INTERESTING SNIPPET OF CHURCH HISTORY! (From Church records)

Until the mid -1800s, the entrance to the Church at Kirton consisted of a rough path on the left of Tuxford Road, at the top of Church Hill (opposite Egmanton Lane.) It would have accessed the Church across farmland, through an entrance, which is still there today, to the top of the graveyard, The current steps and Lychgate were not in evidence until 1875, when a former Rector, Rev. C.T.Lawson had them built, together with the now listed retaining wall. He also planted the trees next to the road on the banking.

Before that time a small house used to stand where the Lychgate now is, and a hedge behind it formed the boundary with the churchyard. The postman used to leave letters at this house and people from the village fetched them.
