
Pedestrian and Cycle Route Options between Eynsham and Stanton Harcourt

Three routes, shown in white, have been identified:


Route A via South Leigh uses road and bridleways. This route is the longest distance at 5.1 miles.

Route B via Sutton uses road, and public footway, which would need conversion to a bridleway to allow cycling. This is the shortest at 2.8 miles.

Route C uses an existing bridleway and has a distance of 4.1 miles.

Initial Investigation

Route A has been discounted due to distance.


Route B – Shortest Route
The route from Stanton Harcourt would use local roads to Sutton.

A public footway, which would need conversion to a bridleway to allow cycling, runs north to the B4449. Consideration of surface type to suit all users.

A pedestrian/cycleway would need to be provided on the B4449 to Eynsham.

Unpaved walking route (PRoW)

Potential off-road cycle route (proposed)

Route C

Uses an existing bridleway the length of the route, therefore cycling is permissible.

Consideration of surface type to suit all users. Particularly on the grass and dirt track areas.

Risk of flooding, so may not be a year-round route option.

- 5. Are there alternative routes we should look into?






Cycle Route Next Steps

Oxfordshire Freight Strategy Lorry Route Map




7.5 Tonne weight restriction area to the south of B4449 and east of A415.
