News from St. Nicholas Church

The improvements that have been carried out during the Winter months are now complete. We have a very well equipped toilet and baby changing facility. The toilet, which is suitable for disabled as well as able bodied, is in the old Boiler House. The kitchen and storage units are in the tower area, which will make serving the cream teas much easier with hot and cold running water over a sink. The West Door has been draft proofed, which will make such a difference in the winter months. Four pews have been removed and bookshelves have been built into the back of a rear pew. A new stone floor has been laid, where the front pews stood, and tiles repositioned to the Font area.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everybody who gave donations so generously to help with the cost of piping the mains water to the Church. Also, other donations to our funds, which, with our Treasurer's very good housekeeping, enabled us to do all this work without begging financial help from outside charities etc.

Silent Auction - As a result of the pew removal, we have two pews to sell, one will seat 6 people and the other 3 people. It is proposed to hold a Silent Auction for the disposal of these 2 pews, so please put your bids in an envelope with your name on stating which pew you are interested in buying and hand it to one of the wardens. If you would like to see the pews, I'm sure this could be arranged, they are in store at the moment.

The Coffee Morning will be held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 10th April 10.30a.m. - 12.00 noon. We serve teas and coffees and have freshly made cakes and scones to tickle your taste buds. Do come along for a coffee and a chat, we will be glad to see you.

County Councillor Jenny Whittle report for Malherbe Monthly

It seems like only yesterday that I was elected as County Councillor for Maidstone Rural East, but it is now four years on and on 2 May the County Council elections will be held once again. I have thoroughly enjoyed being the County Councillor for Boughton Malherbe, working with the indefatigable Parish Clerks, Pat Anderson and Christine King, to tackle highways matters including pothole repairs, gritting and improved signage in the village. I responded to the calls from Liverton Hill residents to reduce the speed limit to 30mph, and jointly funded with the Parish Council an

interactive sign to reduce speeding in the village. I have allocated a Member Grant to undertake kitchen repairs at the village hall.

In addition since January 2011, I have held the KCC portfolio for Specialist Children's Services, covering adoption, fostering, children in care and children's centres across the county. I led a team in delivering substantial improvements to Safeguarding Children's Services and have worked very hard to support our most vulnerable children and our super foster carers and adopters along with the social workers who do a fantastic job day in, day out.

Soon I will be out and about delivering my election leaflet and will be knocking on doors to get your views on politics and public services in general. KCC provides over 300 services, ranging from school places, libraries to adult education and waste disposal. I will try and get to you, but please appreciate that with nearly 7000 households in the Maidstone Rural East division, I may not get to you! 

Installation of kitchen and lavatory, St. Nicolas' Church

Work began on 5th November 2012 with removing cupboards and other items from the tower area and clearing out the boiler house. Under the boiler house floor was the old boiler, still in place though probably redundant since the arrival of electricity in 1951. A cast iron sectional boiler, it was manufactured in August 1933 by Ideal Boilers, and replaced the original 19th century boiler.





On 14th November a watching brief was carried out while digging of the soak-away took place. alongside a huge piece of ragstone, human bones were uncovered about a meter down. mixed with building debris, so it is assumed a grave had been disturbed during some previous work, maybe the building of the boiler house in the 1840s, and the bones re-buried, unceremoniously, along with bricks and rubble. They have been removed and will be buried with due ceremony and respect.

By 20th November the plumbing for the lavatory had been installed and the floor was ready to be laid. A 'time capsule' was placed underneath the floor before it was sealed. Then work on the fixtures and fittings could begin.





Meanwhile, the kitchen was beginning to take shape and by 8th December the basic units were in place. But there was still a long way to go.

Kitchen and lavatory just about completed, work began to remove the front pews and replace old floorboards and floor tiles.



The Architect came to sign off the work on 19th March 2013. The Church is transformed, stunning, and a credit to the amazing skill and hard work of Peter Flack and Peter Culham in often freezing conditionsand sometimes under supervision! (Ruby, Pippin and Jack)

Mondays to Fridays

The big change is the re-introduction of an afternoon service to Maidstone, departing from Grafty Green at **13.25**.

There are also two timing changes. The 12.20 service from Maidstone now departs ten minutes later at **12.30**, and the 17.25 service from Maidstone now departs twenty minutes later at **17.45**.

Saturdays

The 09.23 service from Grafty Green now departs at **09.30**, bringing it in line with the Monday to Friday departure time.

Government's pronouncements on housing become daily more confusing. Construction is one area where the government rightly sees an urgent need for reversing that industry's downturn and getting us back to growth.

The new NPPF and Localism Bills must be clearly and rapidly redefined still further, so we can know exactly how Government intends to deal with the nation's massive housing shortage. WKPS' task is to see that this shortage is resolved without compromising the countryside with any more land-grabbing than absolutely necessary.

There are in place large development plans situated immediately around the major towns within our region. Like others, WKPS has to accept that such developments are needed. If we say 'no' to everything, we will rapidly become ignored. We have to strike a balance between much-needed housing and the countryside we wish to protect. Supporting outlying town developments can give us the moral authority to object to any such developments appearing in rural areas.

All authorities have scheduled consultation sessions, to discuss how these large schemes will progress. Those attending include groups from the Church, CPRE, Kent Wildlife, Rural Kent etc. as well as developers, landowners and Parish and Borough Councils. WKPS will be involved with these consultations to ensure our voice is properly heard.

After four years of economic stagnation, there are rumours of 'small green shoots'. Developers are certainly increasing their planning applications. Providing the constraints on lending do not continue to be dissuasive on those seeking new mortgages, these green shoots will translate into a greater number of new building starts. Without the clarification needed on the new legislation, this must be a time of great concern to anyone who cares for the countryside. Without Core Strategies firmly in place, developers can apply for planning permission almost anywhere. The new regulations require authorities to decide applications more rapidly - especially for large developments. Prolonged delay will produce an automatic presumption in favour.

Constant and detailed vigilance must be WKPS' watchword as we enter these new, uncertain times.

Grafty Gourmet

This is an authentic Greek recipe using minced lamb. Alternatively, minced or ground chicken can be used.

Lamb Souvlaki Kebabs with Tzatziki - Serves 8

Kebabs

2 lbs minced lamb
1 medium onion, finely chopped
3 table spoons soft butter
3⁄4 teaspoon ground cumin
Pinch of salt
Dash of fresh ground black pepper
1⁄4 cup of finely grated cucumber (deseeded)
1⁄2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Tzatziki

cup Greek Yoghurt
 (no other yoghurt will do)
 fresh mint leaves chopped very finely
 teaspoon ground allspice
 tablespoon olive oil
 clove very finely crushed garlic

Serve with

Sliced tomato Thinly sliced onion Lightly grilled pita bread

1. Knead the minced lamb, onion, butter, spices, salt, pepper and cayenne in a bowl. Then form into sausages of about 4 - 5 inches long, and about an inch in diameter. Cover and leave in the fridge for about 1 hour.

2. For the Tzatziki, Drain the yoghurt through a sieve, to get rid of the watery content of the yoghurt. Sieve the cucumber and dry on a clean tea towel. Whisk together the yoghurt, olive oil, mint, garlic and cucumber in a bowl. Refrigerate for 30 minutes.

3. Preheat oven to 190 degrees Celsius and cook the kebabs for 12 - 14 minutes.

These can be eaten as a sandwich, by placing a couple of the kebabs in side each pita bread, and adding the sliced tomato, onion and Tzatziki. Alternatively, the pita breads can be put on a plate, with the kebabs on top, covered with the salad and Tzatziki, with a garnish of finely chopped parsley.

Windows 8 – What's it all About

Windows 8 introduces a radical new full-screensized Start menu that's designed for touch screens – displays controlled with your fingertips, like many mobile phones.

Now called a Start Screen, it also appears on desktop PCs, but be you may find it difficult to use the mouse to mimic a fingertip initially.

The Key feature of Windows 8 is that it "pin apps,

websites, and people to Start" which is now the whole desktop. There is no start button in Windows 8.

From Start, you can just start typing to search for what you want. You can also see a list of all "apps" (short for applications or mini-programs) on your PC when you swipe up or right-click, and then tap or click **All apps**.

You can get to the Start screen by swiping in from the right edge of your screen and tapping the Start charm or by pointing your mouse to the upper-right corner of the screen, moving down, and then clicking the Start charm. You can also use the Windows key

Finding a Start screen app or Program

When searching for apps or programs, try these tricks:

- 1. Mouse users can right-click on a blank portion of the Start screen. A bar rises from the screen's bottom showing an icon named All Apps (shown in the margin). Click the All Apps icon to see an alphabetical listing of all your computer's apps and programmes. Click the desired app or program to open it.
- 2. When looking at the Start Screen, keyboard owners can simply begin by typing the name of the App or program, as you type Windows 8 lists all the apps matching what you've typed so far.
- 3. On a touch screen, slide your finger up from the screen's bottom. When the bottom menu appears, tap the All Apps icon to see an alphabetical list of all your apps and programs.



The charms: Search, Share, Start, Devices and Settings

The charms appear on the right side of your screen. Swipe in from the right edge or move your pointer into the top-right corner and then down to see them, you will then be able to select the charm you need as follows:



Search charm - is a powerful new way to find what you're looking for. Enter a search term once and you can quickly get results from the application you're using, other applications, the web or your PC—all from the same place.

Share charm - lets you send links, photos and more to your friends and social networks without leaving the application you're in.

Start charm - takes you to Start or, if you're already on the Start screen, returns you to your last application.

Devices charm is a handy way to do things like send files and stream films to TVs, printers and other devices around your home.

Settings charm is how you do basic tasks like shutting down your PC and changing the volume. It's also used by applications to configure things like account and privacy settings.

There is much more to learn about Windows 8 and much more to discover, so this will covered in future articles. In the meantime you may want to know how to **Exit Windows.** There are two different reasons that you want to Exit Windows, permanently to turn off your PC or temporarily to allow people to use a shared computer.

Permanently – to turn off your PC: (most common for home use)

- 1. From the Settings Charm see how to view the charm bar above
- 2. Click the Settings Icon and then click the Power Icon
- 3. Choose Shut Down
- 4. If you have any open applications or documents you will get messages to close applications and/or save your work.

Temporarily leaving your computer: (when the computer is shared and user

profiles have been set up)

Return to the Start Screen, Click on your user account picture in the Start Screen's upper-right corner. Choose:

Lock - which means you have to add your password again to open windows, stopping other people access your information

Sign-Out – This is used when there is more than one person using the same PC, it saves your work and allows the next person to log in.

Another Account – Allows you to switch users to allow the other person to work within their own area on the same PC which will save their settings and documents.

The April Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Pisces at beginning of April, and moves into Aries towards the end of the month.

New Moon occurs on Wednesday 10th April. **Full Moon** is on Thursday 25th April, and rises in the southeast with **Saturn** in late evening between the constellations of Libra and Virgo.

Mercury rises in the southeast at sunrise in the constellation of Pisces, so again we will not be able to see it in the twilight.

Venus rises in the southeast at sunrise in Pisces, so again will not be visible this month.

Mars is rising in the southeast at sunrise with **Venus**, so will also not be visible this month.

Jupiter is again well placed for viewing in the evenings this month. It is high in the western sky at dusk and is brighter than any of the stars. Relative to the stars it is moving westwards in Taurus, and sets in the early hours of the morning. Through a telescope you should be able to see the dark and light bands together with the **Great Red Spot**. It may also be possible to see, even through binoculars, Jupiter's four major moons.

Saturn is rising in the southeast in the late evening between the constellations of Libra and Virgo, and is high in the southern western sky before setting at sunrise. Through a telescope you should be able to see the famous rings together with many of its moons.

Now back to the age-old question 'Does life exist elsewhere?' Apparently 3,000 planets have been detected in the past four years, dozens of which may be capable of supporting life. It was reported to the Royal Society that a total of 2,700 planetary candidates have been detected by the Kepler space telescope since its launch in 2009. It has detected up to 50 planets in habitable zones but none is the size of our Earth. Some of the finds include gas giants three times the size of Jupiter, a super dense planet with seas of molten iron, and a world light enough to float on water.
