

Draft Parish Notes - January 2022

Meeting of Great Milton Parish Council, held at the Pavilion on Monday 17th January 2022 at 7.30pm.

The meeting was attended by Cllrs S Harrod (Chair), W Fox (Vice-Chair), P Allen, G Bennet, C Deacon, D Harms and M Horsley. Apologies were received in advance from Cllrs Caroline Newton (SODC) and Freddie Van Mierlo (OCC). Tim Darch (Clerk) was in attendance. No interests were declared, and business was conducted as prescribed by the agenda.

Matters to Report

Monthly reports were received from Cllr Freddie van Mierlo (County Councillor, Chalgrove division) and Cllr Caroline Newton (District Councillor, Haseley Brook ward). Both are available on the Parish Council website.

Correspondence and public discussion

An e-mail has been received from a resident suggesting that the Neighbours Hall could be sold to Le Manoir, and any funds put into enhancing the potential of the Pavilion as a community facility, with access improvements which may then allow the Recreation Ground to be used safely for school parking. After discussion it was agreed that although some felt the idea had some merit, issues over ownership and the destination of sale proceeds were likely to mean that the suggestion was unlikely to be practical.

Planning Applications

The following planning applications received from SODC were considered:

P21/S5155/FUL (LASSCO, London Road, Milton Common). Variation of condition 2 (approved plans) in application P11/W1939 Demolition of existing rear part of main building. Extensions to existing main building to provide improved accommodation and function room and letting room accommodation.

For reference only: site is in Tiddington PC area and Great Milton residents are some distance away on London Road, east of the A329.

P21/S5363/LB (The Old Stores The Green Great Milton OX44 7NT). Removal of mid/late C19 sash windows with plate glass to be replaced with new sash windows with original details and heritage slimline glazing to the front façade.

After brief consideration, it was AGREED that the Parish Council had no concerns regarding the proposed application and that it was supported.

B The following planning decisions received and any outstanding planning matters were reviewed:

P21/S4437/HH (Hampden House, Church Road, Great Milton OX44 7PB).

Numerous external and internal renovations and amendments. Planning permission is GRANTED for this development proposal.

P21/S4645/HH (The Penn Thame Road Great Milton OX447HX). Extension and conversion of roof to create habitable room within roof void. Application withdrawn

The minutes of the December meeting of the Parish Council, held on Monday 13th December 2021, were reviewed, approved and signed as a true and accurate record of proceedings.

The latest monthly bank reconciliation, accounts and bank statement were received, reviewed and approved. The reconciled bank balance as at 7 January was £46,971.69.

Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

- The annual inspection of trees on parish council land is in the process of being arranged.
- Issues with blocked gullies close to the school entrance are now on OCC's
 programme and will be fully investigated and remedied in due course. The Parish
 Council will continue to pressure the County Council via Cllr Freddie Van Mierlo
 to ensure that the matter is resolved.
- Many residents will have received a letter from Airband advising that full fibre broadband is coming to Great Milton. The parish council is investigating the detail of this offer, which has arrived somewhat unexpectedly, and the extent of potential coverage.
- A resident has once again raised the issue of exterior lighting remaining on when
 not necessary at the new school classroom, close to the allotments. The light
 pollution and wasted energy is a concern for the parish council, and it is hoped
 that the issue will be resolved shortly. The parish clerk will once again make
 contact with the school in the hope that a permanent solution can be found.

COVID-19: update on village response/impacts

No significant local developments were raised with regard to the current pandemic, other than those which are receiving widespread national publicity.

20mph zone

The application for a 20mph in the centre of Great Milton village has been submitted to OCC: further developments are awaited. The residents' survey on the

subject indicated that approximately 80% of respondents supported the proposal.

Issues with mail deliveries

It is understood that there has been a regional reorganisation of rounds based on a drop in the volume of postal traffic, with some rounds doubling in size. The Great Milton and Little Milton rounds appear to have been merged, which with larger volumes of post at Christmas plus issues with Covid has placed increasing pressure on Chris to get deliveries done, with him sometimes even needing to work on Sundays to get the mail delivered. Following discussion, it was agreed to monitor the issue for a further month to see whether the issue settles down, then revisit it if necessary.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee

The Jubilee celebrations scheduled for Thursday 2nd to Sunday 5th June were discussed. After brief discussion it was agreed to speak to a member of the PCC to see if there are any plans to advance the Church Fete by a week or so in accordance with the event, and also to the Headteacher at the school to see if the school has any plans to mark the occasion with an event.

The meeting closed at 8pm.

The next meeting of Great Milton Parish Council will be held on Monday 21st February 2022 at the Pavilion, starting at 7.30pm.

Notes from Near the Rectory By Tony Jefferis

For many the end of January and the beginning of February are the gloomiest days of the year. The nights are long, the days are short, it is cold and wet, and this year is the third year of Covid restrictions, with some limits to our freedom continuing.

And yet there are signs of hope: in our gardens the snowdrops are beginning to show. The common snowdrop's botanical name is galanthus nivalis, a Greco-Roman mixture: gala means 'milk' in Greek, and anthos means 'flower'. Nivalis comes from the Latin, meaning 'of the snow'. The 'milk-flower of the snow' is not native to the UK, coming here in Roman times from Eastern Europe.

Snowdrops have a wide and varied place in European folklore: for example, in Germany, the story goes that when God created the earth, the flowers were asked to give some of their colour to the snow. All refused, apart from the snowdrop which, as a reward, was allowed to bloom each year before all other flowers. In another account, Eve was weeping in her barren garden after the 'Fall of Man' when an angel comforted her by blowing on to a snowflake and turning it into a snowdrop. A flower bloomed, and hope was born. Whilst some of the folk tales are darker, the flower has long been viewed as a symbol of hope for better times ahead.

In the Church it is associated with Candlemas when the church remembers the presentation of the boy Jesus in the Temple, and as a result, snowdrops were sometimes known as Candlemas Bells.

The snowdrop is a pretty bell-shaped flower, composed of six white flower segments or sepals. It is beautiful as an individual bloom, and different varieties are much sought after by galanthophiles, snowdrop enthusiasts. The flowers are also beautiful in a group, as can be seen in many of our local churchyards. St Peter's usually has an impressive cluster, but this year they are obscured by the building work on the tower, and at St Mary's we hope there will be an emerging display this year, after several people from the village planted fifty or sixty clumps round the beech tree. We wait expectantly!

It is this combination of beauty as an individual flower and beauty in a group that I would like to highlight. This is one of the central messages of Christianity: anyone, any individual, is welcome, whatever their origin, whatever they do. Equally, all are called to be in community to love each other, to be a body which respects and values others who are differently gifted.

So, can I commend visiting a churchyard with great snowdrops (Swyncombe is particularly good) and perhaps even giving church a try. You will be welcomed as an individual, and whatever your inclination, you will enrich our community.


Neighbours' Hall AGM

View from Views

That's the first month of 2022 gone and it only seems yesterday that we were looking forward to Christmas. Now everything is back to as normal as we can expect under the present circumstances. I can't understand why this year after such a mild period that crops seem to have not grown as I would have expected, some of it due,



I guess, to the fact we are tending to plant just that little bit later to beat the scourge of one of our biggest enemies, "Black Grass", now that we have limited access to the chemicals to control it, plus their expense. Having said that everything is looking healthy which, by not being too forward, are not so vulnerable to disease. The spinoff of this weather is that the countryside has a wonderful green hue at the moment; never remember a time like it. Wildlife here still seems to be flourishing, lots of flocks of finches, including many Yellow Hammers. Many Hares still evident, which means if they all breed we should have a good increase in numbers next spring (plenty of fodder for the Kites), good flocks of Starlings still apparent and a few Greenfinches starting to appear, with many other birds as I will mention later.

Well here we go again after a long period of relatively dry weather; 15mm rain on Christmas Eve and, low and behold, the Thame was in flood on Christmas day, staying in flood until 8th January. The plus side of this was that we were visited by about 15 Shoveler Ducks. Looking them up in a book we noticed that they were uncommon, which was quite fun. They stayed about 3 days, being accompanied by Grey Lag Geese and some other smaller unidentified Ducks, also slightly uncommon at Views Farm. During this period, being curious, I could see a heron standing on sentry duty, as they do, but in exactly the same position every day for the 3 days I visited the site. Whilst on the subject of the River, as you know something close to my heart, it is good to see the issue of the pollution that is allowed getting a lot more publicity latterly which hopefully will have some effect. Also good to hear on BBC's "Farming Today" that Farmers Environmentalists, Water Authorities, Super Markets and Councils, with the Environmental Agency (EA), have got together to discuss the problem that I wrote about concerning the Wye Valley. This has to be a good deal better than a similar organisation in this area which I understand just broke up in disarray; a very disturbing outcome over a very important issue. We just must talk and find a way around these problems. We now learn that, due to a lack of funding, the EA will not be able monitor all issues that they should

I get the impression that gradually some authorities are beginning to realise that we are in danger of over-populating this little Island of ours. Recently the

New Forest Council has asked for an embargo on any future development, for this very reason. Is it not time that all planners took this view and not be contradicted by Government dictat. It is this over-population that is behind most of the pollution problems we are facing; the waste facilities that we have, whether it be sewage, concentration of animals producing food for this population, or rubbish disposal, we just cannot deal with it (as I have said many times before).

It will not have escaped anyone's notice that our Minister has announced another part of our new payment scheme all of which sounds great. It will be, as long as it is introduced sensibly. It is though in danger of being high-jacked by big money from the City or, worse still, by foreign money that can just buy land to produce carbon sequestration and not food, which has already escalated the price of land and will severely reduce ability to produce our own food. In his announcement he states we are at 70% self-sufficiency; not sure where he gets his figures from. As an example, a prominent British pop star has said that he had enough money to buy land to plant trees so that he could continue to fly around the world and offset the carbon produced. This cannot be right; just carry on doing what you like and plant a few trees to placate the pollution you leave behind. Not good enough – the land has to produce food as well.

When it comes to land use, or should I say taking land out of production to produce so called Eco Energy, I think we have got it all wrong. I gather there is a running battle between the City of London and a Dorset Council, or a Dorset organisation, where the City wants land to erect a large enough Solar array to supply it with electricity. Not sure how this is achieved; will they then run cables directly from Dorset to the City or how does this work? Surely before we go this far, we should consider covering more roofs with panels that are already connected to the grid. This whole situation must be discussed with all interested parties involved right from Farmers and authorities, right down to the man in the street. We all need to understand where we are coming from and compromises made. It seems a little unfair when we in Agriculture are putting as much of our own resources as we can into saving the environment when now, as it looks as if Covid restrictions are being lifted, all talk is about booking flights for holidays. It makes me think, why do we bother? Let's all fly and spread carbon over everything we can and blame the farmers who are only trying to feed us.

Great Haseley and District Horticultural Society

What a difference a year makes. This time last year we were locked down. This year we are able to see friends and family, although we are still very careful and will continue to be so.

There has been a high pressure sitting over us for sometime now which has brought a lot of sun, but also a lot of fog. There have been days when the garden has stayed frozen all day which is mood lowering. Nevertheless, the sunny days have been wonderful and my garden cut back continues on those days.

Yesterday there was a loud thud on the kitchen window and I turned to see what I thought was a magpie flying into the Cercis. Much to my surprise it was a great spotted woodpecker which is a very rare bird in our garden and I have never seen one at such close range before. It pecked around for a while and then flew off, seemingly none the worse for its collision. It is, according to wildlife website I consulted, our most common woodpecker; we have visits from green woodpeckers on most days which are always a pleasure.

Also yesterday, I picked some early snow drops and sprigs of winter box for the

table. The pleasure this arrangement brings far exceeds its diminutive size. It is pretty and the combined scents are wonderful.

By the end of November ordinary snowdrops were through the ground and showing some white on the buds. For the next month they made no progress, but now some are developing quickly. It really is starting to feel like spring! The sun does not set until 4.30 allowing longer days in the garden and providing some lovely sunsets.

Every year I say I'm going to have fewer pots outside my front door and every year they just multiply out of control. I feel bad about throwing away any plants even if I don't like them very much. I started to get better with it a few years ago, but I have failed to keep it up. One good decision has been keeping two large white Marguerites outside the front door right against the house wall. I'm amazed that they are not only still alive, but still in flower although I'm sure my grandchildren will sort that out at the weekend. They like to make 'terrariums' in plastic butter boxes which can contain a wide variety of plants, stones and insects; they usually have flowers on the top layer.

I badly need to keep on top of the weeding which, of course, is now made difficult by bulb shoots so hoeing is not an option. Every year the weeding gets away from me and I can already see that this year will be no different.

Enjoy watching your spring garden develop and look at a few seed catalogues to gain inspiration for the new year.

Omicron/COVID-19 and Flu Vaccination Programme Update

The NHS in Oxfordshire and across the country is continuing to vaccinate against COVID-19.

We are vaccinating as follows:

- 1st and 2nd doses for people aged 12 years and over
- 3rd doses for people with a severely weakened immune system aged 18 years and over
- Boosters for people aged 18 years and over
- Boosters for people aged 16 and 17 years who are at high risk from COVID-19 or frontline health and social care workers

There is a growing problem of no shows or very late cancellations for vaccine appointments. This leads either to vaccines having to be destroyed (at £20 each) or involves additional planning to minimise wastage – time which could be spent on other patient care roles.

John Howell MP writes...

A new year, but many of the same issues roll around. My inbox continues to be dominated with issues around COVID 19 and, as always, some opposing views on how we continue to deal with the situation. As schools have returned some have expressed concern at the risk of greater exposure and there is concern too over health issues other than COVID where people are seeking, often long awaited, treatment. However the balance of views being expressed is increasingly towards a sense that we need to learn to live with the COVID virus and move from pandemic to endemic. This is my view too. The Coronavirus Act 2020, which came into effect on 25th March 2020, has a two-year time limit. This can be extended by Parliament but, as it stands at the moment, I think it unlikely that the Government will seek the support of Parliament to do so.

Looking to the year that lies ahead I hope that the plans to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee will be able go ahead as planned for the central weekend of celebration in June. It would be good to be able to have this national celebration as a time for communities to come together once again. Details of the programme, which is a year long celebration are available online at https://www.royal.uk/platinumjubilee. I would be interested to know what plans communities across the constituency have.

Thinking about communities I am pleased that the Charities Bill has now been introduced to the Commons. It has long been acknowledged that charity legislation can be complicated and unduly burdensome which can hinder charitable activities in some respects. I know that this has been a concern for many in this constituency and beyond. In response to a report from the Law Commission, which has been supported in the charity sector, this Bill was introduced in the Lords and has been through the full process in that House. It was introduced to the Commons on 11th January and will received its second reading later this month.

Another important piece of work launched at the start of this year is a consultation on proposals to help developments achieve Biodiversity Net Gain. This would put protecting and enhancing the environment at the heard of housing and infrastructure developments. I know that many in the constituency will be interested in this. £4million has also been earmarked to help Local Planning Authorities prepare for Biodiversity Net Gains by helping to restore wildlife, plans and landscapes after building work has taken place. The consultation which is asking interested parties on the details of how biodiversity net gain should be delivered can be found online at the Government Consultation webpage. www.gov.uk/government/consultations/consultation-on-biodiversity-net-gain-regulations-and-implementation

Whilst on the subject of the environment I would like to assure those who question that I did not vote to allow water companies to pump sewage into our rivers. I actually voted in favour of a package of measures to reduce harms from storm overflows. Please see my website for further comment.

As the year progresses there will continue to be challenging issues to debate with strongly felt views on all sides. I am always interested to know the views of constituents even if we agree to differ. If there is an issue that concerns you please do share your thoughts. 




