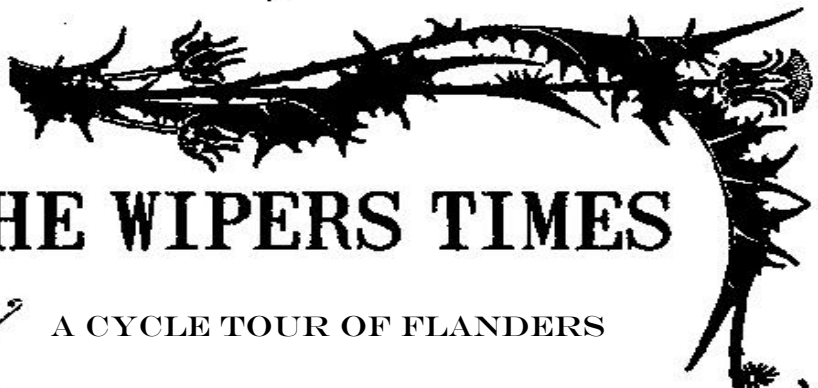
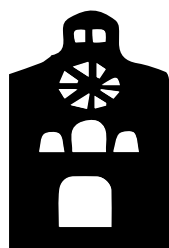


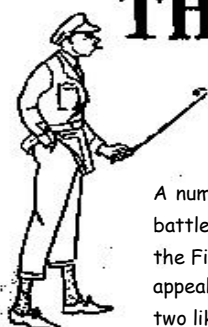

THE WIPERS TIMES

A CYCLE TOUR OF FLANDERS



A number of things conspired to inspire a cycling tour of the battlefields of Flanders the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War, retirement, a new touring bike, the appeal of a relatively flat landscape, the allure of Belgian beer, and the enthusiasm of two like-minded friends, Stuart & Tim.

Trio editor Ann Williams asked me to *take lots of photographs and write something for the August Newsletter* to coincide with the centenary of the official declaration of war on 4th August 1914. The whole 4-day, 110-mile adventure also took in the Battle of Waterloo landscape, a sortie around Oudenaarde and a day around the beautiful city of Brugge (Bruges). My logistical genius friend Stuart managed the schedule and we left on the 7.30am ferry from Dover to Calais, arriving in Ypres mid-morning for a good day of cycling and sightseeing. Our route took us through the Menin Gate and out of Ypres via *Hellfire Corner*, now a benign suburban roundabout, though during the war it was considered to be *the most dangerous place on earth*. Quiet lanes through gently undulating terrain led to Tyne Cot Cemetery near Passendale where almost 12,000 dead and 35,000 missing men are honoured. It's the largest Commonwealth forces cemetery for any war, anywhere in the world and it's just for allied soldiers who died in this part of Flanders 1917-18. The landscape around Ypres has scores of cemeteries and memorials, British & Commonwealth, Belgian, French and German for around 500,000 soldiers of all nationalities who perished on the Salient front.

After visiting Hill 60, Sanctuary Wood and the Hoge Crater museum, by late afternoon we arrived back in Ypres for the excellent Flanders Fields museum with a novel interactive account of personal experiences of the conflict. At 8.00pm we attended the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate memorial to 55,000 men who have no known grave, where we joined about a thousand other people for a very humbling 30-minute ceremony that has taken place every day since 2nd July 1928.

In a vast battle-scarred landscape around Ypres, there aren't any mature trees or buildings over 100 years old, there are around half a million graves and names on memorials for young men who had families, friends, loved ones and youthful aspirations, tragically cut short by war. What struck me most was the futility of the carnage, where half a million men died for a bit of Belgium that we cycled round in a day.

I hope that on Remembrance Sunday the people of Harby, Thorney and the *Thankful Village* of Wigsley continue to remember the men of our parishes who fought in the Great War.

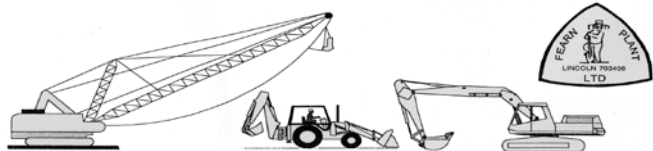

For our May meeting, archaeologist, Jane Young, and her assistant Jo, brought along a vast amount of pottery and ceramics to show us. These were passed around for us all to handle, which was a delight compared to seeing them through a glass case in a museum.

The oldest pots were from the 9th century and the newest were from the 1930s. As some of the older pots were just pieces there were also replicas to show us what the full item would have been like. The presentation was entertaining, informative and interactive. We had to guess what the items may have been used for, often with surprising results. We learnt how the items were handled, for example, why mug handles weren't used when drinking. and what tea saucers were really for. Jane told us about the difference between ceramics used by rich and poorer families and which would pour tea into a cup first and which would pour milk and why. From what we learnt we had to spot the difference between a Victorian vase and a modern replica, and we'd all paid enough attention to the detail to get this one correct.

Jo then came on and told us what to look out for at car boot sales, which was really fun and made us all plan to set our alarm clocks early for Sunday!

Finally, Jane and Jo brought out a selection of cook books with medieval recipes so we could see what sort of thing was actually cooked in the vessels we'd seen that night.

After the presentation, Jayne Rose showed an item that she had discovered in her garden and asked Jane and Jo's opinions. It turned out to be part of a jug from the late 13th or early 14th century. It was really exciting to think that a family in Harby was perhaps using that jug at the time of Queen Eleanor's fated visit to the village.

For our June meeting, Richard Croft provided us with an illustrated and sometime moving account of his recent cycle holiday. Entitled "Belgian Battlefields- a Cycle Tour from Waterloo to Ypres" we saw now and then photos of the battle sites and local towns that were affected during the Battle of Waterloo and the First World War. It was hard to believe the destruction when the today photos were viewed of such calm scenery. We also saw the war cemeteries and how many men lost their lives during World War I. All this was interspersed with photos and tales of Belgian beer!

After the presentation, Colin Wells showed us part of his postcard collection. The cards he brought with him were of Canada and Alaska and were over 100 years old. He also had a collection of Red Indian postcards from the 1908 Great Exhibition in London.

Our next meeting is on 30 September at 7:30pm and is a talk and slide show by Richard Pullen. Entitled "Women's Role in the Building of Tanks in WWI", Richard will also be bringing along his book for sale. Signed copies of these would make lovely Christmas presents for that hard to buy for person so please bring money along.

Meetings are on the last Tuesday of the month in the village hall lounge and unless specified start at 7:30 pm. £1 entry and everyone is welcome. Please phone me if you want more information or even just a bit of encouragement to attend. New members welcome on a regular or casual basis.

Mighty oaks from little acorns grow

The last 18 months have brought many exciting changes to North Clifton Primary School. Our previous headteacher, having refocused the school, moved to a larger school at the end of the spring term, and we have appointed a new Headteacher who will be starting in September. The OFSTED inspection of May 2014 rated the school as good in all areas and made particular comment on the 'good and sometimes outstanding teaching'. This is very pleasing as it is difficult for a small primary school to be awarded 'good' in all areas. We are now aiming for 'outstanding'!

Something we have learned recently is that, because we are a small school tucked away in a rural location, some people have not heard of us. North Clifton Primary School is a designated provider for free state education for any child who has reached their third birthday. This means that children in the Foundation Unit are accepted from outside the normal catchment area of the school. This unit is well equipped and run by a qualified teacher and teaching assistants. Our recent OFSTED inspection found that the children in our Foundation Unit 'make good progress across all areas of learning and outstanding progress in their personal and social development, communication and language'. It was part of the process of giving residents not only the opportunity to try something new, but allow them to be able to discuss the village questionnaire, which was in circulation at that time. We were pleased at the number of people who turned up for a cup of tea, delicious cakes and to sample the Kurling as well.

The answers on the questionnaires are currently being fed into Survey Monkey which will help us analyse the results. Members of the Committee are working as quickly as possible to input all your answers, but it is quite a large and laborious task. However I can promise you that every single tick and comment is being fed into the website.

The findings will be written into an Action Plan which will support development over the next ten years. This will then assist the Parish Councils and other Public Services by providing a true picture of how the residents feel about their villages.

CRIME PREVENTION – PCSO Thomas Pettit

Crime across the County is reviewed every day by the senior management and the local Neighbourhood Policing Teams. What has become apparent recently is the number of offences that have occurred which could have been prevented by taking simple crime prevention measures.

There has recently been a spate of thefts from vehicles in the north of the county. A large number of the targeted vehicles had been left unlocked and with property left on display. Had the vehicles been locked then the offences would not have occurred and more importantly the owners would not have become the victims of crime. Other potentially avoidable crimes of note have been a 4 x 4 stolen from a drive because the keys had been left in the ignition and the theft of a van after the keys had been hooked off a table in an office through an open window.

Another issue which was recently highlighted to me whilst on patrol is the delayed reporting of suspicious incidents and crime to the police from our rural communities. On one morning in particular I was in a village North of Newark and in 15 minutes spoke to three people who all reported crimes and suspicious activity from the week before. Had we been made aware of these crimes at the time we would have been able to direct resources appropriately.

We rely on intelligence from the community to help target crime and reduce anti social behaviour. It is therefore vital that if you see anything untoward, out of place or suspicious that you report it to the control room calling 101 or if you suspect a crime is being committed or about to be, ring 999, we will investigate. One member of the public did just that in the early hours recently on seeing three suspicious men and a vehicle in a village. Officers attended and stopped the vehicle arresting all three of the males for going equipped to steal.

Crime is continuing to fall within Nottinghamshire and our rural villages and rural areas remain safe places to live, work and enjoy. With your help we can make them even safer.

The Group is an important facility within the village, not just for the children, but also for the parents. It is a great support network as you try to navigate life as a new parent and being in the company of people in the same boat can be a real help. I have made some very good friends through the toddler group and I know they will remain as such as our children go through school together.

I have really enjoyed my time as leader, and gained a lot from the Toddler Group but I also hope I have given something back to the village, as I have definitely had a lot out of it in the past.

I know I now leave it in very capable hands, and on that note I will now look forward to entering the next era of my life!!
