

Some Local News Snippets

A recent sad event at Sandway with a horse in a field in considerable distress and agony with some equally agonised would be helpers. The irony transpired that despite a vet willing to attend they couldn't as it was private land and both police and RSPCA needed to attend and initiate any vet involvement. After 2 hours the agony was ended. The RSPCA emergency number has now been added to the magazine list.

Still on a high from their recent short match bowls win against Lenham, Grafty Green played Headcorn and were reminded of their relative newcomer's status to short mat bowls and came second! Whatever a very enjoyable game – new members are very welcome to join them.

The defibrillator project is moving forward in conjunction with the Parish Council and hopefully it will not be too long before it is a reality. It will be available 24/7 at a central location to be finalised with the ambulance service holding the lock combination to give to 999 callers. Regarding cardiac arrest (heart stopped) CPR (resuscitation) needs to be started immediately and ideally defibrillation within 5 minutes with each passing minute decreasing the chances of a successful outcome; 8 minutes is the absolute limit. Recently published data shows our ambulance service resuscitation attempts success at just 6%; a major reason being non arrival in time slot – with average responses for Headcorn area of 15 minutes (quoted from KM). Both CPR and defibrillator techniques are simple to learn and training sessions will be arranged in the village hall – simple message 'it could save somebody'. It is still hoped a CFR (Community First Responder) scheme will get off the ground but meantime we have the temporary help offered by Chris Wheal who is both first aid and defibrillator trained – if a second defibrillator becomes available valuable time could be saved not having to access it from the public point; we just hope it will never be needed.

In response to requests telephone numbers for doctors, hospitals and KCC Highways have now been included on the 'contact numbers' page.

On the Saturday 16th February for a while in the morning the only fully open route into Grafty Green was via Ulcombe with most of the problems involving trees and power lines and a landslip in Elmstone Hole Road. The blockage on Liverton Hill had to wait for clearing with Council help in mid-afternoon and inspection by Network Power; a small groups of 'locals' working alongside the Council and the hill was reopened late afternoon. The Fire and Ambulance service were notified of the possible difficulties which in the event caused no problems.

As an advance notice on the afternoon of Tuesday 8th April an 'open house' multi - agency event is being planned in the village hall as an opportunity for residents to ask questions and gather useful information on numerous topics. Present will be KCC Community Wardens, Police/PCSO's, Kent Fire and Rescue Service, Parish Council, an advice agency such as Age UK or CROP and lastly either Red Cross or St John Ambulance (emergency first aid / defibrillator awareness amongst other things).

Events such as this have been held elsewhere and have proved to be extremely popular covering many diverse topics.

Full details will appear in the April publication of Malherbe Monthly.

Grafty Gourmet

This is a great dish which will literally melt in the mouth. Serve with either sautéed potatoes or mash, with vegetables of your choice. Serves 4

Slow Roast Belly of Pork with Caramelised Apples & Cider Sauce

2.25kg piece boneless pork belly
1 bulb garlic, halved
2 sprigs fresh thyme
1 tablespoon vegetable oil
2 teaspoons coarse cooking salt

Caramelised apples

½ cup (110g) caster sugar
½ cup (125ml) calvados
20g butter
4 small apples, peeled, halved, cored

Cider sauce

1 tablespoon olive oil
3 shallots, sliced thinly
3 cloves garlic, sliced thinly
1 sprig fresh thyme
3 cups (750ml) dry apple cider
1 chicken stock cube, crumbled
1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
1 teaspoon caster sugar
50g chilled butter, chopped

Preheat the oven to 140°C (120°C fan-forced). Using a small sharp knife, score the pork rind.

Place garlic and thyme in the base of a medium baking dish. Season the pork flesh with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Place pork, rind-side up, on garlic mixture. Add enough boiling water to the baking dish to almost cover pork (try not to cover rind). Place a sheet of baking paper over pork. Cover dish tightly with foil, ensuring it is completely sealed. Roast for 4 hours (the pork should be starting to fall apart).

Remove pork from the baking dish; discard liquid. Cool pork to room temperature, keeping it covered with baking paper and foil (refrigerate overnight, if possible for better results).

Preheat oven to 220°C (200°C fan-forced). Cut pork into 4 equal pieces. Place pork on a baking-paper lined oven tray. Rub the rind with oil and coarse cooking salt. Roast for about 30 minutes or until the rind is crisp and browned.

Caramelised apples

Meanwhile, place sugar in a medium frying pan over medium-high heat. Cook, without stirring, until sugar turns a dark caramel colour. Add calvados and flambé (be very careful, this will flame). Simmer, uncovered, for about 1 minute, then add butter and apples; stir to coat the apples in butter mixture. Cook, covered loosely, for about 8-10 minutes, turning apples occasionally until just tender.

Cider sauce

Heat oil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Cook shallots, garlic and thyme for about 3-4 minutes or until tender. Add cider and bring to the boil. Boil for 5 minutes or until liquid is reduced to 1 cup. Add stock cube; simmer for 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Strain mixture through a fine sieve over a bowl; discard solids. Return cider to the pan over low heat. Gradually whisk in butter (piece by piece) until shiny and thickened slightly. Stir in sugar and parsley.

BUS SERVICE 59

Grafty Green – Maidstone via Ulcombe and Kingswood

A new timetable, reproduced in Malherbe Monthly, was introduced on Monday 24th February, affecting certain **Monday to Friday** services.

The morning **schooldays** departure from Grafty Green now departs ten minutes earlier at **06.53**. This change has been made by Arriva following complaints from parents and schools about late running caused by increasing traffic congestion in Maidstone. In the town it now runs to the High Street via Mill Street so will therefore no longer serve the Chequers Bus Station.

On **non-schooldays** the first bus from Grafty Green will also depart ten minutes earlier at **07.11** and is scheduled to arrive at Maidstone King Street at 08.04.

The afternoon schooldays departure is now starting its journey from the Chequers Bus Station at the existing time of 16.12, ie. it will no longer serve the King Street stop.

The **Saturday** service is unchanged.





If you continue to use Windows XP after support ends, your computer will still work but it might become more vulnerable to security risks and viruses.

To stay protected after support ends, you have two options:

1. Upgrade your current PC

Download and run the Windows Upgrade Assistant to check if your PC meets the system requirements for Windows 8.1 (the latest version of Window) and then follow the steps in the tutorial to upgrade if your PC is able.

Book about building The Heart of Kent Hospice

Many people are familiar with The Heart of Kent Hospice through personal experience of the love and care it offers to the terminally ill and their families. Many more have heard about its valuable service from friends and relatives. But not everyone is familiar with how the hospice came to be built – and of the seven years hard work it took to raise the money to build and equip it.

Mrs Molly Poulter, the Appeal Organiser at the time, has recently published a little book entitled *Building the Heart of Kent Hospice: a personal Memoir*.

In it she writes about the long and tortuous negotiations involved in getting the hospice built. She talks about the twenty-six local fund raising groups she set up, and the regular meetings that took place over the years so that everyone was kept up to date with what progress was being made. She names the many people who were involved (and apologises for those she has inadvertently left out), and she describes all the major events she organised centrally. The book is full of photographs of the volunteers involved, and the events that took place over the years.

In all, £1.3 million was raised to build and equip the hospice. When the project first began, it was anticipated that £600 would be needed. Now, it costs over £3 million per annum just to run it!

In her book, Molly talks about the philosophy of the hospice movement, the reasons why people get involved in a charity, and the importance of a good organisational structure. What emerges from the book is the wonderful feeling of camaraderie and friendship that developed over the years – something, she says, continues to this day.

It is a book that people involved with a new charity might find helpful for the many fund raising ideas it contains. The book costs £7.99 and, thanks to some very generous sponsorship, it is hoped it will add over £5,000 to hospice funds. Christian Message - March 2014

Was it a goal or wasn't it?

If you are of a certain age, like me, you will remember the 'goal' scored by Geoff Hurst in England's victory against West Germany in the 1966 World Cup final. It must be one of the most frequently shown clips and one of the most widely debated of sports incidents in our time.

Even today, with the help of slow motion replays and computer simulation, it seems that nobody can be completely sure. We have to feel sorry for the referee on the day, but he had to come to a decision.

And so it is in our lives. We have to make decisions and the right choice is often far from clear. For instance, have you been offered a ticket as you drive into a car park by someone as they are leaving and there is unspent time on their ticket. Might that be thought of as stealing from those who run the car park, or can we justify it by saying that time has already been paid for by someone else? The right choice, we might decide, is not clear.

Jesus did say

'give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's.'

Mark 12: 17

The guidance Jesus gives us as we make our decisions is that the whole law is summed up in the command to love. This was the new commandment that Jesus gave us, that we should love one another. Even in the Old Testament we have examples of how to make right decisions in the way we live our lives.

Recently I have been reading from the Old Testament book of Jeremiah, where he is telling the people to prepare for a long exile and so gives them advice on how to live in a foreign land. He tells them to live alongside the Babylonians seeking and praying for Babylon's welfare, a very different attitude from the desire for vengeance and plans for rebellion that others are forming.

We too might be seen as living in a foreign land - a land where much of our secular lives are lives that can be seen as lives being lived in exile from the moral and ethical certainties that we like to think Christianity would offer. But that is not the way of Christ, he never promised us an easy life where having to make right decisions about right and wrong, good and evil would be easy. Sometimes the choice is clear, sometimes confusing, sometimes easy, sometimes hard, sometimes mattering little, sometimes much, but, whatever the case we need to seek the will of Christ to make up our minds as to the best way forward.

Just the same as Jeremiah, we are called to live in the place and time we find ourselves in today. Jeremiah's advice is not easy to follow, denial, anger and opposition to many situations we find ourselves in are natural responses. Jesus himself commands that we

'love our enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you' Luke 6:27-28

Peter also offers advice on our decisions on how we live in often difficult circumstances. He says that others in our society will see how those who follow Christ are living that they

'will see their honourable deeds and glorify God.' 1Peter 2: 11-12

We do know that Jesus himself would break the law, for instance healing on the Sabbath. He tells us that the whole law must be summed up in the command to love. We must pray for understanding of what that means so I pray that may that truth shape our decisions, our attitudes and our life, to God's glory. Amen
