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# SPRING SHOW 2<sup>nd</sup> APRIL 2022

## Rules for Exhibitors

1. All exhibits in classes D1 – D4, 1 – 20 and 29 – 39 shall be the bona-fide property of the Exhibitor, grown in his or her own garden or allotment. See Rule 9.
2. All entries shall be made on the Form provided and delivered to Lesley Schofield or Ron Brumhill (see entry form) on or before Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> March. Earlier entries will be appreciated.

Entry fees: Adults - 25p per entry Juniors - 10p per entry

3. Exhibits must be staged for judging between 8am and 10.30am 2<sup>nd</sup> April in the Church Hall, Denmead.  
Exhibitors must not move other exhibitors' entries.  
Should more space be needed, please ask the Show Secretary or Stewards.
4. a) No more than three entries in any one class may be made by the same exhibitor.  
b) Only one cash prize in any one class will be awarded to the same exhibitor.
5. The Judge's decision is FINAL regarding the merit of exhibits. All matters of dispute shall be settled by the Society's Show committee. Any protest shall be made to the Show Secretary by 3pm with a payment of £1 which will be refunded if the Exhibitor's complaint is upheld.
6. NO EXHIBITS or prize cards shall be removed until after an announcement is made – approximately 4pm
7. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.

8. Cups, Medals and Diplomas will be awarded on the Judge's decision of merit and points will be awarded as follows:  
1<sup>st</sup> - 4 points      2<sup>nd</sup> - 2 points      3<sup>rd</sup> - 1 point  
HC - ½ point
9. The Committee reserves the right for its official rep to visit, by appointment, before or after the Show, gardens from which produce has been entered for competition.
10. The Committee cannot be responsible for exhibits or personal property.
11. All prize money will be paid out by the Treasurer after 3pm. All prize money must be checked before leaving the Treasurer and must be collected on the day. Any money not collected on show day will be assumed as a donation to the Society.
12. Exhibits in Homecraft may be cut at the Judge's discretion. Cake covers will be provided.
13. Exhibitors shall provide plates and vases (although vases are available). A 'vase' has a greater height than the width of its mouth. A 'bowl' has a width measurement at least equal to, but usually greater than, its height.
14. In all horticultural classes, varieties should be named (if known)
15. Novice classes are restricted to entrants who have never won a first prize for the material exhibited in any of the Shows held by the Society.
16. All trophies must be returned, cleaned, to Anne Hughes, The Poplars, Hambledon Road (opposite Lincoln Green Nurseries) Denmead, one month before the next show at which it is to be awarded.

The presentation of trophies will be followed by an auction of exhibits left to be sold for the Society's funds.

The Society would like to extend sincere thanks to the judges, those who have so kindly donated prizes, to all helpers, visitors and those exhibitors who generously leave exhibits to be auctioned for the benefit of the Society.

## Preserved Ginger Cake

### Ingredients

For the cake:

- 175g butter at room temperature
- 175g caster sugar
- 3 eggs at room temperature
- 225g self-raising flour
- 2 tablespoons ginger syrup (from preserved ginger)
- 1 tablespoon black treacle
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- 1 tablespoon ground almonds
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 6 pieces preserved ginger

For the icing:

- 110g sieved icing sugar
- Juice of half a lemon

### Method

Preheat the oven to gas mark 3/170C/325F, adjust for fan ovens.

Grease and line a 20cm/8” round cake tin (spring form is easier).

Cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat the eggs in a basin until frothy, then gradually beat them into the mixture together with the flour a little at a time.

Warm the black treacle to soften, then stir in the ginger syrup and black treacle.

Add the ground ginger and ground almonds, followed by the milk. Chop up five pieces of ginger and fold the pieces into the cake mix. Add the mix to your tin and bake for an hour (until springy and firm to the touch). Leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes and then turn out on a wire rack until cold.

To make the icing, sieve the icing sugar into a bowl and mix with the lemon juice and about a teaspoon of water – you need a spreadable consistency. Spread the icing on top of the cake.

Cut the remaining piece of ginger into pieces and decorate as required.

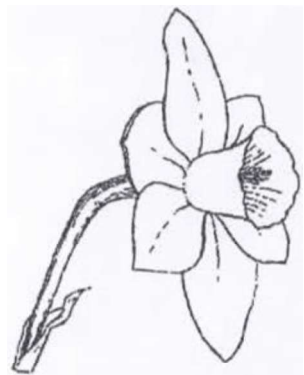

## DIVISION 1 TRUMPET DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

One flower to a stem; corona (trumpet) as long as, or longer than the perianth segments (petals)



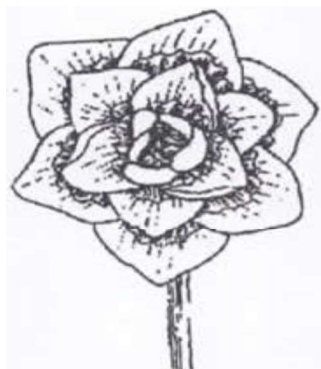
## DIVISION 2 LARGE-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

One flower to a stem; corona more than one third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth



## DIVISION 3 SMALL-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVAR

One flower to a stem; corona not more than one third the length of the perianth segments



## DIVISION 4 DOUBLE DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

One or more flowers to a stem; with doubling of the perianth segments or the corona or both

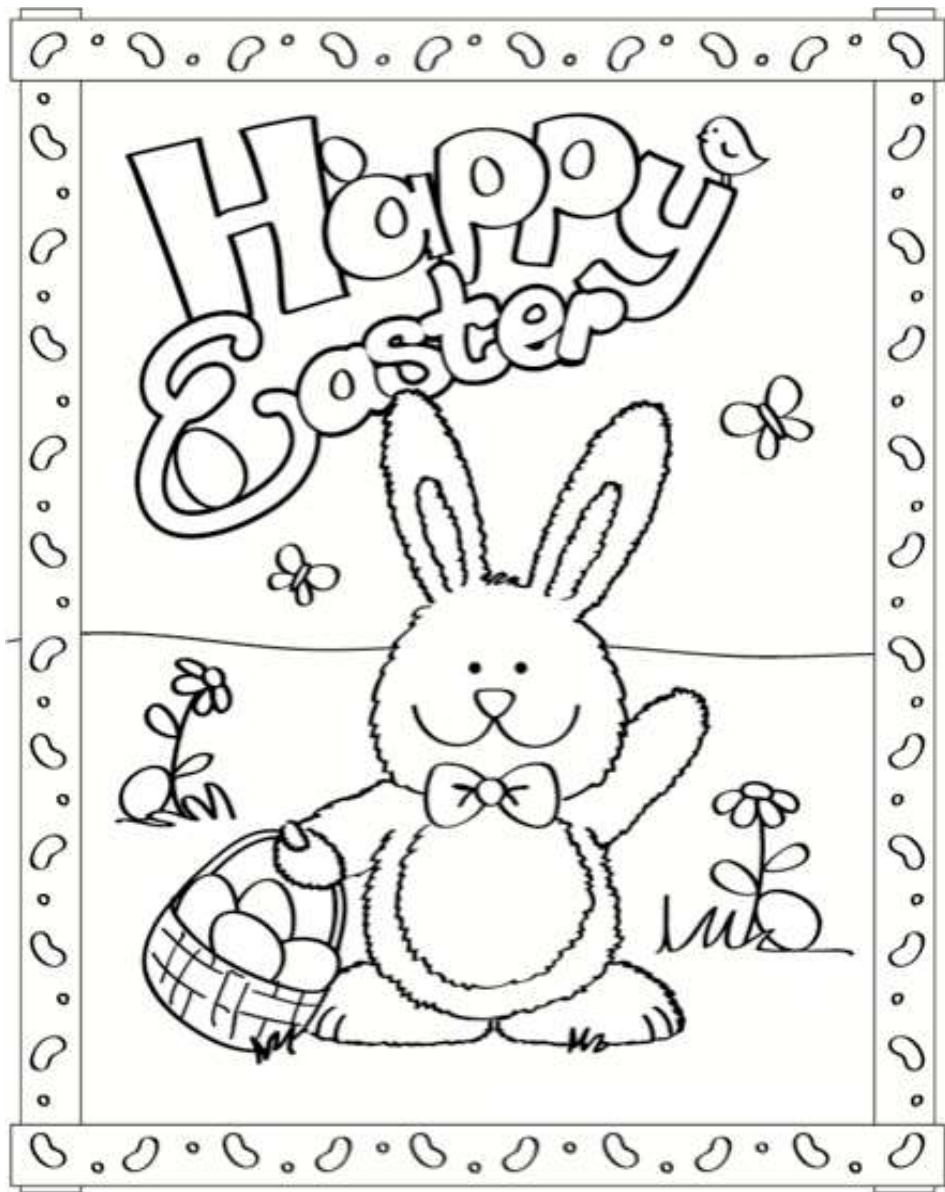
