Wild Aylesbury Vale



• Choose the right box for you

- Locate in the right place for the bird
 - Sparrows on a flat surface
 - Robins tucked away for shelter
 - Tits with a clear line of sight
- Put out some bird feeders
- Grow plants with seeds and fruit
- Clean out in September remove old nests and clean with boiling water
- Don't use insecticides of flea powder

Goulson – a man who knows about bees!

They are very useful as they pollinate fruit crops. Gardeners can easily encourage these bees by proving artificial nest sites, by drilling holes in dry logs or blocks of wood.

We cut wooden posts and put blocks of drilled wood on top. You can drill holes straight into fence posts.

COMPOST

We have put a Green Johanna compost bin on Boughton's Peace.

It is designed to provide a simple, easy to use compost system to safely compost all degradable kitchen waste all year round!

We invite you to pop your waste in the bin when you pass BUT please be careful with what you add.

Compost has to be a mix of brown and green. Too much of one and it won't break down, too much of the other and it turns to sludge.

There's a notice on the bin, please read it.
