Rector's Letter



Another year draws to a close

With December, the year draws to a close; and another year goes by. A year with, I trust, many happy things to look back on; things that bring a smile to your face as they come to mind. Mixed, I have no doubt, with some hard things that you've had to deal with this year, and perhaps some events that are painful to think back on. I hope that the balance has been towards the happier things of life for you this year.

On this yearly cycle of life, the Church now moves into Advent and then on to Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for us; preparing ourselves for the celebrations of Christmas, hopefully as we remember - amongst all the wrapping paper, presents, food, drink, and family time - the reason that many are having time off work ... we are celebrating the birth of an incredibly special baby about 2,000 years ago; a baby who Christians believe, as a man (and as God) came to help us and save us. Advent is also, for the Church, a time of preparing ourselves, more deeply, for the return of Jesus again - whenever that may be. Perhaps it will be in thousands of years, or maybe hundreds of years; or perhaps it will be in your lifetime; or tomorrow. None of us know; but we should be prepared - that is what Advent is about.

The years also move on; this year we are celebrating five Christmases together. I cannot believe where that time has gone. There are plenty of things to share together in the run up to Christmas and over Christmas; I hope we'll meet up at some of them. It all begins with our candle-lit Advent Carol service on Sunday 3 December; then an Advent evening together with Revd Rosemary at the Mission Church in Sandhurst on Monday 4 December. The Primary School Nativity on Wednesday 13 December; the Parish Carol Service, with the church illuminated by the candelabras, on the evening of Tuesday 19 December. We've then got a choice of four services on offer on Christmas Eve: 8am Communion, 10am Morning Worship, 3pm The Crib Service (come dressed as a nativity character - whatever your age!) and 11.30pm for the first Communion of Christmas. On Christmas Day you can then join us for Communion at 8am, or 10am for Family Worship - which then runs into another Communion if you'd like to stay. However, it doesn't end there! If you'd prefer not to be on your own for the rest of Christmas Day, you're welcome to come and have Christmas lunch at the Memorial Hall (but please sign up for this - for further details see page 9); or drop into the Hall for a drink when you're out for a walk. Alternatively, you can catch me in The Bull, of course! We have a great community spirit in Benenden; come and join in with it. I wish you a blessed Christmas.

Belonging

The ageing grandmother had been persuaded to move to be closer to her daughter and grandchildren. She loved seeing them and watching them as they grew. And she could chat to her daughter face to face instead of just on the phone. But now they were on holiday. She knew no-one else locally and no longer drove a car. She mustn't sit looking out at the rain thinking of those she had left. She would restart her quilting hobby and join a group. There must be people with a fellow interest in Egyptology. She had her free bus pass. She might even join a local church.

Home and part of the community again, if only for a short while. It was great working abroad but good to be back. The career woman felt an inordinate degree of pleasure in seeing familiar faces in passing cars, as she made her way to the local shop; in recognising people walking their dogs; and being greeted by those who knew her face even if they had forgotten her name. It was different overseas. Both the ex-pat community and the local people were usually friendly, but everyone knew that she was only passing through. How much to invest in getting involved - on both sides?

Two excited toddlers were racing round the play-park on their scooters whilst their mum was checking her smartphone. There were three texts from other mothers, two WhatsApp messages and a general call from 'mumsnet'. One was asking if she would like to join a group picnic, another a request to help a new mum with child-minding. She was already booked with others to sort contributions for the local charity shop. Housework? Shopping? Or being with others?

The young, fit, teenager had been approached as a possible member of the Black Dog gang. His friend had already joined. But he would rather continue belonging to the football team where he had been doing well. However, there were problems with a change of team coach and the loss of their practice slot on the local field, so things were looking rather shaky. Surely he needed to belong to something.

The little boy sat at the end of the table eating his sandwiches looking on as the others in the reception class were busily chatting and exchanging morsels of their mothers' carefully balanced packed lunches. He had started school well enough but then was away for a fortnight with illness. On his return he found that his little friend had found someone else. Now he just wished that someone would choose to sit with him.

The desire to belong is universal and Christmas is the season when we are particularly aware of this. A time when most individuals would wish to feel that they belong to a family, a group, or that they are part of a community, or at least have their existence noticed. Maybe it is up to those around to make the first move.

As mentioned last month we are actively progressing our Neighbourhood Development Plan. We had a well-attended, productive meeting on 11 November on future housing needs, and how they may be satisfied. We are now seeking volunteers to join a series of work groups covering these and other key issues which will be further developed in our Plan. Any help would be appreciated, even to walk around and photograph. There are five active working groups covering the following areas:

Housing Supply planning policy, site identification, demand, numbers and types of dwellings, - family houses, smaller homes, affordable, social, rent or shared equity. Flats, bungalows, extensions. A Community Land Trust could be considered.

Design and Built Environment architecture, landscaping, site layout, lighting, garaging and parking, special factors such as the two designated Conservation Areas (central Benenden and Iden Green), smaller settlements in the Parish, impact upon listed buildings, whole life issues - building homes that will still be appropriate as people age. Access to local services and facilities.

Transport and Infrastructure roads, pavements, traffic management, speeding and HGV routing, signage, public transport, infrastructure, services and utilities, including local roads and facilities - schools, doctors surgeries, hospitals cinema, railway stations.

Business and Local Economy traditional local businesses such as farming and forestry, the needs and future development of our larger businesses (Benenden Girls' School, Benenden Hospital), the development and growth of smaller local businesses, new start ups, home working. Identifying potential economic development sites and issues. Protection of our pubs, post office, and other businesses which offer key services to the community. Business Rates.

Landscape and Green Environment AONB open spaces, recreation, footpaths, Hemsted Forest and other historic woodlands, historic landscape, ghylls and smugglers' trails. Sustainability issues, relating specifically to the green environment and future generations. Landscape character assessment.

Please let me know if you could help the work of one of these groups.





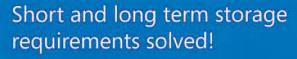

Benenden CE Primary School

Visit to "our" Cathedral

Early in November, 32 Primary School children from years 5 and 6, along with four members of staff and the Rector, left bright and early for a visit to Canterbury Cathedral.

The coach trip was followed by a walk through the shopping precinct to the Cathedral



precinct, and then into the Cathedral itself - where we still had 32 children! We were the first of nine other CofE Primary Schools to arrive. When the other 250 children had appeared we were welcomed to by Revd Nick Papadopulos, Canon

Treasurer of the Cathedral. He said, "When your parents or brothers/sisters ask where you've been today, don't say 'l've been to the Cathedral', but say 'l've been to our Cathedral', because that is what this place is. It is ours; so please enjoy being here, in your Cathedral."

Once we'd been welcomed, we split into groups of nine or ten and explored various parts of our Cathedral, and entered into many different activities around the beautiful building.

Some of the children went to a "senses" prayer station set up in the crypt, others designed

stained glass windows and learnt about their shape and symbols. Some visited the archive room and made a "charter and seal" while another group, dressed up as monks, was given a tour with some of history including a gory bit about Archbishop Thomas Becket's demise.

After a packed lunch, and a bit of exercise to burn off energy, we gathered back in the nave for worship, led by some children from other schools and by Archdeacon Stephen; this included actions, songs, prayers, and a reflection on a piece of scripture by two schoolchildren.

It was a good day; and judging by some of the comments I heard afterwards the children enjoyed it too.


Moreover, the good news: we still had the same 32 children when we got back to Benenden!






Wealden Land Grab

It was high noon 22 April 1889. Thousands of pioneers lined up on the banks of the Canadian River between the Oklahoma and Indian territories. It was the start of what became known as the Great Land Rush. If you worked a plot of up to 160 acres for five years, it was legally yours for the cost of just ten dollars.

Now it may not be on quite the same scale, but people are beginning to think we are witnessing a massive new land grab in Kent a century and a quarter later. For generations we've believed that agricultural land was protected from major building projects, and that an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty was sacrosanct. Now we're starting to see new estates springing up on greenfield sites.

In Benenden only one has so far received planning permission - the Walkhurst Road development of 12 houses - outside the Limit of Built Development (LBD) and within the High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), but another application is expected for an estate of eight houses in Iden Green on a working orchard (also outside the LBD and within the AONB). Meanwhile rumours abound after surveyors were seen in a field across from Wards the Butchers on the Benenden crossroads. Is a planning application for an even bigger estate in the pipeline?

The experience of our neighbours in Hawkhurst and Sissinghurst does not bode well. The biggest proposal for 120 houses in Hawkhurst may have been withdrawn for now, but an estate of 62 houses will be built following the loss of a planning appeal. Tiny Sissinghurst - less than half the population of Benenden - is reeling from the loss of another






planning appeal and awaits the bulldozers to begin construction of 60 new houses off Common Road. The site is 3.5 hectares of the 'best and most versatile agricultural land', again, outside the LBD. Here the former hop garden is not in the AONB, but even the planning inspector conceded that harm to the landscape would be 'reasonably substantial'. Cranbrook is still waiting to see if it will have a 180-house development at Brick Kiln Farm foisted on it in the face of unanimous opposition from the Parish Council.

Both planning appeals were lost on the grounds that TWBC had failed to identify sufficient sites for the 13,000 new homes the Government says they must build. Arguments against the development did not "significantly and demonstrably outweigh those matters that are in its favour, particularly the delivery of housing", concluded the Sissinghurst Planning Inspector. What this means for Benenden - and pretty much any other villages in the Weald - is that all bets may be off when it comes to protecting the countryside and preventing large and totally unsympathetic developments.

Well, that's not quite true. There is one piece of fairly powerful ammunition that we have up our sleeve. Or rather WILL have. And that's a Neighbourhood Plan. The same Localism Act of 2011 that told local authorities they had to identify a supply of sites to provide five years worth of housing also established Neighbourhood Planning. This, according to the government "gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and shape the development and growth of their



local area. They are able to choose where they want new homes, shops and offices to be built, have their say on what those new buildings should look like".


In theory this should give villages like ours the ability to determine the sort of development we want. The Parish Plan survey showed that what we wanted was 'small groups of fewer than five houses' (49.2% against 8% who favoured larger estates) and 60% wanted more affordable housing. But as we have seen, permission has already been given for one estate of 12 houses in Walkhurst Road, eight are proposed for Iden Green, and possibly far more on the crossroads site. And what's to stop a major developer proposing 60 or more on a field next to you?

The Borough Council recently conducted a 'Call for Sites' - an exercise in which landowners were encouraged to identify possible areas for housing. As you can see from the maps this includes huge swathes of the local countryside. There's nothing to say that planning permission WILL be granted on any or all of those sites. But equally there's nothing to prevent a major developer proposing it ... or a planning inspector taking the same line as in

Hawkhurst and Sissinghurst.

Frankly it's up to you to stop or control the current land grab. It's not the Parish Council or any other group who is working to draw up the Neighbourhood Plan. It's individual volunteers. At the first three meetings in the village hall I would estimate the average age of those attending to be rather over 60. That's fine so far as it goes, but where are the younger people who will, by definition, have a rather longer stake in the future of the village? As the poster says: Your Village Needs You. And, ultimately if you want to have any control over future development, YOU need to sign up to help with the Neighbourhood Plan.

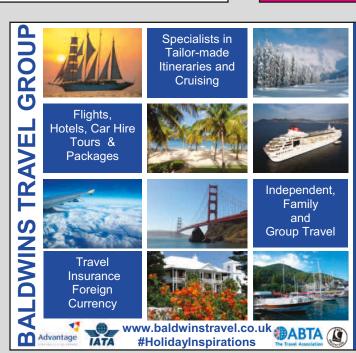

Benenden Collection goes to Battle of Britain Museum

The family of a Benenden flying ace, Wing Commander Ronald Gustave Kellett, has donated a series of his artifacts from World War Two to the Battle of Britain Bunker Museum in Hillingdon.

Wing Commander Kellett, DSO, DFC, AE, served near the bunker during the Battle of Britain in 1940 as the British officer commanding 303 Squadron, a Polish fighter squadron at RAF Northolt.

By the end of October 1940 he was credited with having destroyed five enemy aircraft, two 'probables' and one damaged which qualified him as a Battle of Britain Ace, one of nine such pilots in his squadron. He



served in both the RAuxAF and RAF from 1933 to 1953 and married in 1939 living in Benenden from 1948 until his death in 1998. There is a memorial plaque to him and 303 Squadron in St George's Church.

The donated items include medals awarded for distinguished acts of valour and courage: the Distinguished Service Order (DSO), Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) and Virtuti Militari (not shown), correspondence, flight logbooks and photographs - including one when

he met King George VI.

The Kellett family said they wanted to keep all the items together. With five siblings and 14 grandchildren they were concerned the collection would be split up and possibly lost.

What Child Is This - the story of a carol

What child is this, who, laid to rest, On Mary's lap is sleeping? Whom angels greet with anthems sweet, While shepherds watch are keeping?

The son of a surgeon, William Chatterton Dix was an insurance executive whose fame largely rests with his contributions to the Christmas carol repertoire. Born in 1837 in Bristol, he was bequeathed the middle name of Chatterton in honor of Thomas Chatterton, a poet whose biography was penned by his father. Although the better part of his professional life involved marine insurance, Dix always nurtured a great love for poetry and hymns.

His interest in both was accentuated at the age of 29 when a near-fatal illness and severe depression confined him to bed for months. It was during this period that Dix wrote most of the 40 hymns credited to him, including As With Gladness Men of Old and more notably his carol gem What Child Is This?

The lyrics for What Child Is This? were initially part of The Manger Throne, a six-stanza poem penned by Dix, who later took three of its stanzas and adapted them to the popular I6th-century tune of Greensleeves. In 1871 both text and tune, the latter arranged by the well-respected John Stainer, were published in Bramley & Stainer's Christmas Carols, New and Old, a widely circulated compilation.

The beautiful Greensleeves folk melody dates from Elizabethan times, perhaps even earlier, and reputedly it had less respectable lyrics sung to it in several settings. One of the earliest references to it was in 1580, and it was twice mentioned in Shakespeare's comedy play, The Merry Wives of Windsor. In the 1642 New Christmas Carols black-letter edition, a variant tune of Greensleeves was used in the carol The Old Year Now Away Is Fled. Strains of the melody were also heard in John Gay's 1728 satirical ballad opera The Beggar's Opera.

The providence of history is such that Greensleeves might be less well known if it

were not for the strange illness that befell William Chatterton Dix. His effort to string religious pearls from the tune and his lengthy The Manger Throne ultimately proved successful. Also because of his reverential treatment of the Nativity theme, the beloved What Child Is This? has become a perennial Christmas favorite for churches, concert halls, and carolers at home.

New school: final boxes to be ticked

The new Benenden primary school is inching ever closer to being a building rather than just a twinkle in the eye of the village, but it may be that we won't see the men in hard hats until the new year.

Contrary to school gate rumour, planning permission for the project doesn't run out until 21 January - five years from the original decision date - meaning we still have a little bit of breathing space; in the meantime there are a few obstacles remaining, albeit hopefully small ones.

Of the 16 pre-commencement conditions needing to be discharged before work can begin, 12 have been dealt with, leaving a tantalisingly small number to be ticked off. According to the Kent County Council website, those remaining are as follows:

Application TW/0275/2017 Details of sustainable energy measures (condition 8), cycle parking facilities (condition 10) and lighting scheme for the carpark and general areas (condition 11).

Application TW/0271/2017 Application to vary condition 15 of planning permission TW/12/1442 to ensure that the off site traffic calming measures are approved and implemented prior to the first occupation of the new primary school.

These appear to have target dates for decision by the end of November, meaning by the time you read this, the arrival of the shovels may have moved appreciably closer.

King of Grapes still reigns in a new Germany

The last we saw of our wine man Tracy Claridge, he was leaving Champagne and pointing his taste buds in the direction of Wehlen on the Mosel to start a journey into the heartland of Riesling. Here is how the trip went.

It was in May that I set off from Reims with my old Aussie winemaking friend Bill Shrapnel and his wife Jane to drive the 300km from Reims, via Luxembourg, to Wehlen, north of Bernkastel on the middle Mosel. The roads and weather were kind to us, and we arrived at the Gasthaus S A Prum mid-afternoon.

The gasthaus and winery are right on the river, opposite the famous Wehlener Sonnenuhr (sundial) vineyard - the sundial, now a famous landmark in the town, was built in 1841 by the vineyard's owner Jodocus Prum. The slopes are steep, the work strenuous, but the Prum family have been cultivating vineyards since 1156; since 1971 the estate has been managed by Raimund Prum, who has made it one of the most prestigious estates in Germany.

Riesling is known as the 'King of Grapes' and, according to Jancis Robinson MW, "is one of the world's greatest white wine grapes, capable of making particularly geographically expressive and long-lived wines at all sweetness levels". At Prum, two wines stood out for me: the Wehlener Sonnenuhr Riesling Kabinett 2016 and the Graacher Himmelreich (Kingdom of Heaven) Riesling Eiswein 2007.

Mosel Kabinetts are usually low in alcohol, as low as 7.5% and perfect on a hot summer's day as an aperitif: off dry, honey and green apples all rolled into one, crisp, with refreshing acidity. I prefer them young, but they will last quite happily for five years. It's all

about your personal taste.

When young, it is all about the primary fruit. As it ages, the wine oxidises slowly, and some Rieslings can display a hint of kerosene on the nose and the palate, which is either a sign of quality or a heinous fault, depending on which winemaker you listen to!

Eiswein is only produced when the grapes

freeze, but sometimes
this does not happen
until the grapes are no
longer healthy enough.
The grower takes the
risk, the sugar levels rise,
the grape shrivels, the
acidity rises, and when
the frost comes, the
grapes are picked frozen
and pressed in that
condition; the water in
the must has turned to
ice, and the must is super
sweet with high acidity.

Only 200 half bottles were made of a wine that is rich and honeyed yet still fresh and long on the palate, and will last for 20 years quite happily.

From Wehlen we headed south to Schloss Marienlay in Morscheid on the Ruwer (more a stream than a river but capable of producing great wines when the climate is right), the HQ of Reichsgraf von Kesselstatt, www.kesselstatt.com.

We tasted about 20 wines and I knew it was a mistake for me to be driving in my own car, as I could not resist buying a range of their most sublime Rieslings. The wines ranged from Trocken (dry) to Auslese (late picked selection) and they are light in alcohol, but with seemingly higher, racy acidity which settles down with time.

We then headed west to Saarburg, on the Saar. I had asked Raimund Prum where he felt the finest example of German Riesling existed, and Weingut Forstmeister Geltz Zilliken (www.zilliken-vdp.de) was his answer. From the road, Heckingstrasse 20 looks nothing more than a modest house, just over the



bridge in Saarburg, but underneath you will find a simple cellar, where virtually everything is done in oak barrels.

From uncomplicated, fresh estate bottlings to sweet, late harvest wines that will only begin to mature and develop ten years after harvest, Zilliken Rieslings are, quite simply, among the finest Rieslings the world has to offer. The Zilliken family

concentrate on timelessness over trends, from their traditional labels to their wines, both dry Rieslings and their more famous 'noble' offerings. Again, I had to put some in the boot, to be enjoyed over the summer. They are delicate, elegant, mouthwateringly refreshing and highly dangerous!

Next we headed for the Rhine, crossing the river at Bingen to meet up with German wine

specialist Peter Hoffman, now retired from the trade, at Rudesheim. We stayed at the Zwei Mohren hotel, which I can thoroughly recommend, right on the riverbank and after unpacking, we headed straight out for a trip down memory lane.

Unbeknown to us, both Peter and I had worked in the Rheingau about the same time in 1977 and 1978. This was my first time back, which is crazy as I loved my time there and made many friends. No time to lose, we headed for Kloster Eberbach, possibly the finest Cistercian monastery still standing.

In 1977-78, the monastery was part of the State Wine Domain of Hessen, and I was fortunate to work there sometimes, attend many tastings, and act as a tourist guide. It is a magical place and it had been 40 years since I was last there. I confess there were tears of joy streaming down my face and into my glass of fine Rheingau Riesling. Thankfully I

did not have to adhere to the strict rules of the Cistercians!

Leave we must, however, and headed for Weingut Josef Spreitzer, in family hands since 1643. They have 21ha of Riesling, with a tiny amount of Spatburgunder (Pinot Noir), in the Oestrich einzellage (single vineyard sites) of Lenchen, Jesuitengarten, Wisselbrunnen

and Doosberg.

The main difference between the Rhine and Mosel Rieslings is the alcohol content. Here we are looking at 11.5-12.5%, the wines are bigger, less elegant and delicate, richer, nonetheless delicious, and for me the trocken (dry) wines from this region work better with food. The star of the tasting was the 'Alte Reben' (old vines) Oestrich Winkeler Jesuitengarten

halbtrocken 2016 (medium dry) - rich minerality, honeyed, big and fruity, more for the back of the car.

The purpose of the trip for Bill and Jane was to try and find the best examples of Riesling and take back to Australia all the knowledge gleaned along the way. The German wine scene has evolved in recent years, with producers presenting a more dynamic, modern image to the world, from contemporary labelling and drier wine styles (especially Riesling), to greater communication of Germany's own gastronomic credentials and the related role of wines, as well as how this translates to other global cuisines. Along with a younger generation of outward-looking winemakers, global warming has played its part too, allowing both the drier Rieslings and Germany's rising star Pinot Noir to express themselves more generously across diverse vintages.

Bird Notes

For 25 years I have been surveying our local bird populations on behalf of The British Trust for Ornithology, and my information is included in the table which shows the results for the last 20 years as compiled by the BTO from data collected in the Southeast of England.

Using this table I have chosen a list of birds that are frequently encountered in the parish of Benenden and compared their population trends over the last 20 years. It makes some very interesting reading. The top gainers are Buzzard +1092%, Greylag Goose +126% and Blackcap +107% and the top three losers are Turtle Dove -95%, Willow Warbler -78% and Starling -65%.

The recovery of the Buzzard population is one of the most dramatic avifauna events in recent years. The Buzzard historically suffered from persecution and more recently their recovery was adversely affected by organochlorine pesticides and by myxomatosis disease in rabbits, their main prey item. No-one expected this dramatic recovery and there must be other factors, such as better habitat with the growth of woodlands. The increase in Greylag Goose numbers is all down to a growing feral population on the local water bodies; the truly wild population is not doing so well hence the amber conservation concern grading. The Blackcap is normally regarded as a summer visitor but with climate warming it is increasingly over-wintering here and will visit bird tables. It is not a trans-Saharan migrant and not affected by conditions south of the Sahara which other members of the warbler family have to tolerate.

Top of the losers list is the Turtle Dove, which is a trans-Saharan migrant and probably does suffer adverse conditions in its wintering quarters, but it also suffers from hunting pressures along most of its migration journey, not least in the Mediterranean, Malta being a particular key stop-off point. We are lucky here in Benenden as we still have a small population on the boundary with neighbouring Sandhurst. I did hear more birds singing, or perhaps I should say "purring", in Bedgebury this year than I have for some time so I am always hopeful the trend might reverse.

The loss of the Willow Warbler in the Southeast is connected to climate change and as the population in this region declines, the northern population is increasing. In the UK overall the population shows a decline of 11% with Scotland up 19%, Yorkshire up 1% and East Midlands down 52%. Northern Ireland is up an astonishing 72%. This is a warbler that was heard in every little copse/woodland until about five years ago when the steep decline began. It was once common in Sissinghurst Castle Woods but has been absent now for a

few years. Hemsted Forest has always been a good spot but the numbers have declined in line with the rest of Southeast. However this year I counted a few more singing birds than for a while so, like the Turtle Dove, maybe the decline might be reversing, or least plateauing out.

The decline in the Starling is pretty similar across the whole of the UK and is probably linked to its main food source the crane fly larva, which in itself is dependent on unimproved grassland. The wonderful display known as 'murmurations' of winter flocks of Starlings is one of nature's most extraordinary sights. However to a garden bird watcher it is sometimes not so popular as a small flock can demolish an expensive fat ball in minutes!

Readers will have noted that there are some omissions in the table, the most noteworthy being the Nightingale; the reason being that it is not recorded in sufficient numbers to be included. In the UK as a whole it is down 48% on the same time basis. The Nightingale has had an interesting population change locally over the years. Taking TQ83, a 10 x 10km square which includes Benenden, there were only 15 territories recorded in a survey in 1980 but in 1994 this increased to 68 and stayed relatively constant in 1999 with 62 but in 2012 the number dropped dramatically to 36. About half these territories were in our parish. From my local knowledge I would guess we are now back to 1980 levels, as I certainly no longer receive calls from parishioners as I once did excitedly telling me their Nightingales are back. I know one very good scrubby habitat that used to be a good territory was cleared recently, much to the dismay of neighbours. With the Neighbourhood Plan in full swing trying to identify sites for another 200 or so houses the demise will only hasten, not only for the Nightingale but many other species as well. Houses not only take up valuable habitat but humans and dogs will increase pressure on local areas such as Hemsted Forest, where we have lost the Tree Pipit and Woodcock as breeding birds, and this year, sadly, there were no Nightjars recorded. It's also a fact that more domestic cats equals fewer wild birds.
