PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT OF WATERSTOCK GOLF CLUB
INTO A LOGISTICS HUB

The Parish Council would like to thank those of you who have been in touch already with your thoughts on the proposed change of use of Waterstock Golf Club.

The proposals have been in the local press recently and consist of the golf club changing use to a logistics hub containing a large number of warehouses, to support the local and regional area. The proposal would generate an increased number of vehicle journeys in the area, made up of the proposed 3,500 employees and vehicles delivering to and from the site, which will directly affect the A418.

The Parish Council are opposed to this and along with Great Milton Parish Council support Waterstock Parish Council in their efforts in fighting this proposal.

We are collating information for those of you who have already responded and working alongside local parishes to find the best way forward for all local groups to work together on this.

There was a really good turn out at the “Walk to Save Oxford Green Belt” at the beginning of July and that showed the strength of feeling and concern at the proposal development at Waterstock Golf Club into a Logistics Hub. Many of you have already indicated willingness to support efforts to fight this proposal and we will work alongside Waterstock and other local parish councils to resist this. If anyone else is able to offer support or wants to get involved, please email the clerk – details below.

There are some wonderful walks in and around Tiddington that give precious access to the countryside that we all want to be able to enjoy, particularly during the lovely weather – but with that comes responsibility and, although most do follow it, it is perhaps an opportunity to remind us all of some of the key points in the Countryside Code:

- Protect animals and plants
- Keep dogs under close control and clear up after them
- Take your litter home with you
- Leave gates and property as you find them

Work is nearly complete in the play area and we are hoping to be able to open early in August ready for the children to enjoy during the summer holidays – we will confirm as soon as we are able and additionally post details on the Tiddington People facebook page. To ensure we can keep it open, and us all safe, we ask that you follow the guidelines that will be posted around the park (see also page x) and if there are any issues or concerns, please let the clerk know. As part of the work we have also erected a gate in the gap next to the bus stop which, we hope you agree, not only looks good but provides some additional safety:

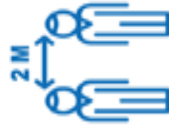
COVID-19 PLAYGROUND GUIDELINES

UPDATE ON THE POTENTIAL DEVELOPMENT AT WATERSTOCK GOLF COURSE

Firstly, a big thank you to all of you who joined in the Save Oxford and Waterstock Green Belt on the Oxfordshire Way footpath which crosses the Waterstock Golf Course. Over 320 people from most of the local villages as well as supporters from Oxford took part to demonstrate the strength of feelings and opposition to this unwanted proposal.

Walkers agreed that it would devastate the Green Belt, double the traffic, massively increase pollution and threaten the health and wellbeing of our communities as well as damaging the local wildlife and the Waterstock designated Local Wildlife Site. The 'walk' was widely reported in the local Oxford press and on the BBC South and ITV Meridian Evening News Bulletins.

By the time you read this we expect that the speculators, Greystoke may have put in a formal planning application on Waterstock Golf Club's behalf to develop the site into a distribution warehousing centre and perhaps to build 1750 houses on the adjacent land. So the 'walk' will probably be just the first of many actions we need to take over the coming months and possibly years until hopefully the Council and planners agree there is no merit in developing this site.

Plans are being drawn up and you will be asked to participate in further events and take actions like writing to your MP and councillors when we know exactly the scope of the threat we all face.

As this article went to press, the Enquiry into the new Local Plan for South Oxfordshire had just started. As many of you will know, the Local Plan sets out where and to what extent development will occur up to 2034, although Plans are usually revised before they reach their finish date. The purpose of the Enquiry, which is led by an Inspector, somewhat like a Judge, is to establish whether the Local Plan is "sound".

It is important for the Local Authority to have a sound plan in place because otherwise planning becomes a Wild West of predatory applications in unwanted places. If the Inspector finds the Plan is not "sound" it will have to be made so, and this potentially could mean some development sites being removed and new ones added, following a new public consultation.

At the Enquiry consultants called Harris Lamb, on behalf of Greystoke, the promoters of the distribution centre and housing development at Waterstock Golf Club and on neighbouring farmland, will be telling the Inspector that he should find the plan “unsound” because some of the proposed housing sites in the Plan are not deliverable or desirable and there is not enough land identified for employment and distribution. They say a big chunk of the Oxford Arc needs could be accommodated at Waterstock Golf Club.

This is not uncommon. Most developers with sites to pitch for will be doing the same. It is unlikely the Inspector will be convinced, and even if he is, he will not consider the suitability or otherwise of Waterstock Golf Club at the Enquiry. However, if he does decide the Plan unsound, then the District Council will have to consider which of the many alternative sites, amongst them Waterstock Golf Club, should be included in a new public consultation on a revised Local Plan.

Our objective must be to make sure that it is not included and is deemed as inappropriate for development to protect all our communities. Our key messages will be that Waterstock Golf Club is in the Green Belt, where development is in principle inappropriate; it is a popular recreation area much used by walkers and golfers – the Government’s recommended use for open Green Belt land. It is a leafy green, tree-covered area, full of footpaths and a carbon sink. Local roads are inadequate and could not cope with thousands of daily HGV and other vehicle movements. A conservative estimate suggests development would double existing traffic along the A418 and surrounding roads never mind the pollution it would create. Development would also threaten important local wildlife and habitats including the Local Wildlife Site.

So much more campaigning is almost certain to lie ahead. We are looking at getting professional advice/input perhaps paid for perhaps pro bono or a mix of both. This means we may be looking at a crowdsourcing campaign to help us with defence costs but if you have any contacts or expertise please get in touch with the Campaign group which will have representatives from all local villages involved.

“Keep Waterstock Green Belt Green” – Development on the 200 acre green belt site of Waterstock Golf Course and 100 acres of adjacent land would cause huge environmental damage and pollution to the surrounding communities, through massively increased traffic and toxic emissions, noise, water and air pollution, as well as endangering rare wildlife.

The proposal for a major fulfilment hub for the South of England with warehousing and lorries based here would affect a huge area, greatly increasing lorry traffic on our roads for up to 50 miles around. This would adversely impact the nature of our local towns and villages in particular Thame, Aylesbury and Wheatley; and alter the nature of our countryside and the health and wellbeing of our communities.

Development on the golf course would destroy thousands of mature trees currently helping to keep our air and water clean and providing much needed shelter and habitat for many kinds of wildlife in the adjacent designated Local Wildlife Site at Waterstock. The Golf Course is a popular public amenity serving the stated purpose of Green Belt in providing recreational and sporting facilities as well as protecting wildlife and countryside.

It is easily accessible and used by people from all over Oxfordshire. It consists of a well-used pitch up and play golf course and several public footpaths including the renowned Oxfordshire Way, used regularly by ramblers and walkers from all over the county.

Plus, the Green Belt at Waterstock Golf Course provides important hinterland to the Local Wildlife Site by giving invaluable protection to the many rare species of birds including rare curlew, animals like otters and polecats and plants like the Greater Dodder. “

Message from Cllr Tim Bearder

When John Howell took over from Boris Johnson as our MP in Henley, his election material at the time included a magazine in which he said: "My position is clear: development should take place to improve Brown Field sites, and should not take place in the Green Belt. That's what I stand for."

The man who went on to become our Prime Minister said of John at the time: "Nobody has worked harder or more successfully than John Howell to protect South Oxfordshire's green spaces. That's why he will make a superb MP for Henley."

Roll forward more than a decade and the ever present threat to the Green Belt and its dual roles safeguarding the countryside from encroachment and checking the unrestricted sprawl of large built up areas, again rears its ugly head.

Not to worry. To combat that fearsome prospect we have South Oxfordshire's knight in shining armour, the mighty Green Belt defender wielding his valiant Twitter account, with which he proclaimed on the 17th Feb this year: "News reaches me today that SODC is preparing to take my advice and go for examination in public before a planning inspector re. Local Plan. Asking for clarification of changes that can be made. At last some progress in the right direction."

"His advice"?! South Oxfordshire District Council was forced to put the previous Conservative administration's plan through inspection by the Conservative Secretary of State Robert Jenrick. The Lib Dem/ Green ruling administration had wanted to withdraw it. It was not his advice that made them take this course of action.

But given he believes it was his suggestion to resolve the plan's problems at the Examination In Public (EiP), isn't it slightly absurd that the inspector hasn't received any submissions from John Howell MP? He's not scheduled to appear at the Hearings. Nor has he submitted comments to the Reg 19 consultation.

In Eastleigh, where I have the great honour of serving as part of the Lib Dem administration trying to pass our own plan, the former Conservative MP Mims Davies has spoken at planning appeals and was due to speak at the EiP in January but her successor, MP Paul Holmes, took her slot after winning the seat at the last General Election. If we go further back in time in Eastleigh, both Mims and Lib Dem MP Chris Huhne before her, got involved in appeals. You expect it of your MP. You'd certainly expect it from someone who has explicitly stated he does not believe development should take place in the Green Belt!

Why I fight for the Green Belt

We have been very fortunate with the weather on the whole since returning, and most of our sessions have been outside: feet painting, nurturing tadpoles into froglets, looking after our plants and clocking up hours for the '1000 Hours Outside' Challenge we started in January. We have also made 'fruit sundaes', explored the properties of scented ice shapes, made potions and driven Mrs Rogers crazy with daily 'Wiggles' social distancing songs and dancing! 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GREAT HASELEY AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY - August 2020

2020 will undoubtedly be a year to remember with our constant companion, Covid-19. This has given a lot of people much more time at home and, with nowhere to go, more time to garden and in particular to grow vegetables and fruit.

There is no doubt that growing your own food is a rewarding, if time consuming, occupation. You know you are eating produce which is chemical free and very tasty because it is so fresh. Even organic produce can have certain chemicals applied because they are plant based, so is not necessarily as good as you think. You are in control of what your home-grown food contains. When I started to write this column a few years ago I practised what I would call balanced gardening with judicious use of pesticides and fungicides occasionally if required. My use of these chemicals has gradually reduced to the stage where I have not used any at all this summer so I am now almost a 'natural' gardener.

I do still use weed killers from time to time as I can't provide the manpower to tackle some weed areas in our meadow. Thistles are pulled rather than sprayed and nettles and docks are either sprayed when very young or have flowering stems removed by hand. The late TV gardener, Geoff Hamilton, used to say that glyphosate was almost organic as it is inactivated when it hits the soil; it may be removed from sale in the near future, like many chemicals, but we will wait and see. We keep a large area of nettles for wildlife in the bottom of the meadow where the slope makes mowing difficult and the whole meadow is cut once a year which keeps weeds down and allows wild flowers to seed, not to mention feeding animals over the winter. This year we have increased amounts of Scabious, Geranium pratense (meadow cranesbill) and the delicately pretty yellow lady's bedstraw. The rain this spring and summer has been fabulous for the garden, although the endless spring rain went on far too long for my liking (never satisfied!). We have had alternating rain and warm sunny periods. This has made caring for the garden much easier than usual and I don't ever remember us having a lovely green lawn at this time of year. I use the term lawn in its broadest sense as an area of mown grass. Even that is not totally accurate as we don't use feed and weed because we don't want to make the grass grow even faster and we rather like all the wild flowers that appear between mowing.

Enjoy your garden while the borders are full and the weeds are, hopefully swamped.

Dog Fouling

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. If you are a dog owner, you have a legal duty to clean up every time your dog messes in a public place.

Under the *Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act* 1996 a person who is in charge of a *dog* must clean up after it when it fouls any footpath, highway, verge or other open space to which the public have access. It is therefore a crime to allow a *dog* to *foul* in any public area without clearing it up.

Fines and criminal offences

In England and Wales, a person who doesn't clean up after their dog may face an on-the-spot fine of up to £80. These fines are known as fixed penalty notices. If a person refuses to pay they can be taken to the local Magistrates Court for the dog fouling offence and fined up to £1,000. If you see a dog owner allowing their dog to foul and not picking it up, take details of anything that might help us identify them and contact Environmental Protection env.health@southandvale.gov.uk

Thousands of residents in southern Oxfordshire have found their recycling bins unemptied each week because they have put the wrong things in them.



Putting non-recyclable items in recycling can contaminate a whole truck-load, which is then rejected at the recycling facility. This turns neighbours' recycling into rubbish and ultimately wastes energy and raw materials by removing these items from the recycling process.

Bin crews in South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse districts have stepped up monitoring of recycling bins in recent months as the lockdown has meant an increase in household waste, which has meant an increased risk of people putting the wrong items in recycling bins.

To remind residents about what can (and can't) be recycled, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils have devised a new recycling quiz here:

During one week of recycling collections in the past month there were 3,801 reports of wrong items found in recycling bins in South Oxfordshire 2,211 reports of wrong items found in recycling bins in Vale of White Horse. Bins found with incorrect items for recycling were left unemptied.

The vast majority were rejected because residents had put black or coloured bin bags into recycling bins. Crews cannot see what is in them and so won't empty the bin. The next biggest category of rejections was because food was found in the green bin. Food contaminates recycling making it unrecyclable. Food can be collected in food bins and taken to a separate facility where it is transformed into electricity and fertiliser.

Textiles, like old T-shirts and odd socks are another reason for crews to leave recycling bins unemptied. Although both councils collect textiles for recycling at a different facility, they must be left in a tied carrier bag next to the green bin. Other non-recyclable items which are regularly found by bin crews in recycling bins are polystyrene, plastic toys, garden waste, electrical items, wood and nappies.

These items cannot be sorted at the recycling centres and shouldn't be put in the recycling as they can contaminate a whole truckload of recycling.

Recycling should be in the green bin loose or in clear bags so the crews can easily identify that the contents are recyclable.

If they see non-recyclables, crews will leave the bins unemptied, record the reasons and leave a tag on the bin explaining to residents.

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I want to begin this month with a huge thank you to everyone in communities who has done so much to help others through the coronavirus crisis. I have been so encouraged by the resourcefulness of communities, the way in which people have adapted to the circumstances, the support that has been given to the vulnerable, and the resilience shown over so many weeks.

Lockdown has gone on for longer than many of us imagined at first and I know that in some respects the initial community spirit has become jaded by our own weariness and frustrations. Many people are still worried about their health and others are frustrated and worried about their livelihoods whether in their own business or in employment. I am also aware of many concerns over the risks not of the virus but of the vacuum created with life on hold. These include concerns over missed education, missed health treatments, mental health and well-being issues and so much more. It was always going to be easier to go into lockdown than to come out and we need to move out with care for one another. The risk of a second wave of the virus is constant and we must not allow ourselves to be lulled into a false sense of security. Yet we must do what we can to return to normal, whatever that will be going forward.

When the prime Minister delivered his speech on recovery I know that the 'Build, build, build' slogan worried some people as they took it to be primarily about house building and were concerned that this might be uncontrolled. It is certainly not about uncontrolled development and indeed is very much wider. It is about rebuilding our collective lives, about investment in infrastructure that has been long called for – in schools, hospitals, and transport, and in turn in creating jobs and rebuilding our economy. There has also been right and proper concern that we take this opportunity to rebuild with the environment in mind, a green recovery as it has been called. I have supported this and was pleased to see this coming through in the Chancellor's mini budget delivered on 8th July.

During this time I have seen the number and variety of issues raised with me grow enormously. Over the last month, with the help of my team, we have dealt with over 3500 emails, this represents over a five-fold increase on more normal months. A large number of these have been helping people on individual issues and problems related to Coronavirus. With other emails it has been interesting to see the wide range of concerns raised. Clearly planning and development concerns and environmental issues remain high on the agenda for constituents.

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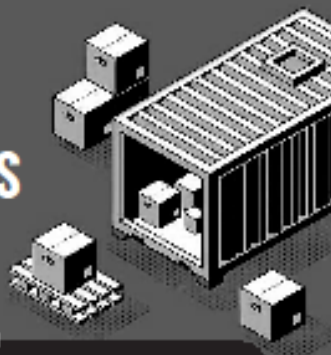
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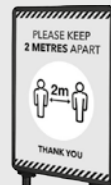
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TIDDINGTON CRICKET CLUB
