Parish Council News

Minutes of the meeting of Great Milton Parish Council held at the Pavilion on Monday, 17th July 2023, at 7:30 pm.

Present: Cllrs S Harrod (Chair), B Fox (Vice-chair), S MacMahon and S Illingworth. In attendance: Chris Ashworth (Clerk), Cllr G Heritage (SODC) and two members of the public. Apologies were received in advance from Cllrs P Allen, D Harms and M Horsley. Cllr F Van Mierlo (OCC) conveyed his apologies.

78/23 Variation of order of business

Item 87/23 broadband in the Pavilion was discussed during item 81/23 correspondence and public discussion.

79/23Declarations of members' interest

No Declarations of members' interest were made.

80/23 Matters to report

The County Councillor and District Councillor's reports were received, reviewed, and available on the Parish Council website.

Cllr G Heritage (SODC) wanted to make GMPC aware of the community grant fund available, with applications open until 20th October 2023. The community grant fund is £5000 spread across the Ward.

Cllr G Heritage (SODC) also wanted to make GMPC aware of Planning surgeries that are available to Parish Councils. These are online meetings with a planning officer who can offer advice on any planning applications/issues. Cllr G Heritage (SODC) will forward the link so GMPC can book a session if needed in the future.

81/23 Correspondence and public discussion

A member of the public raised the subject of Broadband to the Pavilion. They commented that the Village is already plagued with telegraph poles and overhead cables, and we should not support a project that would demand more. It was questioned why GMPC wanted this project to go ahead when groups like the Great Milton Youth Club should encourage attendees to be away from screens.

A member of the public also raised the point that the Village plan from 2012 was in that plan to investigate electricity cable burial in the Village and that if the project for Broadband to the Pavilion were to go ahead, then it would mean more telegraph poles and overhead cables.

Cllr Harrod confirmed that the Broadband to the Pavilion had been stopped and that the building would be withdrawn from the OCC initiative. Cllr Harrod said that GMPC wanted this project to future-proof the building while OCC funded it. Cllr Fox added that it was a countywide initiative to get places connected. Cllr MacMahon raised the fact that OCC could turn away from offering Great Milton future projects.

Cllr G Heritage (SODC) mentioned that in her Village, overhead cables are everywhere, and they are going through a battle to get cables buried underground; it is not an easy battle and is still ongoing. GMPC will speak to Cllr F V Mierlo (OCC) at the next meeting regarding overhead cables.

Cllr Fox noted that the problem Hornbeam tree is being chased, and GMPC is doing all they can at this stage for the tree to be moved/removed correctly.

85/23 Parish clerk and councillors' update of matters in hand

- We are still looking at suitable places for the Hornbeam tree within the Parish.
- The Clerk will begin research on getting .gov.uk email addresses for all Councillors and report back at the next meeting in September.
- The Councillor Priority fund has been applied for to help with costs for the Speed Indicator Devices, and OCC has been contacted regarding the installation of SID poles.
- Jenks have completed the yearly tree survey. The report shows there is only one high-priority item. The high-priority item identified by Jenks in the tree survey concerned tree T7, a field maple, and involved removing the stakes and a 2 ft diameter of turf around the base and installing strimmer guards.
- Cllr Harrod asked if work could be done on the bush on the small Island \bigcirc

between The Forties and Church Road to prune the brambles out and keep it maintained. The Parish Clerk will enquire about prices for this work to be completed.

86/23 Security in the village

Residents are encouraged to continue to report any incidents they witness or experience to the police via the 101-telephone service or online via the police.co.uk website. Cllr Harrod asked if the Clerk could contact the Neighbourhood Watch to ask if they could attend the September meeting of Great Milton Parish Council.

87/23 Broadband in the Pavilion

This item was discussed during item 81/23 correspondence and public discussion.

There was a meeting between GMPC and the Great Milton Recreation Committee on Tuesday, 11th July, where it was agreed to stop the process of connecting The Pavilion.

88/23 Parish Clerk Laptop update and discuss a new laptop budget.

The GMPC Clerk's laptop was purchased in November 2017 for £400.

The Clerk uses the laptop regularly to keep up to date with all the administrative side of GMPC. As such, it is now becoming rather slow and crashing from time to time. Recently there were a couple of days when the laptop would only boot into safe mode meaning the Parish Clerk couldn't complete tasks.

The Parish Clerk would like to discuss a budget for a new laptop so they can continue to research the correct laptop for the job.

GMPC agreed on a budget of £500 for a new laptop. The Parish Clerk will research and agree on a suitable replacement laptop with GMPC.

The Rector's Pint

After my last letter I wrote about 'wilding' a part of our lawn. 'No-mow May' is a grand idea, but as far as garden lawns are concerned, moving into 'no-mow June', and then onto 'no-mow July', was not, perhaps, such a grand idea! I fully appreciated that this wouldn't be an instant wildflower meadow, and that creating such areas are hard, but worthy work. After just over two months, I was mindful of the story of the vicar admiring the old gardener's wonderfully kept garden, his prize-winning Dahlias and his abundant and beautiful vegetable plot. Ever the one to use his encounters with his parishioners as an opportunity, the vicar remarked, 'My, what a sight, we really must thank the Good Lord for all the abundance he provides for us". The gardener replied, "Ah that be true. Mind you vicar, you should have seen the state of his place when it was left to the keeping of the Good Lord and before I got my hands on it!" As I said in my last letter, our churchyards are wonderful spaces in which we can manage 'wilder' areas. It is clear now that the wild spaces that I have allowed to develop in my garden also now need managing. Stewardship does not imply neglect!

So, my grass had to be cut, and it became a metaphor. The day after I started tidying up, I read Psalm 90. It's not a comfortable read, as it talks about the transience of all life:

"For a thousand years in your sight are as but yesterday, which passes like a watch in the night. You sweep them away like a dream; they fade away suddenly like the grass. In the morning it is green and flourishes: in the evening it is dried up and withered."

I really appreciate the Psalms; there is an honesty in those writings which reflects the full experience of life, and not just the good bits. Whenever I read them, I will now also read an accompanying meditation from the Christian writer, thinker, poet and priest, Malcolm Guite. The rest of this reflection will be his hope-filled meditation on that Psalm.

A cosy comforter, a lucky charm? Not with this psalmist, for he praises God From everlasting ages, in his psalm.

A God of refuge - yes - and yet a God Who knows the death that comes before each birth, Who sees each generation die, a God

Before whom all the ages of the earth Are like a passing day, like the cut grass In Larkin's limpid verse: 'brief is the breath Mown stalks exhale'. So we and all things pass, And God endures beyond us. Yet he cares For our brief lives, his loving tenderness

Extends to all his creatures, our swift years Are precious in his sight. In Christ he shares Our grief and he will wipe away our tears. (From David's Crown 2021) *Simon*

School Governors' August News Bites

Welcoming refugee children

In October 2022 school initially welcomed 23 newly arrived pupils from Afghanistan. A further 9 Afghani children and one from Ukraine joined later. There was an emotional goodbye to all at the end of term. Education is protective; it is how these children have begun to rebuild their lives and look towards their futures. The Head and her team provided a sense of belonging and gave them a routine via normal school life. We wish all pupils and their families well as they move on to their permanent UK homes. You gave us the opportunity to build on and promote a culture of inclusion and empathy.



School Sports and Outings

A busy term came to an end with Sports Day & many trips including Reception and Y6 to Science Oxford, Y2 to Wheatley Library (on the 46 bus), Y5 to Stratford

on Avon for a Tudor crime & punishment experience and Years 3 & 4 to the Jack Peers Centre. Everyone loved Y6's production of Alice in Wonderland.

Teachers' Strikes Ended

Recent strike action affected school in so far as some support staff were unable to come to work as they had children at home because the schools their children attended were closed. Our school stayed





open. Out of the four teachers who were in the NEU, none of them voted to strike when the ballot papers went out, therefore none of these teachers took action on days of industrial action. Not to say that staff at Great Milton do not have strong feelings about the shortages in the education sector, or that they



did not support colleagues across the country who chose to strike. The Department of Education and all four major teaching unions announced on 14 July that all teachers will receive a 6.5 per cent pay rise from September 2023.

OFSTED (Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills)

The ongoing debate about whether one-word grades for schools make sense prompted OFSTED to announce changes to its inspection system. These include allowing schools that were given an inadequate rating over safeguarding to be reinspected within three months, giving them a chance to be re-graded if they have addressed concerns. Governors are aware of the stress OFSTED inspections create and will continue to support and work closely with Head and her team in the lead up to the next one which will most likely take place in the next year academic year as the last full inspection at the school was in 2013, with a short one in 2018. Our school scored Good both times. "You and your Deputy lead the school with passion and enthusiasm.

You are determined that all pupils will receive the best standard of education and care possible."

Term Dates, including Insets.

Term ended on 21 July, pupils return on Tuesday, 5 September. There are two inset days on 1 and 2 September. (Inset days are formally called inservice training days, but the shortened term is used almost everywhere. They are days when teachers are required to be available for work but pupils are not in school. These days are used for a variety of activities, including time for teachers to write reports, undertake performance management reviews/ planning, planning lessons and schemes of work).



View from Views

Of course it is far too early to make any predictions but at the time of writing I am fairly optimistic, as early harvest reports are of record breaking yields, also all fruit bearing trees and bushes are covered in ripening produce. The next Newsletter in 2 months' time we will have a better idea. This is probably due to the right



amount of rain at, roughly, the right time. In spite of all the talk of drought conditions, all our ditches and ponds still have water in them, which is not usually the case at this time of year. As harvest starts to get into full swing, we are continually reminded that safety must be a priority. Farm safety is becoming more and more an issue, farming being one of the most dangerous places of work. Mainly due to the pressures put on us to improve productivity and, tighter time scales having to be adhered to, which of course is causing many mental problems for those who are susceptible, a number that is worryingly on the increase.

We are constantly being remined of the decline of certain species with all sorts of spurious reasons by those who have a point to make depending on which axe they wish to grind, at the time. This year my observations are that I have only heard the Cuckoo twice once early in the season and once just a few weeks ago, Yellow Hammers that we had in profusion, have all but disappeared, on the hand Sky Larks and Buntings seem to be flourishing, along with some other species, Dragon flies not may sited, but plenty of Damsel flies, and plenty of Grass hoppers in the river meadows.

When it comes to emissions from farming there have been some recent developments. We are constantly told we must stop cows belching, well apparently if they are fed with a chemical extracted from daffodils, belching can be reduced, whatever next. Also, it has been discovered that a gas (Di-methyalsulphate DMS not sure of the spelling or it's actual name but rest assured it is something like that) produced by ripening cereal crops can form a barrier (cloud) that will reduce the effect of global warming. George Monbiot continually says these sorts of initiative only scratch the surface, this of course is true but it has to be right to keep looking at all aspects that could make a difference, in the hopes that one day we will be able to crack it.

With reference to the current discussion over the right to roam policies, there was an article in the farming press and, I quote "Increasing public access to the countryside needs to be a grown-up discussion, with fears the policy is at the centre of a political battleground. Livestock attacks, wildfires caused by open campfires (disposable barbeques) and fly-tipping incidents, have thrown right to roam back into the spotlight with debate ignited once again on how the policy will play out in the countryside". This was accompanied by a picture of cattle trying to eat or play with a tent that somebody had left for someone else to clear up, this could easily have been a Deer, Badger, or any other wild animal. This in a way illustrates the points I have been making many times before that, due to the density of our population now we have to restrict access if we are to preserve any form of nature.

Rural crime is becoming more and more of a problem, highlighted recently when a local farmer hit the national press having had £100k's equipment taken from his yard. Having made that point it is reassuring to read that the Kent Police announced that their "Rural Police Task Force had made 34 arrests, 35 stop& searches, 506 vehicle stop checks and, completion of 75 investigations. A total of 112 vehicles were seized and 97traffice offence reports been issued". Added to this they had recorded 182 wildlife related incidents and 146 poaching reports. This would indicate to me that at last the Police are taking note of what we have had to put up with over the last few years.

Over the last 3-4 years we formed a couple of farm clusters to cover the upper and lower parts of the "River Thame". The idea is that we work together to make more of an impact on the natural world (of our area based on the River Thame) by working collectively on various initiatives. Having had a run-in period we have decided that we should both pool our resources and work as one cluster, so "Thame Catchment Farm Cluster" (TCFC) has been formed. This will enable us to for instance initiate things like, wildlife corridors along the length of the river, produce soil analyses so as to identify areas of risk for pollution, analyse carbon release or sequestration and, create greater conservation schemes. We are lucky that this cluster is being supported by the "River Thame Conservation Trust" by providing personnel with the necessary knowledge, to kick start our organisation. Being such a group enables us access to funding, from both Government and wildlife organisations. This is all very exciting which could produce a lot of benefits for nature, in our special area whilst not ignoring the fact that our primary aim in life is to produce food.

John Howell MP writes...

Population growth and new housing bring many changes and challenges to our communities as we well know. One change brought about is the review of representation in Parliament. Under the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986 the Boundary Commission is required to review the parliamentary constituencies in England every 5 years. This is to ensure that MPs represent roughly the same number of people and therefore have around the same number of people eligible to vote for them. The latter is known as the 'electoral quota'. Another key factor of a review is that boundaries respect local links between areas. Constituency names can also be changed to reflect growth. I am writing about this as there will be changes coming forward which will affect this constituency, not least that the name will change from the Henley Constituency to the Henley and Thame Constituency. This reflects the growth of Thame and the fact that it is now a larger town than Henley and indeed the largest in the constituency. It is also geographically more central to the constituency as they will be moved to a different constituency altogether.

All of the villages which come under Cherwell District Council will come out of this constituency and be part of a new constituency which will be known as the Bicester and Woodstock Constituency. The northern boundary of the Henley and Thame Constituency will be the same as the northern boundary of the area covered by SODC. This is, in fact, as it was when I first became the MP here! This will affect residents in Bletchingdon, Charlton-on-Otmoor, Fencott & Murcott, Hampton Gay & Poyle, Heathfield, Horton-cum-Studley, Kirtlington, Islip, Merton, Noke, Oddington, Shipton-on-Cherwell &Thrupp, and Weston-on-the-Green.

To the West of the constituency all of those currently in the Sandford and Wittenhams Ward will move to the renamed Didcot and Wantage Constituency, currently known as the Wantage Constituency. This is a sensible change as the Ward is currently partly in my constituency and partly in the Wantage Constituency. The Boundary Commission do not like split Wards as this makes local representation more difficult. This affects residents in Clifton Hampden, Culham, Marsh Baldon, Nuneham Courtenay, Sandford on Thames, and Toot Baldon.

And now to something much more local and immediate, I am sure that the news that the upper limits for Fixed Penalty Notices for littering and fly tipping have been increased will be welcome. I know that environmental crimes like these are of concern to many. I hope that we can get wide publicity of the increased fines to deter more people from such damage. The increases come into effect from the end of this month. The upper limit of fixed penalty notices for littering, graffiti and fly-posting offences will increase from £150 to £500; for household waste duty of care offences from £400 to £600; and for fly-tipping offences from £400 to £1,000. This is part of the Prime Minister's Antisocial Behaviour Action Plan which was launched in March. The Government is also looking at ringfencing the money raised from these fines for enforcement and clean up activity.

Parliament will soon be going into the summer recess, but work continues. Although the House is not sitting ministers continue to work on their briefs and I continue with my work. The summer break does give a chance to catch up with things and my team and I will also be taking short breaks as do many others at this time. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts. 


