Please note: Changes in Government advice or legislation regarding Covid and the wearing of face masks, social distancing or other measures could be implemented with little warning.




### **POND CLEARING**

Hampshire County Council's Operation Resilience work to clear the pond is expected to last for up to two weeks, and now due to start (at time of going to press) on Monday 8th November. Preparatory work to cut back overhanging vegetation is scheduled for Thursday 4th November. The parking area will be closed while the work is being carried out.

### METHOD OF WORK

HCC has advised that they will use a floating pontoon with excavator which will lift silt from the pond (as picture opposite by way of example).

It is to enable the excavator digging arm to work freely that overhanging foliage/branches will need to be cut back. The works will be carried out in localised areas and care will be taken to avoid ducks, moorhens etc.

This attachment is made of high tensile steel which keeps the weight low without compromising on strength and has a maximum digging depth of 3m.

The silt will be loaded into a tank and as the tank fills, excess water will discharge back into the pond leaving wet silt, which the site tanker will empty and then transport to the disposal site. This method, says HCC, is used throughout the country in rivers and ponds.

### **NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING TEAM**

Hampshire Constabulary's first 'Barn Meet' was held on Wednesday 6th October at the Candover Valley Club.

It was organised by CountryWatch, for Basingstoke Rural South area, to include all policing interests – from District Commander, CountryWatch, Neighourhood Policing to Firearms licensing and Counter Terrorism (re ammonium nitrite).

The meet was for everyone with interest in local policing – landowners and employees, residents, Neighbourhood Watch, local Councils. Much discussion centred on reporting and communication. A Hants 'Disc'

Much discussion centred on reporting and communication. A Hants 'Disc' community reporting system' is to be introduced (Police & Security Community Network Disc system).

Everything comes back to reporting and building intelligence – any sights of suspicious vehicles, licence plate numbers, a quad bike where it shouldn't be... The Police know in many cases who the main perpetrators are, catching them in the act is very difficult. But otherwise providing courts with proof beyond reasonable doubt is also very difficult.

There was unanimous agreement that the event was useful and for similar events to be held on a regular basis.

From the Neighbourhood Policing Team... Thank you so much to everyone who was able to attend our inaugural barn meet on 6th October. It was a fantastic turnout and the glorious sunshine helped to showcase rural Hampshire at its very best. For those who were unable to attend, and as a reminder for those who did, here are the key points:

Chief Inspector Matthew Reeves (District Commander for Basingstoke



& Deane) outlined the challenges of policing a borough with such significant and diverse issues in both urban and rural areas, and introduced members of the rural Neighbourhood Policing Team and Countrywatch.

Firearms Licensing Officer Tony Hill gave an update on firearms licensing and emphasised the need to take security seriously to stop guns getting in to the hands of criminals.

Counter Terrorism Security Adviser James Booty spoke about the need to be vigilant and secure fertiliser to help in the fight against terrorism.

Sergeant Stuart Ross from our Countrywatch Team gave an overview of ongoing rural policing operations:

Please see following Operation names which are ongoing: if you believe that one of these offences are taking place, call 999 and refer to the Operation name. Citing the Operation name will activate a trigger plan. [For offences and incidents not currently taking place, report online or to 101.]

- Operation Galileo hare coursing and poaching offences
- <u>Operation Slid</u> theft of ATVs, quad bikes and similar.
- <u>Operation Rebate</u> Other rural thefts and burglary from outbuildings
- Op Liberal is rogue trader awareness to support the vulnerable who are taken advantage of financially
- Op Signature is to identify and support vulnerable victims of fraud eq online or phone call scams

We are so pleased that there was such strong support for holding more barn meets in the future and we look forward to meeting you again soon.

### **POLICE FOCUS ON COUNTY LINES**

National County Lines Intensification Week, which targets drug traffickers who often recruit children and vulnerable adults to supply drugs across the country, ran from Monday 11th to Sunday 17th October.

Hampshire Constabulary alongside other forces in England and Wales engaged in operations to crackdown on county lines.

Some good news in relation to our Operation Fortress team. While a lot of this might be related to the Town, so much of it is connected to crimes within the rural community.

'Cuckoo' addresses for example play a big part within the rural community and the money used to buy the drugs often comes from crime, including burglaries and other thefts.

Cuckooing is when a drug dealer or a

gang takes over a vulnerable adult's address for criminal purposes, usually as a base to supply, store or produce drugs. Gangs will exploit an individual's vulnerabilities for profit and to avoid police detection.

The Police can only achieve these figures with your help in feeding information back to the Police or Crimestoppers.

### **POLICING PAST**

Dear Residents
Some further reports
of past policing in the
Cliddesden area.
At Basingstoke
Divisional Petty

Sessions on February 11th 1863, Mary Nickless, Clara Goodall and Frank Goodall, all of Cliddesden, were charged with damaging, with intent to steal, a quantity of swede greens, the property of Mr GR Budd, and fined 12s (£35.48) including costs, to be paid in a fortnight, or in default to be committed to Winchester Gaol for seven days.

Captn Philip Mack was summoned for having, on September 22nd 1909, at Cliddesden, kept a carriage without a licence. He was also charged with a similar offence in respect to a male servant. PC Jones said that on the day in question he saw a two-wheeled trap belonging to the defendant being used, and the next day he saw the defendant and asked if he had a licence for his trap. Captn Mack replied: 'No I haven't received any notice, or I would have sent the cheque as usual.' He made a similar statement with regard to the licence for his gardener. He was fined 24s (£93.80) in total for the two offences.

Bert Jacobs, a young man living in Soper's Grove, who said he was working on the new well at Cliddesden, pleaded guilty to having been drunk and disorderly in Cliddesden on the 2nd of September 1903. PC Wallace said that at 10 o'clock on Monday night he found the defendant lying asleep by the side of the road near the railway bridge at Cliddesden. He was unable to raise him and when he did wake he was very violent towards the Constable and refused to walk. The Constable asked a passing cyclist to go to Basingstoke Police Station and ask that assistance might be sent to him. Jacobs then walked to the Police Station. He had a previous conviction and so was fined 10s including costs. George Hedger, a thatcher of Nutley, was summonsed for having ridden a bicycle without a light on the highway leading from Farleigh Wallop to Cliddesden, at 11.20pm on May 16th 1903 when he was stopped by PC Quibell. He said that his light had just gone out and he didn't have matches to re-light it. A friend riding about three yards in front came back and lit the lamp. At Basingstoke Divisional Petty Sessions Mr Hedger said he did not have any 'Lucifers' (matches) and could not make his friend hear. He was fined 1s and 7s costs.

## J7 WAREHOUSING APPLICATION REFUSED BY DEVELOPMENT CONTROL COMMITTEE BDBC

On 27th October, Development Control Committee Councillors voted 9 to two with one abstention to Refuse the planning proposal for what would be one of the UK's largest warehouses and distribution centres near M3J7. This at the application's second hearing and following previous decision and officer recommendation for approval.

<u>20/02586/FUL</u> Land At Oakdown Farm, Winchester Road, Dummer.

This time environmental and ecological concerns were give more weight. The declared ecological emergency coupled with the climate emergency played a huge part in Councillors' decisions to refuse this application



The felling of ancient Oak trees, air and light and noise pollution, were issues raised during the debate.

The application has been opposed by Dummer Parish Council, Ward Councillors, the action group CAGE (clean air green environment) and the Change.org petition to 'Stop the destruction of 67 Oak and 3 Beech trees on Oakdown Farm'. It is likely the developers will appeal.






Eastwood's appearance in the film, after his string of **Spaghetti** Western and Dirty Harry roles, somewhat startled the film industry

and he was reportedly advised against making it. Although it was very poorly reviewed by critics, the film went on to become an enormous success and became, along with its 1980 sequel Any Which Way You Can, two of the highest grossing Eastwood films. When adjusted for inflation, it ranks as one of the top 250 highest-grossing films of all time. Which just goes to show what critics know.


Zellweger in the title role, Ewan McGregor as her

### **TOWN CENTRE FUTURE**

Earlier this year BDBC consulted on what residents, groups and businesses would like to see in the town centre in the future. From feedback received, consultants have created 'Early Vision and Masterplan' principles. These include:

- Opening up the town centre to make it more accessible; creating opportunities for more community and cultural activities and more green spaces.
- New high quality and low carbon urban communities for those wanting to live, work and play in a central area, with facilities and activities on the doorstep, including shops, parks, community space and transport links.
- Reimagining the existing Malls building to open up the area, creating opportunities for uses in addition to retail for community and cultural use, space for entrepreneurs and education. Modernising shopfronts at the Top of the Town while celebrating the borough's rich heritage.
- Making the town centre more walkable and cyclefriendly by introducing new traffic zones, two-way traffic on New Road, creating a new bus interchange at Churchill Way and a new multi-storey car park in New Road.

The Vision is to create a 'greener' feel through new open spaces in Church Street and in the Top of the Town as well as new planting to improve the area's biodiversity.

### BDBC DECLARES ECOLOGICAL EMERGENCY

At full Council meeting of 14th October, a motion to declare an Ecological Emergency was proposed by Cllr Konieczko, seconded by Cllr Harvey and agreed unanimously.

From the Notice of Motion: Council notes...

- 1. The recent *Dasgupta Review* on the Economics of Biodiversity confirms that our societies and economies are embedded within nature, not external to it.
- 2. Humanity and the economy depend on the services that nature provides... People also derive a sense of wellbeing from a healthy natural environment.
- 3. *The State of Nature 2019* highlighted the critical decline in UK biodiversity.
- 4. The Environment Bill will require the introduction of a Local Nature Recovery Strategy and Nature Recovery Networks as an aid to planning.

### **Council resolves to:**

- 1. Declare an Ecological Emergency.
- Maximise co-benefits from addressing Climate and Ecological Emergencies.
- 3. Add ecological implications alongside those for climate and sustainability in Committee and Council reports, and embed ecological initiatives within all council work areas, including COVID recovery projects and programmes.
- 4. Work with local communities, county, regional and national partners to promote landscape and habitat protection, restoration, expansion and connectivity, while devolving greater responsibility to genuinely-empowered community groups.
- Work with stakeholders to provide everyone, and especially children, with opportunities to learning about and reconnect with nature.

- 6. Ensure the Ecological (and Climate) Emergencies are strategic priorities for land use planning, planning policies and design guides, and protecting areas for habitat restoration and biodiversity gain. Seek to incorporate biodiversity, nature recovery networks, green and blue infrastructure and ecosystems services into the Local Plan, Neighbourhood Plans and other initiatives.
- Create a register of natural assets and estimate the ecosystem services derived from those assets.
- 8. Recommend to Cabinet that funding is provided for an Ecological Emergency Strategy and Action Plan...

Cllr Mark Ruffell, Cabinet member for Environment, spoke in support: 'Restoring nature is vital to tackling climate change.' Labour group leader Cllr Andy McCormick said: 'I hope... it will crystallize our thoughts. Do not pave gardens, guard the undergrowth, join and

support conservation groups.'
