids near Brookside Gardens, fined for the litter they drop.

Proposed large scale housing developments will encroach on important villagers' access to open countryside and protected important footpaths and bridleways such as the Leicestershire Round.

Flooding although not a direct problem has become a problem where I live as our back garden does become sodden and in excessive rain, it can have a pooling effect until the run-off has settled.

Dog fouling, payment by post office narrow dangerous

Stop building on the green fields

What is happening with Byrons building in Main Street opposite hairdressers' (eyesore) and rat infested, also dangerous building.

Unfortunately, Fleckney is getting bigger. Can we cope with flooding and sewerage?

With the addition of Main Street, high street and Kilby road a few years ago, housing we have seen a considerable increase in traffic pressure on the infrastructure as NO accommodation to main thoroughfares has been actioned

Losing small pockets of land. Fleckney is a country village and should stay a village.


Concerns about the safety of the road in the centre of the village. It is congested and dangerous, particularly at peak times.



Enforcement of law and fines, and points on licences are needed to change behaviour. When these idiots have accumulated enough points, lose their licence the problem is solved.



Examples:

Car parking throughout the village is a problem.. New houses should all have two parking places as most families have two cars these days

I cycle now but in some areas, I feel unsafe and use the footpath if there are no pedestrians on it. The lorries from the industrial estate are a problem particularly on the left-hand side going out of the village to Saddington where the hedges grow out into the road and there are bollards in the middle opposite the Saddington Grange entrance.

Very few buses, Too early stopping time i.e. last bus 6pm

More terraced houses on Gladstone Street/-Vitoria Street have small front gardens. Most are 2 car families. An incentive Could be given to turn a lot of the redundant gardens into a parking space to relieve the clogging up pavements and side roads. Re-open a train platform at Kibworth. The train line is still running. Easter to get to Leicester and Market Harborough

Police the racing cars after dark. It's like a racetrack. HUGE HGVs come through in the night destroying the roads and shaking foundations too.

Put weight restriction signs up and penalise drivers who flout them.

Double decker buses entering and leaving the village with only 1 or 2 passengers on board are frequently observed. Probably cheaper and more environmentally friendly to fund free taxis on demand. Seriously.






Greenfield land (undeveloped)



Appropriate traffic calming measures to be put in place.

It is important for the neighbourhood plan to consider development in the surrounding villages to ensure that the green areas of separation are maintained.

None of us have a crystal ball so if a need arises and there is an excellent solution that no one has thought of today, then the plan should be written flexibly enough to incorporate it rather than it be rejected because it is not in the plan.

Some shops at the end of the village near to the Kibworth turn. Even just a grocery shop or newsagent would be useful to the new housing at the end of the village. It could also be used by residents of Saddington. A proper coffee shop - maybe the old post office could be used?

The nature of the village centre - as there is less industry - it needs more of a cohesive feel.

It needs to be listened to by the Council and central government, because at present it seems that we are losing amenities while the village continues to grow. Large building developers are being allowed to profit from the community while not putting anything back into it. Fleckney is a village and should not be allowed to become a small town. I.e. Lose its identity.

Traffic It is all very well to build these proposed houses the centre of Fleckney can barely cope now with the present traffic it is dangerous and will only get worse. Doctors today is 29 March I've made an appointment with the doctor and cannot get one until 24 April nearly 4 weeks! Before we have any more residents surely this should be sorted. Post office We have just lost a fully functional post office which is now squashed into a small convenience store coupled with the fact that the staff are not trained properly. Not everyone especially the elderly are able to travel out of the village to use other reliable branches.

No more houses Repair the roads, worst in the county.

I think the community feel will be lost if more housing is added on to the ends of Fleckney. It will end up being one long village and the people on the outskirts will be less likely to walk in to the village and will simply drive in and out.

If houses have to built I would stress the importance of the style of house... these should be quality individual looking to suit fleckneys rich history. there is nothing worse than a cheap looking housing estate to devalue the existing resident's property. I am also very concerned about whether the school would cope with an expanding population.

Do not build on potential flooding land

Accessibility to health care facilities, doctors, nurses, opticians, dentists

Developments should not be too closely built together. We should make sure that the centre of the village is developed to enhance the retail space, widen the pavements and ensure there is adequate car parking or people will not stop in the centre.

The road from the top of Kilby Road right through the village to the duckpond desperately needs resurfacing. The chicane at the duckpond is an accident waiting to happen. People race each other to get through. Surely, now the school has gone, the need for it has gone as well.

The roads are not wide enough. Doctors are at full capacity. Schools are also full. Most people have no garages to the older houses so cars have to be parked on the road. Roads are full of potholes and we have hardly any pavement in the centre of the village.

Dog fouling. More help for the elderly. More Street lighting along alleyways. Parking issues in certain parts of the village. Use existing brownfield sites. Overcrowded doctor surgeries. Not losing small pockets of land which in turn damage the wildlife. Keep Fleckney a village.

Remember that it is a village. Do not let ambitions of becoming a town destroy the character of the location. There is basically very little to attract residents if the village character is lost.


The children's park on Edward Road needs proper bins and a dog bin to encourage more people to use them, and stop A.S.B there.
