THE ANN HOWSDEN CHARITY

For those of you who are new to the village, the Ann Howsden Charity was set up by our very own benefactress, Ann Howsden, in 1631. She bequeathed the income from her estate in Moggerhanger, Bedfordshire, to the poor and needy of the village and over the centuries residents have benefited by receiving winter boots, clothes and blankets, as well as coal and other necessities. More recently the charity has given the pensioners of the village a winter heating grant and some financial help at Christmas time. As well as individuals, the charity has been able to give grants to the maintenance of the church and churchyard, to the village hall and to subsidise the Hinxton children's party. Principally, the charity now owns the four Duxford Road bungalows, three of which are kept at affordable rents for Hinxton pensioners (or those with a strong connection with Hinxton), and the fourth is run as a commercial let to augment the charity's income, thus enabling the disbursements as described.

There have been some recent changes which you should know about. Two of our trustees have recently resigned: **Toni Moses** who has served for six years and **Roy Ellis** who has served for an astonishing 47 years! I would like to thank them publicly for their enormous contribution to the charity over so many years.

Our new trustees are **Paula Loveday-Smith** and **Chris Elliott** and we are very pleased to have them join us. We are also delighted to welcome **Nick Cliffe** as our new Treasurer to replace **John Statham** (from Ickleton) who has done sterling work for us for more than 10 years. Nick lives in Hinxton and is a chartered accountant, so his professional expertise will be much appreciated. It has been a busy time this year as we are endeavouring to join the 21st century (in Charity Commission terms!) and are composing policies which are now required and also working on some amendments to our Scheme, so that we are fully compliant with the up-to-date Charity Commission guidelines.

Finally I would like to point out that the charity exists to help anyone resident in Hinxton who is in need or distress. This means that anyone who is suffering hardship, be it with illness or financial difficulty, perhaps requiring some help with house repairs or heating, is invited to apply for a grant. A message from Petra

It seems odd to be writing for January and the New Year ahead when we've only just put up the Christmas Tree and there are still Christingles, Carol Services and Christmas itself yet to go. Yesterday I made a start on decorating the Tree, determined that this year I would stick to the gold decorations only and have something tasteful and elegant to grace our dining room. But as I started to unpack, I came across the little wooden roundabouts I bought about twenty years ago from a Church Christmas Fair in Sawston, and then a fairy I bought for my daughter during a particularly difficult Christmas for us as a family. I found the salt-dough Christmas tree she had made and stuck sparkly bling all over aged about five, two china doves given to me by a friend who was dying of cancer, metal stars given by another friend, tacky lametta that my husband and I have a difference of opinion about. So our Christmas tree is as overloaded and tasteless as ever, but is full of memories and there were moments when I had a lump in my throat.

As we move from the end of one year into the beginning of another, it's often a time for reflection. We can look back at those things we have achieved, enjoyed, new relationships and friendships, as well as the things we've failed to do, the relationships that didn't go so well and sometimes the loss of dear friends or members of our family; memories that can bring a smile to our faces or a tear to our eye.

January is traditionally named after the Roman god, Janus, the god of beginnings, transitions, time, doorways, passages, and endings. He is usually shown with two faces, one looking back to the past and the other forwards to the future. And often at the beginning of the year we find ourselves both reflecting on the past year and looking forward to the year ahead.

In the church year we traditionally celebrate the baptism of Jesus early in January. His baptism marks the very beginning of his ministry in the same way as it marks the beginning of our Christian journey. Baptism is not 'it' in itself. It is, if you like, the starting out post for a lifelong journey of seeking, learning, failing and trying again and again. We'll be celebrating Jesus' baptism in 2019 on 13th January at a special service for everyone at Duxford School.

Although baptism marks a Spiritual beginning, it's very much concerned with how we function in the world. Even for Jesus, as the Holy Spirit descended on him like a dove at his own baptism, he was ankle deep in the mud at the bottom of the Jordan! And, in a very real sense, we associate Jesus with the messiness and failure of people's lives; as he touched, taught, healed and restored them. It's often in our own messiness and failure that we find him most easily; when everything else has been pared away, what is left is God. Starting out on any journey involves a certain amount of uncertainty and risk. Certainly, for our country, there is a lot of uncertainty in the year ahead and none of us can know for sure what 2019 will bring each of us personally. I pray that the year ahead will be good for you. It has been a great pleasure and privilege to meet so many of you during the last year and to have some wonderful conversations with you. I look forward to many more in 2019 and hope to see you at some of the services and new events we have planned.

Year past and year to come for Hinxton Parish Council

The agenda for Parish Council meetings might give the impression that they are held on a bi-monthly Groundhog Day. The issues appear to progress glacially but underneath things are quite busy. For example in our round-up a year ago we cheerfully predicted that a replacement iron bridge would be in place by the spring. Unexpected technical challenges intervened making larger funding demands of the Wellcome Trust. We again predict a replacement next spring!

There is something of the remorselessness of a glacier about the major planning applications. Early last year we put a lot of effort into our formal objections to SmithsonHill's proposal for a major business park in fields by the village. In March the District Council comprehensively rejected it. This has been appealed against by the developers, and we have been called to appear at the Planning Inspector's hearing this coming June. On the hills just across the A11, Uttlesford proposed in its draft Local Plan to build a 5000-home new town. In August we submitted our objections to this. We were expecting to appear before their Inspector this coming summer. But their Plan has run into troubles which may delay the process and may even jeopardise this absurd hill-top town proposal. And sometimes applications simply melt away, as apparently has the one for a service station on the M11 near J10 (thanks to an American Mustang).

There can be no doubt that it is worth making an effort to confront developers' glossy ambitions with reasoned argument.

A far-reaching event during the year was that the Local Plan put forward jointly by Cambridge and South Cambs was finally approved by government. This should help provide some order to local development. But nothing stops new applications popping up. We are starting 2019 with the Wellcome Genome Campus submitting their ambitious 'vision' of a massive expansion, including an affiliated business park and up to 1500 new homes attached to our village of 150. Responding to it, and mitigating adverse consequences, will likely dominate the start of our coming year.

Meanwhile normal life continues. We hope that the problem of flooding at the junction of North End Road and the High Street has, subject to routine maintenance, been solved. The village signs have been renovated. The playground continues to receive attention to maintain child safety. We have been involved in neighbourly consultation on the Genome Campus Wetlands and with the Imperial War Museum at Duxford, who will continue to provide free access to Hinxtonians for all but air show days. Our relations with neighbouring parish councils continue to widen and strengthen, which helps awareness of our collective concerns at Council level. There we are greatly helped by Peter Topping's unstinting guidance at both County and District Councils. Peter McDonald is proving a worthy successor to Tony Orgee as our District Councillor. Despite the distractions of Westminster, Heidi Allen as our MP has also been a great support in our dealings with the developers.



This is currently the home of Jackie Scott & Willy Brown who have lived here since 2013

The Fletcher family with Peter Hiscocks on the right. The children with the dog are Anna & Lauren Russell & Helen Wragg

Between July 1988 and August 2013 the house was occupied by Ian & Jennifer Fletcher and their children Richard, Elizabeth and Eleanor

In October 1997 the house featured in Country Life magazine when Linda Allan had the idea of taking photos of villagers standing in front of their houses similar to the 1911 picture below





From 1939 until he died in 1976, Frank Searle lived there with his wife Lilian. They had three children Antony, Geoffrey and Eileen. Tony and Geoff continued to live in the house until 1988.



Home Farm Article researched and written by Ros Smith

No 1 High Street formed part of Hinxton Hall Estate and Frank Searle began work as a kennel boy then later as a builder repairing estate property. He was the fifth of eight children.

At the end of the 1800s, this was the home to the Andrews family (seen in the 1911 photo on the opposite page)

In 1869 at the age of 19 Elias Andrews married Emily Jane Smith. Elias was a groom on the Estate. A year later Minnie Ann was born followed by Frances and Martina. Sadly, following the birth of son James Whitehead Andrews, Emily died and was buried on 28th July 1877. James was baptized the next day.

Viv Ellis produced an excellent article about David Andrews to commemorate his death in WW1. He served in the 7th Battalion, Suffolk Regiment . His wife Hilda gave birth to their son Douglas just 8 days after David's death.

Elias Andrews passed away in 1935

In 1936, this was home to Mr. and Mrs. Tweed and twins Edie and Pamela. Mr Tweed was stockman at Hinxton

Hall and kept cows at Home Farm

David Andrews of Hinxton, died 15th October 1916



Regular readers will know I try to make my parish newsletters informative rather than political, but given that Parliament has been dominated by Brexit in recent months, it would be remiss of me not to mention it. I hope editors don't mind! Since the referendum in June 2016, I have encouraged constituents to contact me with their views and you have not let me down! I have received thousands of letters and emails, you have come to my surgeries and in response to the incredible volume of correspondence, I have held four major public meetings.

However you voted, I am sure we can all agree that Parliament has an important role to play in managing the process of leaving the EU. To reflect this, last December, I voted for Parliament to have a "meaningful vote" on the terms of withdrawal. You will have seen recently in the press that this vote has been delayed and will now be held in January 2019. In December this year, I voted again to ensure Parliament will have a role in determining next steps if the Prime Minister's "deal" is rejected by Parliament in January.

I hope you believe as I do, that Parliamentary sovereignty and the role of individual MPs really matters. You have my word, that every time I vote, I exercise my duties with the utmost seriousness, unequivocally putting my country and South Cambridgeshire before anything else. By listening to each other, we will successfully navigate these choppy waters together. My website has a dedicated Brexit page - https://

www.heidisouthcambs.co.uk/brexit and is updated regularly so please do check there for new information.

Bridging the gap between home and Westminster, over the last month I have been helping local schools celebrate Parliament Week. This is an annual event designed to engage people across the UK with Parliament, exploring what it means to them and empowering them to get involved.

I visited Icknield Primary School in Sawston (pictured with the Headteacher Mrs Stockdale), where their elections were in full swing and I was pleased to welcome Comberton Village College to Westminster.

It's always so refreshing and energising to see lively, young minds thinking about how they can get involved to shape the world we live in.

Last month I was asked to speak at an event in Cambridge as part of the 50:50 Parliament #AskHertoStand campaign. This campaign is designed to increase the number of women elected to Parliament and to encourage women to stand for office. At each election, 650 MPs are elected but since 1918, only 491 of them have been women.

As you may know, it was only in 2011 that I decided to become politically involved - and within just a few years, I went from thinking about making a difference to becoming an MP. There are still too few female MPs, so if you're even vaguely thinking

about it, come and talk to me!! You've got to be in it, to win it! The shambolic introduction of the new train timetable earlier this year caused misery for so many constituents and I have continued to battle for improvements to the service and compensation. Details of the steps that I have taken are set out on the dedicated page on my website - https://

www.heidisouthcambs.co.uk/

gtr. GTR and Great Northern are now embarking on the next phase of the improvements which were supposed to occur in May. Their new timetable, which will deliver more than 200 additional services across their network, began on the 9th December and details of the new timetable are available here - https:// www.railplan2020.com/ timetables.

I have met with the Rail Minister to let him know the strength of feeling of my constituents about the 3.1% fare increase coming into effect in January. I have been championing a 'fare freeze' on behalf of constituents so was disappointed and angry to hear the rail industry had chosen to implement a fare increase whilst reliability was still recovering from the disastrous summer of delays and cancellations.

In slightly better news, I was pleased to see the Department for Transport confirm that GTR, the train operator behind Great Northern will not be allowed to retain any profits for the rest of this financial year and will have its profits capped for the remainder of its franchise, which is due to expire in September 2021. GTR has also been asked to contribute £15m towards improvements for passengers, on top of the £15m already contributed towards compensation for passengers since the disruption.

GTR and Great Northern know that I will continue to monitor their progress very keenly as they deliver this new timetable – it is long overdue but they now need to deliver the improved services which they promised earlier in the year.

Our guest cook this month is Virginia Walker. Her recipe for chicken breasts with apricots is delicious- light and delicate but full of flavour. Just the thing for January after all the heavy stuffings, puddings and pies at Christmas. Enjoy!

Serves 4

CHICKEN AND APRICOTS

4 chicken breasts

½ pt. stock

4 oz. apricots (ready soaked), cut into bits

3 tbsp. double cream

2 oz. bacon, cut into small pieces

butter for frying

1 medium onion, finely sliced

2 tbsp. flour

4 tbsp. cider or white wine salt and pepper





Brown chicken pieces in butter and remove from pan. Put cider or wine into pan, bring to the boil, and pour over the chicken. Fry onion and bacon, then add flour, cook for a few minutes, add stock and cream, apricots and pepper and salt. Put chicken in an ovenproof dish, pour sauce over the chicken.

Cover with foil and cook in the oven for about 45 minutes at 180 degrees C, 350 degrees F, Gas Mark 4.

RECENT MEETING

Dr Twigs Way is a lecturer and writer with a fascination for the history of gardens and gardeners. Her talk entitled Ernest 'Chinese' Wilson – Edwardian Plant Hunter Extraordinaire was stimulating, portraying the man, and the years given to discovering the locations of plants that we consider, today, to be part of our garden landscape in the West. Interested in plants from an early age he had the opportunity to travel to China in the latter 19th century. Experiencing torturous terrain, political unrest and threat of tropical disease, he nevertheless, over the period of eleven years, introduced 2000 species, including Lilium Regale, Rhododendron, Acer, Berberis, Clematis and the fascinating Handkerchief Tree. His photographs of the locations remain as well as his meticulous records of his discoveries and the terrain in which they were found. The Ernest Wilson Memorial Garden is now a permanent reminder of his early years and is open daily in his birthplace, Chipping Campden.
