Neighbourhood Plan UPDATE



irstly, thank you to all of the Parish residents and business owners who completed the recent Neighbourhood Development Plan questionnaire. In total, 187 surveys were submitted via either the online system or hard copy. We have now had the responses professionally analysed, providing a wealth of detail across the eight objectives that were identified following the initial consultation events that were held in the autumn of 2015. Unsurprisingly, some objectives received more detailed feedback than others with a particular focus on traffic, parking and housing, including dwelling type, numbers and design.

The Steering Group are now using this information to write the draft Neighbourhood Development Plan. It is our intention to have this ready for a review by the Parish Council by the end of the summer prior to sharing it with

the Parish in the autumn.

There will be an opportunity to provide comment and feedback on the plan at this stage before it is submitted to Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC). The plan will then have to be approved by both AVDC and an independent examiner who will ensure that the plan reflects the views and opinions that have been received through consultation with the Parish.

It is intended that a referendum will take place in the spring of 2017 when everyone in the Parish will have the opportunity to vote on whether the plan should be adopted.

FORD END WATERMILL IVINGHOE, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE

The only working watermill to survive intact in the county. The mill, recorded in 1616 but probably much older, was in use until 1963.

Now restored by volunteers and run by Ford End Watermill Society, it retains all the atmosphere of a small farm mill of the late 1800s. Visitors can work the sack hoist and mill wheat on a rotary hand quern. Stoneground wholemeal flour for sale on milling days.

e at the Hub have had a really exciting few months since the last issue of the Beacon! Our external paying has completed. which we hope you will agree, really adds something to the Old School and to the centre of our village - we thank everyone for their forbearance while the work was carried out, although the contract became somewhat stretched because of worn out drainage, unrecorded ancient plumbing. tree roots and other problems. From the Hub's point of view, everything has been really positive apart from the theft of a contractor's dumper truck on a Tuesday early evening - this left a bad taste in our contractor's mouth during what he had felt was a very worthwhile project.

You may have noticed also that we have a 'mini' Victorian style lamp-post by the rear gate – to match that at the front – which gives much needed ground level safety illumination around the gate and rear entrance way – we are not hoping for it to grow bigger to match the one in the front, though!

A very enjoyable Jazz evening was held on 4th April, and we hope this will be the first of many – it is suggested that a summer musical evening would be able to spill out onto the rear paving area to enjoy



the sunset lit summer evening space!

We volunteer trustees for the Hub and our hard working CuriosiTEA Rooms tenant and team, are **intent on fulfilling our remit for Community wellbeing** by running this welcoming Hub venue. We always throw it open seven days a week to offer its rooms for hire, and the Café to offer refreshment. On special Lawn event days we warmly extend that welcome to offer support in whatever way we can...just come in, in good time, and plan with us... because it all adds up to welcome village entertainment and wellbeing for us all.

When the Church fete did its lovely Queens 90th Birthday Celebration in early June, the trustees hung up union jack bunting, and hung a special Royal Photography wall exhibition around our welcoming 'hall' space. Hayley extended the café into outdoors ice cream selling and withdrew her cakes, so that the WI could sell their own either inside in the cool of the exhibition space or just in case it was wet, or – as it was a lovely day – they chose outside in the open.

CuriosiTEA Room's 3rd Birthday on 19th June Birthday coincided with the Beacon Choir 'Singing on the Lawn' which was really lovely – challenges still raise their heads, though, in that just as we were singing 'Happy Birthday to You' and hanging up surprise Café bunting, someone rushed out of the café loo

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

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any of you will have heard that the lead was removed from both lyinghoe and Marsworth churches recently in two damaging acts of theft. The lead lay on top of the wooden roof to provide a waterproof seal. The cost of the repairs to St Mary's will be approaching £10,000. Both churches are insured but are still liable to pay an excess of £1000 each.

All churches with lead roofs are protected by a system called Smart Water. This is a chemical painted on that gives the lead from each church a unique indelible code. Any dealer buying the lead could identify where it has come from so it is unlikely to be sold in this country. What was stolen might raise about £500 if taken abroad.

We might not have stopped to think that how we use money is spiritual matter. There is a need deeply embedded into human nature to give and share what we have. We discover, as we grow older, that we get more pleasure and joy when we give presents to others than when we receive. We are made in the image of God who is generous; all we own and all we are is his gift to us. People of faith find that in giving to charity we learn about the nature of God. The same can be said about giving time and using our abilities for the benefit of others. These are all ways of sharing our gifts.

Jesus had plenty to say about money. There are the parables of the talents, the dishonest steward, the rich young ruler, the widow's mite and others. He was more concerned with faith-raising than fund-raising. We need to get on with both but they are closely linked. Many situations of need are much more urgent and bigger than the holes we now have in our church roofs but they present an opportunity for us to become more fully the human beings we have the potential to become. As we learn to give we grow spiritually.

A Swarm Of Honey

Honey Bee Swarms: Swarms such as the ones pictured are merely Colonies that are in transition. Normally these Swarms are found hanging from tree branch, fence post or any place where the swarm can gather close to the Queen while scouts are sent out to look for a more permanent home. A swarm left alone will only be in place from just a few minutes to a few hours and occasionally a few days. Generally swarms are very docile and the swarming Bees usually will not sting. When Honey Bees swarm they gorge themselves with honey before leaving the hive which makes it very hard for them to double over and sting.





What Causes Honey Bees to Swarm: Honey Bees have a natural instinct to survive by sending out new colonies. They may also swarm through overcrowding or because an old queen is thought to be failing and they wish to raise a new one. Honey Bees usually swarm in early spring just as the colony is building up numbers in anticipation of the upcoming honey flow but swarming can happen through to late summer It is difficult to predict if weather conditions will lead to a large number of swarms in a particular year.

If You See a Swarm: Declining Honey Bee numbers make the collection of swarms an important part of the work of bee keepers. You should never interfere with a swarm and pest control companies will not kill a swarm unless absolutely necessary.

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Councillor News from Avril Davies

Home to School Transport Policy Review – consultation closed 15th July

Although the proposals in the review may not affect Pitstone residents, where the proposed policy is already applied, this will affect Ivinghoe and Ivinghoe Aston unless responses to the consultation and my own representations block the changes. It means that free transport is proposed to be no longer provided to Cottesloe school automatically, only to the nearest school, which is Tring. Free transport will be provided to Cottesloe only if a place has been applied for at Tring as first preference, but is not available. No changes will take place until September 2017 at the earliest.

The changes proposed are to remove Section 2.2 Additional Entitlements Provided in Buckinghamshire

Those living closest to a non-Buckinghamshire school:

In addition to the statutory entitlement to transport to the nearest school, qualifying pupils will also be offered transport to the nearest Buckinghamshire School unless in a particular locality there is an existing admissions arrangement or significant pattern of parental choice for a non-Buckinghamshire school.

Section 3 Eligibility for free travel

Your nearest qualifying school is an out-of-county school.

The policy includes four out-ofcounty secondary schools as **'virtual'** Buckinghamshire schools for transport purposes.

For 2014/15 they will be: Icknield School in Watlington, Lord Williams School in Thame, Tring Schools and Wheatley park School, and for the areas in Buckinghamshire where one of these schools is closest and where there is a 'significant pattern of parental choice' for the out-of-county school then free transport will be provided to that school.

Where these schools are closest but there is 'significant pattern of parental choice' for a local Buckinghamshire school that is further away, then free transport will also be provided to that school as well. This particularly affects Tring School as currently Marsworth and Pitstone have a 'significant pattern of parental choice' for Tring School and transport would be provided there whereas Cheddington, Dagnall, Ivinghoe Aston and Edlesborough all have a 'significant pattern of parental choice' for Cottesloe School and are provided with transport there. The schools included at this point will be reviewed annually.

The following section is not proposed to be changed.

Free transport will still be provided (subject to conditions) if you could not be offered your nearest qualifying school even though you applied for it.

If we could not offer you your preference nearest qualifying school then we may assist with transport to the next nearest qualifying school if you expressed this as a lower preference.

Active Bucks - Keeping active is the key to staying healthy - FREE exercise and activity classes on offer

People of all ages can benefit from being active says Dr Jane O'Grady, Buckinghamshire's Director of Public Health, in her annual report: "it's not just our health and wellbeing that is improved by physical activity but also the educational attainment for our children and young people, the safety and quality of our environment and the connections we make in our communities.

"At the moment, we're simply not active enough, with only 1 in 5 young people in Buckinghamshire reaching the level of activity needed to see benefits, and the proportion of active children actually falling. With adults, only 6 out of 10 are reaching the recommended guidelines, and 1 in 5 are completely inactive – with activity levels generally reducing with age.

'Active Bucks' launched in June has brought together all the opportunities for fresh air and exercise throughout the County on to a single website, enabling you to search for all activities by distance from where you live, and offering a free taster first class or session.

In addition a new scheme of free walks will soon start from Ivinghoe, with walk leader training taking place on 18th July and walks launched soon after, and you can already participate in an open air adventure scheme in Ashridge.

England's economic Heartlands

The Bucks, Oxfordshire, and Northamptonshire alliance to promote economic infrastructure projects including East-West rail and Silverstone has been joined by five other local authorities to complete an Oxfordshire to Cambridgeshire arc. In a very short space of time this group of councils has gained the same status with government for investment as the more publicised North West powerhouse and the Midlands powerhouse.

Bucks County Council is also putting together a business case for a single unitary authority for the whole of the county, except Milton Keynes which already is a unitary authority. The Bucks Districts are also working on their own business cases. All will be put to the government minister in December for an early decision.

This plan is now going through its first round of public consultation, and is certainly testing the robustness of the Neighbourhood plans already subject to referendum and accepted. Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan

If you are not already aware the AVDC Local Plan is now at the Draft stage and the DC are presenting the full document to the residents of the district for review and comments. This consultation will be from Thursday 7th July to Monday 5th September. You should have received a leaflet through your door giving details of how to access the plan. Hard copies will be made available at Aylesbury Friars Square on Thursday 14th July and Friday 5th August supported by council officers to answer any questions.

How to make comments

In addition to the opportunity at the events identified above you are asked to feedback online using the link on AVDC's website: www.aylesburyvaledc.gov. uk/localplan

What you can comment on

You can comment on anything in the plan or tell AVDC about things that you think should be in the plan but isn't. Look for things that you have concerns; you need clarification; you would like further detail etc.

The Local Plan Document is made up of 221 pages and will take a considerable time to read, I have tried to identify some of the contentious points that we as residents may wish to have further justification/clarification. The main theme of my listings below is housing development because I have assumed



(right or wrong) that this will be the immediate interest. Also, although this listing is by no means definitive it is aimed at what I consider the high profile 'points'.

Para 1.10 Page 11: Duty to Cooperate

This is the reason for the additional "12.000 additional houses identified as unmet needs".

Para 1.14 Page 12: Housing

Here the DC describe the Garden Town aspiration's.

Para 1.26 Page 14: Neighbourhood

Plans Why the numbers are not the same for the Neighbourhood Plans and the AVDC Local Plan!

Para 2.4 a. Page 21: Green belt will be protected. Not a lot in Aylesbury Vale District (AVD), see map on page 19.

Para 2.4 i. Page 23: A new settlement,

(the first in Buckinghamshire since Milton Keynes in the 1960's)

Para 3.11 Page 29: "Following uplifts, the number of new houses required across the housing market area is 50,000, with 21,300 required in Aylesbury Vale. Although other councils have not yet completed their capacity assessments, there is likely to be an element of unmet needs required to be met by Aylesbury Vale. At present we are estimating a figure of 12,000 to meet unmet needs from Wycombe, Chiltern and South Bucks. Further capacity work within the housing market area may mean that this will change, so a definitive housing number cannot yet be established."

Para 3.16 page 30 and 31: Spatial Strategy for growth identifies the percentage growth for all settlements; 19% for Cheddington and Marsworth as medium villages; 22% for lyinghoe and Pitstone as larger villages.

Page 33: 5 Year housing Plan explanation. Para 3.22 and 3.23 page 34 "Windfall allowance" ie one off builds etc. this is not clear!

Page 35: and following tables – Settlement hierarchy and cohesive development, these tables are interesting in that they do not agree with the neighbourhood plans.

Page 41: Green Belt, this section describes the changes to the green belt within the AVD.

Para 3.5 page 45: Infrastructure, worth reading.

Page 49: Gypsy, Traveller and travelling showpeople provision, informative but no specific changes to existing arrangements locally.

Page 54: Delivering through the neighbourhood planning

Page 65: Delivering a new settlement, interesting because Cheddington was considered (twice it seems! table page 66) Would this have meant a 6000 new dwellings somewhere between Cheddington, Ivinghoe, Marworth and Pitstone? Short list currently are Haddenham and Winslow. This needs to be watched and questioned.

Page 78: Delivering the allocated sites larger villages, ref to neighbourhood plans etc, table shows requirements and the requirements, see paras 4.72 and 4.73.

Page 83: Delivering the allocated sites medium villages, ref to neighbourhood plans etc, table shows requirements and the requirements, see paras 4.82

Page 107: Aylesbury town centre redevelopment, aspirations, parking shopping etc

Page 113: Affordable housing on open market sites, to buy or to rent! States the percentages ie 31% on sites of more than 11 or more dwellings.

Page 115: Affordable housing on rural exception sites, these are house aimed at keeping local villages within their home village, and example in Cheddington is the Partridge Close development.

Page 123: Self/custom build housing "The plan will expect all larger

developments to provide a percentage of serviced dwelling plots for sale to self/custom builders"

Page 124: Housing mix: housing for older people and housing with specific needs, contains percentages and rooms numbers etc.

Page 144: Vehicle Parking. Gives the number of parking spaces per rooms. Also see Para 7.4 "Research has also shown that most residents use garages for domestic storage rather than for vehicle storage, which subsequently reduces the available off street parking for individual dwellings. It is therefore proposed that these structures will no longer be allocated as parking spaces within new developments."

be allocated: Pitstone page 208; Cheddington page 209 (Croft Meadows); Marsworth page 210 (Marsworth Glebe, Lower Icknield Way), Ivinghoe page207 (no sites identified at this stage) **Page 212: Glossary,** this is useful and may be worth printing out if you want read the whole document

NB:

- 1. The text above in italics are from the local plan.
- We have noted that there is no reference to any unmet needs from Luton, South West Beds, Dacorum or London, so we are specifically concerned that this requirement can grow.

Conclusion

It is essential that as many residents review this draft AVDC Local Plan and feedback to the council their views and request clarifications where appropriate.
