Rural Firewatch (Boughton Malherbe / Grafty Green) Fire Safety Away From Home

This news sheet is brought to you as a joint initiative between Kent Fire and Rescue Service (KFRS) and Boughton Malherbe Parish Council. We are all aware of the fire safety messages in our own homes; having working smoke alarms and regularly checking the batteries, having escape plans, having chimneys swept regularly , electrical safety, care with cooking, safe storage of inflammables, naked flames etc.

What about when we go away from home?

Almost without exception most of us will spend nights away from home during any year and probably take things for granted. We may stay in a hotel, guest house, B & B, self-catering cottage, apartment, caravan, narrow boat or holiday cruiser, with friends or family and last but not least opt for a cruise ship. Our chosen place may be at home or abroad, it may be in a 'high population' area with all attendant services readily available, or quite the reverse in a far away remote place, wherever, caution is the key.

Wherever the destination your and your families safety should be a paramount priority.

Many establishment like hotels and cruise ships will almost certainly have robust fire detection systems (perhaps with some reservation in places abroad), however you should familiarise yourself on arrival with alert procedures, escape plans and routes especially for night time and darkness. For all types of self catering accommodation even if there is no legal obligation there is unquestionably a 'moral' need for working smoke alarms and escape plans amongst other safety considerations. Unfortunately your hirer cannot and should not be relied upon to ensure everything is as it should be. **Check Everything For Yourself.** Mercifully fires are very rare, but in the event are often become infernos in minutes with no time for dithering – remember just two or three breaths of smoke or fumes can quickly lead to a fatality.

Fact or fiction of the need to check things? Two recent personal experiences!

We have just returned from a narrow boat holiday in Wiltshire, a four star boat, 65 feet long x 7 feet wide and high, and fitted out almost entirely in wood laminate panels and varnished timber but somewhat surprisingly DEVOID *OF ANY SMOKE ALARMS*. There was a detailed escape plan however there was no mention of the need overnight to keep the key in the rim lock of the stern door to facilitate a quick escape from the 'rear' sleeping quarters of the boat; nor was there any mention of this with the hire briefing.

Our static holiday home caravan was fitted with a smoke alarm. In the knowledge the alarm would 'bleep' with a low battery warning I didn't check it on every visit particularly as the caravan was only used by family. On a recent visit on checking it I didn't get a 'test bleep'. On looking inside I discovered the <u>battery had been removed</u> by someone probably with good reason at the time (burnt toast!), the battery cover had been closed and it forgotten the battery had been removed RENDERING THE SMOKE ALARM USELESS.

Please never take it for granted smoke alarms are working without checking wherever you stay, familiarise yourself with escape routes, ensure exit routes are unobstructed and doors are easy to unlock particularly in the dark or an emergency situation

FOOTNOTE Reinforcing what has been said about vigilance regarding fire safety when staying away from home Wiltshire Fire Service on an audit of 144 hotels bed and breakfast and boarding houses covered by the statutory Fire Safety Order found only 23 deemed to be satisfactory, 103 required some degree of work to rectify failings and 8 had such serious failings that Enforcement or Prohibition Notices had to be served. No doubt Wiltshire can be taken as a typical County, doubtless we could expect a similar derisory situation for self-catering holiday lets be they cottages, caravans or boats where there is lesser regulation and huge reliance on the diligence of the property owners.

Be safe and carry out whatever necessary fire safety checks wherever you arrive .

Remember to secure your home if you go out; lock all windows and doors and avoid leaving valuable items on view which might tempt thieves. Timer switches can also be handy to turn lights on and off, giving the illusion that someone is home.

Grafty Gourmet

This has got to be the simplest recipe yet. Its more difficult to boil an egg! If ever you do not feel like cooking try this is very simple, yet very tasty dish. Its very versatile and can be served with rice, pasta, noodle, or vegetables.

Easy Spicy Chicken - Serves 4

Ingredients

4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts ½ pint of French salad dressing 1/4 cup salsa 1 teaspoon dried thyme

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 175 degrees C. Lightly grease a medium baking dish.
- 2. Arrange chicken in the baking dish. In a bowl, mix French salad dressing, salsa, and thyme. Pour evenly over chicken.
- 3. Cover with aluminium foil, and bake 20 minutes in the preheated oven. Remove foil, and continue baking 10 minutes, until chicken juices run clear.
- 4. Serve with your choice of rice, pasta, noodles or vegetable.

What is the Cloud?

......and you may ask, why do I need to know? Well recently many of the Internet Service Providers have been encouraging people to use things like – BT giving you "On-line Storage" to back-up your documents and photos, Microsoft and Hotmail have just launched SkyDrive, and Google has GoogleDrive and Google Calendars. All of these use Cloud technology, so I thought it might be a good time to provide a series of articles to demystify this topic in case you come across it and need to understand more, starting with the "Science", then moving into more practical applications that people may find useful over the next few months.

Cloud computing is the use of <u>computing</u> resources (hardware and software) that are delivered as a service over a <u>network</u> (typically the <u>Internet</u>). The name comes from the use of a <u>cloud</u>-shaped symbol as an abstraction for the complex infrastructure it contains in system diagrams. There are many types of public cloud computing:

- <u>Infrastructure as a service</u> (IaaS)
- Platform as a service (PaaS)
- Software as a service (SaaS)
- Storage as a service (STaaS)
- Security as a service (SECaaS)
- <u>Data as a service</u> (DaaS)
- Test environment as a service (TEaaS)
- Desktop as a service (DaaS)
- API as a service (APIaaS)



The <u>business model</u>, using software as a service, users also rent application software and databases. The cloud providers manage the infrastructure and platforms on which the applications run, which are the Internet Providers that we use to get our emails and Internet, who are now encouraging us to use the Cloud by sharing and/or storing documents and pictures etc.

We, the people using computers from home access cloud-based <u>applications</u> through a <u>web browser</u> or a <u>mobile application</u>, commonly known as Apps on mobile phones or iPADs.

So we are only concerned with the two items in bold above and in the coming months I will include specific applications and features that use the Cloud for example, Hotmail SkyDrive, GoogleDrive and the latest that BT are offering.



The November Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Libra for most of November, and at the end of the month crosses into Scorpius.

New Moon occurs on Tuesday 13th November, and **Full Moon** is on Wednesday 28th November in Taurus.

Mercury is at inferior conjunction (almost directly in front of the Sun) on 17th November, but at the end of the month it may be possible to get a glimpse of this elusive planet as it emerges into the pre-dawn sky. In December we should have better opportunities.

Venus is rising in the northeast in the early hours, and by dawn the brilliant "Morning Star" will be well up in the south-eastern sky. Relative to the stars, it is moving rapidly south-eastwards across the constellation of Virgo, and into Libra at the end of the month. Again very little detail can be seen through a telescope apart from a rather featureless white disc.

Mars is very low in the western sky at dusk throughout November, and sets only a short time after sunset. Again it will be difficult to see in the twilight.

Jupiter rises in the northeast soon after sunset, and is high in the south-western sky at dawn. Only **Venus**, which is on the opposite side of the sky at dawn, outshines **Jupiter**. Relative to the stars it is moving very slowly westwards in the constellation of Taurus. Through a telescope you may be able to see the dark and light bands, and some of Jupiter's four major moons.

Saturn was in superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) in October, and is just emerging into the dawn sky at the end of November. Although it can be seen to the lower left of **Venus**, it is very faint. We will have to wait until winter to get better views.

This month is the turn of the **Leonid** meteor shower, which is generally active between 15^{th} and 20^{th} of November. They appear to radiate from the constellation of Leo, and can be best seen after midnight on 18^{th} November.

Some of you may have read that a planet the size of Earth has been found orbiting a star in the Alpha Centauri system, the Sun's neighbour in space. It is circling Centauri B, but with surface temperatures in the region of 1.500° C it is far too hot to support life. However, they say it could be part of a more extensive system containing planets that might be habitable. Astronomers, from the European Southern Observatory, detected it by measuring the tiny wobbles in the star's motion caused by an orbiting planet. At only 4.3 light years from the Sun, it is only a step away in astronomical terms.

Christian Message November 2012 November 2012 – All Saints Day and Remembrance Sunday

November is a full month in the church's calendar. On the 1^{st} of November we celebrate All Saints Day, and on the 11^{th} we have the Remembrance Day services.

All Saints day has been celebrated as far back as 609/610, when Pope Boniface IV consecrated the Pantheon in Rome to the Blessed Virgin and all the martyrs. Then, in 835, in the days of Louis the Pious, Pope Gregory IV made it a Day of Obligation.

It has been celebrated since by both Anglicans and non-conformists, when saints both past and present are remembered.

The word immediately brings to mind all those Christians over the centuries whose lives were recognised by the church as especially holy Whenever we visit an Anglican church, we find it is dedicated to a particular saint or, as is ours at Ulcombe, to *All* the *Saints*.

But who are the saints? Are they just certain holy and God fearing people from the past who have done wonderful things in the name of the Lord – or are there saints alive today?

Would it surprise you if you were called a saint? It would certainly surprise and embarrass me, as it would, I am sure, you. Yet St Paul, writing to all the Christians in Rome, Phillipi and Thessalonika, addressed them as 'saints.'

Saints, in St Paul's definition, are those who acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, and who, through the ministrations of the Holy Spirit, do their best to carry out Jesus' command to love their neighbours as themselves, to forgive their enemies, feed the hungry, look after the strangers and homeless, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit those in prison. One only has to read the New Testament to get an idea of what the Christian life is all about. And Jesus' offer is open to everyone, 'I am the way, the truth and the life.'

This takes us to Remembrance Sunday when we remember all those who gave their lives in the First and Second World, and all the wars since. Remembrance Sunday is held on the 11th of November at 11 o'clock – the eleventh hour on the eleventh day of the eleventh month – the actual day of the month and the time when the First World War ended in 1918. A year later, an Australian journalist, Edward George Honey, wrote in the London Evening News a suggestion that the end of the war, and the 20 million dead (and 40 million casualties) should be commemorated by a two minute silence. King George the Fifth liked the idea, and the Remembrance service has been held ever since.

The Cenotaph (a word which means an empty tomb, encompassing those whose remains are buried elsewhere), was erected in 1920 and bears the words *the glorious*

dead. At the first service, people spontaneously threw flowers at the base of the tomb, and this was the beginning of laying poppy wreaths.

The horrors of war are revealed in the statistics. In the 20th century no less than 120 million people died in conflicts – many of them innocent civilians. Debate will continue to rage as to whether or not war is ever justified. Some pacifists reject war outright. Many argue that the way to achieve peace and reconciliation is through forgiveness.

I believe that, as 'saints', we can each do our bit towards achieving peace if we accept, in our individual lives, Christ's command to love our enemies and live in peace with all men.

Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called the children of God.


