Village Hall: It seems that we will not be receiving the Local Communities Grant applied for. An application will be made again next year, and further grant funding will be investigated.

The hall could benefit from some redecoration – this will be discussed further at the next meeting Roads and Hedges:

1. Under-pinning work is underway on the Halam Beck section by the Turnpike

2. Some verge cutting is required, especially where the long grass obstructs views at junctions. This has been flagged up to County Highways

3. The gulleys that need clearing – especially School lane – have been reported to Highways

4. Flashing school lights – these are to be sited on the approach from Edingley when a suitable location has been agreed.

I have retired as Churchwarden for reasons amongst which are a wish to share more time with our grownup children with their own busy lives, and Graeme, of course, who retires in September.

A month after arriving in Halam, I was invited by Canon David Keene to be PCC Secretary and later asked by Canon Hendy, who followed David, to be Churchwarden, which I did for 13 years mentored by Lynda Bass. Six difficult years of interregnum followed, with no parish vicar. David Herbert joined me as Churchwarden and Revd. David McCoulough became priest for 5 years. When David Herbert sadly died, Lay Reader Anne Godfrey supported me. I have enjoyed and learned much over the years organising christenings, confirmations, weddings, funerals, school services, Christmas plays and reading rosters during those years, as well as much administration. Our children grew up attending church, reading lessons, serving the vicar, being admitted for communion and confirmed at the Minster - they had fun, were helpful, matured and learned much which they take into their future lives.

Sharing my lovely garden with visitors on behalf of The National Garden Scheme, as well as small group appointments for WI, U3A and Garden Clubs over the last 14 years has been a joy, as well as generating much-needed funds for charity; funds raised from refreshment income have been donated to St Michael's Church and The City Hospital Burns Unit - this has amounted to about £8,000 for St Michael's over all these years - of which I am very proud. My work as Assistant County Organiser for the NGS involves vetting new gardens, and responsibility for the administration and visiting of about 25 gardens in Notts.

I could not have achieved any of this without the wonderful support of generous friends and my husband Graeme and family. I would like to say a 'big thank you' to all those who have supported me throughout these very busy years both within the church and the village in many different ways.

Village Hall: Some areas of the hall need redecorating. It was agreed to buy paint up to the value of £150, and Carolyn Todd and Sarah Godfrey will organise volunteer painters._Further major work will have to wait until next year, subject to a grant application at that time.

Roads and Hedges: The village gulleys were cleaned out and the verges cut following the parish council's request to Highways last month. A further gulley on Mansfield Road needs clearing.

There are some hedges in the village that need trimming.

A reminder to all residents – the village has been entered into the Best Kept Village competition so it would be appreciated if everyone could make an effort to keep the frontage outside their property looking neat and tidy, especially this month when judging will take place – thanks you!

Flashing lights outside the school – the County Council is to re-visit the site to decide where the lights should be located on the approach from Edingley to the school.

Parking on Radley Road - vehicles are still being parked too close to, or opposite St Michael's Close making it difficult and dangerous for St Michael's residents to enter on to Radley Road. Please park considerately and do not cause obstruction – please note that the local police are aware of this problem and the situation is being monitored.

The continued problems of the School Lane/Turnpike junction were discussed – it was agreed to have further discussions with the County Council to see if there were any ways to make this junction safer e.g. traffic calming measures.

Queen's Birthday:

Many thanks to all involved in organising such a successful village tea on Sunday 12th June, especially all who donated sandwiches and cakes. Many thanks also to The Waggon for hosting the Royal Pub Quiz and providing nibbles and prizes. A special thank you to Julie Paris and Sarah Godfrey for organising these events. Profits of £40 were donated to the parish council towards hall upkeep.

Open Meeting:

The wall will also serve to more clearly define the drive as a private drive and not a road – unanimously agreed to support.

Whatever the weather.....

The English obsession with the weather is our national cliché. Complete strangers discuss its trivial fluctuations intimately, it reflects our shifting moods, and we often endow it with deep meaning. Most people can be easily engaged discussing it, and quite often we use the weather to initiate conversations.

English artists such as Constable and Turner painted weather evoking mood and meaning, - and for hundreds, perhaps over a thousand, years English writers have been describing it, using it symbolically, and finding it to be the subject of despair, joy and humour. Meteorological metaphors litter, and enrich, our language. Our weather is endlessly variable, and though we supposedly have four distinct seasons, occasionally all four manifest themselves on the same day!

If summer 2016 has been a bit on the grim side, endlessly cold and wet, with a few (very few!) days of sun which were so blisteringly hot no-one could bear to go outside for long, we try to appropriate blame: El Nino, the changing direction of the gulf stream, global warming, - but the truth is the English weather has always been capricious. It throws up so many little conundrums for us: What shall we wear today? Ought we take an umbrella? Shall we risk planning a picnic/barbecue/outing?

The truth is where would we be without it? In France people greet each other with kisses; Eskimos rub noses; in Eastern countries people bow; In Germany everybody, but everybody, shakes hands. But the reserved Brit's typical opening gambit generally focuses on the national obsession: 'What awful weather we've been having lately!' It is, if you'll pardon the pun, our way of breaking the ice.

Oscar Wilde thought that talking about the weather was 'the last refuge of the unimaginative'; Jerome K Jerome famously said: 'The weather is like the government, - always in the wrong'; Mark Twain wrote: 'In the Spring I have counted 136 different kinds of weather within 24 hours'. Perhaps though we all ought to adopt John Ruskin's philosophy: 'Sunshine is delicious, rain is refreshing, wind braces us up, snow is exhilarating; there is really no such thing as bad weather, only different kinds of good weather.'

<u>CYRIL HOGGARD</u> 13 June 1933 - 11 August 2016



Cyril was born into a farming family at Brockley Farm, only a few fields away from where he died, and was a farmer all his life. He had a deep love and empathy for everything about the countryside, the land, growing crops and tending animals. He had a deep affection for people. He was a loving and proud husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather.

He was the youngest of 9 children. The family were staunch Methodists and his father was a Methodist lay preacher. He went to school in Edingley. From a young age he helped on the farm, working hard, and eventually farming and market gardening became his life's work. The only time he left farming was during National Service when he joined that RAF for 10 months, then returned home as farming was an exempt occupation – there was still rationing on after the war. His experience in the RAF gave him a lifelong interest in the 2nd WW and the RAF. He was very interested in planes that had come down in this area, and remembered well the Lancaster Bomber crashing in Halam.

Cyril had 'green fingers'. He could grow anything. In addition to vegetables he grew ferns, hollies, daffodils, and he planted an orchard with apple and walnut trees. He farmed in Laxton as well as Halam and was interested in Laxton's history but never wanted to live there - he was too deeply rooted in Halam.

He loved animals, especially dogs and hens; the Hoggards' hens are a familiar sight on Radley Lane, as was seeing Cyril with his dog. Meeting him on a walk was always a great pleasure. He enjoyed talking to people he met in market gardening and farming, and getting to know his customers - he always had a cheerful smile and a word for them.

Above all Cyril was a family man, loving and proud of Dorraine, his children, Duncan, Lynn and Denise, and his grandchildren and great grandchildren. He and Dorraine were married for 59 years. Cyril moved to Lowbank Farm when he was 21 and met Dorraine in the village shop and post office that Dorraine's mother owned and ran.

Cyril had great pleasures in his life. Dorraine, Duncan and Lynn remember annual family holidays, and his wonderful sandcastles. They remember his great sense of humour. Cyril liked reciting poems and one particular poem, 'A Deed and a Word', was read at his interment. He was very fond of the song 'Danny Boy' and it was his request that it be sung at his funeral. He will be remembered in Halam as a kind and gentle man, and a true gentleman.

St Michael The Archangel Fundraising

Having a beautiful grade 1 listed church in the village is a wonderful blessing, as witnessed by the number of people attracted to it for important family occasions such as weddings and baptisms. Maintaining such a desirable building is costly and the PCC are extremely grateful to all those who answered the funding campaign in such a positive manner, the results of which are vital to the general upkeep of the church and services.

Over the last 3 months the PCC has had to face the fact that the boiler that has heated the church for the last 25 years is now obsolete and it is impossible to obtain spare parts. Quotations for a replacement are now in, and we will have to find approximately £9,600.00 to purchase and install a new boiler before the onset of winter. The Church is fortunate to have a Trust, which has been in place for many years, the interest from which has accrued and will pay for the boiler and associated work.

However the Quinquenniel inspection and report prepared by the Diocesan architect at the end of July highlighted urgent work needed on the fabric of the building within the next 12 months, in particular the roof, the cost of which is estimated to be £23,500.00. The PCC are investigating possible grant aid available but will be looking to hold fundraising events during 2017 to help, so if anyone has any ideas or can help in any way, no matter how small, please talk to the Churchwardens Glenys Herbert and Penni Wells. Thank you for your support!

Sarah Godfrey to contact BT on behalf of the P.C. to request that BT cut back the hedges. 3) Matt Duckworth for C.C. Highways is coming out to see if anything can be done to improve the safety of the School Lane/Turnpike junction.

<u>Village Hall</u>: 1) <u>Cleaning</u>: Mrs Todd & Mrs Godfrey agreed to try to get prices for a professional cleaner for the hall; Two hours fortnightly was suggested. They will report back to the November meeting.

2) <u>Grants</u> – Mrs Godfrey is preparing applications for a WREN grant and a Notts County Council "Supporting Local Communities" grant. 3) <u>Harvest</u> <u>Supper</u> – everything is in place for the event on Friday 14th October. 4) <u>Roads and Hedges:</u> School Lane/Turnpike Junction – the Clerk is meeting with County Council Highways next week to discuss this junction and general road safety on the Turnpike.

5) <u>Pot Holes</u> – there is a bad pothole on School Lane. Andrew Paris will report this. NB: anyone can report potholes or road/pavement damage on the County Council's website:

Present: Vice-chairman Mr Andrew Paris, Mr Chris Bevans, Mrs Sarah Godfrey, Mrs Glenys Herbert, Mrs Janet Simmonds, Mrs Carolyn Todd

As the chairman was absent Mr Paris took the chair.

Village Hall: 1. Harvest supper was most successful and raised £440.50. Many thanks to all who helped with the event. It was suggested that next year the supper could be a more traditional evening with a speaker. In order to help ticket sales consideration will be given to charging more for those who pay at the door (£10) with a discount for tickets bought in advance. (2) It was suggested we hold another fundraiser - a games night at Easter. (3) Grant Application – needs to be sent in February. A questionnaire may be used to gauge village support. (4) Village hall cleaning - a two-weekly deep-clean was suggested, but this may not be satisfactory one messy letting might mean the hall is dirty for subsequent lettings until the next clean. A weekly clean may be a better option to maintain the cleanliness for quality lettings. Mrs Todd is to investigate further.

Roads and hedges: Volunteer(s) are needed to keep the area around the bench and phone at the crossroads tidy – no one has come forward yet.

Mr Duckworth from C.C. Highways visited the village to see what road safety improvements can be made on Halam Hill, and improve visibility issues at the crossroads. His view was that that nothing much can be done, that there are already too many signs on Halam Hill and little can be done to improve the hedges at the bottom of the hill.

County & District Cllrs were told school interactive signs don't work as they should; they will investigate.

Open meeting: Cllr Rainbow will give the name of the cleaner at the Town Council, and will find out the contact for our PCSO.

Cllr Jackson told of the latest scam - tipping rubbish in gardens then offering to clear it at extortionate prices. There have been several burglaries in the area; Cllrs Laughton and Jackson will see if they can link their reports to our website.

Mrs Godfrey reported that BT claim the hedges covering their overhead lines (on School Lane) are the responsibility of the landowner.

Mr Simmonds thanked Mrs Todd for re-painting the St Michael's Close sign.

<u>Finance</u> The P.C. budget was presented and briefly discussed; this will be discussed further and the annual precept set at the December meeting.

The village hall mortgage statement will be circulated to parish councillors so that the amount outstanding and term remaining can be assessed. It was agreed to pay PAT testing for the village hall.
