Birdingbury Parish Council Report

It feels like spring has finally sprung with daffs all around and the clocks going forwards, giving us a bit more light in the evenings. This tends to be a busy time for the Parish Council as a new financial year starts in April, we have the Annual Village Meeting on 30 April, and the Parish Council has its AGM in May. We have decided to move to 6 meetings a year, instead of 10, so we'll meet every other month (May, July, Sept, Nov, Jan and March). We have agreed some 'rules' that ensure that we don't miss anything in between, like planning applications.

A couple of quick updates on items I mentioned last time. The curbing has been done in Main Street where the verge was being damaged, and this should also stop soil going into the drains. The drain on the corner of Stockton Road that keeps flooding has been cleared and inspected, and that has shown that the water has been flowing out (!) of the drain from the ditch behind it. The culvert under the road is blocked and we've raised this with Highways. The drains elsewhere remain on Highways' list, but it is a long list apparently, with few crews working it. We'll keep chasing.

We have also discussed the Recreation Field safety inspection report. A number of issues have continued to deteriorate so we have decided to address as many as we can. The biggest concerns relate to the slide, the 'multi play frame' (the log frame with the monkey bars), and deterioration of the skatepark ramps. For these three, we are seeking quotes to repair or replace them. We expect these to be expensive so will also need to seek external funding once we know the ballpark costs. The report also identified a long list of smaller fixes that don't require specialist skills and we hope that the village community can take these on, supported and funded by the Parish Council. Please see the piece later in Birdsong for more details.

You might have seen that a stretch of hedge has been removed on the west side of the Long Itchington Road. Our Clerk, Jackie, raised this with Rugby Borough Council and Natural England, which resulted in police visiting the site and giving the farm manager a 'final warning'. This was raised as an issue with the PC and Jackie ensured that the right action was taken by the authorities, but it is an example of something that can be raised directly, and often faster, by members of the public. Hedging issues can be raised with Natural England and RBC Planning, and incidents of speeding can now be reported at www.warksspeedconcern.org. You can also go online or use the RBC app which allows you to report fly-tipping, noise nuisances and missed bin collections. If you have a concern, please do contact a Councillor or our Clerk. If there is a way for you to 'self-serve' we'll try to point you in the right direction.

And speaking of contacting the Parish Council, we have all moved to .gov.uk email addresses, so mine is now <u>guy.french@birdingbury-pc.gov.uk</u>. The other Councillors follow the same format and Jackie is now <u>clerk@birdingbury-pc.gov.uk</u>.

As ever, I look forward to hearing from you and seeing as many of you as possible at the Annual Village Meeting on 30 April.

Recreation Field Working Party

The Parish Council pays for an annual safety inspection of the Recreation Field and the play equipment. This year's report has highlighted that three pieces of equipment carry a 'moderate risk' (the slide, the multi play frame and the skate park ramps). These will need specialist help to either repair or replace them, so the Parish Council is looking into quotes and funding.

The report also listed a range of smaller concerns that we can address ourselves. These include:

- Sanding, repainting and fixing the football goal posts
- Repairing broken rails in the Glebe Field fence
- Sanding down cracks and splinters on wooden equipment
- Covering up exposed foundations
- Sourcing and fitting about 100 bolt caps on wooden items
- Cutting or capping various projecting bolts
- Re-staining wooden items
- Tightening loose fittings on the double swing
- Removing moss and algae build-up
- Cutting back overhanging branches and clearing brambles.

So, we are hoping that there are some practical minded people in the village who are happy to join a working party for a few sessions at the Recreation Field over the Summer. Simon Kent has kindly agreed to co-ordinate the group and act as the link to the Parish Council, which will pay for any materials.

More Commercial Vehicles of Yore

Following my article in Birdsong issue 111, here are a few more transport models with a local(ish) theme.

Midland Red C5 Motorway Coach



This was developed by Midland Red to coincide with the opening of the M1 motorway in 1959 and provide an express service between the midlands and London. It had an 8 Litre Turbocharged engine and reportedly reached over 100mph at a time when family saloons struggled to top 60mph. The M1 had no speed restrictions until 1967 when the 70mph limit was introduced.

Travel Decoursey School Bus: Daimler Fleetline Alexander

Operating between 1972 and 2020 from a base at Coventry Airport (at least latterly), DeCoursey operated many services around the local area.



C and G Travel: Scania/ MCW Metropolitan



At some point a subsiduary of Midland Red South, and operating out of Avenue Road garage in Learnington, C and G Travel ran services in and around Learnington Spa.

Leamington Priors Gas Works Coal Wagon.

Leamington Priors was a small village owned by Kenilworth Priory before the massive expansion due to the Victorian craze of Spa water treatments that created Leamington Spa. The town gas works operated from the 1830s until the introduction of natural gas in the 1970s.It was situated on the Grand Union canal, funnily enough in Gas Street about half a mile from the GWR station. The



works received coal from the canal and was never connected to the rail network, all coal being transported by road from the railway goods yard.



Binley Colliery Coal Wagon

Only 10 miles from Birdingbury, Binley Colliery operated between 1908 and 1963. It was the most southerly of the Warwickshire coalfield pits which stretched up from Coventry through Nuneaton and Bedworth as far north as Tamworth.

Today Binley Industrial Estate covers the old mine and the railway sidings are a nature reserve called Claybrooke Marshes, named after two miners Jack Clay and James Brooke who were killed when the roof of the mine collapsed in 1947.

Harbury/Bishops Itchington Cement Works Wagons



The name of Greaves was long associated with this area, having lime works on the Grand Union canal between the Boat and the Blue Lias pubs. Greaves opened Greaves Cement Works in 1855 and in 1932 it was taken over by Blue Circle Industries. Cement



production ended in 1970 and the site was then used as a depot until the 1990's. Today, a small housing estate occupies the site, and the old quarries, known as Bishops Bowl, are used for fishing, .

On the Right Track, Matt!

In 2020, as I headed towards completing 31 years with West Midlands Police, I began to ponder my future. I'd spent many years being on call for murders, kidnaps and answering calls for advice; my days were punctuated by meetings. My evening TV viewing was, more often than not, achieved by peering over the top of a laptop screen while I tried to make headway into the work emails calling for my attention. So, I scoured recruitment websites, built a CV, and signed up for lots of job alerts.

One evening, I stumbled across an advert for train drivers, and having heard positive stories from those who had switched from policing to this as a career, I decided to give it a go. The selection process itself took years, and in the meantime, I undertook a couple of other roles, both linked to crime and investigation. As the months rolled on, I was invited to various national tests and assessment centres. These tests are seemingly designed to ensure candidates can focus for long periods of time, follow rules precisely, and quickly identify and rectify faults whilst under pressure.

Eventually, in September 2023, I was offered a job with London Northwestern Trains and I began my training. Like many, I underestimated what was involved. On day one, I was issued the rule book which comprised around 1000 pages of information covering speeds, definitions, and what must be done in almost every conceivable situation. Every couple of weeks there was another exam, and if you failed to achieve 80%, that was the end of the line.

After the rules, came what they call 'Traction Training'. This was three weeks to learn the mechanics of the Class 323 train. On the first day, they handed out unlabelled diagrams of the air system, electrical system. They said that by the end of this course, we had to be able to label the 40 plus components on each diagram and state their function. After this, came another week to learn the differences between the Class 323 and 350.

One of the final courses was entitled 'Principles of Route Learning'. Before a driver is allowed to drive a route, they are assessed to ensure they know every line name, speed, speed change, junction, gradient, braking point, low adhesion area, stations, signals, points, crossovers, neutral sections, and available shunt and 'wrong direction' moves. I had to manually draw out the route from Coventry to Northampton, which in the end, stretched out over 18 pages of A4, and included over 100 signals, more than 30 different speeds, 80 bridges and dozens of places where a train could potentially be misrouted. One feature we were asked to be particularly mindful of was 'low adhesion areas'. These are areas particularly prone to issues associated with leaf fall. I hadn't appreciated the danger that leaves on the line presented to trains and passengers until I heard countless stories of trains sliding, in some cases for more than a mile, unable to stop, because of autumn leaves being squashed under the wheels and effectively greasing the track. This is a very real problem when you consider how much of our railway is built in tree-lined cuttings. In some areas, they have removed trees, but the dying roots have led to landslips.

Three weeks ago, under the watchful eye of an instructor, I started driving hundreds of blissfully unaware passengers (I must complete 240 hours under instruction before going solo). I am driving routes across Lichfield, Redditch, Bromsgrove, Walsall, Wolverhampton, Birmingham, Coventry, Rugby and Northampton and loving it.

I can now see how important the training was: knowing what to do when things go wrong; and knowing exactly where you are at any moment, even when driving at 110mph, at night, in thick fog. It has also been reassuring to know that there is so much going on behind the scenes to keep passengers safe.



And, the best thing is, I now have no emails, no meetings, I'm not on call, and there is some lovely countryside out there, but

that will have to wait until I am confident to look anywhere other than directly ahead.

The total walk one way is approximately 1.5 miles from the Friendly Inn to Birdingbury Club, where you can have another pint! Highly recommended.
