

In this time of political and financial turmoil there is some comfort to be drawn from all the great activities happening in the village this month. Instead of a time of slowing down and hibernating, November starts with a literal bang with the return of our fabulous bonfire and firework display at Benenden School. Numbers are limited so I recommend you snap up fast-track discount tickets in advance, online or at the village shop (page 9). But, earlier that day, if you have an hour or two to spare, the tireless team who look after the churchyard would very much appreciate a hand clearing the final patch of wildflowers. Then everything will be ready to burst into bloom next year, attracting myriad bees and butterflies.

Other horticultural 'seeds' are being nurtured across the village: work is continuing on the wildflower meadow behind the primary school; plans for an allotment space on Walkhurst Road are underway; and a new gardening group is being launched (page 24). While these may seem relatively minor when contrasted with what's going on the wider world, I appreciate them much more deeply after talking with Olena about the challenges her and her family are facing due to the war in Ukraine (page 32). I can't even imagine what it would be like to have to pack a suitcase and leave my home within a few hours, not knowing what the future holds. Her sister, one of four Ukrainian girls welcomed by Benenden School, is so happy to be there - what an opportunity. While she was sad to have left her school and friends back home, her face lit up as she talked about her lessons and the facilities.

This was at the back of my mind as I toured the new concert hall (page 34). It is truly stunning and what I particularly applauded is that not only is the hall to be used by schools across the county, it is also hosting events for our community, too. Our very own 'not so mini' Glyndebourne!

Parish Council



We are pleased to report that the transfer of the ownership of the allotment land in Walkhurst Road is near completion. For those of you who are not aware of the history of this land, it is a field of about one acre that was kindly bequeathed to Benenden Parish Council by Pat Thoburn, who lived at Pympne Manor nearly all her life and passed away peacefully in 2017, just short of her 91st birthday. Pat's bequest stipulated that the field should be owned by the parish council, and used only for allotments, so we have been busy researching the best way to deal with this in anticipation of the imminent land ownership.

It is very likely that we will need to create a Benenden allotment association, as only properly established associations set up as a community resource can apply for funding. The allotment association will require a governing document, and trustees or a management committee. If you would like to put your name forward to become part of the association, either registering your interest in a plot, offering to help, or both, then please do contact our clerk Caroline Levett and let her know. We would like to clarify, though, that registering interest and/or help does not guarantee a plot.

In other not so positive news, it is regrettable that following ongoing vandalism and anti-social behaviour at the public toilets, we have made the decision to close them until further notice. It is our view that the toilets are not a safe environment at present, and we need to make a difficult decision as to whether we should continue to maintain them, or whether the upkeep costs involved could be put to better use elsewhere in the parish.

We would be grateful to hear the opinion of residents on this matter, so please do email me or Caroline and let us know your thoughts.

Back and busy, renewed and refreshed

Here I am, back from my sabbatical: my 'holy trek' in Scotland and the north of England. What a wonderful and rewarding time it was, full of amazing experiences. Things have been safe whilst I've been away thanks to the churchwardens and service cover provided by our ministry team of Revd Ylva, Revd Rosemary, David Harmsworth, Lyn Hayes and Vicki Young; plus other local clergy, including Revd Jack Bateson at the girls' school - whom I bumped into on Holy Island! - and our archdeacon, Ven. Andrew Sewell. Other colleagues helped with some of the weddings over the summer. Thank you to everyone for help; this meant that most things ran uninterrupted whilst I was away. (Except that part of the ceiling at St George's fell in the day after I left!)

My 'holy trek' involved about 350 miles of walking in beautiful scenery, a retreat at the abbey on lona, and another on Lindisfarne. It also involved time spent in the beauty of nature on the Orkneys and in the Outer Hebrides. I visited some amazing and beautiful churches; went to some 'interesting' church services; visited some medieval and also 10th century chapels, ancient graveyards, and 5,000-year-old stone circles and dwellings.

I have seen the respect with which people of the past treated their dead. I have met some lovely people, from all over the world; I have met many Christians and also people of no faith; and have had some wonderful conversations. There have been many 'coincidences' with the people that I have met. Through the people, the worship, the walking, through nature and simply just slowing down, I have drawn closer to God. I am so grateful that I have been allowed to do this and experience this. Thank you. And I can honestly say it is good to be back; and I have enjoyed leading worship again in the parish. So, for better or for worse for you, and feeling refreshed, I am here to stay for a little longer.

Coming up in the next few days and weeks we have some special services. Wednesday 2 November is All Souls' Day and we have a service in the evening at St George's, where we can name, remember and light candles for loved ones. Talking Point



Campaigning for a legal duty of care at universities

My daughter Phoebe, and her two brothers, Tom and Hamish, went to school locally, Dulwich and then Cranbrook School. They all went on to university, Phoebe to Newcastle to study Philosophy. I am sure you will all resonate with the mixture of excitement and trepidation that accompanies the preparation for heading off to uni. There are such high expectations yet many challenges and this process of flying the nest is a very vulnerable time. Phoebe found it extremely tough and lockdown happened before she had found her feet. There were other issues but, having reached out to 12 members of university staff, Phoebe lost all hope and took her life on 3 June 2021.

You would never think it could happen to you. It is every parent's worst nightmare. You want to ignore it because you think talking about it may instil ideas etc, but it needs to be out in the open and talked about because ultimately it is healthier.

Why am I writing this here you may ask? Students leaving home for the first time are an extremely vulnerable group. They must learn to be independent, have no set boundaries, make new friends, cope with study pressures and are often far away. We trust universities to support our children. Currently there is a legal obligation to ensure there is appropriate support in place (i.e. a legal duty of care) for those in school, the workplace (university staff included) and even prisons, yet there is nothing for our university students.

How could there be a legal duty of care at universities? Surely they cannot be expected to look after students when they are out. Valid questions. So, let's be clear on what we are asking for. Universities should owe a legal duty to exercise reasonable care and skill when teaching students and providing support services: have they missed lectures, are there problems with work, what help do they need and what specific support does that student need?

Why is this not legal already? I have no idea. Obviously, it's more work for the university and something they have not been obliged to do so far. Today the universities do not even record the number of those who have taken their life at their institutions. The result is that they are not learning why students take their lives and what could have been done to prevent it.

What do we need to do? To help our students, current and future, for always, we must act now and seek a change in the law. To do that we need it debated in parliament. Therefore, I am appealing to you to sign and share this petition (https://petition.parliament.uk/petitions/622847). A legal duty of care at universities would bring clarity for all students, staff and parents. There would be proper 'opt-in' programmes, information-sharing within the universities, learning from the past, the correct support services depending on needs. At Bristol, for example, they have adopted a policy where they can now phone parents - 96 were phoned last year. How many lives may have been saved by that? But it is not universal.

I do believe Phoebe would be here today if she had been given the right support at university and, of course, if they had phoned me. It's so hard to live with.




Remembrance Events

On Friday 11 November the Benenden Branch of the Royal British Legion will, as usual, gather at the War Memorial at 10.55am to remember the Armistice that took effect exactly 104 years ago.

In addition to the senior pupils of the primary school we invite local residents to join this brief assembly.

On Sunday 13 November the annual Remembrance Sunday service will take place at St George's Church starting at 10.45am. Members of the Legion's Branch Committee, the Parish Council, Benenden Hospital and Benenden School's Combined Cadet Force will, after the service, lead the congregation to the War Memorial for the laying of wreaths. The Last Post and Reveille will be sounded as usual at the church and at the parish memorial.

If you wish, please gather in Walkhurst Road as soon as you can after the church service as the main road will not be closed. All those with service medals are invited to wear them for our special Acts of Remembrance.

Benenden Hospital

As we move into November, I instantly think of 'Movember' and the amazing work this movement does to raise awareness of men's mental and physical health. Sadly, there are significant challenges within male health; testicular cancer is the most common cancer among young men, men die an average of five years earlier than women and one man dies by suicide every minute.

At Benenden Hospital we know how important it is for men to speak up. Gary and Nigel both had urology problems which they sought help for from their GP before being referred to our hospital for treatment.

Gary says: "My advice to any men who are struggling with urology problems would be, don't hide your symptoms. You should go straight to your GP and don't suffer because there's always help available.

Nigel advises: "Don't wait as long as me. It's something which is worrying as you get older, you worry about cancer, you have PSA tests and they come back and look reasonably okay but it's not satisfactory. It's like many things - the sooner it's dealt with the better."

Prostate and testicular cancer is far easier to treat in the early stages, so it's essential to get checked on a regular basis to ensure that any changes are picked up promptly.

Sometimes these symptoms relate to other conditions that affect the male reproductive organs but if you are experiencing symptoms which could indicate prostate cancer or any unusual changes in the way your testicles look or feel, I urge you to book a GP appointment.

I hope we can all work together to support male health and wellbeing during this month and beyond.

A beautiful painting of landmark Benenden buildings has been presented to the village hall by the Arts Society High Weald in celebration of its 25th anniversary as a society meeting in the hall every month. 

Our village defibrillators: life-saving technology

In Benenden we are lucky enough to have two defibrillators, also called automated external defibrillators or AEDs. One is situated on Wheelwrights House on the west side of the Green and the other is about to relocate to the Congregational Church porch from the phone box on Iden Green Road. Volunteers maintain the AEDs and the parish council pays for the consumables. Boxes do not charge the device, they keep it warm in winter and cooler in summer so it is 'rescue ready'. Neither box is locked.

We are planning to place another AED in a locked box at Cranden Diamonds. The ambulance service will have the code and we will make it widely known to people living and working nearby.

What does a defibrillator do?

A defibrillator is used to shock the heart back into a normal electrical rhythm, restoring a normal heartbeat. It does not restart the heart.

Who should it be used for?

AEDs are used for people who are in cardiac arrest when the heart stops beating effectively. It is not used in heart attacks, when the person is clearly alive and usually suffering chest pain, nor is it appropriate to use it for people who are expected to die because of a long-term illness.

Why can't we wait for an ambulance? Of the 30,000 or so cardiac arrests in the community in the UK each year, only 10% survive. Survival is increased dramatically by providing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), as described in last month's magazine, and by the use of an AED within three to five minutes.

In Cranbrook and Benenden only 35% of category one, life-threatening, calls, are attended by trained personnel within eight minutes.

Can I harm someone with an AED?

No.AEDs are automated and will not shock someone unless it can read what is called a 'shockable rhythm'.

Do I need to be trained?

No, the device talks you through it. I would however recommend you watch the St John Ambulance video on YouTube or attend one of the training sessions at Benenden Hospital.

A quick guide to using an AED and CPR To use a defibrillator, follow these simple steps:

- I If the casualty is not breathing and appears unconscious, they are probably in cardiac arrest. If you are alone, phone the ambulance first, they will provide instructions and send help. Otherwise get someone to call for you and send someone to get an AED.
- 2 Start CPR.
- **3** Turn the defibrillator on by pressing the green button and follow its instructions.
- **4** Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the patient's skin, one on each side of the chest, as shown in the picture on the defibrillator. Ensure the person's chest is dry and, if they are hairy, use the razor in the defibrillator pack to quickly shave the areas the pads are attached to. Try to keep doing CPR while this is happening.
- **5** Once the pads have been attached, stop CPR and don't touch the patient. The defibrillator will then check the patient's heart rhythm.
- **6** The defibrillator will decide whether a shock is needed and, if so, it will tell you to press the shock button. A fully automatic defibrillator will shock the patient without you pressing the button. Don't touch the patient, or allow others to, while they are being shocked (the AED will tell you this).
- **7** The defibrillator will tell you when the shock has been delivered and whether you need to continue CPR.
- **8** Continue with CPR until the patient shows signs of life or the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heart rhythm again. Start CPR again as soon as the machine says you should.

How can I help?



Dancing through life with a spring in her step

Jean Chapman recently celebrated her 90th birthday, so it was a good opportunity to talk with her, not only about her years in Benenden but also about her extraordinary life as part of the Keep Fit

Association (KFA) movement since 1952 Jean started life on a farm in Micheldever, Hampshire in 1932 but the war meant the family moved a great deal which led to Jean attending nine different schools. "I discovered dancing at 11 and absolutely loved it," she says, "but my father didn't think that would be a good career so I studied PE at St Katharine's College in London, where, fortunately, dance was a strong part of the course.

When she qualified as a PE teacher (her mother, grandmother and great grandmother had all been teachers), Jean became involved with the KFA, which incorporated dance into fitness classes. These wonderful classes were (and still are) extremely popular nationwide because they provide a fun full-body workout for people of all ages.



It was through the KFA that Jean met 1950s fitness advocate Eileen Fowler. Eileen had been running fitness classes since 1934, followed by daily

classes on BBC Radio in the '50s. When invited to conduct sessions over ten weeks on TV, Eileen invited Jean to be part of the team. "It was hard work, but great fun," recalls Jean, who was also in Eileen's team when they demonstrated at the Festival of Movement



at Wembley Stadium in 1963.

Jean has been part of the KFA movement ever since, taking a demonstration team from Cranbrook Adult Education Centre to many venues in Kent. "Every year we had a new fitness outfit," says Jean. She also took a demonstration team from Sussex, several times, to perform at the annual National Festival


in the Royal Albert Hall to celebrate the versatility of the dance discipline.

Jean met Roy while she was at college and they married in 1958, moving with their three children, Christopher, Liz and David, to Benenden in 1976 when Roy, an electrical engineer, relocated to Tunbridge

Wells. Not surprisingly it wasn't long before she started running fitness classes, first in Iden Green, followed by regular weekly sessions

in Cranbrook, Goudhurst and Horsmonden.

The family quickly became involved with many aspects of village life. Jean managed the fete book



stall for 18 years and was a founding member of the Benenden Players, which started in 1981.

Jean's energy is truly inspiring: "I'm lucky that dance has kept me fit over the years." She still runs, twice weekly, 'Dance and Exercise for Seniors' classes in Benenden Village Hall (on Monday and Thursday mornings), where many of her 'students' have been with her for over 40 years. A family's journey from the horror of war to peaceful Benenden

Like many I've spent months reading about the war in Ukraine, the politics, the ebbs and flows and the impact on the daily lives of families living there. Britain, along with many countries around the world, responded to the call for help and shelter and gradually Ukrainians - mostly women and children - have arrived to stay with kind sponsor hosts in the towns and village around us.

Recently I had the opportunity to speak to someone who has experienced the trauma of having to leave their home in Ukraine at short notice. Quite by chance in the café recently, I met a cheerful Olena Kravchenko, who was celebrating her move that day into a flat in Benenden with a coffee and croissant. We got talking and she happily agreed for me to tell her story here, and that of her three-year old son Matty, mother Maria and 15-year-old sister Alisa, who travelled to the UK with her and, of course, her father and brother back in Ukraine.

Her story starts when Covid descended and the world tilted on its axis in 2020. Olena had just given birth to Matty and was on maternity leave from her marketing research job, living in a flat close to her parents, brother and sister in Kyiv. They all decided to move to a house with a garden in the country and isolate together, along with her grandmother. "The house was lovely and the fact that it was only a couple of miles from a military airbase wasn't an issue," says Olena. "But it became a major issue at 5am on 24 February when the bombs started to fall and, of course, the air base was a primary target. That morning I would have been getting ready

for work and taking Matty to nursery but was woken up by the windows and doors rattling. Initially I thought it was just thunder, but after the second and third explosion there was no doubt.

"Although we had been



that we were too close to the airbase and that we had no choice but to leave. My father had previous military



experience so he immediately volunteered. My brother works in IT and, thank goodness, his company had been prepared and had booked a holiday complex near the Polish border for its workers and their families in case of invasion. We spent the next two months there in one

room. It was safe but it was cold, with no kitchen or washing facilities. This was a very difficult time - we felt like zombies and it was hard to think about the future and our choices while worrying about those back home.

"Gradually we started to research our options. My brother returned home but, as we speak English, coming to the UK seemed to be the best and safest option for my son, sister and mother, particularly so that Alisa could continue her education. That was our primary goal. She's clever and had already had a lot of disruption during Covid, and things are very uncertain in Ukraine as you can imagine. I contacted a friend who lives in England, who, through her English wife, linked us with the lovely Simpson family in Sissinghurst who wanted to provide

accommodation. They were amazing and helped us with the all the relevant visas and documents. The four months we stayed with them enabled me to find work and, as a result, independence and stability."

Through the host family, Alisa was introduced to Benenden School and she is one of four Ukrainian girls who have been given a free place to study there. Asked to describe the school. Alisa said: "It's a safe place after this stress. Everyone is happy and always smiling."

Olena, who speaks five languages, was recruited by the UK office of the company she worked for in Ukraine. "I can work from home which is great," she smiles. Matty attends The Learning Tree nursery in Sissinghurst and is at an age where is he quickly picking up English. "He had some issues to begin with, but he loves it now and the staff there are brilliant." Olena's mother Maria is a doctor and is hoping to return home soon.

"The whole experience has been dreadful,

but the British people are so kind and have been so welcoming and helpful. I do feel that I am one of the lucky ones", says Olena.



As we finish talking, a door slams shut in the café and Olena jumps, visibly shaken. She apologises: "We never used to be scared of thunder or loud noises but we are now." Ruth Clark

Building for the future



Astonishing! A 'vital community asset' lands on our doorstep

About halfway through our guided tour of the new Centenary Buildings, I noticed a strange thing. One of our number, a sane and levelheaded chap, not easily moved to hyperbole, had begun to walk wide-eyed and with his jaw sitting at least two inches below its normal resting place.

At every turn, the open-mouthed incredulity seemed to grow and he began to mutter. "Astonishing," he said, several times. "Absolutely astonishing." I asked him if he was alright. "Astonishing," he replied, which I took to mean yes, although I'd not seen him like this before.

Of course, we'd all expected something pretty special of a project that had been seven years in the making and had had an undisclosed (for which read stratospheric) amount of cash

thrown at it by way of donations and "careful borrowing", but as our astonished man confirmed, this was some way beyond special.

Many of us - the village's dog walkers in particular - had watched the Centenary Hall and



the Sir David K.P. Li Music School emerging slowly but dramatically from the earth. In the midst of winter, with the site puddled and windblown, we'd wondered if it would all be worth the wait once the Portakabins had gone; and now, in the company of the Mayor of Tunbridge Wells and his big ceremonial chain, we three,

the humble contingent of invitees from the Benenden Magazine, were about to find out.

As we walked and talked with the school's director of music, Edward Whiting, we learned the nitty gritty. The main hall seats up to 800 people, who can, as part of their visit, pass through five pivot doors, which each weigh 650kg but, rather handily, can be rotated with just one finger. Its 'diagrid' roof houses 870 metres of timber beams, not to mention the 1,500 metres of gold aluminium fins that adorn the building. If you have the time, you'll be able to count 35,000 bricks and brick slips, but if you do, you'll be missing the bigger picture.

Yes, the facts and figures are impressive, but it's the grandeur and the sheer scale of the concert hall (leaving aside the impressive 23 practice and rehearsal rooms of the music school) that take the breath away, even without an orchestra to stir the senses. I'm sure that when the crowd are ensconced (on rows of seats that retract magically into the walls) and the music is being massaged by the exquisite birch and maple acoustic panels that line the walls, the place will come into its element, but empty and still, it has the feel of a welcoming cathedral of warm wood, ingenuity and excellence.

What, you may well ask, has all this got to do with the village at large? Well, the commitment


from headmistress Sam Price is that these grand new buildings will become far more than just an add-on to the school's music department. She sees them as an investment in music, for



children, for wellbeing, to destress and improve achievement, to be shared with the state sector and the local community, who have already had the chance to attend a free concert shortly after the opening and will surely embrace many more opportunities to soak up the benefits of a world-class auditorium.

"I want hundreds and hundreds of young people across Kent to be using these facilities," she added, outlining a vision beyond curriculum, adding that the project will represent a "vital community asset for schools struggling with music provision". Who could fail to be impressed by such a bright prospect?

As our awestruck friend said: "Astonishing. Absolutely astonishing."



In Your Garden

It may be hard work, but relax into autumn

With a truly visceral feel of autumn in the air, a book published back in 2001 and written by Dan Pearson is one that I reach to as my companion as I start to shift my focus from the mayhem of summer to the (relatively) slower pace of the new season and into winter.

'The Garden: A Year at Home Farm' was written in response to a four-acre site in Northamptonshire that he and the garden's owner brought back from the brink. I have long admired how Pearson gardens and this is transposed to the way he writes.

While we know him most recently for realising the dreams of Vita Sackville-West to build Delos, a 'garden within a garden' at Sissinghurst, to remind them of happy times Greece, I return to this particular book for further inspiration.

In his chapter for October, he mentions the light and how it softens, particularly in the morning. He planted a large swathe of stipa gigantea and molinia 'Moorhexe' in the Barn Garden to capture this light and the effect is almost translucent. I subsequently 'borrowed'

this idea for a client's sheltered south-east facing border and planted a slightly different variety of molinia called 'Transparent'. When the sun shines on it first thing and the air is still, the effect is quite magical. One word of warning though: although molinia is a stunning grass, it has a

rootball like no other to divide. You may need mechanical means (as we discovered) in the form of a battery-operated hedge cutter, which did do the trick, but it was a problem I was not expecting to have to deal with.

He goes on to explain how we have to 'relax' into autumn and enjoy the 'informality' of it, and this resonates quite truly with how I approach gardening at this time of year.

There is a good section on propagation, too, with replanting into warm soil along with useful ideas on planting up for autumn colour, which is best achieved with a confident 'grand scale' approach.

In November he writes about woodland work, particularly planting new hedges and trees but also coppicing and producing pea sticks from hazel, useful for plant supports in the borders. As we head towards December the colour palette has reduced to a point where we rely on our choice of landscaping



materials much more, particularly in areas nearer to the house, where a select group of evergreens can soften a hard edge yet provide good contrast with the materials, say, of a stone wall. It's another good reason to think carefully

about the hard landscaping elements of your garden, as they are much more evident in the winter months.

After what seemed like an eternal summer of dry ground, fortunately we can all now finally get a spade into the borders and get busy. I do not feel quite as relaxed as Pearson suggests,

as my workload has tripled - and fairly instantly, too. I am now digging over ground to extract newly-sown weed seedlings, dividing and replanting perennials, planting narcissi and alliums (the tulips can wait a month), re-edging borders and leaf-clearing.
