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### **May Monthly Meeting**

ew of us in the UK can have any understanding of the experience of losing absolutely everything you and your family own. However, for members of the charity Shelterbox, which was set up by Rotary in Helston in 2000, with the aim of providing emergency disaster relief to people after natural and man-made disasters, this is a regular observation.

This month's speaker for the Support Group was Catherine Ryan an ambassador for the charity, who gave a most professional guide to Shelterbox's activities, of providing the five key essentials, shelter, warmth, water, food and light.

To start, she gave a guide to the magnitude of the issues involved, where the charity's current estimate is that the world currently has 113 million people who are homeless, as a result of either natural disasters or war, of which 83 million have resulted directly from conflict. They forecast this will grow to 167 million by 2040. However, since starting, Shelterbox has helped 2.5 million people in 98 countries.

Shelterbox has been very careful to remain politically neutral, as a result of this reputation, it is often one of the very first aid charities on the scene following a major incident. Its whole ethos is to initially provide shelter and survival resources packed tightly in a large plastic box. This is often backed up with technical advice, all with the aim of helping people to initially survive, recover, and then to rebuild, whilst at the same time helping them to maintain their dignity, with the added aim of keeping communities together.

Core to the contents of the box, which on being emptied can be used as a table or again any reclaimed possessions, is the tent. It is a great tribute to the design and construction of these tents, that some are still in use after 10 years of habitation. Other essentials include a rope, mosquito nets, a tarpaulin, two solar powered lights which also can be used to charge mobile phones, a full kitchen set, water carrier (suitable for child use – children often being the main collectors of water) along with a water filtration unit, and of course blankets and sleeping mats. In addition to the standard box, Shelterbox also now provide basic tool kits which can be used to start to retore damaged homes. These kits include a saw, hammer, spade, pick, wire and wire cutters, rope and tarpaulins, as well as some fixings.

For Shelterbox being able to respond rapidly is key. For example they were in place in the Turkish earthquake within 72 hours. It has achieved this remarkable success through having 5 key warehouses sited each close to known potential disaster points. In addition, it often uses local Rotary members as facilitators, who over the years have smoothed the way with local authorities and acted as local translators.

Needless to say all of us were deeply inspired, not just by the vibrancy of Catherine's presentation, but also by the achievements and ongoing determination and commitment of this most impressive charity.
