Fewer new homes should be planned for Basingstoke & Deane – putting less pressure on local communities, nature, schools and GPs – say council leaders in an appeal to Government.

On 21st October, Diana Maclean with her co-driver Helen Chatfield our Benefice Youth Pastor, set off on yet another purposeful quest to deliver humanitarian aid to the Ukrainian Army. They named their 4X4 Shogun vehicle Vira that translates as 'hope'. This was Diana's fifth passage to Lviv joining a P4P convoy of nearly 40 vehicles.

They were buoyed up by Luke's beautifully crafted words of blessing given at the farewell ceremony of eats and drinks at Hydes cider barns, Herriard. It was hosted by those who had made the journey possible, especially our talented teenage English and Ukrainians who performed at the fund-raising concert in August.

The journey was not without incident or apprehension. Vira stalwartly pushed on almost covering the 1,500-mile continental trip but she eventually faltered not far from the destination requiring repair by a Ukrainian support team.

That night, Diana and Helen endured broken sleep, having to evacuate to the hotel bomb shelters when sirens all over the city were triggered by attacks from Russian drones. On their 'day off', Diana and Helen were shown huge appreciation for their efforts by their Ukrainian hosts. Eventually and much relieved after a six hour return journey the following day into Poland, they took a return flight to UK from Krackow. Mission Accomplished!

Children in the village enjoyed a Teddy bear's picnic in St Stephen's churchyard before the Harvest Service, they brought their own stuffed animals and enjoyed teddy bear themed games and treats. Thank you Charlotte for organising such a happy event!

Continued from front page... had been making until Government increased the number of new homes it had to plan for from 830 to c1,150 per year. Cllr Paul Harvey said: 'Before the Government upped the borough's housing targets, we had a Local Plan that would have worked.

'The new target risks undermining that progress, forcing extra development that puts unnecessary pressure on our borough's infrastructure and communities. We urge the Government to really look at our borough's circumstances and revise the housing target it has set to a more sensible level.'

The letter questions Government's plan for new infrastructure to support the additional development and its impact on existing infrastructure, local communities' identities and the borough's natural environment, including its precious chalk streams.

It also criticises the Government for encouraging a developer 'free for all' by setting higher housing targets that are more difficult for the borough to meet and which mean it can't achieve its required housing delivery for the next five years. Thus it has less power to refuse planning applications for land not in its Local Plan.

Cllr Gavin James said: 'If Government now wishes for significantly more homes to be built across Basingstoke & Deane, then we want it to explain to us how it will fund and deliver the critical infrastructure needed to support them.'

The council leaders invite the Government minister to join them in visiting Greenfield sites the council is now having to put forward for development as they explain why they believe the borough's housing numbers should be reconsidered.

GOVERNMENT URGED NOT TO 'WATER DOWN' NORTH WESSEX DOWNS

PROTECTION

From News release 10673, 20 Oct 2025 BDBC Leaders are urging Government to retain a planning rule that helps to protect England's national parks from new development.

The law currently says public bodies must aim to 'further the purpose of'

National Landscapes (formerly AONB) like the North Wessex Downs, which cover around a third of the borough of Basingstoke & Deane.

The Downs' ancient woodlands, globally rare chalk streams and other biodiverse habitats play an important role in supporting native wildlife and encouraging nature recovery. Recent reports including in The Times suggest Government is considering changing that 'duty' in the Planning and Infrastructure Bill to 'have regard to', potentially paving the way for new roads and housing developments in the Downs and England's other National Landscapes.

The leaders also invited Government to discussions about working with BDBC to grow the borough's economy while protecting its natural environment.

Cllr Paul Harvey said: 'We are lucky that the North Wessex Downs pass through our borough and we must protect this valuable landscape, which is home to rare habitats including some of the world's most important chalk streams and rivers. Given that loosening the protections for National Landscapes like these to allow more homes and infrastructure would be nothing short of environmental vandalism, neither I nor the co-leader genuinely believe the Government would propose such a move. But with the recent press coverage, for the sake of clarity we're asking them publicly to rule out any such change entirely.

Cllr Gavin James said: 'The current protected landscapes "duty" helps to encourage nature recovery, clean up water, improve long-term food security and restore and enhance habitats in the North Wessex Downs.

'The Government has already said suggestions it could weaken this environmental protection are pure speculation. I am therefore looking forward to a timely public statement that confirms this duty will stay as it is and puts a permanent end to any rumours or uncertainty.'

BDBC is one of nine local authorities that sit on the North Wessex Downs Council of Partners, whose 35 members are responsible for managing the National Landscape. The North Wessex Downs were formerly designated as an area of outstanding natural beauty (AONB) until November 2023 when – along with all other AONBs – it became known as a National Landscape.

to investigate but I am very keen to find the area where the drone are being flown from and any index of cars in the vicinity parked in random areas near open fields.

The standard drone, despite it having a camera would provide very poor footage. The drone would need to be substantial in size and strong enough to carry a heavy camera with the facility to give infra red images. We have had two stolen from a car which was parked in a rural location earlier this year, which I suspect were high spec.

Ellisfield have had an increase in criminal damage, burglaries and other wildlife crime including an attempt to fire a catapult at a game keeper narrowly missing him but causing significant damage to his car. Rural officers have been out in recent weeks conducting operations with other departments within Hampshire Police, as well as with bordering police forces and some gamekeepers, which has resulted in a vehicle seizure and obtained some valuable intelligence.

Present, Parish Councillors and clerk, one member of public.

Public session discussion re likely further planning proposal for Owen's Farm (Hook, Hart District) this time for 400 houses.

Parish councillors Matthew Morris co-opted as new Parish Councillor. With great regret the Chairman accepted the resignation of Parish Councillor Paul Ghent. Paul will be greatly missed; he has consistently done everything within his power to support the Parish Council and Water End community.

Thus the Parish Council continues to have one Councillor vacancy.

Newnham 900 Preparations for 20 September in hand and on budget due to dedicated work of N900 team.

Newnham Green ponds To record thanks to HIWARG for follow-up working party evening of 26 August.

Parish pubs

Very sadly Chris and Donna are not renewing their Licence for the Old House at Home after the end of September. This is due to recent health issues; they would not otherwise be leaving. To record the Parish Council's thanks to Chris and Donna for the success of the Old House at Home over the past seven years and to wish them well for the future. Red Oak Taverns have the pub advertised to let.

At the same time, and due to owners' change of circumstances, the Iron Bull Roadhouse (previously renamed the Y-Knott Inn, formerly the Red Lion) is advertised for sale.

Agreed unanimously the Parish Council will take all steps within its power to ensure the both continue as successful pubs for the benefit of their communities.

Local Plan Update Spatial Strategy

as published in the *Public Reports Pack* for BDBC's 04 September Environment & Infrastructure meeting The map shows no allocated sites for development locally or across the large part of the Loddon Valley; though what is now proposed as SPS5.4 Land at Whitmarsh Lane comprises the 900 previously allocated for East of Basingstoke plus 600 at Lodge Farm. To note: The Settlement Assessment

(Appendix C) again concludes that Newnham 'settlement would not be suitable for an SPB (Settlement Policy Boundary) and should not be included in the settlement hierarchy'. **Hart call for sites** Also to note, Hart are beginning their Local Plan Update Process and have issued a Call for Sites – 29 August to 10 October.

Owen's Farm as discussed in the public session, a given this land will be included in Hart's call for sites. A speculative planning application is likely due to Hart's lack of land supply. Hook's Neighbourhood Plan's Gap policy will also be considered out of date (though that doesn't mean it will be entirely discounted).

The developer withdrew a previous Appeal in March 2019 following Inspector's letter confirming Hook's housing figures – reduced by the then new Standard Method. The NPPF Dec 2024 Standard Method increases Harts housing requirement from 453 (latterly 297 due to early oversupply) to 750 new dwellings per annum.

Lodge Farm (North Warnborough, Odiham Parish) Again to expect this to be submitted to Hart's Call for sites – Warehousing, distribution, logistics.

Local Government Reorganisation proposals for all areas in the new Hampshire and the Solent Combined County Authority – from all existing first and second tier Councils – will go through the formal approval process via the councils' Cabinet and Full Council meetings in September – for submission to Government by 26th September. The proposal as agreed by the majority of councils includes a Northern Hampshire Unitary of BDBC, Hart and Rushmoor. Then to await Government consultation.

CONSERVATION AREA APPRAISAL

Newnham Conservation Area was first designated in 1981 by Hampshire County Council in association with Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council in recognition of the special architectural and historic interest of the area. It was further amended in 1984. In 2004 BDBC approved the Conservation Area Appraisal as Supplementary Planning Advice (SPG). A further appraisal is being undertaken, will go to consultation, and on approval will be adopted by BDBC as an SPD (Supplementary Planning Document) to the Local Plan.

November contains the feasts of All Saints and All Souls as well as

Remembrance Sunday, all of which makes it a time when the here and the hereafter, earth and heaven seem especially close, almost dissolving into one another. In the very act of remembering we can find pain and pleasure, sorrow and joy dissolving into one another. We cannot remember all that we have lost through someone's death without at the same time remembering all that we gained through their being alive. Sometimes I get an acute sense of that when I wake up having dreamed vividly and happily about someone who has died. In the act of remembering we discover, if we did not know it already, that those we remember are not those we have loved but those we still love, and that in remembering them they are alive to us. Yet our hope goes beyond that, to embrace the belief that, not only are those we love and remember alive in our consciousness, but also that the

We base this hope not on wishful thinking but on what we see in Jesus Christ. In Jesus we see someone who is fully human who knows pain and pleasure, sorrow and joy just as we do, and so we bring our sorrows and our joys into our prayers knowing that they are understood. Yet this is also the Christ, the Messiah, the anointed one, whose life is totally mixed up

for ever.

consciousness of God, and so is alive

with the life of God. So, as we see Jesus, the Christ, in the gospels, we see both how we can be and how God is. We see it especially on the cross, where the glory of God shines out through the surrendering of this man's spirit, the essential him.

In the tomb the human life which was laid down is raised up, it dissolves into the life of God and the life of God dissolves into it. This is why, I guess, after the resurrection the risen Lord is essentially the same and yet different. Our belief is that we can follow Christ in life and through death so that our life is caught up into the life of God for ever. That our lives can have an eternal quality both in the here and in the hereafter; both on earth and in heaven.

The 2nd book of *Samuel* chapter 18 contains I think one of the most moving passages in scripture; it tells of the heartbreak of King David as he learns of the death of his rebellious son Absalom. 'Absalom, my son, my son, would that I had died in your stead, Absalom, my son, my son,' David laments. We can identify with those sentiments, it's our cry in those circumstance confronted with the death of a loved one.

If we believe that in Jesus we see a God who loves, us then we also see a God who has gone to those lengths for us so that we shall not be lost for ever.

I always find writing a piece for our magazines challenging and absorbing, so absorbing that it's easy to lose track of time; which in a way is what this piece is all about, looking to a time when we are totally caught up in God, totally absorbed in him in the timelessness which is eternity.

'His truth springs up from the earth. 'His holiness looks down from heaven.


'The Lord will certainly give what is good.


Our land will produce its crops. 'God's holiness leads the way in front of him.'
